## Personal Income In U. S. Sets New Record

WASHINGTON (AP) — Almost everybody made more money last year, the Commerce Department reported Saturday.

IT SAID the personal income of Americans rose to new records in all regions and in most states in 1955. North Dakota had the biggest percentage gain over 1954 — 16 per cent.

In only four states did personal income last year dip below 1954. These were Iowa, down 5 per cent; South Dakota, down 6 per cent; Nebraska, down 4 per cent; and Kansas, down less than one per cent.

Thirteen per cent increases in total income were registered — by Alabama and Nevada, and gains of 11 per cent were shown in Maine, Mississippi, Georgia and Florida. Illinois income increased 4 per cent to \$2,257 per capita.

Over the country as a whole, per capita income amounted to \$2,447 in 1955, a 5 per cent increase from the previous year.

Others in the top rank of per capita income were Connecticut, \$2,486; Nevada, \$2,246; District of Columbia, \$2,234; New Jersey, \$2,211; California, \$2,171 and New York, \$2,163.

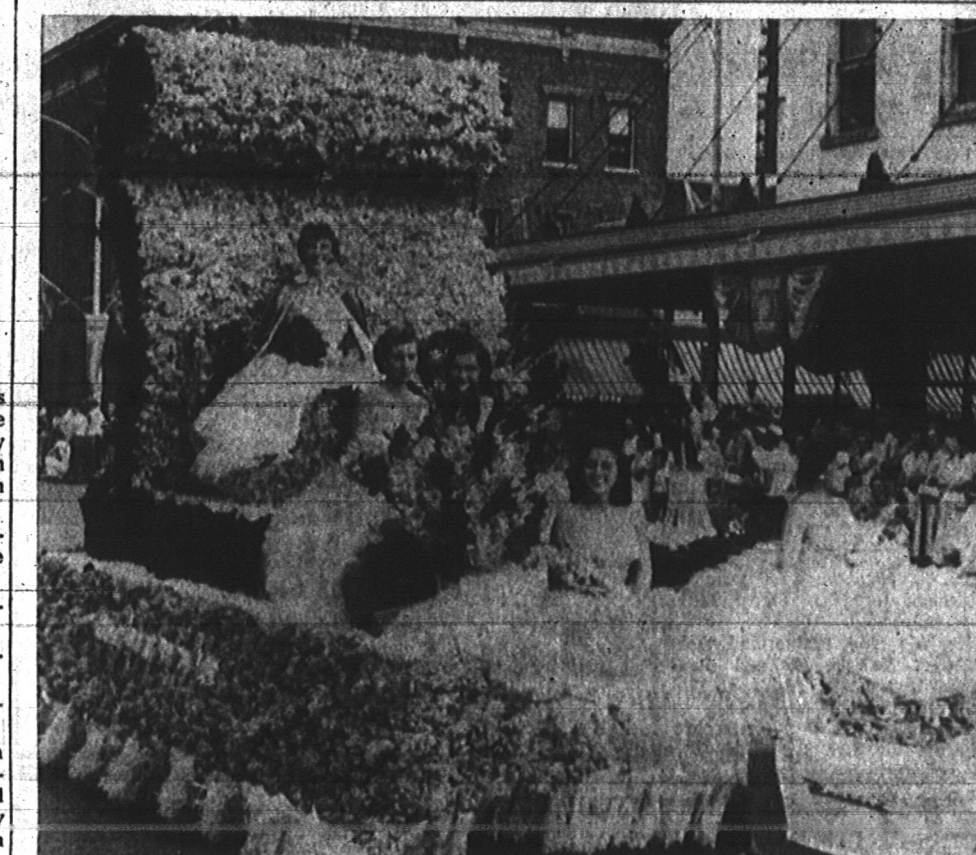
Dead following a series of collisions at 1:15 a.m. Saturday on the highway were:

## Link Ambush Slaying To Acid Attack Case

NEW YORK (UP) — A beer truck driver with a police record was killed Saturday in an ambush which police said might be an aftermath to the acid attack on labor columnist Victor Riesel.

Police feared the ambush slaying of Fred Mischner, 26, may have been another move by the same underworld figures who last month killed Riesel's face, blinding him last April 5.

Mischner was shot four times by the gunman who lay in wait in the hallway of the tenement where he lived. Abraham Telvi, 21, a petty hoodlum named by the FBI as Riesel's "fixer," was found sprawled in the gutter, a bullet in his head, only six blocks away on July 28.

Later in the same day that Telvi was killed, two of his hoodlum friends, Richard Langone and James Rocco, were found slain in a car. The double murder also took place only a few blocks from where Mischner lived. Langone was killed in a shooting on July 28. Rocco was killed in a shooting on July 29.

Police are now looking for a link between the slaying of Mischner and the acid attack on Riesel. They are also looking for a link between the slaying of Mischner and the acid attack on Riesel.

## Republicans To Campaign On Home Screens

NEW YORK (AP)—Although the Republican National Convention has not yet begun, the strategy of Republican campaigning this fall already is well outlined. Television will play an important role in it.

For one thing you can expect to see some popular television programs ending five minutes sooner, the time purchased by the GOP to explain why you should vote Republican. As far as can be learned, the Democrats have not adopted this particular strategy.

At this point there is no solid word on what programs will be shortened to bring the Republican cause to the home screen.

The gentlemen who buy and sell television time obviously have convinced the Republicans that they have a "built in" audience.

BUT it is possible that some viewers might be so annoyed at having their favorite programs interrupted that they might just possibly snap off the set. We are grudging this to the rug, you understand: we're just tip-toeing around it.

By the latest A. C. Nielsen audience ratings, the most widely viewed regular TV programs are the \$64,000 Question, The Hank Greenaway Show, The Steve Allen Show, Dragnet, Ford Theater, and Gunsmoke.

It is a safe assumption that some of all of these programs may be shortened to bring a Republican talk to the home screen. But cutting a TV program is not as easy as slicing a cake. We aren't saying it can't be done.

Take a half-hour program like Dragnet or Gunsmoke. In the last five minutes Jack Webb almost invariably must resolve the previous 25 minutes of crime. In the last five minutes of Gunsmoke, Marshal James Arness must bring justice from rank injustice.

SINCE THESE and the other popular dramatic programs cited are planned and filmed months in advance, a real technical problem must be faced.

Possibly it is not planned to interrupt any popular filmed programs. Possibly the only feasible plan is to take a piece of a live program. In that event, the network is taking the current top ten shows, three popular programs and the Sullivan and Allen variety shows.

The experience of anyone who writes about television is that there is no more sensitive TV fan than a TV quiz fan. They watch their favorites as faithfully as some people attend church. They are the hard core of television fandom.

It appears from this corner that it would require great courage indeed to tear five minutes from the quiz time these fans worship. Suppose, for example, there isn't enough time for the quizmaster to find out WHAT IS my line?

So we have the variety shows. There have been variety shows when a politician would be a welcome relief, it's true. But what would be the proper transition to a politician's five minutes? A love song? A comedian? Some dancing bears? Unless the transition is perfect, the audience will begin laughing.

## City's Growth Shown In New Installations

The growth of the Kankakee area is reflected in figures cited by the Northern Illinois Gas Co. in a report of its activities in Kankakee this summer. As residents have noted Kankakee and nearby areas have been pockmarked by many holes, trenches and excavations in a summer marked by extensive work by all utilities.

The Northern Illinois Gas Co. has been one of those utilities engaged in reworking and extending services. William E. Land, district superintendent for the gas company, said the firm has been pressed to meet the demands of new customers.

