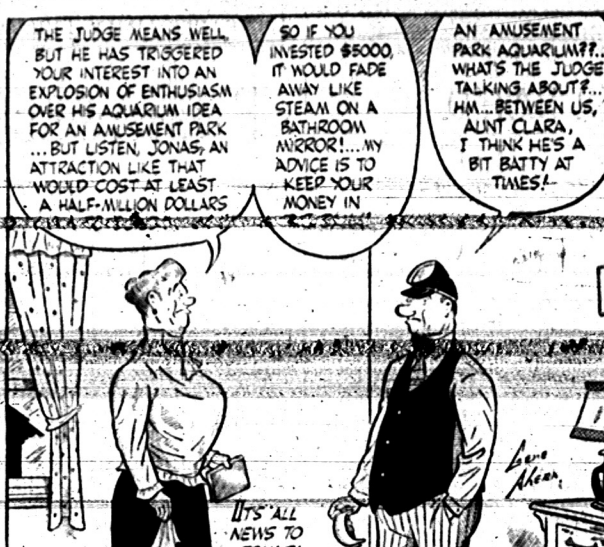

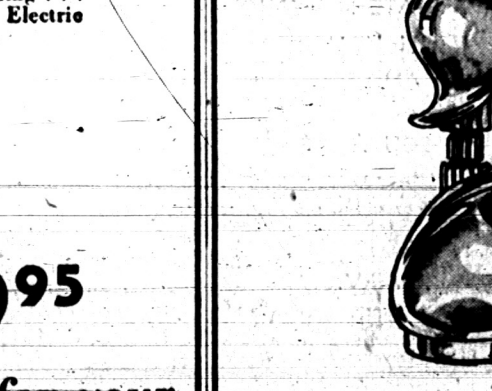

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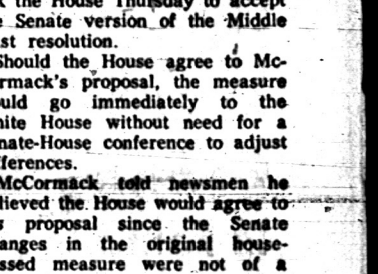

## Codfish With Green Sauce Is Famous Spanish Recipe

By GAYNOR MADDOX, NEA Food and Markets Editor

Add this Spanish recipe to your Lenten files. It combines codfish with clams and Spanish olive oil. This "Codfish With Green Sauce" recipe comes from Theodore Bardie, one of Spain's most famous chefs. The Spanish housewife uses dried cod in many recipes. But we have substituted fresh or frozen, although flaked salt cod is available all over the United States.

The fish is first pan-fried in olive oil, then transferred to a baking dish for further cooking later with the other ingredients. This enables you to do the major share of the preparation early, slipping the dish in the oven just before mealtime.

Codfish with Green Sauce (Makes 4 servings)

Four codfish steaks (fresh or frozen); 3 tablespoons flour; 1/2 cup Spanish olive oil; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon pepper; 1 tablespoon chopped pepper; 1/4 cup water; 8 clams or mussels, well scrubbed; 1 hard-cooked egg, quartered; 8 cooked or canned asparagus stalks; 1 cup cooked peas.

Dip codfish steaks in flour and brown on both sides in hot olive oil. Season with salt and pepper. Place fish steaks in casserole. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Add water and clams to oil in skillet. Cover and simmer 10 minutes.

Remove clams and strain sauce over codfish in casserole. Bake the codfish in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 20 minutes (10 minutes longer if fish was chilled).

Separate the shells of the clams and arrange the halves containing the clams around the codfish. Arrange eggs, asparagus stalks and peas around the codfish. Bake 5 to 10 minutes longer.

## Find Body Of Coles County Man In River

The body of a Coles County man was found in the Mississippi River in Bird Park late this morning.

Eight neighbors of Fred Schagmann, 58, of Humboldt, located the body about 35 feet offshore.

Schagmann disappeared Feb. 16, and his car was found in Bird Park the next day.

Two previous attempts to find his body in the river had been unsuccessful.

The neighbors said Schagmann left a note which said: "I intended to leave you a note but there is no time. I know you will hate me for this and I even despise myself."

His body was a few hundred feet from the shore where his car had been parked.

Coroner William Spillane and Deputy Sheriff Matt Egan went to the scene as the body was recovered. Spillane will schedule an inquest.

Mr. Schagmann, who came to this country from Germany about 30 years ago, leaves his wife, Minnie, and a daughter, Martha, about 18. His wife has been distraught since his disappearance, the neighbors said.

THE SCHAGMANN home is six miles southeast of Humboldt.

## Skippers Are Heading Overland

There's a new world of tomorrow waiting for the world of tomorrow will certainly be one in which people will stay put less and less. With more and more money and more and more leisure, people can be expected to use some of the money and some of the leisure for travel.

