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### Wage Hike, Health Program Sought By Railroad Union

CLEVELAND, Aug. 26.—Wage increases of \$1 a day and comprehensive health programs are the goal of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, which opened in Chicago today with representatives of 10 major American railroads.

Headquarters of the independent railroad union there said Vice President M. W. Hampton heads a nine-man negotiating committee meeting with management officials in behalf of about 60,000 firemen, engineers, hostlers and boiler-makers.

The statistics compiled last spring, the average hourly rate for firemen, hostlers and boiler-makers was \$1.15, the union reported, and with engineers included, the average rate was \$2.30.

Vaglica was arrested in nearby Hayward where he had been living under the name of Frank Joseph Salerno and working as a laborer.

### Lydon Asks Quash Of Writ Attaching His Property

SPRINGFIELD (UPI)—William Lydon, the suspended Chicago policeman whose fabric crafts sales Co. figured prominently in the Hodge scandal, today appealed to the Illinois Supreme Court to quash a writ attaching his property.

The attachment writ was issued in Chicago July 27, charging that former Auditor Orville E. Hodge, Edward A. Epping and Lydon owed the state \$441,270 because of fraudulent state warrants. The writ holds whatever property necessary to satisfy the claim.

The Fabric Crafts Sales Co. headed by Lydon, redecorated Hodge's Chicago and Springfield offices, and records show the firm was paid \$396,000 of state money.

But Lydon said he did not receive any money nor did he, and the writ was invalid. The petition will be presented to the Supreme Court when it convenes Monday.

### Admits Spill Guilt

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—Anatole Ericsson, 46-year-old radar instrument maker, was indicted for "grand espionage" for Russia. The indictment said he had supplied Russia with secret radar information since 1939. Ericsson pleaded guilty at a preliminary hearing Aug. 21. He said he sold blueprints and photos of Swedish radar equipment to Russia.

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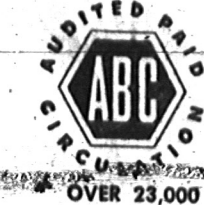

## Eden Calls Parliament Over Suez

Meeting Slated For Wednesday After Secret Development

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—A development termed important since the five-nation Suez Canal committee last week, called an emergency session of Britain's Parliament for next Wednesday to hear a report on the committee's mission to Cairo.

The vacationing lawmakers were not due back until Oct. 23. The nature of the development was not disclosed by either side here. But the committee, headed by Australian Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies, set aside today and Friday for private discussions of Egypt's viewpoint on the Suez crisis as explained by Nasser.

THE DISCUSSIONS between the Egyptians and the committee in four formal sessions today, under secrecy imposed by Menzies himself since the start Monday—though the general position of both sides are well known. The committee wants to put the canal under international control. Nasser objects to anything that would limit Egypt's sovereignty in its operation.

A committee spokesman said the development did not represent a statement in the talks which opened Monday, and added: "I am optimistic that a compromise will be found."

He said no time was set for the next meeting "because the situation is looking into various detailed aspects of things which must be reached."

The committee came here with a proposal for international control of the key Middle East waterway by 15 of the 21 nations attending the recent London conference on the canal controversy. The conference was called by Nasser after announced July 26 that Egypt had nationalized the canal. Nasser has maintained that Egypt has the right of sole control over the canal and that he will not accept any proposal for "international control."

SOURCES close to the Menzies committee and the Egyptian government denied that Nasser had rejected categorically the international control proposal put forward at the London party by Secretary of State Dulles.

Nasser had presented his viewpoint, which differed from the Dulles proposal.

"But Nasser presented his viewpoint in a positive and not in a negative manner," an Egyptian source said. "He has always said he would not accept the Dulles plan, but he still has not slammed it."

## 5,267 Enroll In Dist. III Schools

An opening day enrollment of 5,267 was reported in Kankakee School District III, with late comers expected to raise the total to near the predicted mark of 5,400.

Last year's enrollment was 4,200. About 400 of the increase results from annexing the Aroma Park Territory, while the remainder is the district's normal yearly growth.

First-day totals were 3,244 grade school pupils, 1,221 in the junior high and 842 at high school.

The high school figure, however, included only pre-registrations in upper two grades, and a good many more students were expected.

