PRESIDENT'S SPECIAL RECOGNITION 2002 FACULTY MEMBER OF THE YEAR

Dr. Sara Spruce
Professor of Education

It is not surprising that Dr. Sara Spruce has chosen to focus her teaching career on early childhood education, because it was in her early childhood that her ambitions and motives were shaped. From the very beginning, her life has been marked by her faith and a passion for learning.

Not unlike any other young girl, Sara enjoyed “playing school” with her friends. But in the Spruce household, school was not taken lightly. The late Fletcher Spruce, Sara’s father and a Nazarene pastor and district superintendent who served on Olivet’s Board of Trustees, and Sara’s mother, Irene, fostered in Sara and her brother a desire and an expectation to learn.

“They developed in us a desire to achieve — not just for ourselves, but for others,” said Sara, who earned her doctorate from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, her master’s degree from Ball State University, and her bachelor’s degree from Eastern Nazarene College.

Teaching is all she ever wanted to do — and not just because it was a vocational choice.

“All of God’s children have so much potential,” Sara said of her enthusiasm for education. “God has given us uniqueness. ... We’ve been blessed with life. It’s our responsibility to give back to God and humanity.”

She delights in sensing that same excitement in her students, when they discover the joy of teaching a child. The students’ discoveries and the changing field of education motivate her never-ending thirst for learning and her quest to train “inspired teachers for tomorrow.”

“It keeps me on my toes academically,” she said, her eyes lighting up at the prospect of more learning, even as she enters her 24th year at Olivet

and after a combined 35 years of teaching. “We’re in this to make learning a joy for those children they are going to teach.”

But Sara remembers something more about her childhood. She vividly recalls her parents regularly praying for her and her brother. It is a lesson Sara carries with her to this day, as her concern for students reaches beyond the walls of a classroom.

Before a semester, Sara, who is a member of College Church of the Nazarene and taught Sunday school for more than 25 years, takes time to pray for students and continues to pray for them throughout a class. She e-mails them, not just explanations about assignments or follow-ups on lectures, but Bible verses and words of encouragement. They are the same verses and words of encouragement that can be found on cards that Sara keeps with her and displays in her home.

She depends on prayer and God’s Word, and she instills that need in her students.

“Our lives in the Scriptures don’t have to be just for 15 minutes during the day,” she explained. “I hope they’ll see Christ in me — that Christ allows us to become who we are.”

After just moments with Sara, it is apparent. Her enthusiasm for her field, her quiet determination, her positive attitude, her patience, and her compassion for her students clearly point to a fervent desire to be Christ to all she meets.

Sara, for your achievements in the classroom and your passion for teaching, but more importantly, for truly personifying the mission of this University, “Education With a Christian Purpose,” we salute you as the 2002 Faculty Member of the Year.

Rev. Walter "Woody" Webb
Vice President for Student Development

For much of his life, Rev. Walter "Woody" Webb envisioned "full-time Christian ministry" as the work of pastors and missionaries. His family stopped attending church when he was 8 years old, after his grandmother, a charter member of downstate Marion First Church of the Nazarene, died of a heart attack at the pulpit while leading the singing — with the Webb family in the pews.

Consequently, as a teenager, Woody knew nothing about Olivet, and was not even aware that the Nazarenes had an educational system. That all changed in the ninth grade, when a substitute teacher he had never met set him on a path that would change his life forever.

His story, he declares, "is a story of God's grace."

The substitute teacher was Davette Lee, a 1961 Olivet graduate who was the wife of Rev. Paul Lee Jr., a 1959 graduate, the pastor of Marion First and now a member of the Board of Trustees.

Davette recognized Woody's name from the Sunday school attendance roll.

"Woody Webb, you belong at the Nazarene church," Woody recalled was her comment to him. "Where have you been?"

Woody went to church the next Sunday. Under the Lees' nurturing, he was saved and introduced to Olivet. He has been at the University ever since — more than 20 years.

"It just illustrates the way the Lord weaves His will in a person's life," he said.

It also explains how he approaches his work as vice president for student development: like the teacher who treated her classroom as a mission field, and her husband, who showed a young man the real meaning of "full-time Christian ministry." Woody realizes the impact his work can have on

students. One thought is constant in his mind.

"When we make a decision that affects a student's life, how is that decision going to affect how a student feels about Olivet and the Church of the Nazarene 10 years from now?" he said.

Woody began his career at Olivet as an admissions counselor and resident director, while pursuing a master's degree in religion at the University and preparing to be a pastor. The Lord had other plans, however, and opened up previously unthought-of ministry opportunities.

