Miss Sullivan said she regretted the "inconvenience it has caused anyone."

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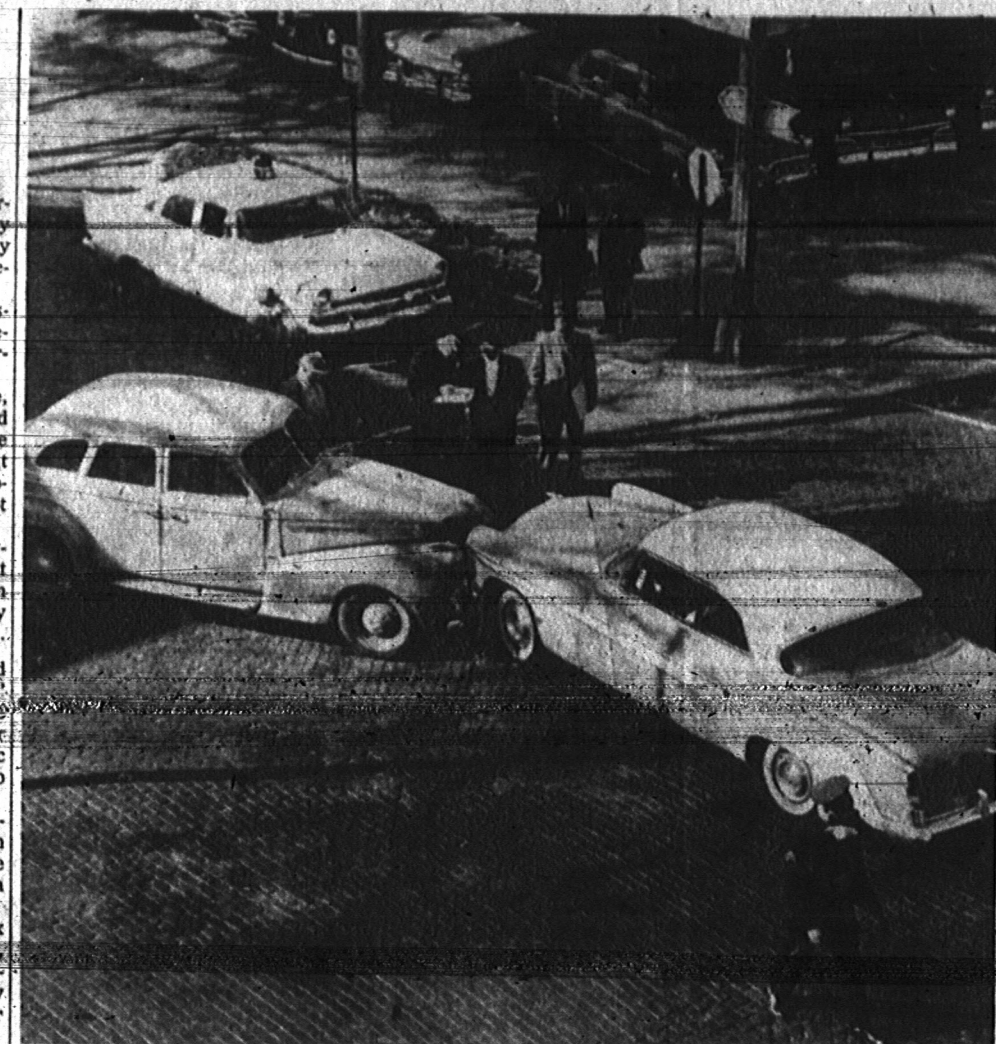

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U.S. To Broaden Veteran Home Loan Plan In Some Areas

WASHINGTON (UP)—The government plan to start lending again to home-buying veterans who live in certain rural areas and small communities where mortgage money is hard to get.

This action, announced Wednesday by the White House, will supplement two government programs already in operation—the Veterans Administration program of guarantees for mortgage loans by banks and other private lending outfits and the voluntary home mortgage credit program which serves as a channel through which would-be lenders and would-be borrowers can find each other.

The VA also lends federal funds to qualified ex-GIs in some areas if they cannot get private financing for a home. The new action would expand the list of areas eligible for this direct government lending.