The new Mark Twain School, 229 E. Court St., will be almost filled when it opens in a week or two, the figures indicated.

PUPILS WHO WILL attend the Baker building is in a rapidly expanding residential area. It also will house the former Baker pupils, half of whom have had to be transferred to the old Central building in recent years.

Enrollments which will move into other schools include 224 at Thomas Edison on Maple street and 190 at William Howard Taft near West Junior High School.

The Taft and Edison pupils, like those at Twain, have been given temporary assignments to keep the classes intact while the new buildings are finished.

The movement into the new schools will ease the situation at other buildings.

# KIDNAPER DROWNED IN CONNECTICUT BAY

## Freak Okinawa Tides Drown 11 U.S. Marines

12 Others Saved; Tragedy Blamed On New Tropical Storm

NAHA, Okinawa (UPI)—Eleven U.S. Marines who went swimming in apparently calm water were drowned Wednesday when caught up by freak ocean currents, Marine headquarters announced today.

Twelve other Marines were saved when other men in the area came to their rescue.

The Marines, who had engaged in field problems throughout the day, entered the water to cool off. They had been given instructions a few moments before by their company commander on safety precautions.

But a freak current hit them and swept them out to sea.

IT WAS THE SECOND tragic incident in six months involving the Marine Corps. Last April 8, six Marines were drowned at Paris Island, S. C., when Staff Sgt. Matthew McKoon, an instructor, led a detachment into tidal waters on a night march which he ordered as a disciplinary measure. McKoon later was court-martialed and sentenced to nine months' imprisonment and had conduct discharge from the corps.

Brig. Gen. Victor H. Krulak, commanding general of the 3rd Marine Division, ordered an extensive land, sea and air search for the missing men.

Available Marine aircraft were sent into the air to search the sea within five miles of the shore. Foot patrols searched the shoreline and boats cruised offshore looking for victims.

"Before the men were swept deep in the water, they were in trouble," eyewitnesses said. "They were knocked from their feet by a vicious undercurrent and tumbled seaward."

Members of the chain were unable to keep their footing due to the strength of the freak current.

Second Lt. John L. Shanahan, a skilled skin diver, heard of the raft and raced to the beach at the north end of the island with a rubber raft. He moved it through the surf and pulled the Marines to the raft. The Marines, unable to swim against the heavy current, clung to the raft until a helicopter arrived and dropped a 100-foot line and towed the raft to safety.

Persons familiar with the action current during typhoons said that the current was unusually strong and that the Marines were caught off guard.

Cynthia was taken from her carriage in the foyer of a Sears Roebuck store two miles from the lake Saturday. Her mother was shopping inside the store.

THE RECOVERY came only a brief time after a new radio appeal was made for the abduction to return the baby safely. The child's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Ruotolo, had all but given up on appeals to the kidnaper Tuesday.

There was no word from the police whether the discovery of the body brought with it any clues as to the kidnaper.

A white purse by her body held newspaper clippings telling her of Charles Waters, 24, had apparently taken his own life Tuesday.

An abandoned automobile belonging to Waters—who was married and had a small daughter—was found on the bridge with the engine running. A foot of footprints in the fog moisture led to the falling.

The stories quoted Mrs. Waters as saying they had been reconciled only two weeks ago after a separation.

Patricia's mother, Mrs. L. Donna V. Morrow, said Waters and Patricia had been going together for the last two years.

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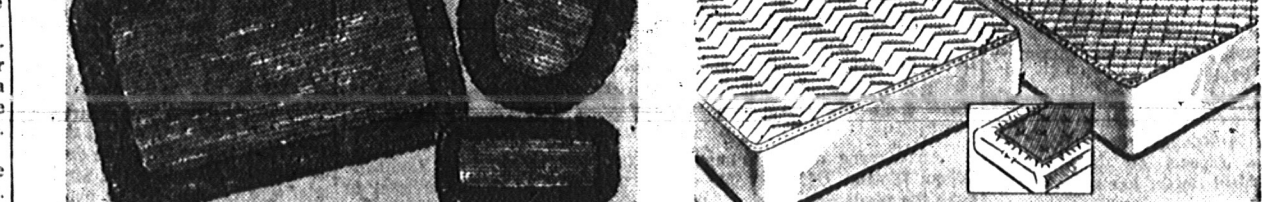

