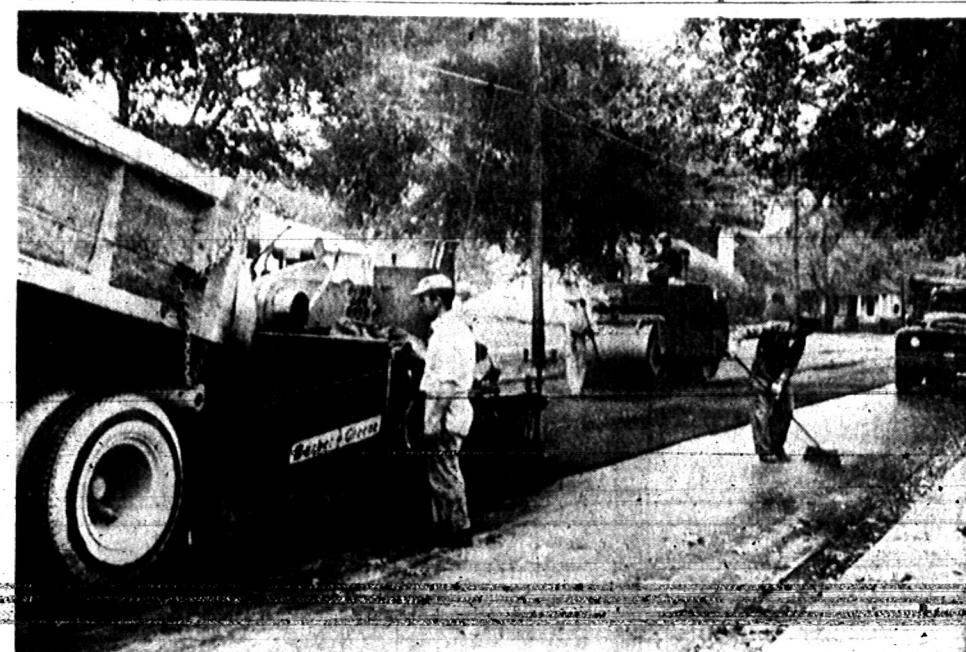

## County Board To Consider Building Code

### Would Apply To Unincorporated Sections Of Area

The Kankakee County Board of Supervisors this morning authorized a committee to draw up a building code for the board's consideration.

The code would apply to unincorporated areas of the county. The committee said it is about ready to recommend a code based on the Kane County Code, which spokesman describe as not unduly restrictive.

George Luhrs, county board chairman, said all interested groups will have a chance to be heard before any county building code is adopted.

A committee has been discussing a building code for some time. The building code committee includes Charles Entwistle, chairman, Henry W. Laffey Jr. and Victor Caridos of Kankakee Township; Walter O'Connor of Limestone Township; Anthony Buschman and Fred Rogers of Bourbonna Township; and Raymond Horan of Otto Township.

The board asked the state director of agriculture to designate Kankakee County as a modified certified brucellosis free area.

THIS MEANS that the county has reduced brucellosis among cattle to the point required for modified certification.

The entire state is scheduled for certification by the end of 1959, and Kankakee County expects to be among the first areas ready.

Brucellosis, also known as bang's disease in cows, causes undulant fever in humans.

The board authorized Sheriff James W. Laffey to appoint one more deputy sheriff.

The board granted salary adjustments to about 10 county employees. Some of the adjustments, including those for the public defender and

## Last Contract For 2 Schools Let

The final construction contract for the Franklin and Mark Twain school additions was awarded Monday night by the board of education. Porter Electric Shop, 555 E. Locust St., submitted the low bid of \$24,045 for the electrical work.

There will be \$554 deducted from this as an alternate for not extending a corridor through two existing rooms on the first floor at Franklin.

The general and plumbing-heating-inventories contracts were awarded Oct. 4, and workers have already started pouring concrete for the Twain addition.

The Franklin addition will progress a few days behind the one at Twain, but both are scheduled for completion by early summer.

Now electrical bids were opened Monday after the first set was turned down because of an error in the specifications.

Eight classrooms will be added at Franklin and nine at Twain. The heating plant at Franklin will be increased to handle the extra load, since one addition has already been built there.

Original contracts for the two additions come to \$137,720. The board will pay for the additions from the regular yearly building fund without a bond issue.

