2007 FACULTY MEMBER OF THE YEAR

Bob Wright

Professor, Department of Biological Sciences



Bob Wright never intended to work at Olivet. In fact, he never intended to become a professor at all. Instead, he planned for a career in medical research and accepted a research position at the University College London.

So in 1968, when then-President Harold Reed asked Bob to teach anatomy and physiology for Olivet's new nursing program, Bob politely declined.

But as he and his wife, Marylon, prepared to leave for London, Bob could not stop thinking about President Reed's offer. He also remembered how his own father had given up a lucrative career as a pathologist to teach at a small Christian college — and how he'd never seen his dad happier or more satisfied.

And so, although he was sure God was making a mistake, Bob accepted the position. Now, 37 years later, he's still grateful for the opportunity to invest in the lives of young Christian men and women.

"I'm very fortunate to have some very good students and to be involved in the development of their lives. I'm encouraged by the spiritual depth and sincerity of students today. They have a genuine interest in serving God," he says.

And Bob has a genuine interest in helping them do so. He has a heartfelt concern for his students, challenging them to grow intellectually and spiritually.

"It is extremely important to help students become grounded in their faith. My goal every day is to help my students

mature and develop spiritually, to develop their God-given abilities and to find God's direction for their lives. I pray every day that the Lord will help me be sensitive to the needs of each one who crosses my path."

In the classroom, Bob's enthusiasm for his subject is evident. Almost four decades into his career, you won't find Bob reading from 35-year-old lecture notes. He constantly reworks classes around the needs of his students — looking for new ways to present material they have trouble comprehending. "I'm here to help them understand what they don't know," he says matter-of-factly.

He speaks passionately about the intricacies of the human body and how God wonderfully created each part to work together, making the subject come alive for his students.

But if being a professor was just about teaching, Bob says, he wouldn't still be here. His profession, his calling, is much more than that. "It's an opportunity to interact with students, to help them in their growth as the Lord leads them," he reflects. "The satisfaction comes in seeing them be successful, both professionally and spiritually."

Bob, for your dedication to your students, for your commitment to "Education With a Christian Purpose" and for your pursuit of God's will in your own life, we salute you as the 2007 Faculty Member of the Year.

Kathy Steinacker

Associate Dean of Community Life



Kathy Steinacker says she was born to be an Olivetian. Throughout her childhood, she heard the praises of Olivet at district events and general assemblies. Her grandparents would even bring Kathy to the University when they attended board meetings.

In fact, when choosing a college, she never visited or considered another school. "The loyalties and devotions shown to Christ and the Nazarene Church by those who surrounded me gave me the confidence to accept that ONU was a great decision for my future education," Kathy remembers.

But returning after graduation was not in her plans. She served as a residential coordinator at a home for unwed mothers, and then spent two years in adoption services. She followed with an unlikely step to a sales position within a real estate company.

"Yes, I too wondered what in the world I was doing," Kathy laughs. "However, this served as a catalyst that reinforced my convictions, strengthened my self confidence and opened up new career possibilities."

One new possibility included a return to her alma mater, serving in the Office of Student Development. Remembering her deep affection for the University, Kathy prepared for another journey to Olivet.

As associate dean of community life, Kathy earnestly seeks to educate and challenge students to grow holistically. Her love of students and the University is

evident as she prepares student events and works alongside student leaders.

"I genuinely enjoy the process of helping and watching students grow as they journey through new challenges," she says.

And students naturally respond to Kathy's genuine and sincere spirit, seeking her out for advice and guidance. Her willingness to reach out to students extends far beyond the walls of the student development office.

In fact, Kathy often finds that the unscheduled moments are the ones that mean the most to both student and staff member.

"My most significant work over these past ten years has been in the passing conversations, unscheduled meetings, and random stops to check in on someone," she reflects. "This kind of work is immeasurable and is what has brought me deep meaning and satisfaction."

As Kathy and husband Matt prepare to welcome their first child, she looks forward to continued service to Olivet and the surrounding community.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OLIVET

Olivet Nazarene University's origins can be traced to the first decade of the last century and to the resolve of several families in east central Illinois who were committed to providing a Christian education for their children. In 1907, classes began in a home in the community of Georgetown, Illinois, and a year later, the founders acquired several acres of land in the nearby village called Olivet. There, they raised a modest building and added the secondary level of instruction. A College of Liberal Arts followed in 1909, along with the first name for this fledgling, but ambitious, institution: "Illinois Holiness University."

By 1912, the founders and trustees were aware of the school's need for a wider constituency and offered to give their educational work to the Church of the Nazarene. This young denomination accepted the school with a pledge to support and promote its ministry of Christian higher education. That early church commitment is still being perpetuated by the more than 800 Nazarene congregations throughout Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin.

The school grew slowly during the next decade. There were several acting and short-term presidents; the campus of 18 acres contained only a few small buildings; the first yearbook, the *Aurora*, was published in 1914; and a new school name followed in 1915: "Olivet University." In 1923, the name was changed to "Olivet College."

As was the case with many small church colleges in the 1920s, Olivet's financial base eroded significantly, forcing the trustees to declare bankruptcy in 1926. Then-college treasurer Dr. T.W. Willingham bought the

school back at a public auction, outlined a new plan for solvency, and was elected that night to serve as president.