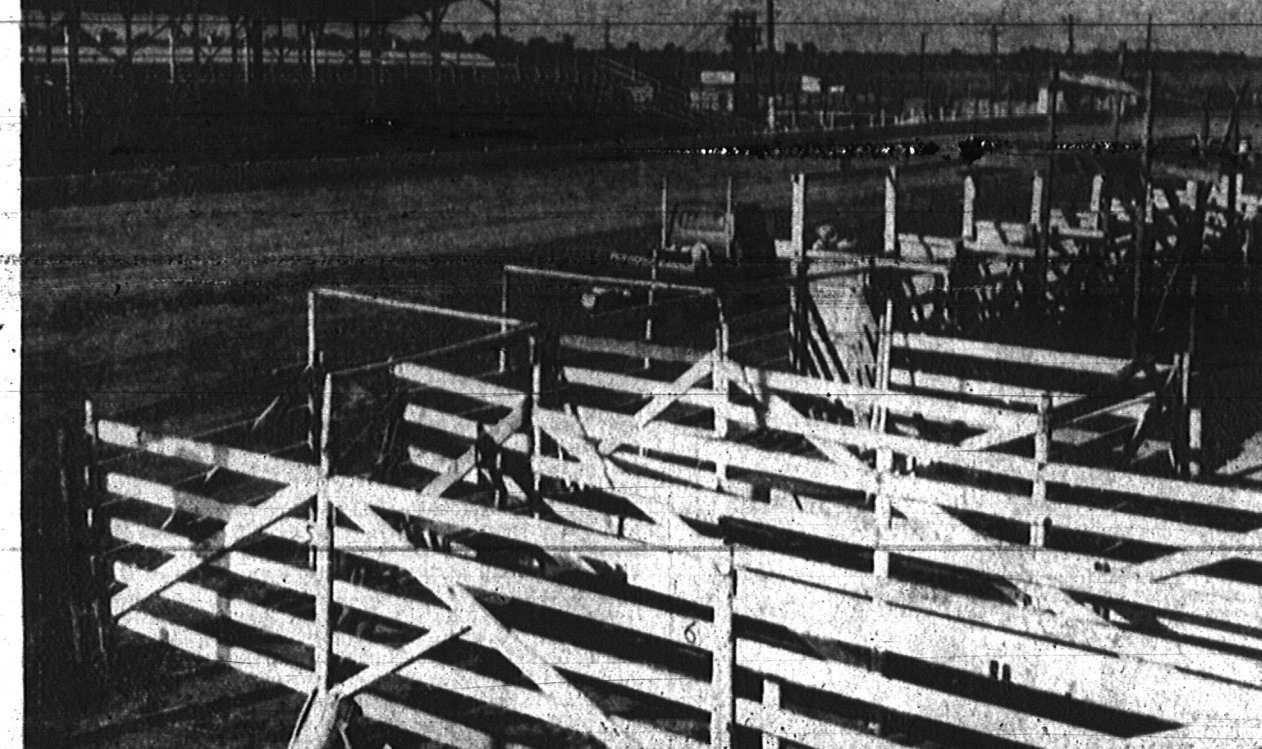

## Kankakee Fairground Takes On New Look For Rodeo

The Kankakee County fairgrounds has taken on a new look as workmen were busy setting up portable bleachers and livestock chutes in preparation for the First Annual Greater Kankakee Area Championship Rodeo which will be held Saturday and Sunday.

The regular permanent grandstand which holds 4,000 persons will be supplemented by portable bleachers at the other three sides of the arena which will hold an additional 3,000 persons.

The stands on the north side of the arena are already in place. After the stock car race Friday night, workmen will erect the stands at the east and west side of the arena.

PERCY LOISELLE, fair association president, said the track will be torn up and loosened to make a softer bed for the cowboys when they fall.

Kear Rogers, Stone City, Kan., will bring in 150 head of rodeo livestock today which will be kept in a large six foot high corral south of the grandstand.

The livestock will include 60 wild horses to be used in the saddle and bareback bronc riding, 20 Brahmas bulls, 25 calves for roping, 25 steers and 15 head of saddle horses for the parade in downtown Kankakee Saturday morning.

