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Child Misbehaving? How To Cope With It

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series in which Dr. Fritz Redi, a noted mental health specialist, offers down-to-earth advice to parents on coping with youthful misbehavior.)

WASHINGTON (UP)—There are seven reasons why children misbehave.

If you understand these reasons, you can head off many disciplinary problems before they arise. And you can cope intelligently with those you cannot prevent.

The advice comes from Dr. Fritz Redi, chief of the behavioral research at the National Institute of Mental Health. Redi, one of the world's foremost psychologists, is particularly noted for his research on the behavior problems of normal and disturbed children.

WIDE DISCIPLINE, Redi said in an interview, begins with the realization that there is "no nice pat theory, no simple rule of thumb" that can apply to every child.

Some parents seem to regard all misbehavior as a rebellion or a sign of "growing out of control." Others go to opposite extreme. They treat all misbehavior as a rebellion.

It requires a little thought, a little common sense, and a willingness to look a few inches below the surface of a child's annoying conduct to find out what prompted it. Then you will know how to handle it.

Here are the seven basic reasons for misbehavior listed by Redi:

1. "Almost hypnotic spell" over children. This is true of older children as well as the very young toddler who grabs for the wafers left on a low table. To the normal child of 6 or 8 or even 10, "a pair of scissors" is a "waste by-product of normal development."

The parent must set limits and enforce them, but he should also remember that "growing up is a process of finding things out the hard way."

2. Any child will misbehave if he is frustrated too long in a normal need. Moving around, making a little noise and letting off steam is a normal need. That's why a child who is cooped up in a car for a long trip, or who has a long wait for a ride, or who is denied a company dinner, often goes off the gold standard with a vengeance.

3. MISBEHAVIOR MAY be a symptom of real emotional illness—neurotic fears, anxieties and conflicts that are far below the level of the child's own consciousness. Unlike the other six kinds of "normal" misbehavior, this is potentially serious. It may require professional help.

4. It is important to enforce the discipline. Punishing a child for misbehavior is not the same as punishing a child for a "bad" act. When a child is under heavy strain, or is confronted with demands that he cannot meet, he may resort to misbehavior as a protest.

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7. Sometimes misbehavior is a symptom of real emotional illness—neurotic fears, anxieties and conflicts that are far below the level of the child's own consciousness.

When they are playing in groups, a kind of "group intoxication" may set in that will cause all of them to do things which none of them would do on his own.

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Science Program, Ike's Topic

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower outlined to the nation tonight his program for training the American youth in the sciences in the space era struggle against Russia.

Some key scientific advisers to the President reportedly have suggested to him that the federal government grant scholarships to promising students as an incentive. But the White House declined to discuss such a proposal.

For tonight's coast-to-coast television-radio address, the second in a "chase up" series, the President travels by plane to Oklahoma City.

The speech will be carried live at 8:30 p.m. CST, by NBC-TV and all four major radio networks. ABC and CBS television will carry the address from film at 10:15 p.m.

Eisenhower will speak at Municipal Auditorium in connection with Oklahoma's "Arrows to Aoms" 50th anniversary of statehood. He plans to start back to Washington by plane immediately after the speech.

THE PRESIDENT'S drive to overtake and surpass Russia in development of missiles and other weapons of the future started formally last Thursday night. In a nationwide TV address, then named James K. Killian, president of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, at a special assistant to coordinate the drive.

He also set forth several other steps in a program to speed the development of the Soviet Union.

At the same time he mentioned briefly certain long-range requirements which he said he would discuss in more detail tonight.

In his talk last week he said: "According to my scientific friends, one of our greatest, and the most glaring, deficiencies is the lack of enough priority to scientific education and to the place of science in our national life."

UNITED NATIONS (UP)—The Republic of Korea called today for the withdrawal of Communist troops from North Korea and a U.N. supervised election there as the simplest way of uniting the divided country.

The proposals were set forth by Dr. You Chan Yang, the ROK ambassador to Washington, in a speech prepared for delivery this morning to the U.N. Political Committee.

"If the factor of foreign aggression be removed from the north," he said, "the people of the north are allowed to express their will freely, the reunification will come about as easily as the water in a can." He said the ROK government is willing to accept a "united front" with the north, but only on the basis of a "united front" with the north.

Doctors say Billy Merriman, 38, needs the kidney transplant, scheduled in December, in order to live. His condition was discovered upon his discharge from the Navy five years ago.

WEN-THU Air Force learned Lt. Sam Merriman, Billy's twin, was planning to give the kidney to a man named "John" who was in the Air Force. Now it means washing out. Family members have sent appeals to President Eisenhower and members of the Oklahoma congressional delegation for a review of the case.

Garcia May Have Foe As Vice President

He's Far Ahead In Filipino Election, But Laurel Is Losing

MANILA (UP)—Carlos P. Garcia, political heir of the late President Ramon Magsaysay, is virtually certain to be elected vice president today. But the voters were giving him an opposition leader as vice president.

Garcia and the apparent vice president, Diosdado Macapagal, are both considered good friends of the United States.

Without there is a complete reversal in the trend, this 11-year-old Filipino republic will have a vice president with politics different from the chief executive's for the first time.