Since 1950, Land pointed out, more than 3,500 new gas services have been installed here, including 431 during the past seven months. Since the first of the year 44,290 feet, or almost nine miles, of gas mains have been installed. Some of the work has been in the replacement and enlargement of existing mains but most of it has been the laying of company extended gas service to Atrona Park for the first time this year.

Land characterized the work as merely being the usual improvement and extension work performed by the gas company but somewhat quickened by the new housing activity.

Most of the natural gas which serves Kankakee is taken directly from a pipeline from Texas which carries natural gas across the country. It is shuttled through a vast underground network of mains to the places it is needed.

During winter cold spells the supply from the pipeline is augmented by gas drawn from the Herscher storage dome.

MORE EFFICIENT laying of pipe has been achieved by the development of better machinery. Augers drill their way under streets and railroad tracks and the pipe is shoved through making it unnecessary to block entire streets.

Trench digging machines have ended the laborious task of shoveling long trenches by hand. Heavy tampers enable workers to restore pavements after they have been opened to gain access to the underground.

But it was pointed out that while motorists may sometimes be inconvenienced it is only another indication of a growing Kankakee.

## Archbishop Denounces Segregation

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—Archbishop Joseph P. Rummel of New Orleans told the national convention of the Christian Family Movement Friday that racial segregation violates Christian charity and basic natural law.

He spoke at the University of Notre Dame. "Can anyone affix the label or merit of charity upon customs that exclude civilized human beings from sharing with their fellow human beings certain facilities, conveniences and necessities of life, chiefly if not simply because they belong to a different race?" he asked.

The Roman Catholic archbishop suggested that "politicians and industrialists promote segregation at times with an interest in perpetuating cheap labor and questionable working conditions, apparently forgetting the fact that the cost of living respects no color line."

Rummel said of the prospect of intermarriage between races: "Integration deprives no one of the right to choose his friends or companions, nor does it deprive or relieve parents of the responsibility to supervise and guide their children in the choice of companions or playmates."

"Integration or no integration, parents always have the duty to safeguard the religion, the morals, the health and the social relationships of their children, teenagers and adolescents. These principles apply equally to all parents regardless of race or color."

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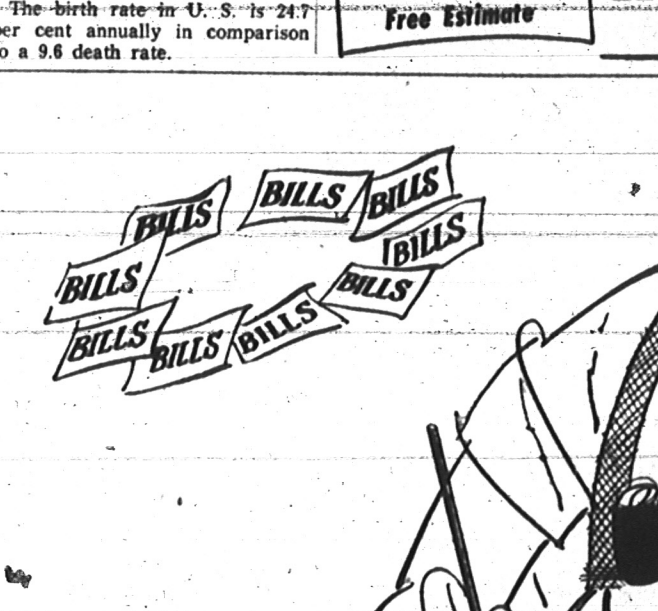

Judges To Select Nurse Of Year

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## Kefauver's Victory Is Hard-Won

CHICAGO (AP)—Homespun Estes Kefauver, frustrated twice in seeking the Democratic presidential nomination, today was on his party's national ticket—as its vice-presidential nominee.

His victory Friday was hard-won. He beat the youthful Sen. John Kennedy of Massachusetts on a second convention ballot after frantic floor maneuvering and last minute delegation vote switches.

The final count: Kefauver, Tennessee's senior senator, 75½; Kennedy, 88.

On Kennedy's motion, the Kefauver nomination was made unanimous. However, there was grumbling in the South. Kefauver's native area which had ticked on mass to Kennedy in a futile effort to block him.

BUT IN CONVENTION Hall Friday night, there were no open signs of disunity as Kefauver got a big ovation in telling the shouting, standard-bearer delegates he was ready to fight alongside presidential nominee Adlai E. Stevenson "for our party and its cause."

Kefauver's acceptance speech was delivered in the slow, somewhat halting manner that has become familiar to voters in all parts of the land during his tireless but unsuccessful campaigns for the presidential nomination in 1952 and again this year. Both times, he lost to Stevenson.

As Stevenson and Kefauver stood together before the convention, there was no trace of the personal rancor that marked their picture of happy success.

In Friday's neck-and-neck balloting, the 32 votes of Tennessee, his home state, went first to Kefauver's Senate colleague, Albert Gore. Later, they were cast for Kefauver.

Of the 334 convention votes cast by 12 Southern states, Kefauver got only 59 on the clinching roll call. Best Tennessee vote for Kefauver came from only North Carolina and Florida. He got not a single vote from Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, Virginia, and Texas.

After the voting was over, there was some talk in the Mississippi contingent about refraining from voting for the Democratic ticket in November. But few if any out-right party thaws were heard.

Truman's Political Strategy Fails Again

CHICAGO (UP)—Former President Truman's reputation as a master political strategist took a beating in Chicago.

Some of his one-time best friends believe he still is thinking in terms of his upset presidential election victory of 1948. Otherwise, Mr. Truman's political strategy has not paid off much.

He picked a loser in 1952—handing him a presidential candidate. That's a severe indictment, especially when it is remembered, as it will be, that vice presidents so often succeed in office—presidents who die.

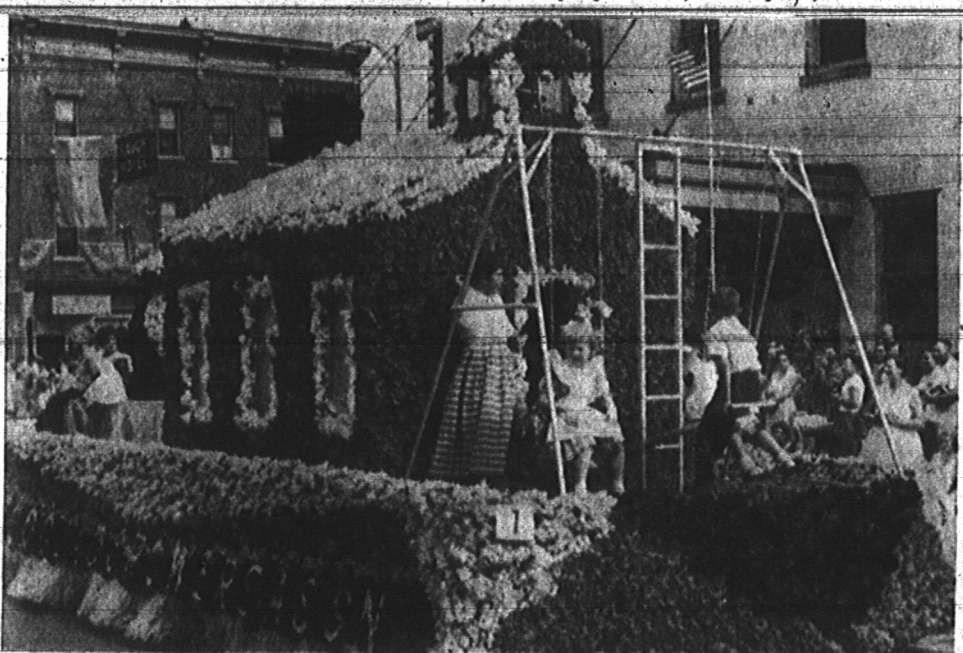

The bus had stopped at a railroad crossing when the car rammed into its left rear. The car was a total wreck. The bus had a stove-in dent in it.

