2001 Faculty Member of the Year

Amy Golysko

Associate Professor of Nursing

Amy Golysko's journey to becoming an associate professor of nursing is an interesting one—interesting, because Amy is not sure, logically, why she became a nurse in the first place. Before college, she knew of no nurses in her family or among her family's friends. She could not point to personality traits that particularly aligned herself with the field. She only knew that it was what she was supposed to do.

Shortly after graduating from North Park College in 1975, as a home health-care nurse for Provena St. Mary's Hospital in Kankakee, she would happen upon a career path that has lasted 20 years. It was during a drive to and from a patient's home, with Olivet nursing students along for the ride. She found herself enjoying the conversation with the students as she explained terms and situations, and she immediately knew that she wanted to teach.

"I always knew that the Lord was taking me along the way," Amy explained. "Each job was moving me and advancing me toward this. God positioned me that way."

Ironically, while pursuing her master's degree from Northern Illinois University, she learned of an opening at Olivet. Today, she and husband, William, a fourth-grade teacher at JeNeir Elementary School in Momence, have a son, Neal, 21, who just graduated from the University, and another son, Phillip, 18, who will be a freshman at Olivet this fall. The family attends College Church of the Nazarene.

Throughout, Amy's teaching has earned rave reviews from her students, as she has brought to the classroom the same practical methods she enjoyed so much during that van trip more than 20 years ago.

It is not uncommon to find Amy bringing food

into her classroom to explain the various types of electrolytes, or scraping her fingernails on the chalkboard to communicate the irritation and pain patients feel as a side effect of the administration of potassium, an electrolyte. It is the result of her 26 years of experience as a nurse, including the past 11 summers at St. Mary's.

"For the past six years that I have been at Olivet, I have conducted exit interviews with our graduating seniors. I hear them year after year giving unsolicited positive evaluations of the teaching of Amy Golysko," said Dr. Norma Wood, chair of the Division of Nursing. "Students comment that her teaching is well-organized, clear, and student-focused."

Whether it is taking students on missions trips to Nicaragua and Guatemala to offer health care in under-served areas, or accompanying students as they practice at local hospitals what they have been taught, Amy is constantly sharing what she knows and has been through, prompting students to find the answers, and pointing them to a patient-centered approach to nursing.

"It's an avenue of service. It's a ministry. ... Nursing certainly involves a lot of technology today, but your patients will love you if you sit down and talk with them," Amy, chair of the division's curriculum committee, says is her message to students. "Be excellent listeners. Show them you care."

What she enjoyed first about teaching in that short van ride with Olivet students is what she still enjoys about the field today.

"It's fun to be with the students. They're so eager when they're with patients," Amy explained. "And fostering that is such a thrill."

Amy, for the enthusiasm you bring to the classroom and for your dedication to teaching excellence, we salute you as the 2001 Faculty Member of the Year.

Mary Anderson

Career Information Specialist/Student Employment Manager

As the career information specialist and student employment manager in the Counseling and Career Center, Mary Anderson meets with countless students and alumni throughout the year – including approximately 750 one-on-one appointments and several lectures in classes on campus.

She addresses students' fears about the job search process and their qualifications, lends an ear to and helps gather material for alumni, and offers practical ways to land the perfect position. If anyone knows about the difficulty of finding a job – finding where one fits in, it is Mary. She has been there, and it took someone like herself to get her on the right career path.

Just 25 years ago, Mary was in downstate Illinois, doing what her degree in music education from Millikin University had qualified her for: teaching music. She quickly realized, however, that it was not the career for her. Running out of options, Mary paid a visit to an employment agency, and met with a woman who evaluated her skills.

"With what I knew about how to find a job, it's a wonder I ever got one," Mary said. "She recognized things in me that I didn't know were ever there. She became my mentor. It did wonders for my self-esteem."

Mary was hired by Nabisco as a sales representative, and enjoyed her job. Later, she would marry Gerald, currently professor of music at Olivet, and move to the Bourbonnais area, where she found herself teaching music once again, this time at Maternity BVM, across the street from Olivet. But it was not until she accepted the secretarial position in the University's Counseling and Career Center that she found her calling.

Graduate work at Governors State University and a master's degree in education from Olivet followed, and Mary became Olivet's career informa-

tion specialist, helping students in the same way that the woman at the agency had helped her years earlier. She discovered, too, that her education and business experience had prepared her for this very position.

"I think that was God's path," said Mary, whose children, Jean, 20, and Paul, 19, are Olivet students. Gerald and Mary are actively involved at Immanuel Baptist Church in Kankakee, where Gerald serves as staff pianist.