## U.S. Pulling Out Half Of Troops In Little Rock

Move Surprises Only Army; Faubus Declines Comment

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — The Army took note Monday of the calm atmosphere around recently integrated Central High School by ordering a drastic reduction in the number of soldiers protecting the school.

The surprise move announced by Secretary of Defense Louis A. Johnson brought a "strong" response from this city, wracked by nearly seven weeks of racial tension.

Gov. Orval Faubus declined comment.

Mrs. L. C. Bates, Arkansas president of the NAACP, said: "We're not surprised. I certainly think the troops that remain will be able to handle anything that might arise."

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## Hoffa Pleads Innocent To Five Counts Of Perjury

NEW YORK (AP) — James R. Hoffa, Teamsters Union leader, pleaded innocent in District Court today to five counts of perjury involving a federal grand jury investigation of wiretapping in his Detroit headquarters.

A previous \$2,500 bail bond, covering his release in a wiretap conspiracy case, was rewritten to cover the perjury indictment.

Attorneys for Hoffa and the government were to argue later before Federal Judge William B. Herlands as to trial dates in both cases.

Hoffa pleaded guilty to one count of perjury, but has been barred by a federal court order from leaving the country.

Hoffa, 44, is being held in the county jail at the county house, posed for photographers but told reporters he had nothing to say.

He was grim-faced as the perjury indictment against him was read.

"Not guilty," he responded, in a loud voice.

The 44-year-old Detroit native plans to take over the scandal-ridden Teamsters Union today or Wednesday were upset in Washington.

Federal Judge F. Dickinson Letts issued a temporary restraining order that barred Hoffa and others elected with him Oct. 4 at the union's Miami Beach convention from taking office.

The term of Dave Beck, incumbent president, runs to Dec. 1. Beck had agreed, however, to step aside to give Hoffa an earlier start in directing the 1,400,000-man union.

ON HIS ARRIVAL here Monday, Hoffa said it appeared that he would have to defer his plan to take over the Teamsters immediately.

He said Beck would stay on the job pending resolution of the legal issues.

Last Sept. 25, Hoffa was indicted on perjury charges.

They will serve on the board for two year terms and will join 10 holdover board members.

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## Hagerly Tells Newsmen They Get Nothing

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower today met with the 13 members of his science advisory committee for a 45-minute discussion of each satellite and missile.

Neither the White House nor the scientists would disclose just what the committee told reporters.

"Anything you want you will have to get from the President's office," said White House press secretary James C. Hagerly.

They would get nothing, Hagerly said earlier had told newsmen the conference was called before Russia's Sputnik began its 11,000-mile-an-hour orbit around a startled and fascinated world 11 days ago.

Reports from both sides of the country said Sputnik had been sighted early today. Ambassador G. L. Mohr of India said he saw it from the terrace of the Indian Embassy in Washington at dawn today. Rooftop observers in San Francisco said they saw Sputnik or one of its celestial traveling companions at daylight there.

They said it was plainly visible to the naked eye.

Meanwhile, U.S. scientists have reported puzzlement over an "unknown force" that apparently is acting on the moonlet, causing variations in its orbit.

DR. J. ALLEN HYNEK, associate director of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, said in Cambridge, Mass., that findings concerning the force confirmed reports from the Naval Research Laboratory in Washington.

Hynek said the information was "very puzzling," and added the findings might account for variations in Sputnik's timetable. He said the satellite's orbital plane apparently is turning faster, as a result of the force, thus preventing electronic computers from accurately determining the orbit on the basis of normal gravity.

But, he went on, gravity still accounts for 99 per cent of the total force acting on Sputnik.

IT WAS REPORTED Monday that the sphere had resumed its "beep-beep" radio-transmissions after emitting a continuous buzz for several days.

And a California physicist, C. R. Moe, said Monday at Sunnyvale that he had obtained the first definite evidence of what he called coded radio signals from the satellite.

Moe said: "We heard 10 pulses of coding or what appeared to be definite evidence of 'keying' of a transmitter." He said he had been monitoring the satellite's radio signals since Oct. 8.

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## Dr. Wolff Takes KSH Direction Thursday

Dr. Armin H. Wolff, who will take over Thursday as superintendent of Kankakee State Hospital, was here Monday to get acquainted with the hospital and the staff.