The mobile skipper is the newest addition to the wheels and tracks. The interest in boats and the trailers that haul them, evidenced at the Sportsman Show held here last weekend, emphasizes this phase of our increasing mobility.

Enthusiasm in boating has been on the increase every year. Just why this growing galaxy of land-locked sailors prefer to haul their boats along with them rather than leaving them at anchor anybody's guess. But the increase in boat trailers has been spectacular. In 1947 there were an estimated 3,800 in use. This year the figure is expected to roll past the 175,000 mark.

Actually, of course, the boat trailer bug can be credited to a combination of factors including the yen to try new bodies of water which could not be reached by transporting the boat overland. Certainly it is more economical to put the boat in the back yard rather than to have it stored for the winter.

The electronic age provides many wonders, not a few of which have unpleasant overtones. Consider the situation in a small town high school where a closed circuit television camera peers down at pupils in a study hall and makes their every move visible at all times in the principal's office.

On the face of it, this sounds like a good thing. Teachers can perform other tasks instead of doing guard duty in the study hall. The pupils pay attention to their work because they know that any

mischief may be spotted by the principal or any other anonymous watcher. More studying; better grades. What could be more desirable than that? Isn't that what schools are for? To fill pupils with knowledge. Yet the schools also have another function, to prepare young people for citizenship in a democracy. Whether this purpose is served by an electronic eye that coldly observes students during all their study hours is open to serious question.

## CARE Aids Refugees In Yugoslavia

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia—Many of the 15,000 Hungarian refugees who have streamed into Yugoslavia during recent weeks have become embittered by the failure of the West to take any steps to help them emigrate to America and other western countries.

They feel they have been unfairly discriminated against and that they would have received better treatment if they had fled to Austria. They do not understand why they should be sent to Yugoslavia rather than to Austria.

The Hungarian refugees who came to Yugoslavia did so for various reasons. Some came because they lived near the Yugoslav border. Others because they had relatives in Yugoslav towns not far over the border. Still others because it was easier to slip over the Hungarian-Yugoslav border, which is much shorter and more heavily patrolled.

THE LONGER THE WEST, and especially America, does nothing to offer the nearly 18,000 refugees here some hope and material aid, the more the situation will play into the hands of the Communists. Within the past 10 days some 130 of the refugees have decided to return to Hungary.

Months with no hopes at all of being sent west and of getting a job, I must return to Budapest and support my family.

Hundreds more of the refugees are waiting to be sent to Hungary. They are doing so to get them out of the camps and into western countries. But so far America has offered them no hopes of any kind.

Negotiations are under way, however, for arranging to ship surplus food from the USA to the refugees here. It is believed these negotiations will be successfully completed any day. But surplus food will not solve the problem, as the Yugoslavs are already fed. The refugees want to go west and get jobs.

ONE AMERICAN RELIEF agency is busy taking positive steps to improve the lot of the refugees who are scattered in several camps in Yugoslavia. I have visited the camps and have been very much impressed by the intelligence and cultural level of the refugees here. The vast majority of them are anti-Communists as in Austria, many of them being young ex-fence fighters. They should be an asset to America both economically and culturally.