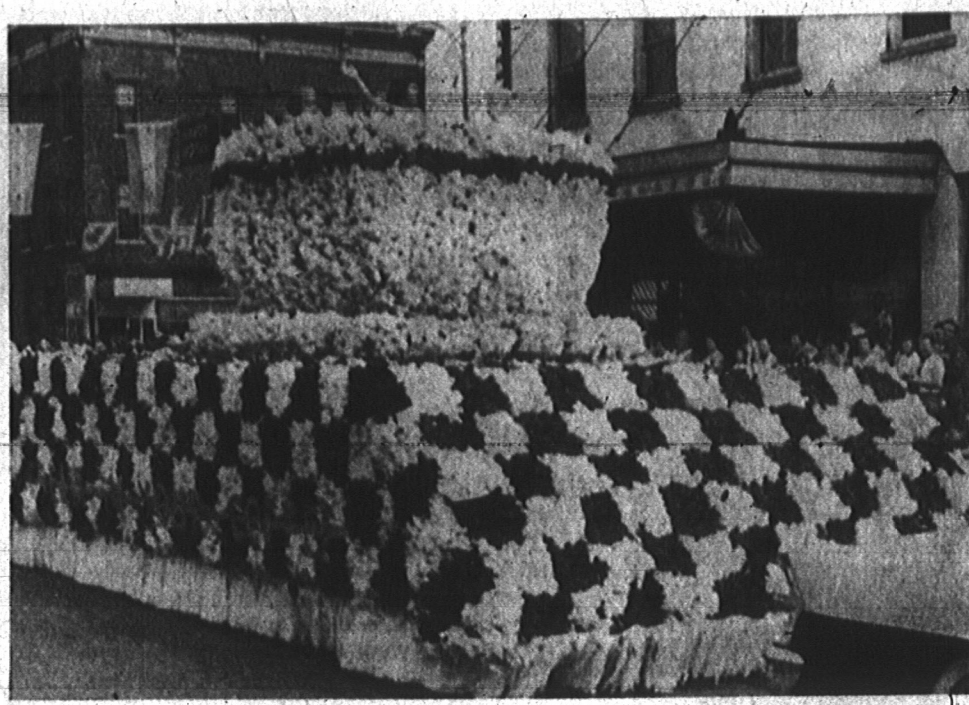

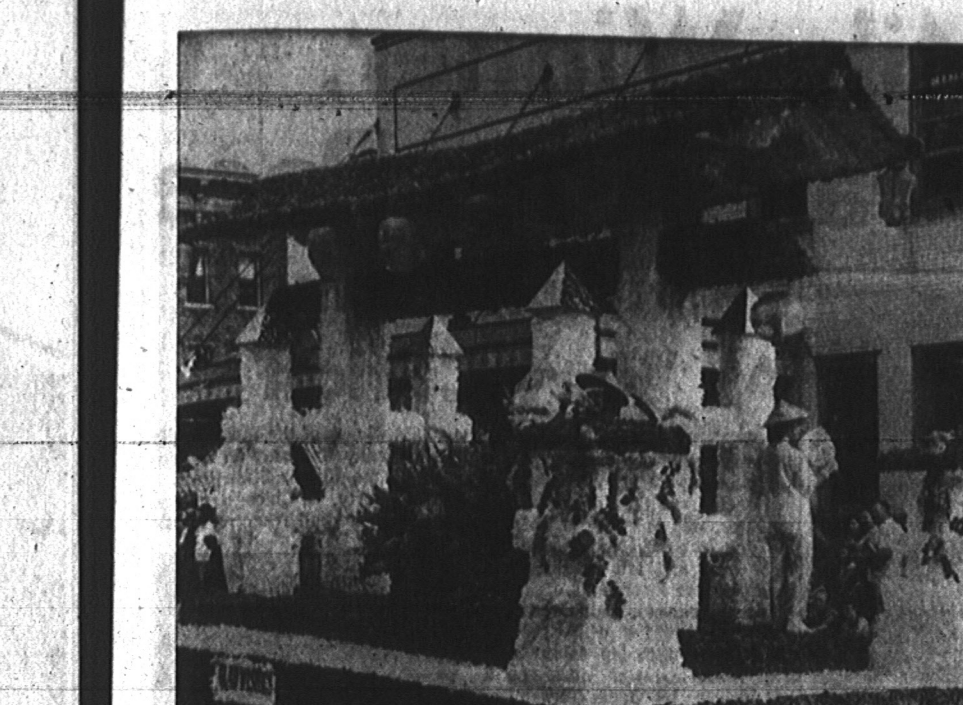

ICA Denies Sending Jets To Yugoslavia  
WASHINGTON (UP)—The International Cooperation Administration today denied it is shipping nearly 400 jet planes to Communist Yugoslavia.

The ICA said all shipments of jet aircraft to Yugoslavia are frozen unless President Eisenhower personally orders that they go through.

Rep. John Taber (R-N.Y.), senior GOP member of the House Appropriations Committee, asked the ICA in a letter about reports that 300 jets in the foreign aid pipeline would go to Yugoslavia despite the new law conditionally blocking nearly all Yugoslavian military aid.

The new law—passed last month by Congress—cuts off shipments in 90 days of all military supplies bought for Yugoslavia with mutual security funds unless the President determines the aid should continue.

Caterpillar To Lay Off 14,000 Illinois Workers  
PEORIA (UP)—The Caterpillar Tractor Co. says it is going to lay off 14,000 workers in plants at Peoria, Joliet and Decatur, Ill., because of a shortage of steel.

The company said Friday that 7,500 workers would be cut from the payroll at its main plant in Peoria today, and an additional 5,000 dropped by the end of next week. Nine hundred employees will be laid off at Joliet and 600 at Decatur beginning Monday.

Caterpillar officials said it expected to return to normal manpower levels at these plants by Sept. 6.

The Illinois State Unemployment office said it was assigning 20 additional workers to its Peoria office to handle the anticipated upsurge of applications for unemployment compensation.

Forest Park Boy Killed By Truck  
FOREST PARK (UP)—Five-year-old Richard Anderson was killed Friday when a dump truck ran over him behind his home in Forest Park.

The driver of the truck, Harold Swain, Forest Park, was charged with reckless homicide pending an inquest into the death today.

Swain, said the boy darted out from between two garages and fell under the rear wheel of the truck.

State Police Officer Is Suspended  
WHILATOR (UP)—State Police Chief William Morris says he has suspended an officer who, with a company executive, has been charged in connection with an alleged bribery attempt.

Suspended from the state force was Joseph Dedina, 35, of Northlake.

Dedina and Conrad Reimer, president of a Schiller Park excavating firm, have been charged in warrants with attempting to bribe DuPage County deputy sheriffs.

Morris said the deputies—John Mayne and Louis Flannan, 37—halted two of Reimer's trucks near Elmhurst last Wednesday and found the dirt-filled trucks overweighed by some 9,000 pounds.

This violation of weight regulations would have subjected Reimer to a possible fine of \$9,744.