The new areas will be announced after Oct. 15. They will be areas which were formerly eligible but were made ineligible when private capital became available.

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Simple Food For Elegant Party

One of the most successful parties we've ever given had the simplest food. We asked about a dozen friends to drop in for late-afternoon snacks and served them miniature hamburgers and small frankfurters in matching-size buns. With these came pickle relish, mustard, crunchy fresh vegetables and olives. There was a choice of drinks to sip, including tomato juice.

But simple as the food was, we took pains with it. The meat for the hamburgers was freshly-ground chuck; the small frankfurters were the best all-beef ones we could buy. The relish and mustard were homemade. The vegetable snacks were prepared with care so they tasted crisp and fresh and looked attractive. The olives were large and handsome and, along with the vegetables, served in bowls of crushed ice.

The real hit of the party was the batch of homemade yeast buns and rolls that were fashioned in miniature size to accompany the small hamburgers and frankfurters. Brushed with an egg-yolk wash, the tops of the buns and rolls looked gloriously shiny and inviting. If you would like to try your hand at making these, here's the recipe.

Should you adopt this party idea, and own an electric roller, by all means use it for grilling the hamburgers and frankfurters. Your company comes. A few of the guests will be sure to be fascinated by the appliance and be happy to take over, leaving you free to keep the rest of the party service running smoothly.

MINIATURE BUNS AND ROLLS
Ingredients: 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup warm water (near 100 degrees), 1 package active dry yeast, 1/2 cup sifted flour.

Method: Scald milk. Stir in sugar, salt and shortening. Measure warm water—make sure it is not hot—into a large mixing bowl. Sprinkle in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture. Add half of the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour. Turn out on lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl; brush with extra shortening; cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Divide dough in half. Use one-half for hamburger

buns, the remaining half for frankfurters rolls.

To Shape Hamburger Buns: Divide one-half of the dough into 3 equal pieces. Form each piece into a roll 12 inches long. Cut each roll into 12 equal pieces. Form into smooth balls. Place on greased baking sheets. Let rise 1/2 inch apart. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 30 minutes. Bake in very hot (500 degrees) oven until golden brown—about 5 minutes. Makes 3 dozen.

To Shape Frankfurter Rolls: Divide one-half of the dough into 3 equal pieces. Form each piece into a roll 12 inches long. Cut each roll into 12 equal pieces. Form into smooth balls. Roll each ball back and forth on lightly floured board with palm of hand until about 2 1/2 inches long, slightly tapering the ends. Place on greased baking sheet, about 2 inches apart. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 30 minutes. Bake in very hot (500 degrees) oven until golden brown—about 5 minutes. Makes 3 dozen.

Pretty Finish: Beat an egg yolk with a couple of tablespoons of milk. Just before the buns and rolls are to go into the oven, brush their tops with the egg wash.

Note: If you wish to use compressed yeast in the above recipe, soften it in lukewarm (near 85 degrees) water.

Swank Smoked Shoulder Butt



Place Smoked Shoulder Butt in Water—Cover a 2 to 4-pound smoked shoulder butt with water, then add 1 medium onion which has been sliced. Drop in 6 whole cloves, 1 bay leaf, 1 stick of cinnamon and 1/2 teaspoon of celery seed. Cover the pan tightly and let the meat simmer, not boil, for 2 1/2 hours or until done. Slices of smoked shoulder butt can be broiled or pan-fried, if desired. There is little or no fat covering on the outer surface, but fat is distributed throughout the meat. This helps make it juicy. The flavor of this meat cut is very similar to that of smoked ham.

Apply the Peach-Brown Sugar Glaze—Remove the Smoked Shoulder Butt from the water and place it on a rack in an open baking dish or roasting pan. For the glaze, combine 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon of flour and 1/2 teaspoon of dry mustard. Moisten this dry mixture with 2 tablespoons of juice from a can of spiced peaches and mix well. This glaze will certainly add an air of elegance to this meat cut. Spoon the glaze over the top of the smoked shoulder butt and bake it in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 15 minutes or until the glaze is set.