With 26 per cent of the estimated 45 million votes counted, Garcia, the Nationalista party standard bearer, held a 150,000-vote lead over sugar magnate Jose Yulo, a Liberal.

Macapagal, Liberal, who spent his boyhood in a grass hut, was leading his Nationalista opponent, House Speaker Jose B. Laurel Jr., by a thumping 262,000-vote margin.

THE LATEST presidential returns showed Garcia, 50, 41; Yulo, 18; Manuel P. Manahan, Progressive, 12; Sen. Claro M. Recto, Nationalist-Union, 11,300; Antonio Quirino, Independent, 11,200; and Pedro Arambura, Nationalist, 10,000.

Macapagal likely will be put on the ticket for four-year term as vice president.

The post is little more than a glorified job, but it is a key figure in the committee's investigation of racketeering in the nation's biggest city.

Hearing Nov. 22 On Petition To Revoke Probation

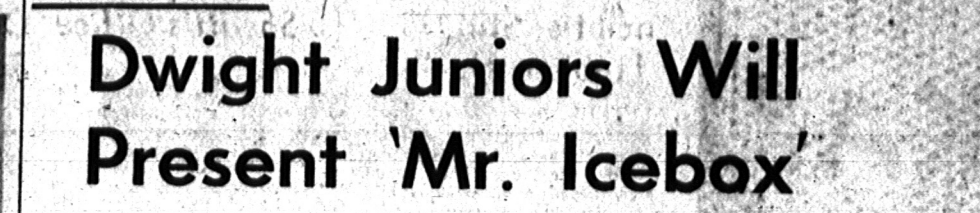

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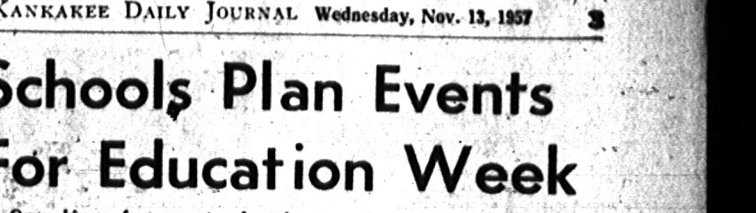
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Greeting Card History To Art League

But We're Saving, Too

IOUs Worth \$43 Billion

NEW YORK (UP)—Americans are living high on the hog. And high on the cuff, too. We owe \$43 billion more than last year. But even as we sign IOUs, we save away cash. Our savings this year add up to well over \$60 billion dollars.

That's because credit outstanding accounts for about 33 billion dollars of the total personal debt. Of this, commercial banks have 12 billion 300 million dollars; sales finance companies (automobiles, appliances) have "financed" 7 billion 300 million dollars; small loan companies, or consumer finance companies, have around 9.2 billion dollars this year, according to the National Consumer Finance Association.

The 10,745 small loan offices around the nation, operated by 1,550 firms, claim one out of every six families for a customer and are growing at a rate of 10 per cent a year in volume next year.

Many people borrow to buy things even though they have the cash. They feel they'll never save the money again once they touch their savings. So they take out a loan. Installment credit also is rising because we're urged to use credit for just about everything. Under the new law, a man can't deduct paid funerals. They call it, "pay now, go later."

The small loan companies are growing right along with the use of credit. They now employ about 25,000 people and have an annual payroll of about 230 million dollars.

Why do we borrow? About one-third of the 16 million loans made by small loan companies this year are for debt consolidation, where the customer borrows to pay off a flock of bills.

Thinks Red Dog Came Back Alive

SPOKANE, Wash. (UP)—The dog aboard Sputnik II probably has been brought back to the earth alive but the Russians aren't talking about it because of military implications, the president of the International Astronautical Federation said Tuesday night.

Andrew G. Haley of Washington, D. C., said he based his belief partly in the difference in the radio code pattern of the two Russian satellites.

Sputnik I gave out signals until its battery was down, he said. The beeping from the larger Sputnik II ended sooner and suddenly, as if connections were broken or instruments destroyed by the ejection of the dog. Haley, who spoke at Gonzaga University on a lecture tour, did not spell out the military implications.

Continue Search For Missing Craft With 44 Aboard

HONOLULU (UP) — A fleet of 16 ships, spearheaded by the mighty carrier Philippine Sea, steamed "their" vacuum cleaner sweep of the Pacific today in search of a missing Pan American Stratocruiser.

The plane vanished Friday with 44 persons aboard while flying from San Francisco to Honolulu. No trace of it has been seen.

The 16 ships were stationed 15 miles apart in a 200-mile line. They sailed slowly down the last known route of the missing luxury liner. At the same time, the U.S. Coast Guard and Pan American planes scanned every inch of the ocean for a life raft or for wreckage.

The Coast Guard and Pan American officials said the search will continue indefinitely. It has already covered an area larger than the state of California and Washington combined.

Algerian Powers Voted By French

PARIS (UP)—By a vote of 354-216 the National Assembly agreed Tuesday night to extend special government powers to combat the 3-year-old Algerian rebellion. The grants have to be renewed each time a new government takes office.