The police chief said the deputies received two \$50 checks, made out by Reimer, and handed to them by Dedina. The checks were turned over to authorities and the charges followed.

Dedina is free in \$1,000 bond.

**OFF THE BOOKBEAT**—Despite all the proven drawing power of such distractions as TV and the open road, the American Book Publishers Council reports that "sales of general books reached an all-time high in 1955. Dollar sales were up 8 per cent over 1954, 12 per cent over 1953, and 19 per cent over 1952. That includes all kinds of books, according to the Council, except textbooks and encyclopedias. Increases in sales appeared notably in religious, paperback, juvenile and technical books, and the publications of university presses. In spite of all the stories about Jack-pot authors who pick up a quarter of a million dollars on one novel and a half million on another, the survey reports that "the books continue to show a profit margin after taxes of 3.1 per cent," and that takes in extra income from reprint and other jack-pot rights.

Adult trade book prices cost on the average at wholesale \$1.84 in 1955 as against \$1.77 in 1952, or rose in price 3.55 per cent. Book club books, however, at \$1.42 in 1955, were \$1.54 in 1952, or a drop of 13.41 per cent.

**OFF THE BOOKBEAT**—Paul Horgan, in the East recently to collect some more of the honors coming his way since the publication of "Great River: The Rio Grande in North American History," found time to talk a bit about another book of his due in the fall. "I signed up with Dutton to do it 10 years ago. But I spent 14 years on 'Great River' for Rinehart, and I therefore don't pity Dutton in the least," said Horgan, a round-faced, bespectacled author, with a quick smile for a Dutton editor who was listening. With the new book securely in the office, Dutton obviously is not to be pitted now, but congratulated; however it gnashed its teeth for a decade. The title is "The Centuries of Santa Fe," in which some 10 characters, composites of historical figures, speak for the Spanish, then the Mexicans, and finally the American City. It is history, despite Horgan's imaginative treatment, and he wrote most of it abroad. 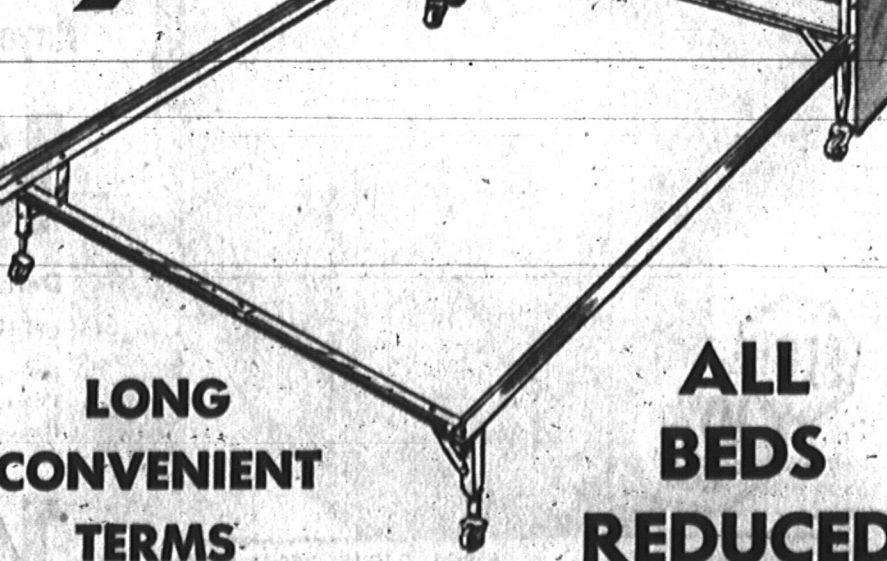

Mayor Ed P. Madison today announced plans for the removal of dead elm trees from terraces on a "first come, first served" basis.

The mayor requested that residents having dead trees on terraces at their homes write to the city clerk's office at city hall giving the name and address of the owner of the tree, the location, number and circumference of the trees.

The mayor said letters which are received first will receive first consideration. He said the city had funds available to remove approximately 400 trees.

The trees must be on terraces, the mayor said, because the city is not permitted to remove trees from private property.

The tree removal plan is being undertaken to help control Dutch elm disease which has taken a heavy toll of elm trees in Kankakee. The beetles which spread Dutch elm disease continue to breed in dead trees, thus endangering nearby live trees. Tree removal is considered one of the most important steps necessary to control Dutch elm disease.

# Keeping in Step

While most Kankakeans are convention viewers via television, Betty Cantlin of 499 S. Alma Ave. was behind the scenes at the Democratic convention last week.

Betty is a business office supervisor at the Illinois Bell Telephone Co. in Kankakee and was the only downtown supervisor at the convention hall last week. She and other telephone company employees were outfitted in powder blue suits and white berets for their stint at the convention phones.

It proved to be a tremendously exciting, according to Betty. Calls came from many points. One woman caller insisted that the telephone operator go on the convention floor and ask the conventioners to repeat the pledge of allegiance to the flag CORRECTLY when they omitted "under God." A senator was notified that he had become a grandfather during one session. And four travelers from Georgia asked that the operators try to locate convention tickets for them at the end of their long, long trip. They couldn't.

The telephone girls kept a guest book handy for the many celebrities who stopped at their booth as they worked. This is work?

The student who does superior work at school is undoubtedly a pleasure to the teachers, but there is also a question involved. Is he neglected in the present scheme of things?

In the opinion of Miss Violet Koerner of 1260 E. Merchant St., head of the English department at Kankakee High School, the bright student has been neglected.

Last year, in the spring semester, it was decided to have a group of accelerated senior English students. Miss Koerner explains acceleration to mean enrichment rather than "skipping." It was such a successful experience that, according to the teacher, it could be a permanent arrangement.

Students for such a class are recommended by the junior English teachers. Last year's class was limited in size to 25. The students responded to the opportunity to proceed at their own rate of speed.

Miss Koerner says that "we are coming to recognize that able learners are entitled to the highest degree of self-realization and development, that their talents are our most important resource to society, and that if our troubled world is to find solace for its ills, it may be through the talents, the resourcefulness, and the courageous leadership of this upper strata." This grouping of superior workers would depart from the idea that they should be kept with the average children to supply a "spark." Miss Koerner considers that perhaps the able learners (not accelerated) do not work to their potential capacity but in their immaturity prefer to stoop to the average level of the class in output and in behavior.

Miss Koerner has just finished a thoughtful paper on "an accelerated class of senior English." She did the work during a three-week summer at Illinois State Normal University, where she was enrolled this summer in three reading clinics offered by the Department of Education: basic, advanced and secondary. They were under the instruction of Mrs. Maria C. Cleworth of Elgin. Miss Koerner feels that the course would be profitable for administrators. She remained for the three clinics in order that she might see the whole school reading program in perspective.

As a result of her studies this summer, Miss Koerner is more enthusiastic than ever about the value of helping the student who does superior work to develop fully.

An interesting case is explained by Miss Koerner, showing the value of special programs for both the student who needs corrective help and the above-average child. One local high school student began in a special reading clinic and progressed to the accelerated class.

Miss Koerner has been at Kankakee High School for 13 years. After graduation from Chatsworth High School, she attended Illinois State Normal University for two years and then worked for two departments at the University of Illinois—bachelor of science and education and master of arts in English.

She resides at 1260 E. Merchant St. and is affiliated with the First Methodist Church, the American Association of University Women, Business and Professional Woman's Club and Delta Kappa Gamma.