His current job, he explained, incorporates his pastoral leanings.

"The greatest joy of my job is the one-on-one interaction with students and to pick up the phone and make a call on behalf of a student," said Woody, who also preaches in churches on the Olivet region and has served on the Kankakee Valley Council for the CROP Walk for Hunger since 1985.

His current work strategically places him in a leadership position for all of the nonacademic aspects of student life: housing, counseling, food service, health service, recreation, and activities. Under his direction, the Office of Student Development has undertaken many initiatives, such as a discipline system that incorporates students in the judicial process, a volunteer program, and leadership development seminars.

He and his wife, Julie, have a son, James, 11, and are members of College Church of the Nazarene.

Woody, for your outstanding vision and leadership, and for serving Olivet with a heart for her students, we salute you as the 2002 Staff Member of the Year.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OLIVET

Olivet Nazarene University's origins can be traced to the first decade of the last century and to the resolve of several families in east central Illinois who were committed to providing a Christian education for their children. In 1907, classes began in a home in the community of Georgetown, Illinois, and a year later, the founders acquired several acres of land in the nearby village called Olivet. There, they raised a modest building and added the secondary level of instruction. A College of Liberal Arts followed in 1909, along with the first name for this fledgling, but ambitious, institution: "Illinois Holiness University."

By 1912, the founders and trustees were aware of the school's need for a wider constituency and offered to give their educational work to the Church of the Nazarene. This young denomination accepted the school with a pledge to support and promote its ministry of Christian higher education. That early church commitment is still being perpetuated by the more than 800 Nazarene congregations throughout Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin.

The school grew slowly during the next decade. There were several acting and short-term presidents; the campus of 18 acres contained only a few small buildings; the first yearbook, the *Aurora*, was published in 1914; and a new school name followed in 1915: "Olivet University."

As was the case with many small church colleges in the 1920s, Olivet's financial base eroded significantly,

forcing the trustees to declare bankruptcy in 1926. Then-college treasurer Dr. T.W. Willingham bought the school back at a public auction, outlined a new plan for solvency, and was elected that night to serve as president.

A devastating fire destroyed the main campus building in November 1938, prompting the newly elected president, A.L. Parrott, and the trustees to consider locating a new campus as an alternative to rebuilding at their rural site. They found and purchased the present campus in Bourbonnais in 1939 and moved the college in the summer of 1940. "Nazarene" was added to the college's name that same year.

At the time of Olivet's move to Bourbonnais, the campus consisted of 42 acres which had been the site of St. Viator's College from 1868 until it closed in 1938. Four of the buildings purchased then are still in use today.

Receiving formal recognition and accreditation by the University of Illinois in 1939 was a major academic milestone for Olivet. The college catalogs of the 1940s reflected a School of Liberal Arts, a School of Music, a School of Religion, and a high school Academy. In 1953, under the skillful leadership of Dr. Willis Snowbarger, newly appointed dean, all areas of study were grouped into curricular divisions, still the model for Olivet's academic organization.

Dr. Harold W. Reed, president from 1949–1975, led Olivet through a period of remarkable growth, including the construction of 20 major buildings to keep pace with swelling student enrollments.

Dr. Leslie Parrott continued this focus on campus expansion, development and beautification during his 16-year tenure with a specific interest in the elevation of Olivet to university status.

In 1986, the school's name was changed to "Olivet Nazarene University" to reflect the diversity of academic programs and graduate studies.

In 1991, Dr. John C. Bowling became president and has led the University in continued growth and effective ministry.

During the decade of the 1990s, Olivet expanded and strengthened both its undergraduate and graduate programs. The University established a formal development program including planned giving and major gifts, an annual fund program known as "Friends of Olivet," renewed grant writing, a comprehensive program of donor relations, and the *In Word and Deed* capital campaign. In 1994, a full-time chaplaincy program was established to give direction to chapel, student spiri-

tual life activities, small-group ministries, missions, and compassionate ministry experiences.

Chalfant Hall was renovated; the Harlow E. Hopkins Alumni Center was established; Milby Clock Tower was reconstructed; the Red Room, Ludwig Dining Room, and the bookstore were renovated; the coffee shop, Common Grounds, was established; the ONU computer, media, and communications network was created; the campus entrance was completed; and the Admissions Center was constructed.

Most recently the Weber Center was constructed, two parcels of land south of the Admissions Center were purchased, Larsen Fine Arts Center was renovated and significant improvements to the athletic fields were completed.

Olivet continues to experience record enrollments and looks to the future with a confident commitment to aggressively meet the challenges and the opportunities that await.