GLAZED SMOKED SHOULDER BUTT
2 to 4-pound smoked shoulder butt
Water to cover
1 medium onion, sliced
6 whole cloves
1 bay leaf
Cover shoulder butt with water. Add onion, cloves, bay leaf, cinnamon and celery seed. Cover tightly and simmer 2 1/2 hours or until done. Remove from liquid. Place meat on rack in roasting pan. Mix brown sugar, flour, mustard and peach juice. Spread mixture on shoulder butt and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 15 minutes or until the glaze is set. Serve with spiced peaches stuffed with whole cloves, if desired.

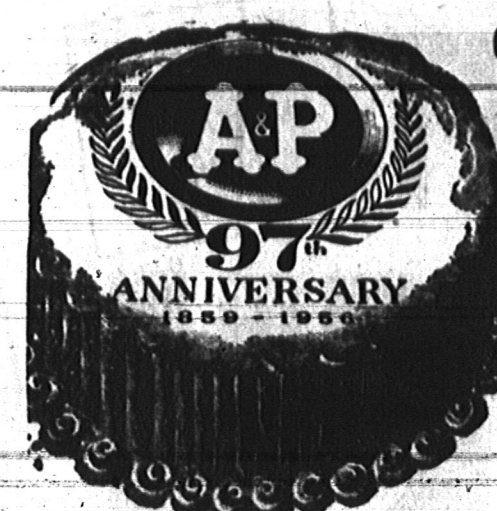

SKILLET BEEF LOAF
Ingredients: 1 egg, 1 slice white bread (regular thickness with crusts left on), 1 small onion, 1 pound ground beef chuck, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/4 cup milk, 1/2 cup flour, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 1/4 cup to 1/2 cup stock or bouillon.

Method: Beat egg in medium-sized mixing bowl just enough to combine yolk and white. Crumb bread and add. Peel onion and grate fine; add onion pulp and juice to bowl. Mix until bread disintegrates. Add beef, salt, pepper, Worcestershire and milk; mix thoroughly. Shape into oval loaf, that can be handled, on waxed paper. Sprinkle top of loaf with half of flour; turn over and sprinkle other side with remaining flour. Heat butter in iron skillet (9 inches is a good size). Carefully turn loaf into hot fat. Brown as rapidly as possible; turn heat moderately low and add 2 tablespoons stock; cook covered 20 to 30 minutes or until half done; add a little more stock if necessary. Turn carefully and cook other side the same way, adding as much of remaining stock as necessary.