The rodeo, approved by the Rodeo Cowboy Association, will be the largest held in Illinois. Professional rodeo cowboys from all over the country will compete for \$3,000 in prize money.

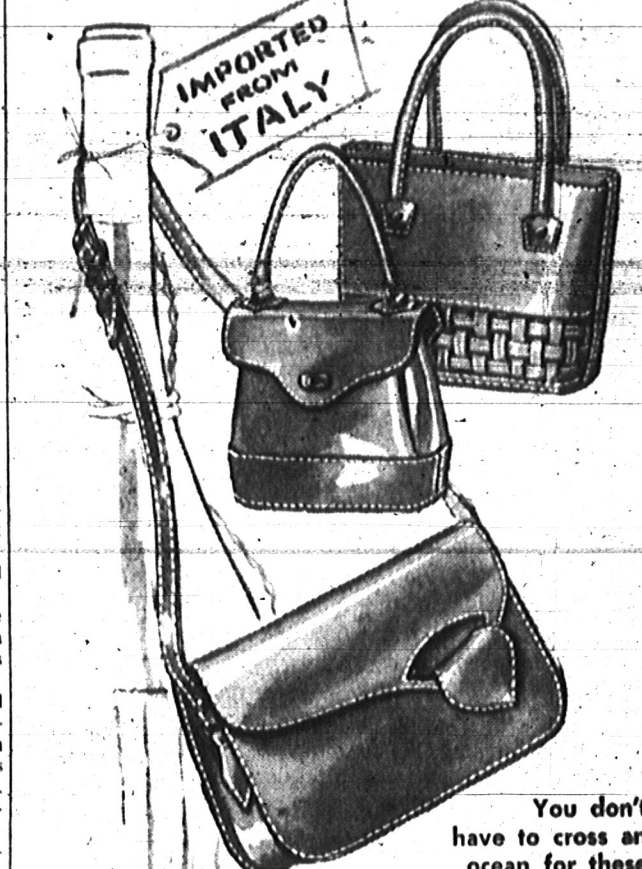

## U.S. Reports Peak Season For Polio Past

WASHINGTON (UP)—Public Health Service figures showed today that the 1956 polio season may have passed its peak.

The number of cases reported in the nation last week was 866, compared with 943 the previous week. It was the first drop in the number of cases since the polio season began last spring.

The Health Service noted that over a five-year period, the average time for polio cases to pass peak incidence has been the second week in September. It cautioned, however, that there is always a danger of later rises.

THE NUMBER of cases in hard-hit Chicago last week was 62, compared with 100 for the previous week. It was the third successive week in which the number of cases had declined in Chicago. For the state of Illinois outside of Chicago, total cases dropped from 67 to 58.

Polio cases this year have been running far below last year's level. Last week's 866 cases compared with 2,609 for the comparable week of 1955. And for the entire "disease year" to date, there have been 7,427 cases in 1956 compared to 15,128 in 1955.

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## Ike To Study Integration Riots In Texas

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower plans to review the federal court order which stipulated that the public schools of Mansfield, Texas, be integrated—an order which led to mob action by whites to prevent Negroes from registering.

A reporter told Mr. Eisenhower at his news conference Wednesday that Texas Gov. Allan Shivers had voiced defiance of the court's integration decree and ordered Negro students trying to enroll at Mansfield transferred.

The reporter asked whether the President had discussed this situation with the Justice Department.

"I HAVE NOT discussed it because you are quoting both and order that I have not read and a statement (Shivers) that I have not seen," the President answered.

But he added that he had sent for the district court order "to know what it says."

The President then went on to say that the federal government should not act to put down riots against school integration unless local law enforcement breaks down. So far, he said, there has not been any case of a state failing "to grapple with this question of riots properly."

Mr. Eisenhower also pleaded again for patience and moderation in the school segregation dispute.

"This is a question of leading and training and teaching people, and it takes some time, unfortunately."