A subject close to Miss Koerner's heart is the reading program for students. "All of us have personal problems and need varying degrees of social adjustment, and for therapeutic value what better source material is there than the whole field of literature?" The department head has employed varying methods in interesting her students in literature. In addition to the standard book review, she occasionally asks that they take parts of characters, cartoon scenes from a book, make covers or try to tell the book. Or she might ask that they group the lovely ladies in literature, or the villains, or old people.

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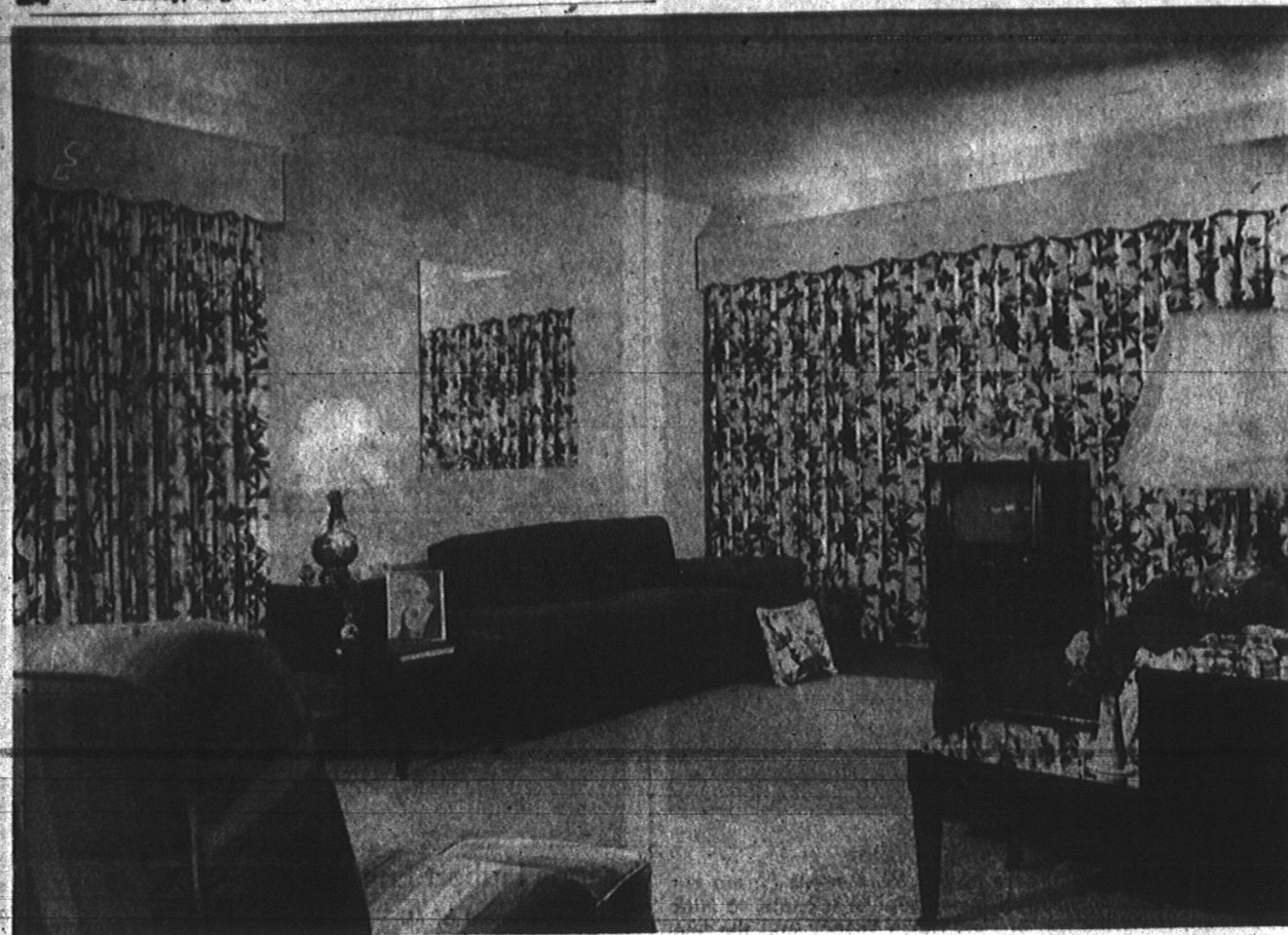

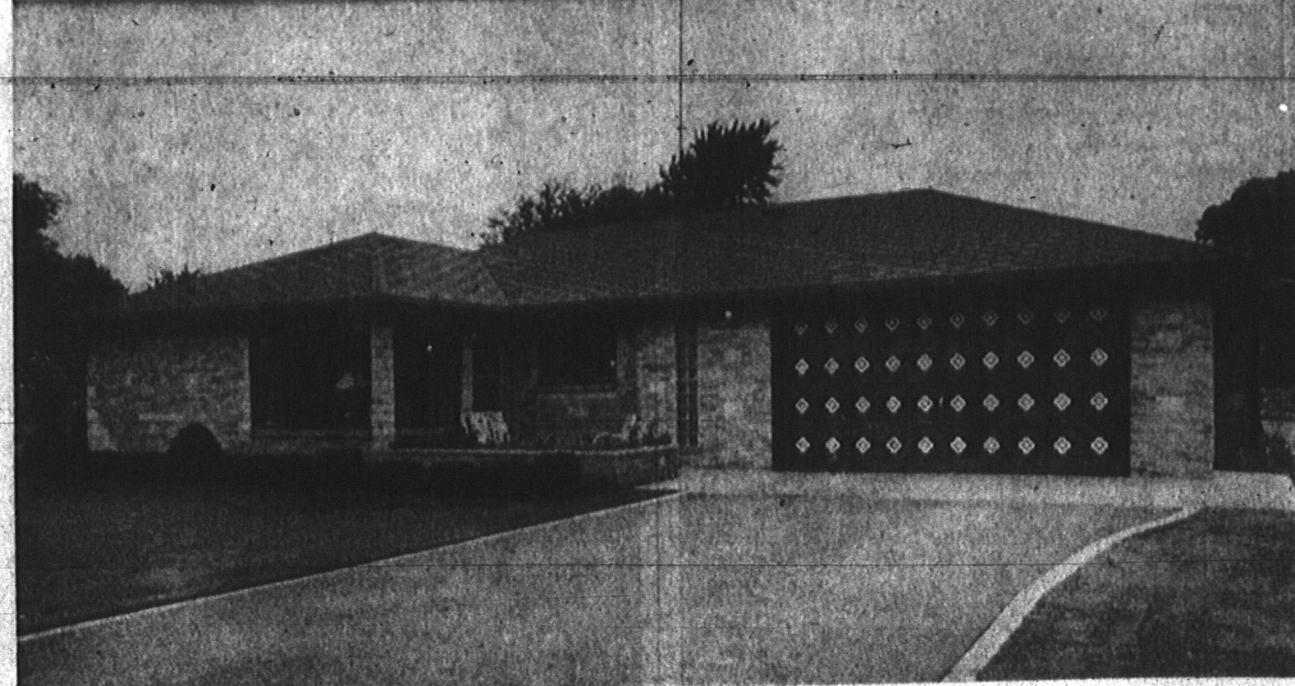

## ON THE HOUSE

Doors in houses are getting to be foolish extravaganzas. Of course, we need a front door and a back door, but the space used by swinging doors inside the house is a perpetually expensive item. It not only is costly to build, but it robs you of usable space for the rest of your life in that house. No doors in some places and sliding doors in others can give you much more house for your money.