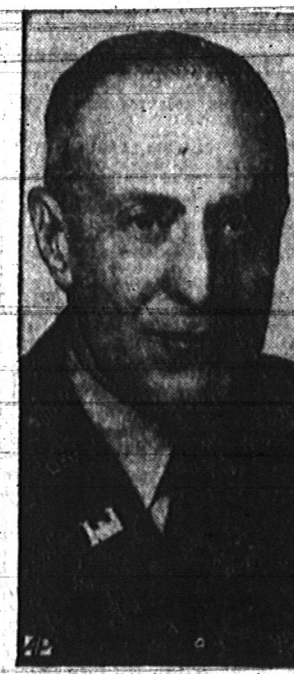

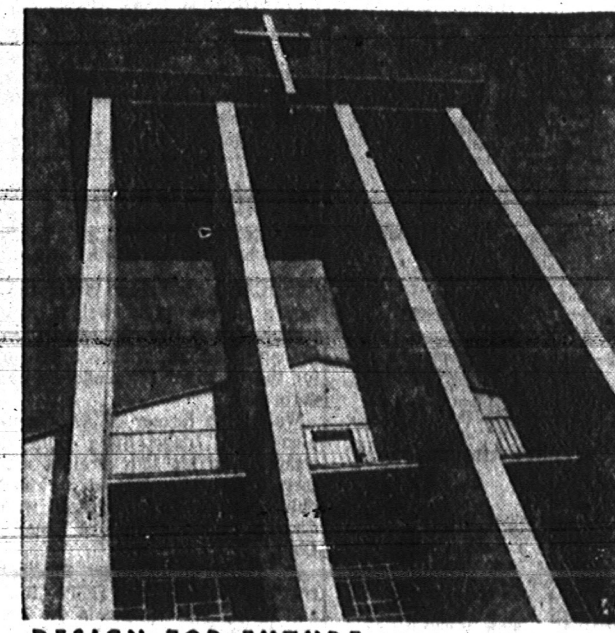

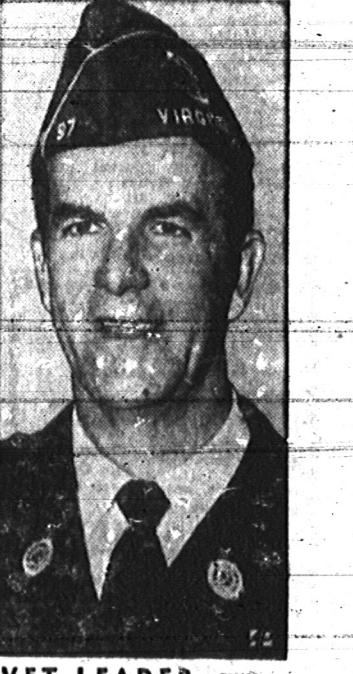

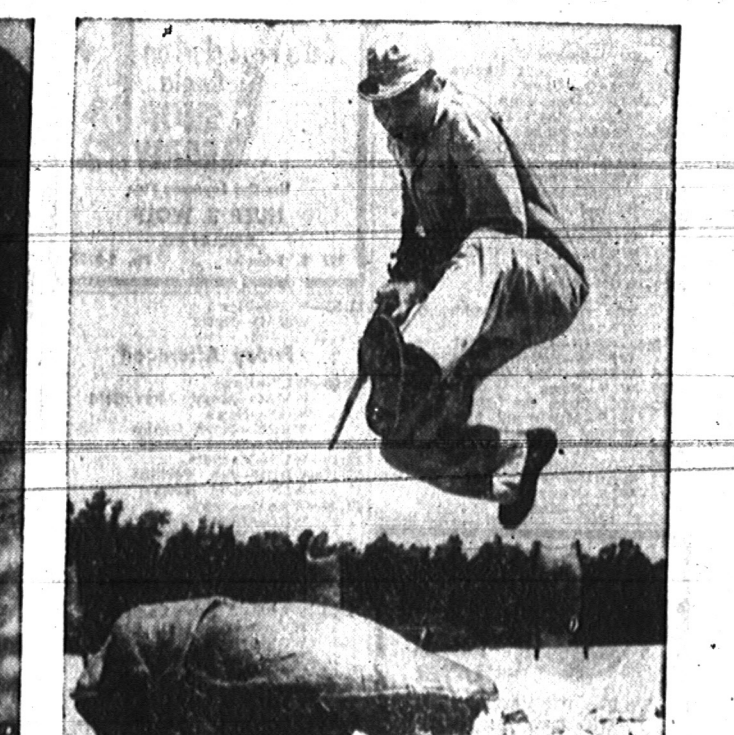

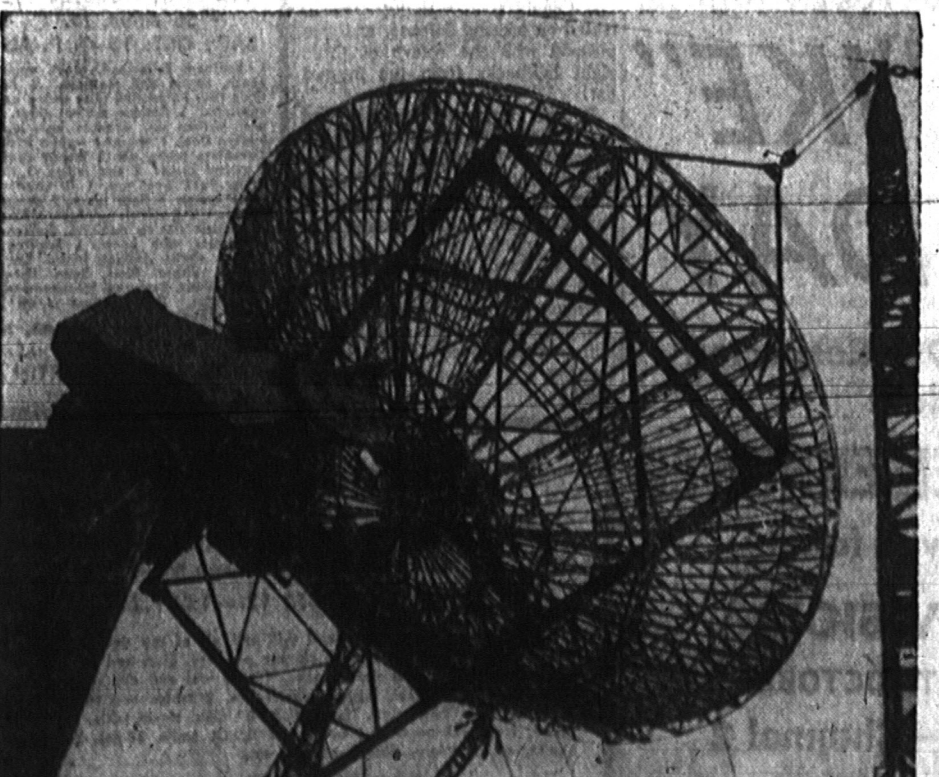

CHICAGO (UP)—A Senate committee today was told how a Chicago bank was closed by State Auditor Orville E. Hodge and was reopened by a new group headed by former Gov. Dwight H. Green.

The testimony was given to the U. S. Senate Banking and Currency Committee by S. Edward Hodge, who was a director of the First State Bank of Elmwood Park.

Hodge, who has been sent to prison for embezzling an estimated \$15 million dollars in state funds, closed the bank in April 1953, on grounds that it held too much small loan paper.

A new bank, called the Bank of Elmwood Park, was opened three weeks later.

FBI agents uncovered an alleged embezzlement Thursday night in the new bank.

The FBI said its agents had seized the head teller of the bank on a charge of embezzling \$66,000 of the institution's funds. He was charged with the theft since it was reorganized after being closed by then-state auditor Hodge in 1953.

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Riots Break Out For Third Day In Hong Kong

HONG KONG (UP)—British Security forces opened fire today on a mob gathering in downtown Kowloon and first reports said two Chinese were injured.

The clash was the most serious in a day marked by scattered rioting in the Kowloon area across the harbor from Hong Kong. The Chinese crowd dispersed when police fired and a Portuguese family took one of the wounded Chinese into its home for treatment.

It was the third day of rioting in this British crown colony.