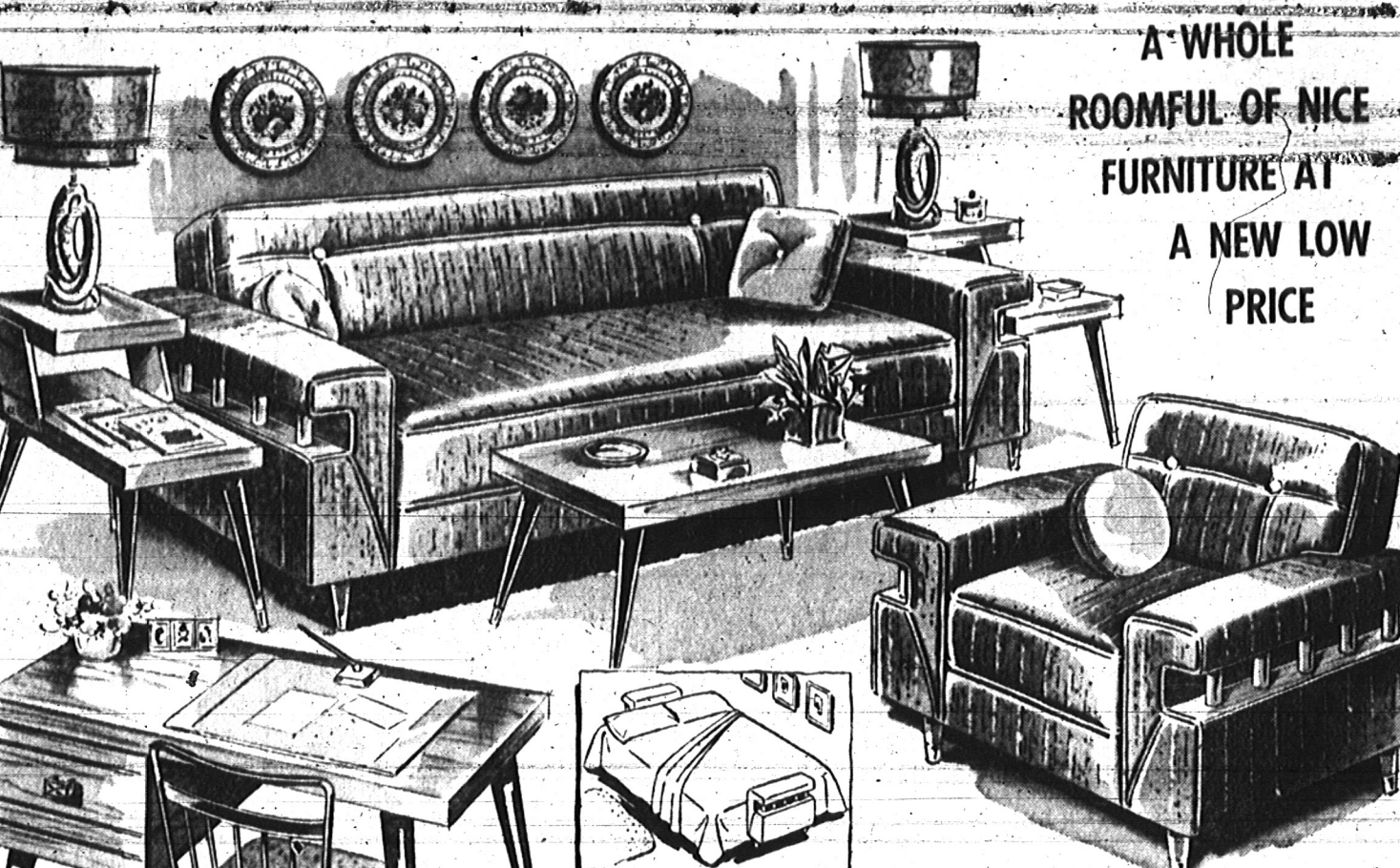

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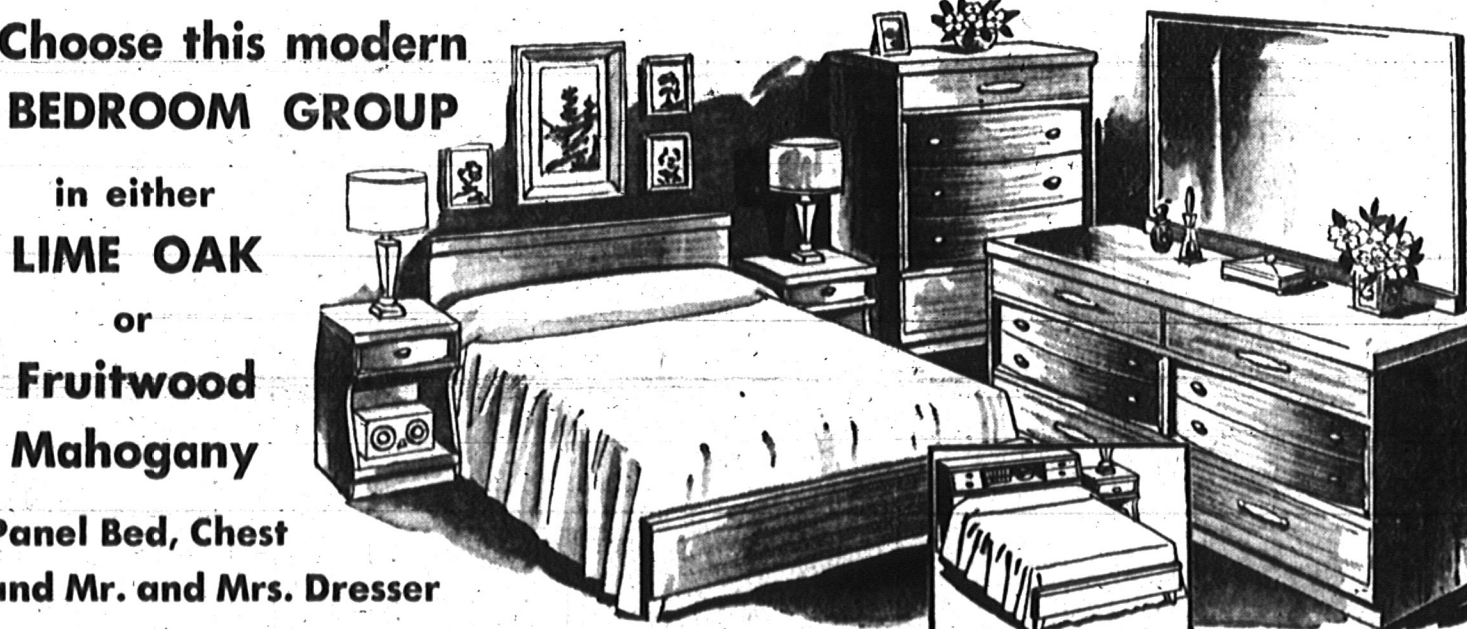

This action is definitely streamlining, for it affords mild but constant exercise for the area of the figure which is most likely to spread.  
However, when these important muscles have been allowed to go soft, you will find it difficult or impossible to hold the up-and-in-pull. The remedy is to restore tone to the brace of abdominal muscles. Nature's girdle is most