No man in his right mind would think of installing revolving doors for every bedroom, bathroom and closet in his house. However, to agree with that statement means we are all half-crazy, because every time you swing an ordinary door you are taking up just about half the amount of space that would be used by a revolving door.

Furthermore, space costs a lot more money when you build a house today. The man who gets a livable one-story house built for around \$12 a square foot usually considers himself lucky. Still in most cases he wastes \$300 or more of his building money on space needed just to swing doors.

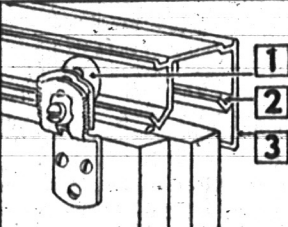
About two square feet is needed for the full swing of the average door. Additional space required when you step back every time you swing that door makes that waste even greater. Count the num-

ber of room doors and closet doors in your house and you can see why sliding doors are being used so widely in new house plans.

SO FAR, most sliding doors are used for closets. They make it possible to devote an entire side or end of a room to generous wardrobes and hat box shelves. These doors are bypassing types — two doors, each equal to half of the overall width of the opening, with a little overlap. No more than half of such a doorway is open at one time.

Now pocket doors are gaining in popularity. These are usually room doors, sliding into apertures in the wall. Great-grandma had them in her Victorian house — often between sitting room and parlor. Today they are being used, singly rather than double, for bedrooms and for divisions between compartments.

As far as the door itself is concerned, the main difference between swinging and sliding doors is in their hardware fittings. In-

stead of hinges, a sliding door uses a track. Instead of a doorknob you use a fingerhold. Both types can have automatic locks.

IN THE OLD Victorian houses, sliding doors were always running off their tracks, involving a lot of lifting and jiggling to get them to

work again. That can't happen with the most modern hardware. Nylon rollers for silent and permanent lubricated operation, are locked in to jump-proof tracks. The doors hang from this mechanism.

After having had trouble with warped doors, shrunken doors and what not running off their tracks in a mid-20th century period home, we took up these problems with an expert—George P. Merrill of the Stanley Works in New Britain, Conn. He pointed out that when the first sliding door hardware was developed, there was still a lot to be learned. The early tracks and steel rollers required a headroom of 3 1/2 inches. Modern tracks and nylon rollers take up only 1 1/2 inches.

Merrill estimates that about 90 per cent of all sliding doors in existing houses are used for closets, primarily in bedrooms. He thinks virtually every door inside a house should be a sliding door, in spite of the fact that his firm makes door knobs and hinges.

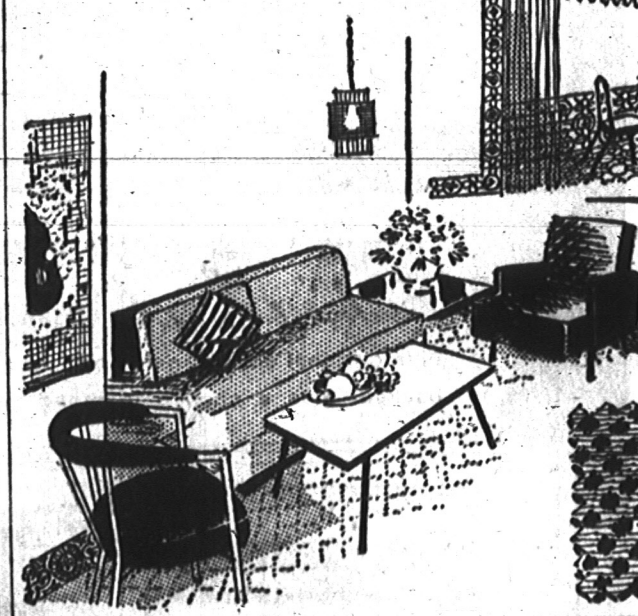

## Swim Pool Is Budget Plan Feature

## California Luxury From A 60-Foot Lot

A private swimming pool comes with this budget-priced house on a modest size lot.

Designated as Design HW-14 in The House of The Week series, it demonstrates the practicability of California luxury on most any 60-foot lot.

The house is expertly planned to keep every room free from cross traffic. It contains three bedrooms, two bathrooms, spacious living room and dining room, an efficiently planned kitchen and a dramatic outdoor living room. Yet the house property covers only 1,424 square feet.

You could build this house even on a 40-foot lot by shifting the swimming pool to the backyard and placing the garage or carport in front of the outdoor living room shown on this plan.

HOWEVER, THE advantages of arrangement in HW-14 are many. The kitchen window faces the pool area to give a mother supervision of her youngsters. The service door not only offers convenience for serving refreshments outdoors, but also has access to a bathroom for showers. This bathroom, adjoining the master bedroom, makes the pool especially inviting for a quick morning plunge.

Completely screened from neighbors, the pool has a covered spectator gallery along its side opposite the house. Blocking views from the street is a small cabana with a shower bath. This insures you against wet traffic through the house and provides dressing space.

HOW MUCH would a swimming pool of this type cost you? Rudolph A. Matern, the architect who designed the HW-14, got a lot of estimates before he completed this plan.

"Most people," he says, "feel that a private pool is beyond their pocket book, because of a lack of information. The best way to get a realistic picture is to get bids from two or more reputable pool builders in your community.

"However, if you are building a new house," Matern adds, "it is worth while to remember that the cost of your pool can be included in your mortgage so that you can pay it off over the 20 or 30 years your mortgage will run. Later it may be built with a three-year improvement loan, or you can make it a do-it-yourself project to eliminate most or all of the labor cost."

Matern points out that there are various types of pools and pool kits available. There are pools of concrete block, reinforced block, poured concrete, steel shell and gunite concrete sprayed on steel rods. Then there are kits for pre-stressed pre-cast concrete, plastic lined pools and fiber glass pools.

"For a professionally built pool, approximately 16 by 20 feet, including piping and filter, the cost may run between \$2,500 and \$3,000," he says. "A pre-cast concrete unit, 18 by 32, complete with filtration system can be purchased for \$1,300. Do-it-yourself labor can keep the installation cost close to this figure.

"A 15 by 30 pre-formed light-

weight fiber glass pool kit, including filter, coping and light can be had for \$1,000—another do-it-yourself project.

"One man built himself an 11 by 17 poured concrete pool for \$390. This and many others have withstood many winters in the cold area of the country."

THE OUTDOOR living room of this house is an especially attractive feature. This is removed from the swimming area and the miniature sandy beach at the head of the pool. It is entered through sliding glass doors from the living room. A separate barbecue fireplace uses a flue in the same chimney as the main living room fireplace. Sheltered by the garage, this outdoor living room is a place to relax, dine al fresco, or watch the bathers in the sun shaded retreat.

Privacy indoors and outdoors is underwritten in this plan. A walk along the outside of the garage leads to the swimming pool area. But a gate at the end of this walk keeps excluded persons out. Usually when you build a swimming pool, you have to have a fence around it. Here the gate, the garage and the covered spectators gallery provide that fence without disfiguring your property.

## HOME REPAIR DOs and DON'Ts

**PAINT TROUBLES**

**DO . . .** know that paint troubles occur when fundamentals are ignored, either unknowingly or because the painter does not take the time and trouble to heed them.

**DO . . .** prepare surfaces properly by scraping off loose, scaly paint, sanding glossy spots and filling holes and cracks with wood putty or plastic wood.

**DO . . .** seal knots and sap streaks with shellac, aluminum paint or a special preparation made for that purpose and he sure all mildew and fungus growths are washed off.