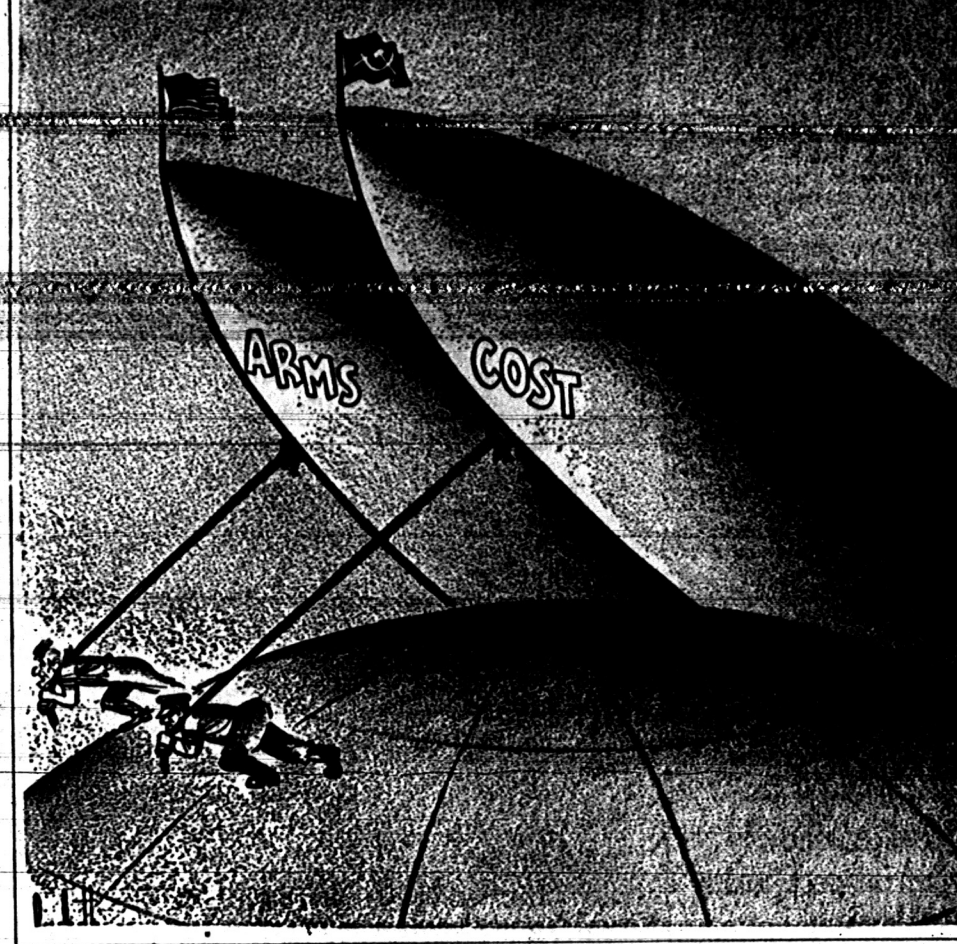

Report Indicates**

The Florence Stove Co. reported 1956 sales at \$31,781,786, down 5 percent from the previous year's \$33,454,208.

The company reported a net loss of \$60,439 compared to a net profit of \$114,437 in 1955.

The loss was charged to operations, however. The balance, \$60,400, was charged off as nonrecurring expense related to plant shutdown and relocation of production facilities.

Part of this balance, or \$435,000 of the nonrecurring expense, will be spent in 1957 to carry out two long range objectives of the company. These are the sale of the company plant at Gardner, Mass., and transfer of all gas range manufacturing to the plant in Kankakee.

Concentration of gas range manufacturing in Kankakee is expected to provide savings from longer production runs and reduce tooling expenditures.

The company reported that operations at Kankakee were satisfactory, that a substantial loss occurred at Gardner resulting from inadequate volume and that there was a stable loss at Lewisburg, Tenn., caused by a seven-week strike and a subsequent loss of range and heater sales because of delayed production.

Contract work carried on at the Gardner plant has been transferred to Kankakee and Lewisburg. With the integration of gas range manufacture at Kankakee and heater manufacture at Lewisburg, John P. Wright, president, predicted that the year 1957 will see the company on a much sounder basis.

**Will Toll Roads Have  
Signs Or Scenery?**

WASHINGTON (UP)—Congress is about to get embroiled in a battle over billboards.

Lined up on one side are large numbers of individual motorists and nature-lovers. Arranged against them are advertising companies, organized sign painters and others who feel their jobs are at stake.

The issue: Should Congress enact legislation designed to keep billboards and advertising signs from springing up along the new federal system of interstate highways now under construction?

The 4,000-mile network of highways will be built over the next 10 years—much of it on new locations—from funds raised by gasoline and other taxes levied on motorists and truckers. Construction work already has started.

CONGRESSMEN sponsoring legislation to control billboards reported today that "long-suffering motorists" and members of garden clubs from all over the country have written in to commend their anti-billboard move.

But the congressmen are getting brickbats from sign painters, carpenters, advertising executives—and some motorist and hotel owners.

So far the administration has taken no stand. It won a reprieve when Senate hearings on the legislation scheduled to start this week, were postponed by debate over the Middle East resolution.

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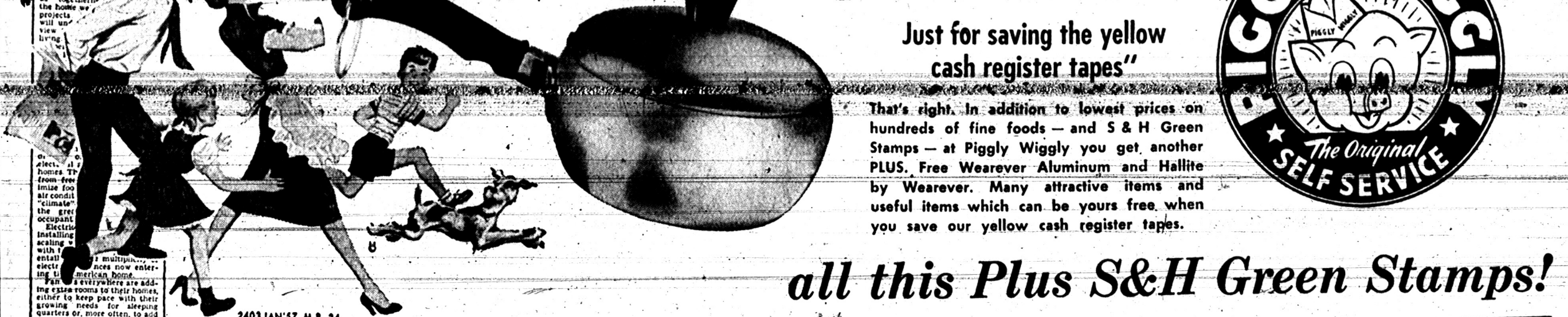

NEW ALBANY, Ind. (UP)—A little red hen is turning out Easter eggs ahead of time. They're green.