remarkable. It never wears out, and properly toned, these important muscles aid in holding the internal organs in their normal high position and keep the abdomen flat and firm.  
The following exercises are taken from the WAC Manual. These progressive exercises are guaranteed to restore live tone to the middle muscles.

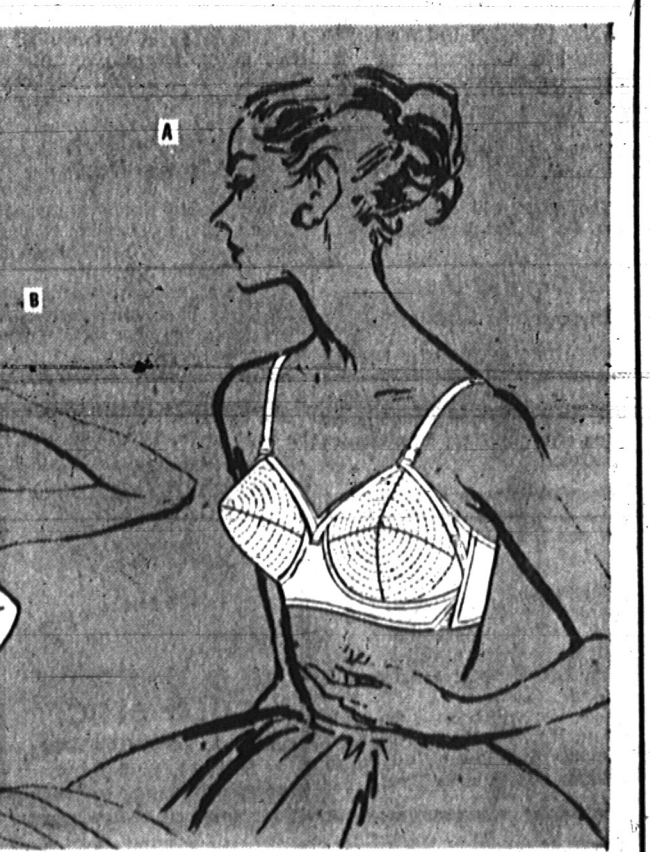

1 cup flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup milk  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon butter  
Hot Fruit