Dr. Wolff will be the hospital's 15th superintendent, succeeding Dr. Cleve Odom who is retiring to private life and ending his duties at the hospital Wednesday.

Dr. Wolff comes to Kankakee from East Moline State Hospital, where he is superintendent. He and his wife, Gladys, expect to be moved into the residence at the hospital Thursday morning.

They have one son, Floyd, who attends college.

Dr. Wolff entered state service in 1936, and was appointed acting superintendent at East Moline in 1949, later being confirmed as full superintendent.

After resigning and moving to Arizona in 1951, he was reappointed superintendent at the 2,100 patient, East Moline institution in July, 1954.

## Police Seek Chicago Area Slasher Of 2

CHICAGO (UPI)—Authorities today searched suburban Elmwood Park grade schools for a blond, blue-eyed boy who slashed and seriously wounded two girls in apparently unprovoked attacks.

Police said the boy, described as about 13 or 14 years old, apparently stabbed the girls with ice picks in two separate attacks Monday night and then fled on a bicycle.

One of the girls, Mary Ann Niemiec, 16, was reported in critical condition at West Suburban hospital in Oak Park with deep wounds in the back and abdomen.

The other victim, Sharon Donner, 14, was in fair condition at the same hospital with six wounds in her chest, back and abdomen.

MISS NIEMIEC, who works at school at St. Celestine Church Rectory, said she was returning home from work when the bike rider appeared. She said he drew a weapon and ordered her to accompany him into a nearby alley.

When she resisted, the boy stabbed her twice and fled.

Miss Niemiec ran to the rectory for aid and was taken to a physician by a priest.

About 30 minutes later, Miss Donner said she was also attacked by a youth of similar description who offered her a ride home on his bike.

Since she was nearly home, Miss Donner replied:

"No, I live right here."

The boy jumped from his bike and struck her repeatedly and then rode away.

## Trailer Town In Wilds Of Idaho Even Boasts Video

BROWNLEE, Idaho (NEA) — port infractions of the speed law. Construction of the Brownlee and Oxbow hydroelectric projects on the Snake River has brought an influx of civilization into the wild and remote upper end of the deepest gorge on the North American continent—Hells Canyon.

The projects have brought more than 1,400 construction workers into this primitive country and most of them live with their families at the scene of their jobs.

Some of the workers live in permanent rooms. Others in the permanent villages which will house the operating forces for Brownlee and Oxbow dams. But most of them make their homes in trailers, established in communities set up along the river, sufficiently removed to avoid the dust and din of the day and night construction work being pushed to meet Idaho Power Company's 1958 power-on-the-line deadline.

Today there are two trailer communities in the area. One is at Brownlee, the other at Oxbow. The project is the Brownlee-Oxbow trailer town.

SPACE IS AT A premium in the canyon and Morrison-Knudsen Co., which is building the dams for Idaho Power, had to cut into the slopes at the base of the mountains to provide a site for the Brownlee-Oxbow trailer community.

The trailer town is arranged on a terraced tract, where 248 of the mobile homes are installed in an area overlooking the river. This community alone boasts a population of better than a thousand men, women and children.

The trailers are arranged along terraced streets, and each is installed on a plot of ground with a 50-foot front.

Brownlee-Oxbow trailer town has its own post office, presided over by Mrs. Elmo Farrar. Ernie Horn trucks the mail in and out of the canyon.

A Brownlee-Oxbow family can do most of its shopping right at home because the community has a supermarket.

A two-man barber shop adjacent to the supermarket caters to a steady stream of customers and down the block is a service station and garage.

THE TRAILER HOME owners rent their space in trailer town for \$6 a week. The rental includes water, sewerage disposal facilities, unlimited use of electric power and television programs. The TV is provided through translator stations set up on the mountain tops to pick up broadcasts from Boise.

Most of the trailer homes are equipped with air conditioning units. Although they know their residence will be temporary, the trailer families have planted grass, flower and vegetable gardens and trees and fenced in their yards.

There is a school and playground in the community. Law and order are maintained through a five-member governing committee, whose chairman, John Wardle, is mayor. However, there have been few law enforcement problems.

Most of the enforcement emphasis is on a five-mile-per-hour speed limit on automobiles in the town's streets.

There are no police officers as such, but the town committee has in attendance, started the evening's designated various residents to festivities.