A devastating fire destroyed the main campus building in November 1938, prompting the newly elected president, A.L. Parrott, and the trustees to consider locating a new campus as an alternative to rebuilding at their rural site. They found and purchased the present campus in Bourbonnais in 1939 and moved the college in the summer of 1940. "Nazarene" was added to the college's name that same year.

At the time of Olivet's move to Bourbonnais, the campus consisted of 42 acres, which had been the site of St. Viator's College from 1868 until it closed in 1938. Four of the buildings purchased then are still in use today.

Receiving formal recognition and accreditation by the University of Illinois in 1939 was a major academic milestone for Olivet. The college catalogs of the 1940s reflected a School of Liberal Arts, a School of Music, a School of Religion, and a high school Academy. In 1953, under the skillful leadership of Dr. Harold W. Reed, president, and Dr. Willis Snowbarger, newly appointed dean, all areas of study were grouped into curricular divisions, still the model for Olivet's academic organization.

Dr. Harold W. Reed, president from 1949–1975, led Olivet through a period of remarkable growth, including the construction of 20 major buildings to keep pace with swelling student enrollments.

Dr. Leslie Parrott continued this focus on campus expansion, development and beautification during his sixteen-year ten-

ure with a specific interest in the elevation of Olivet to university status.

In 1986, the school's name was changed to "Olivet Nazarene University" to reflect the diversity of academic programs and graduate studies.

In 1991, Dr. John C. Bowling became president and has led the University in continued growth and effective ministry.

During the decade of the 1990s, Olivet expanded and strengthened both its undergraduate and graduate programs. The University established a formal development program including planned giving and major gifts, an annual fund program known as Friends of Olivet, renewed grant writing, a comprehensive program of donor relations, and the "In Word and Deed" capital campaign. In 1994, a full-time chaplaincy program was established to give direction to chapel, student spiritual life activities, small-group ministries, missions, and compassionate ministry experiences.

Chalfant Hall was renovated; the Harlow E. Hopkins Alumni Center was established; Milby Clock Tower was reconstructed; Ludwig Dining Room, the Red Room, and the bookstore were renovated; the coffee shop, Common Grounds, was established; the Olivet computer, media, and communications network was created; the campus entrance was completed; and the Admissions Center was constructed.

In recent years, the Weber Center has been constructed, two parcels of land south of the Admissions Center have been purchased, Larsen Fine Arts Center has been renovated, and significant improvements to the athletic fields have been completed.

In the summer of 2003, the University continued to upgrade and expand its facilities. Olivet purchased from Provena Healthcare the former Fortin Villa property of 25 acres of land along Main Street, just south and west of the main campus.

On the main campus, in Birchard Gymnasium, the University turned the fitness center into a new varsity weight room, and the pool area into a new fitness center for students, faculty and staff. In Snowbarger Athletic Park, additional seating and a new press box were installed at Larry Watson Baseball Field; tennis courts were resurfaced and new nets and posts were installed; Ward Field was renovated to include a larger running track, a new entry building, fencing, refurbished bleachers, a new larger press box and an enhanced facade. Electric service was improved throughout Snowbarger Athletic Park.

In 2004, President Bowling introduced the theme "Promises to Keep" to students, faculty, churches and alumni. These "promises" included plans for a Centennial Chapel to seat about 3,000 for chapel and other events.

Information Technology expanded wireless access throughout the campus, including wired access to every classroom and residence hall room. In the academic realm, the radio station WONU-FM and broadcasting classes moved from the north wing of Benner Library to a former restaurant building next to the Admissions Center on Main Street. The Department of Communication and some art classes moved into the library space, including new television, graphic arts and photo studios. Campus athletic fields were improved with new sod, and lighting was added to Ward Field.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OLIVET — CONTINUED

The School of Graduate and Continuing Studies established a Chicago Regional Center in Rolling Meadows, Illinois.

In 2005, North Central Association granted ONU continued accreditation for the maximum of ten years without conditions. A major reorganization of academic divisions, departments and schools was approved to begin in the fall semester.

The new plan includes the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Education, School of Professional Studies, School of Theology and Christian Ministry, and School of Graduate and Continuing Studies.

The top three floors of Burke Administration Building were remodeled for use by the Department of English and Modern Languages on the fourth floor, School of Theology and Christian Ministry on the third floor, and Institutional Advancement on the second floor. Offices for the academic vice president and the registrar are being expanded on the main floor. The Department of Mathematics joined the Career and Counseling Center on the ground floor.

The Bourbonnais offices for the School of Graduate and Continuing Studies moved to 21 Heritage Drive, north of the main campus. The former Fortin Villa property was readied for ROTC classes and intramural sports fields.

For three consecutive years, *U.S. News and World Report* selected Olivet Nazarene University as a Top-Tier University-Master's in its report, "America's Best Colleges."

In preparation for the fall 2006 semester, campus improvements continued to take place with major renovations in Williams Hall, Chapman Hall, Common Grounds coffee shop, first floor Burke, and the Decker Quadrangle. A new student hangout, Jazzman's, was added to Benner Library.

During the summer of 2007, the Hardy C. Powers President's House was renovated to house the Olivet Center for Student Success. A new residence for the president of Olivet was established at Reedy House on Olde Oak Drive. A major renovation of student housing was begun and new classrooms were established on the lower level of Burke Administration Building.

The University also experienced its tenth consecutive year of record-breaking enrollment during the 2006–2007 school year with nearly 4,500 students at the 10-day count.