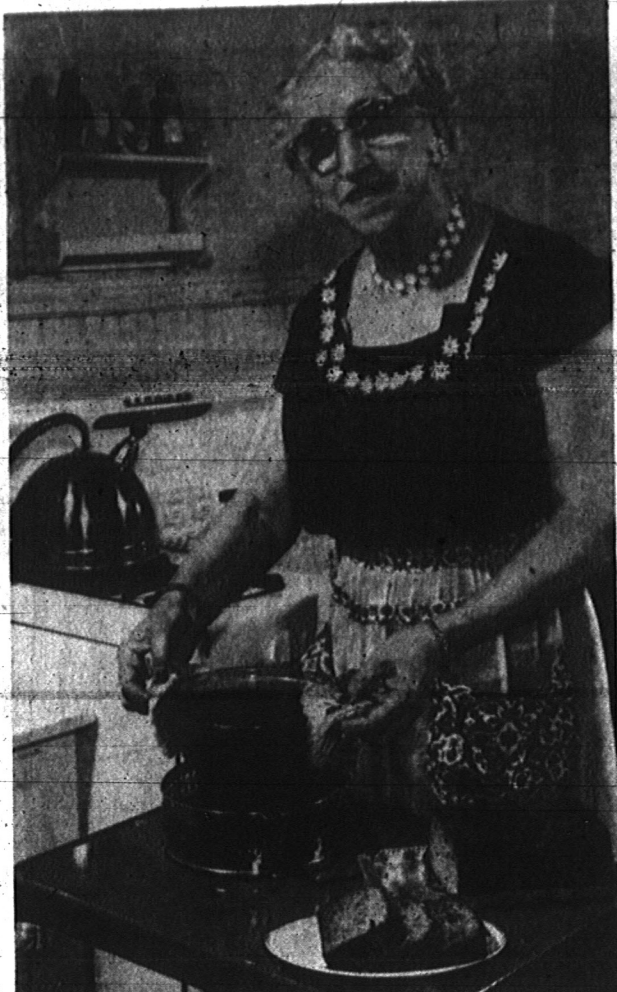
Mix ingredients and pour into pan. Pour any hot fruit over and bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes or until brown on top.

## New Ideas For Quick Favorite

By CECILY BROWNSTONE

That favorite quick, broiled lamb chops, will take on extra savor if you season them as we suggest in the following recipe.

Nowadays you don't always have to buy the chops when you are doing your fresh-food shopping.

But be careful: if you've thawed frozen lamb chops and then changed your mind about roasting them, refrigerate the meat and use it the next day. Actually it's not broiling, but naturally the frozen chops take several minutes more to cook per side—and they have to be cooked more slowly—than thawed chops.

The advantage of thawing, in our opinion, is that the chops can be cooked quickly. From this you can conclude that we are not a staunch advocate of broiling meat today. Many modern schools of cookery disagree with us, but we have fine restaurant chefs on our side.

**SAVORY BROILED LAMB CHOPS**  
Ingredients: 8 loin lamb chops (regular or frozen), 2 tablespoons lemon juice (1 small lemon), 2 large clove garlic (crushed), 1/4 teaspoon paprika, salt, pepper.

Method: If chops are frozen, thaw. Arrange chops (1/4 to 1/2 inch thick) on broiling pan rack. Mix lemon juice, crushed garlic and paprika. Spread one side of chops with half of the lemon juice mixture; broil until browned. Turn chops, spread with remaining lemon juice mixture and finish broiling. Sprinkle chops with salt and pepper. Serve at once. Makes 4 servings.