"Shortly after I put the children for adoption," she said, "I returned to St. Vincent's and they were gone. I was told they were taken to a private home in Belvidere. The Coopers and sisters at St. Vincent's said Boone County authorities told them I gave my full permission."

"All I want is my children. I can't understand how it got this tangled up."

Boone County officials, meanwhile, said they may issue a contempt of court citation against Mrs. Burt for illegally taking the twins from St. Vincent's.

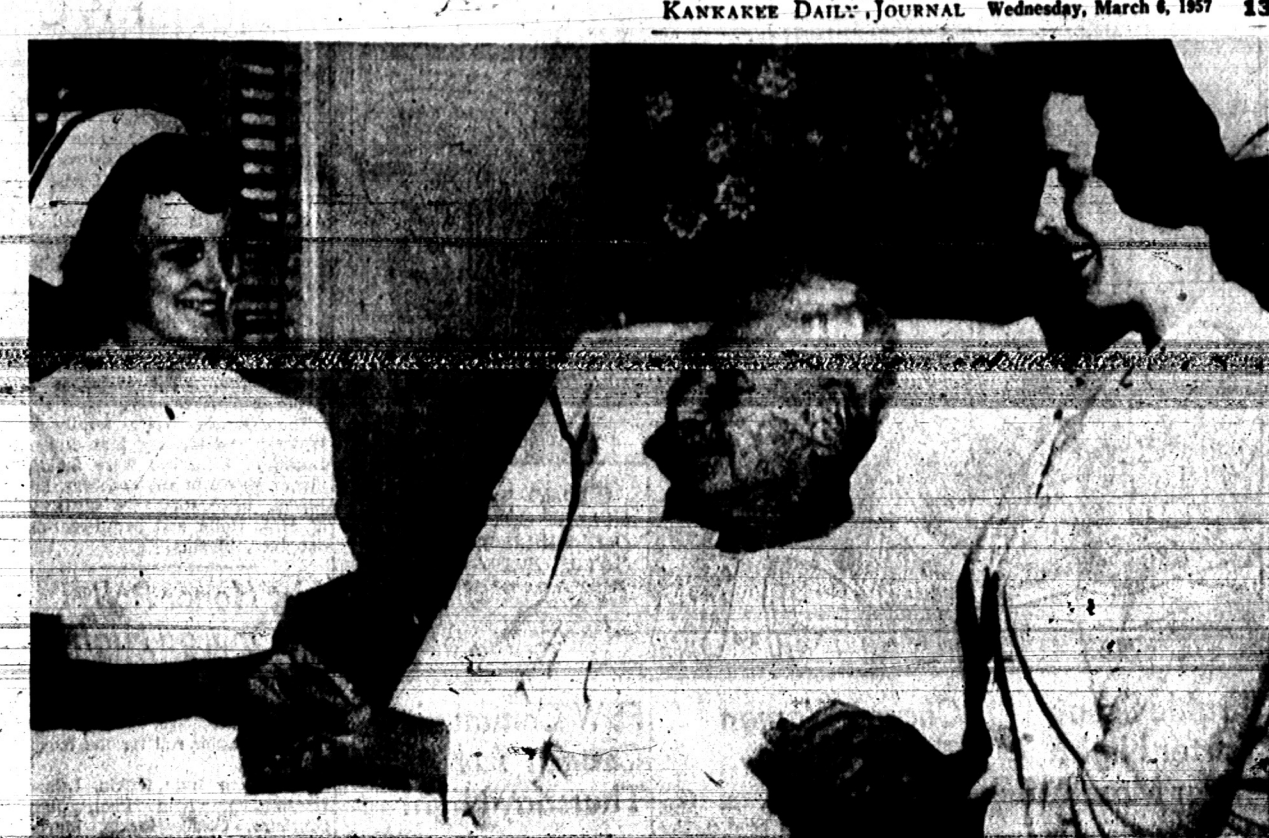

NEW ORLEANS (UP)—A bystander shot to death a Tulane University student wearing a convict's suit in a crowd of costumed Mardi Gras revelers Tuesday night at the height of the pre-Lenten festivities.

Police said August Joseph During, 27, Korean war veteran and an electrical engineering student, was shot down by a Negro armed with a .32 automatic pistol and carrying a tambourine.
