## Because They Picked On Him

## Boy Wipes Out His Family Of 3

MANFIELD, Conn. (AP)—An 11-year-old boy, aiming awkwardly because of poor eyesight, shot to death his entire family—mother, father and older brother.

He told police they picked on him and he feared he would be sent to reform school.

Fifth-grader Robert Curren was killed the three last Saturday afternoon at the family's rural home, 30 miles east of Hartford. He slept in the farmhouse that night, then reported the killings to a neighbor Sunday morning.

ONE NIGHT last week his father spanked him because he wouldn't put out his bedroom light and go to sleep, Robert said.

After telling his story to police Sunday Robert was committed to the state hospital at Norwich for a 30-day mental examination.

Robert is built stockily but he has poor sight in his right eye and wears glasses. He said he had to fight the rifle with his left eye.

He told State Police Lt. Harry Taylor he reloaded the 22 caliber rifle after every shot, carrying spare bullets between his teeth.

First he killed his brother, Richard Jr. He walked into the barn where Richard was milking a cow about 5:30 p.m.

April had been free on \$100 bond since the disturbance.

## Bloomington Faces Water Emergency

BLOOMINGTON (JNS)—The Bloomington City Council Monday night declared a "state of emergency" on the city's diminishing water supply and asked citizens to engage in voluntary conservation.

The council, by unanimous vote, also appropriated \$50,000 for construction of a pipe system to take water from the Mackinaw River and route it into Lake Bloomington, the source of the city's water supply. The river and lake are a half mile apart.

THE COUNCIL said it believed the project could be completed by June 1, about one month before they felt the water level in Lake Bloomington would reach a dangerously low level.

The governing body also asked Gov. Stratton to declare a similar state of emergency about the city's water shortage. It said it would seek permission from the Illinois Division of Waterways to take water from the river.

Bloomington's population is about 34,000.

## Could Extend Life Span Of Oldsters Another 10 Years

CHICAGO (UP)—Adequate facilities for prevention and treatment of disease could extend man's lifetime by another 10 years, the director of the Illinois Department of Public Health said.

Dr. Roland R. Cross told the State Legislative Commission on the Aging and Aged Monday that there are about two million persons in the state 45 to 65 years old whose problems the commission is studying.

Dr. Cross said adding another decade to the life span would require a large expansion of medical facilities and the cooperation of the public. The public would have to increase its knowledge of health measures, he said.

The best approach to the problems of chronic diseases is to accent prevention, he suggested. Cross announced his department is "now concentrating all its available resources for an attack on the problems of chronic illness."

## Primary Elections Held In 2 States, Alaska Today

WASHINGTON (UP) — Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Alaska voted today in presidential primaries which may provide a few more clues about how the voters regard the 1956 campaign.

Only Alaska, which has not a vote next November, offered a head-on contest between Adlai E. Stevenson and Sen. Estes Kefauver, now the chief contenders for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Although neither has campaigned in the territory, both were entered in the presidential preference vote, which does not bind national convention delegates. Delegates sharing six convention votes will be picked later at the Democratic territorial convention.

The Pennsylvania vote may be interpreted in terms of a popularity contest between President Eisenhower and Stevenson, although the state primary law prevented today's balloting from providing a clear test.

Only Republicans may vote in the GOP primary and Democrats in the Democratic primary. Among the state's five million registered voters, the GOP has a bulge of about 350,000.

In the Democratic preference vote, Stevenson was supported by the Republican side, Mr. Eisenhower was entered against Sen. William F. Knowland of California, who was unable to withdraw by the time the President made his second term announcement.

Mr. Eisenhower went to his Gettysburg, Pa., home to vote in today's primary.

The President and Knowland also were both entered in the Alaskan GOP primary. The territory will send four delegates to the Republican convention.

Pennsylvania will have 74 delegate votes at the Democratic national convention and 70 at the Republican convention. These are chosen in today's primaries and by the state party organization.

STEVENS is now the choice of most of the Democratic leaders in Pennsylvania.

The Massachusetts primaries provided no direct vote on presidential candidates but by written-poll delegates to give written votes to House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack as a favorite son while Americans for the Democratic Action have urged a write-in for Stevenson.

Massachusetts Democrats were picking delegates to 40 convention votes in today's balloting, and the GOP was choosing 38 delegates. Kefauver and Stevenson were both in Washington today, preparing to resume their campaign tour. Stevenson, after a Washington address to a United Auto Workers Union group, goes to New York tonight to address a Lincoln League fund-raising dinner and to Florida Thursday night before heading for the West Coast for savings through Oregon and California. Kefauver returns to Florida Sunday night.