Note: Broiling time varies, depending on how close the meat is placed to the broiling unit and the degree of heat under which it is broiled. As a guide, inch-thick loin chops placed about 3 inches from high heat will need about 4 minutes per side to be medium-well done.

**BROILER TIP**  
It's not necessary to use a range's regular large broiling pan and rack if only four chops are being cooked. Inexpensive small shallow broiling pans, with racks, are widely available and easier to wash than regular pans. If you line either pan (small or large) with aluminum foil, turning up the foil to cover edges and corners, you'll save your self work.

**Plan To Detonate 'Live' Civil War Cannonballs**

ANNISTON, Ala. (AP)—Several Civil War cannonballs, found recently near Chattanooga at the site of the battle of Missionary Ridge, are expected to be fired at Ft. McCall, Ala., later this week.

The cannonballs, considered "live" because rust prevented a complete examination, are scheduled to be set off by Lt. Donald H. Hines, commanding officer of the 4th Infantry Division, 2nd Infantry Division.

The battle of Missionary Ridge, a major Confederate defeat, was fought Nov. 24, 1863. White said he presumed the old cannonballs would explode with a sharp effect.

**Navy Backs Old Style Typewriter Over Electric Unit**

CHICAGO (AP)—The Navy Wednesday sprung to the defense of the non-electric typewriter.

Through one of its psychologists, the Navy granted that electric typewriters are speedier and easier to operate than the older "manual" variety of machines. But it said it has found that it's not true that would-be typists will reach a higher proficiency level in less time if they are trained on electric instead of on manual typewriters.

Psychologist Henry L. Adams of the Navy's Personnel Research Field Activity at San Diego said that after three weeks' training "it was found that students trained on manual typewriters performed as well as students trained on electric typewriters."

He made his remarks in addressing the American Psychological Association.

## Cherry Cream Pie Recipe

Cherry Cream Pie is one of the ways in which they do it. This recipe makes one 8-inch pie.

Sauté one cup of milk. Mix 3 tablespoons of flour with ¼ cup sugar and ½ teaspoon salt, then add gradually ½ cup cold milk to this mixture. Stir into the hot milk, and cook slowly over boiling water until thickened—stirring constantly. Cover and let cook over boiling water for 5 minutes. Lightly beat 3 egg yolks, adding the hot mixture slowly to the egg yolks, and cooking 1 minute longer. Add ½ teaspoon vanilla and 1 tablespoon of butter and let cool. Pour into baked pie shell.

Cherry Topping: Drain juice from one No. 2 can of sour pitted cherries. Place juice in small sauce pan with 1 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons cornstarch. Cook until clear. Put cherries into this mixture and cook about 5 minutes. Cool and pour over cream pie filling. Cover with maraschino made from the 1 egg white. Beat the egg white until stiff and beat in 6 tablespoons of sugar, one tablespoon at a time. Add a pinch of salt and put over pie. Bake in 350 F. oven until well browned. Be sure pie is well cooled before serving.

## Kentucky College Hotel Is Noted For Fried Chicken

Berea College, Berea, Ky., founded in 1855, is the oldest and largest of the mountain schools in the state. The school draws over 90 per cent of its 1,500 students from the Appalachian sections of eight southern states. No tuition is charged, and many of the students carry their expenses at work provided by the institution. Student industries include the bakery, candy kitchen, printing shop, needlecraft, broomcraft, woodcraft, fireweed weaving, mountain weavers and the dairy, farm and creamery. Boone Tavern, the college hotel, is maintained almost entirely by student labor.

At Boone Tavern, the attractive handwoven fabrics in upholstery and curtains, the Colonial furniture in the lobby, parlors and writing room were made by the students. Many of the foods served are fresh from the college farms, garden, dairy, creamery and bakery. Southern fried chicken and spoon bread are a couple of their specialties. Here is their recipe for Spoon Bread.

Gradually stir 1/4 cup of corn meal into 3 cups of milk. Let this come to a boil, making mush. Add 1 teaspoon salt, and 2 tablespoons butter to the hot mush. Then add 3 well beaten eggs and 1 1/2 teaspoon of baking powder. Pour into buttered casserole or pyrex dish. Bake in 350 F. oven for 30 minutes. Serve in the baking dish. This light-textured spoon bread literally melts in your mouth when eaten with no more butter on it than an average baked potato would require.