In addition to her many accomplishments and responsibilities, Mary has implemented the Student Employee of the Year program, which honors student employees for their work throughout the school year. It is just one example of the approach Mary takes with students—in a profession that often focuses on numbers.

"I'm interested in them as individuals," she said. "They're not just statistics to me. I cannot get them a job; I need to teach them *how* to get a job."

That effort has not gone unnoticed by Woody Webb, vice president for student development, who said that Mary "sets worthwhile goals and works hard throughout the year to accomplish them. ... She provides a great service to ONU and our students. She is a team player who loves Olivet."

She loves Olivet, and she loves her job. So, when Mary meets with Olivet students and alumni, she shares a bit of wisdom.

"You can't be everything you want to be, because God called you to be everything *He* wants you to be," she said. "You can't predict that."

Mary, for your work ethic and for your interest in the success of Olivet students both past and present, we salute you as the 2001 Staff Member of the Year.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OLIVET

Olivet Nazarene University's origins can be traced to the first decade of this century and to the resolve of several families in east central Illinois who were committed to providing a Christian education for their children. In 1907, classes began in a home in the community of Georgetown, Illinois, and a year later, the founders acquired several acres of land in the nearby village called Olivet. There, they raised a modest building and added the secondary level of instruction. A College of Liberal Arts followed in 1909, along with the first name for this fledgling, but ambitious, institution: "Illinois Holiness University."

By 1912, the founders and trustees were aware of the school's need for a wider constituency and offered to give their educational work to the Church of the Nazarene. This young denomination accepted the school with a pledge to support and promote its ministry of Christian higher education. That early church commitment is still being perpetuated by the more than 800 Nazarene congregations throughout Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin.

The school grew slowly during the next decade. There were several acting and short-term presidents; the campus of 18 acres contained only a few small buildings; the first yearbook, the *Aurora*, was published in 1914; and a new school name followed in 1915: "Olivet University."

As was the case with many small church colleges in the 1920s, Olivet's financial base eroded significantly,

forcing the trustees to declare bankruptcy in 1926. Then-college treasurer Dr. T.W. Willingham bought the school back at a public auction, outlined a new plan for solvency, and was elected that night to serve as president.

A devastating fire destroyed the main campus building in November 1938, prompting the newly-elected president, A.L. Parrott, and the trustees to consider locating a new campus as an alternative to rebuilding at their rural site. They found and purchased the present campus in Bourbonnais in 1939 and moved the college in the summer of 1940. "Nazarene" was added to the college's name that same year.

At the time of Olivet's move to Bourbonnais, the campus consisted of 42 acres which had been the site of St. Viator's College from 1868 until it closed in 1938. Four of the buildings purchased then are still in use today.

Receiving formal recognition and accreditation by the University of Illinois in 1939 was a major academic milestone for Olivet. The college catalogs of the 1940s reflected a School of Liberal Arts, a School of Music, a School of Religion, and a high school Academy. In 1953, under the skillful leadership of Dr. Willis Snowbarger, newly appointed dean, all areas of study were grouped into curricular divisions, still the model for Olivet's academic organization.

Dr. Harold W. Reed, president from 1949–1975, led Olivet through a period of remarkable growth, including the construction of 20 major buildings to keep pace with swelling student enrollments.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OLIVET- CONTINUED

Dr. Leslie Parrott continued this focus on campus expansion, development and beautification during his 16-year tenure with a specific interest in the elevation of Olivet to university status.

In 1986, the school's name was changed to "Olivet Nazarene University" to reflect the diversity of academic programs and graduate studies.

In 1991, Dr. John C. Bowling became president and has led the University in continued growth and effective ministry.

During the decade of the 1990s, Olivet has expanded and strengthened both its undergraduate and graduate programs. The University established a formal development program including planned giving and major gifts, an annual fund program known as Friends of Olivet, renewed grant writing, a comprehensive program of donor relations, and the "In Word and Deed"

capital campaign. In 1994, a full-time chaplaincy program was established to give direction to chapel, student spiritual life activities, small group ministries, missions, and compassionate ministry experiences.

Chalfant Hall was renovated; the Harlow E. Hopkins Alumni Center was established; Milby Clock Tower was reconstructed; the Red Room, Ludwig Dining Room, and the bookstore were renovated; the coffee shop, Common Grounds, was established; the ONU computer, media, and communications network was created; the campus entrance was completed; the Admissions Center was constructed; and recently, construction of the Weber Center was completed.

Olivet is experiencing record enrollments and continues to plan aggressively to meet the challenges and opportunities of the future.