**DO . . .** use a priming coat when the directions call for it, remembering that this sometimes is the difference between an excellent result and an ordinary one.

**DO . . .** select the right paint for the job, keeping in mind that there are many special-purpose paints on the market and more being introduced all the time.

**DON'T . . .** apply too thick a coat, either indoors or outdoors, since this causes the common paint failure known as wrinkling.

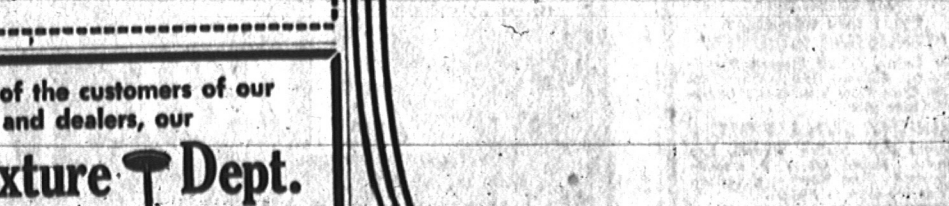
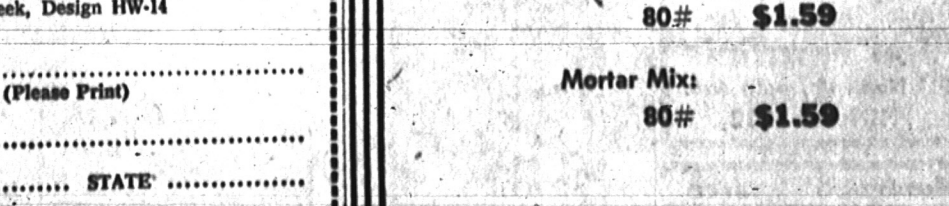
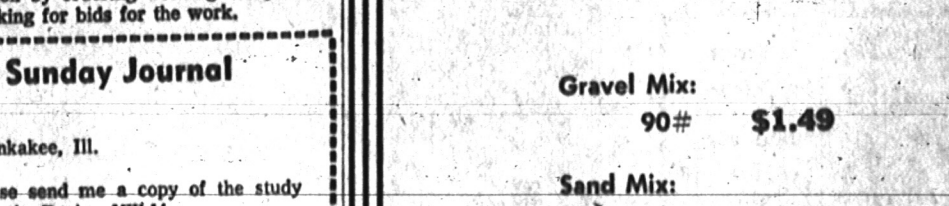
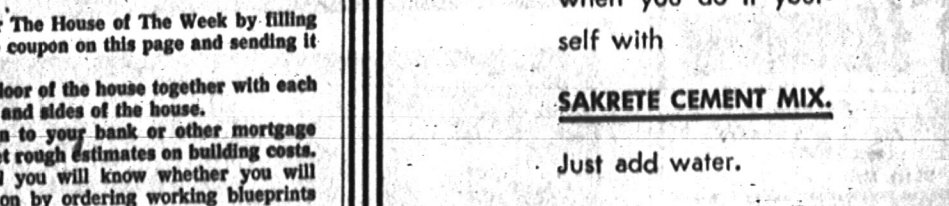
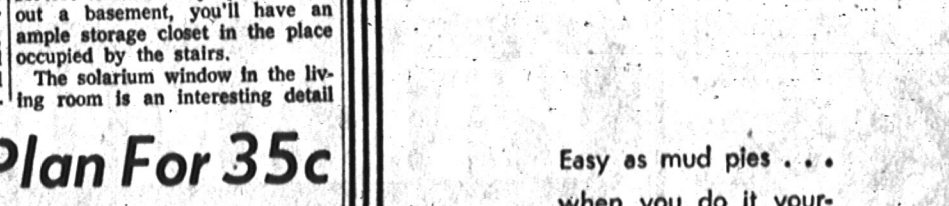
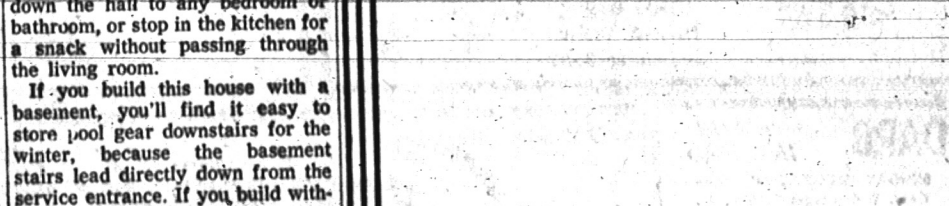
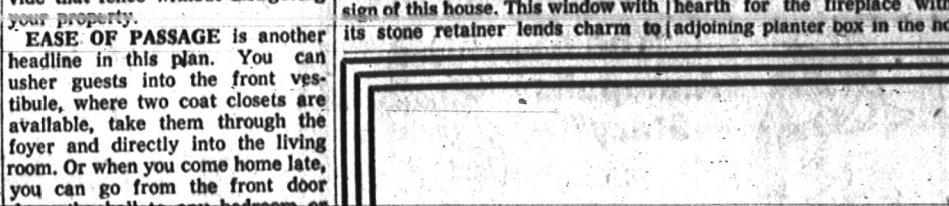
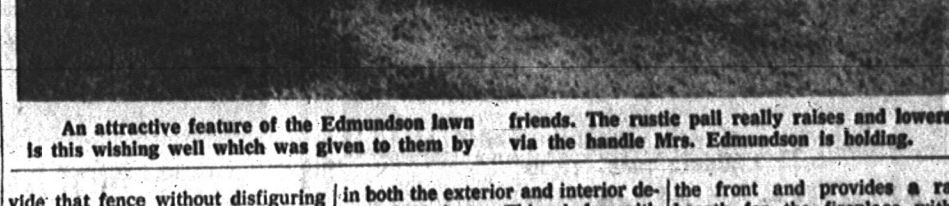
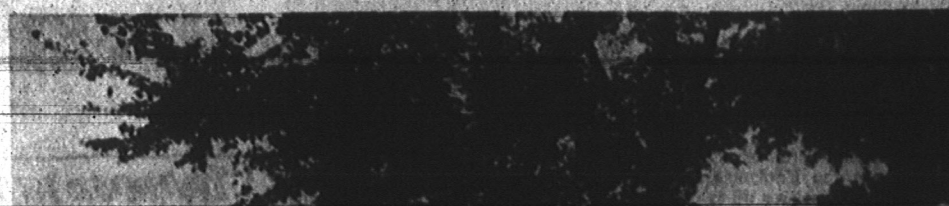
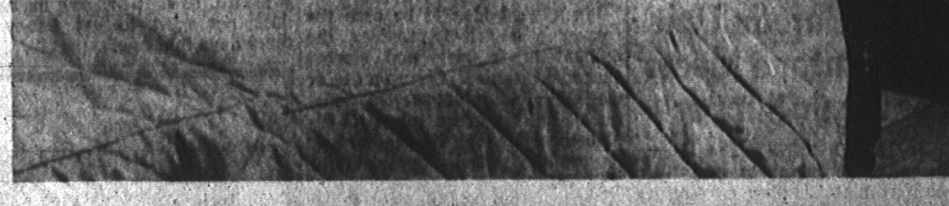
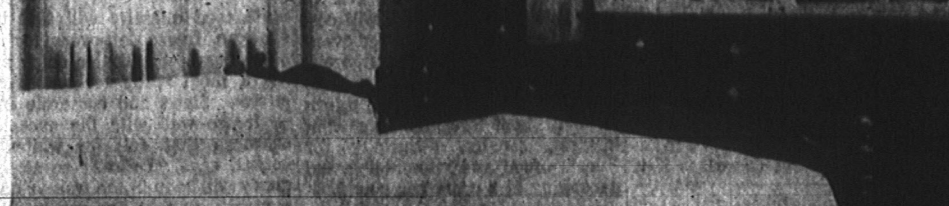