UNITED PRESS cameraman Marvin Parkas, who accompanied police on a patrol through the riot district said one mob broke into a Communist-owned wine store today and wrecked furniture and smashed bottles in the street. The mob melted away when the police arrived.

Several fires also were started in Kowloon.

Stems measures by Hong Kong police and British troops kept most of the streets deserted, and there was no report of the widespread rioting which brought the Communist Party to a halt.

BRITISH COLONIAL authorities put the death toll in the rioting at 30 to 40 and said it might be some time before a accurate estimate of the number of deaths could be made.

Peiping radio, the voice of Communist China, was making propaganda in an effort to ease tension in the wake of a seven-hour Israeli reprisal raid which left an official death toll of 29.

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100 Citizens Query Ike Tonight On TV

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower pictured as highly pleased by support from a Negro Democrat in Congress, makes an other nationwide bid for votes on television and radio tonight.

This latest appeal will be in a novel form. White House news secretary James C. Hagerty describes it as an "impromptu, entirely unrehearsed press conference" where about 100 "cross-section Americans" will put questions to Eisenhower on various issues.

The broadcast time is 8 p.m. EDT, over NBC.

The participants to take part have been invited to Washington from all areas of the country by the National Citizens for Eisenhower Committee, an organization which has been working to get Eisenhower re-elected.

"I THINK the President probably has never met more than one or two of the 100 or so people who will be questioning him, and we won't know in advance what they are going to ask," Hagerty said.