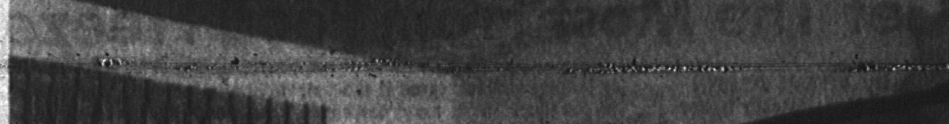
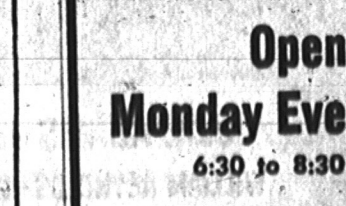
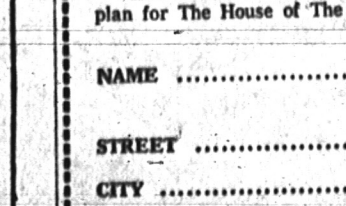
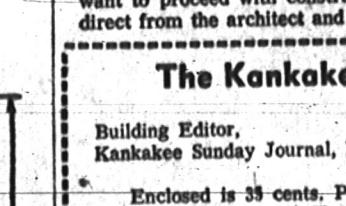
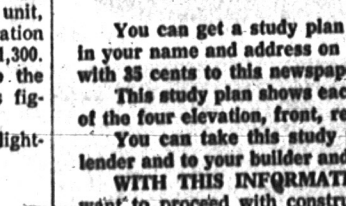
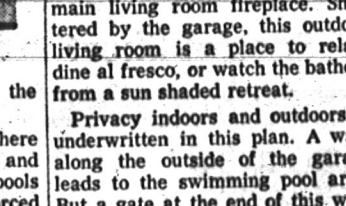
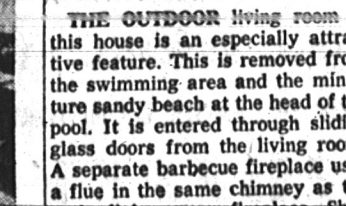
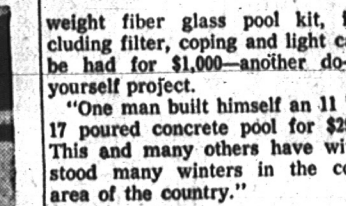
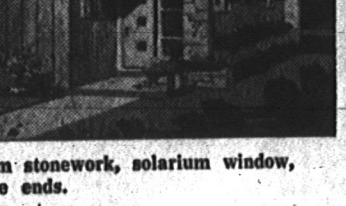
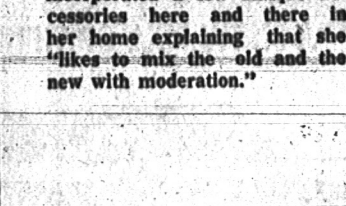
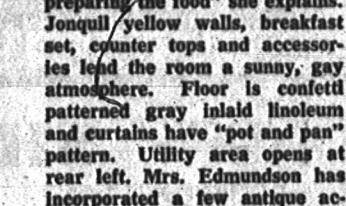
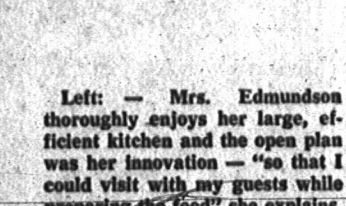
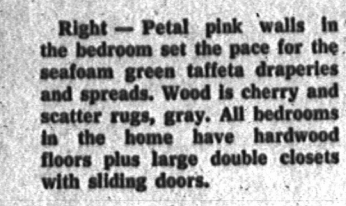
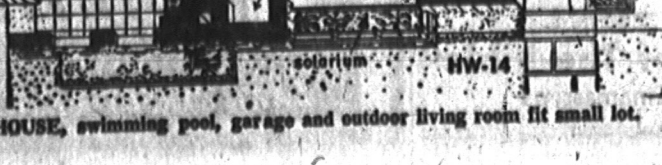
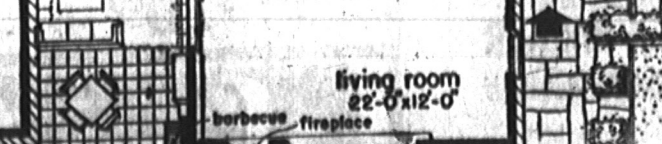
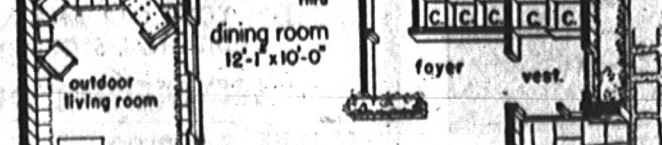
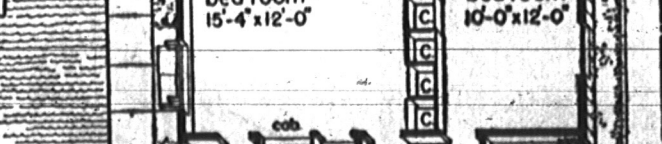
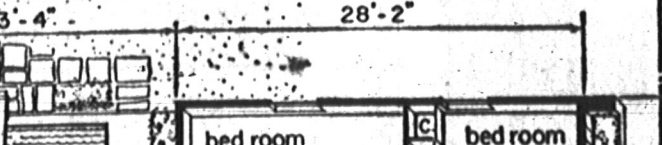
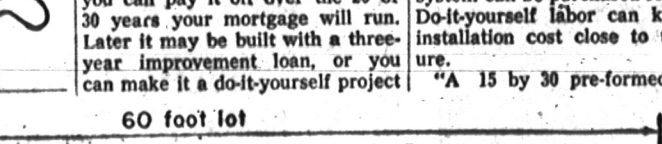
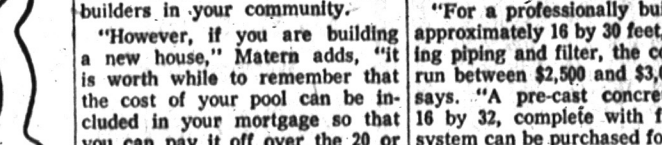
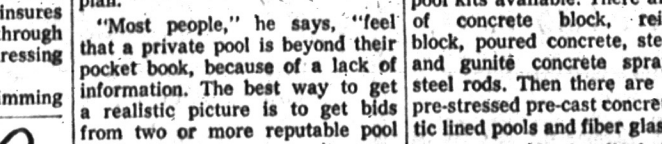
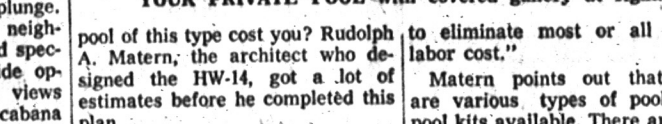
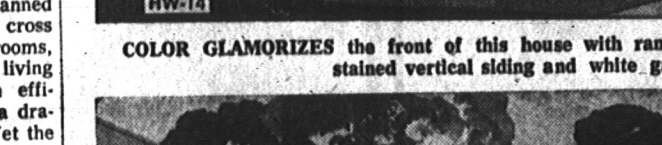