The special powers permit the government to rule by decree in Algeria, bypassing normal channels, and to confine suspects in camps without time charges.

Talks Progressing

CAIRO (UP) — Anglo-Egyptian financial negotiations in Rome are progressing, "although differences of viewpoints still exist," the Egyptian Finance Ministry said today.

A ministry spokesman said Hassan Zaki, chief of the Egyptian delegation, received fresh instructions from the government to continue negotiations with financial problems resulting from the Suez crisis last year.

TEL AVIV (UP) — Gen. Alfred Gruenther, president of the American Red Cross, left Israel today for New York.

Charges Hussein Appeals For Help From U.S., Iraq

CAIRO (UP)—Egypt's government-controlled press continued its attacks on Jordan's King Hussein today, claiming that he has appealed to the United States and Iraq to protect him against dislodgment among his people.

A newspaper said Hussein asked President Eisenhower to send the U. S. 8th Fleet to the eastern Mediterranean to support him. The newspaper said Hussein sent a message by courier to tell the President that Jordan is threatened by an Egyptian-Syrian conspiracy.

A Washington correspondent reported that Hussein asked his cousin, King Faisal of Iraq, for help.

Red Cross Leader Leaves For U.S.

TEL AVIV (UP) — Gen. Alfred Gruenther, president of the American Red Cross, left Israel today for New York.

Gruenther said his visit was apolitical, but he talked with Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion for 90 minutes.

Objecting Marine Faces New Charge

OCEANSIDE, Calif. (UP)—An 18-year-old Marine, Pvt. Peter H. Green, of Evanston, Ill., was arrested Tuesday on a charge of illegal possession of an alcoholic beverage.

Earlier this year Green was the central figure in a conscientious objector dispute with the Marine Corps.

Green, the son of Harold E. Green, executive editor of a magazine, was given 48 hours to enter a plea on the charges. He returned to Camp Pendleton where Marine authorities said he had been absent without leave since Saturday.

POLICE reported 12 cans of beer were found at a motel room where Green was arrested. They said Green told them that a friend, whom he declined to name, had bought the beer for him. State law bars the sale of alcoholic beverages to minors.

Since March Green has tried to be classified as a conscientious objector for religious reasons. However, his appeals, both to the Secretary of the Navy and in federal court, have been rejected.

Methodist Church officials in Evanston and southern California have supported his efforts.

Mark had applied for a \$600 loan. Green said he had no income. The loan was made to the Evanston community center, which had no income.

The city's four commissioners accepted the appointment.

The commissioners earlier had ordered Egan to appoint a new police chief by today because the Rev. Mr. Andrews is hospitalized with a heart ailment.

Curran served as police chief for a period during Egan's first term as mayor, but was fired by Egan when the two had a falling out. Curran argued he couldn't be fired and won his point in court. However, he then resigned and became a desk sergeant on the force.

Hold Man For Investigation On Fraudulent Checks

William Charles Holligan, 27, campaigner and formerly an employee at a local hotel, is being held in Kankakee County Jail for investigation on a charge of passing fraudulent checks.

He allegedly admitted cashing a \$5.40 fraudulent check at a local service station several days ago and on further questioning admitted writing other bad checks, police said.

Frank Curran, Kankakee County state's attorney, has ordered Holligan held for further investigation in connection with other reports of fraudulent checks.

Generally, the witnesses agreed that small businesses need: 1. INSTALLMENT payment of estate taxes to avoid liquidating a business; 2. A more rapid amortization of outlays for new equipment and more realistic valuation of depreciable assets on the basis of the inflated 1957 dollar.

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Water Supply Cut Off

Negro Family Charges Maywood Officials Try To Oust Them

CHICAGO (U) — A Negro machine operator and his wife have charged suburban Maywood officials cut off their home's water supply in an effort to force them out of the village.

The charge was made by Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Carmichael in a Superior Court suit Tuesday asking that the village be ordered to provide water for their new brick home.

Congressman Plans To Help Polar Crews

MCMURDO SOUND, Antarctica (U) — The first U.S. congressman to set foot in the Antarctic said today he would investigate reports that many Navy men here are being forced into debt by a Navy ruling.

Rep. John P. Saylor (R-Pa.), a member of the House Interior and Insular Affairs and Veterans Affairs committees, landed at the McMurdo Sound base from New Zealand.

Saylor, a Navy veteran, said a ruling by the Navy comptroller's office had created a pay situation that appeared to be a "gross need of correction."

Saylor heard reports that some Navy men might have to appeal to the Navy Relief Society to get them out of financial holes after serving voluntarily for a year or more in the Antarctic.

WIDESPREAD bitterness among Navy personnel here stems from two contradictory Navy rulings. In addition to regular pay, their travel orders entitle them to per diem payments ranging from \$1.55 to \$5 or more. They were allowed to draw in advance the money, which totaled from several hundred to more than \$1,500 a man.

Subsequently the comptroller ruled that Navy men stationed in the Antarctic are not entitled to per diem payments. Some who have gone home have been required to repay advances out of their regular pay.

Credit Herbert W. Whitney of Arlington, Mass., a Seabee officer who accompanied Saylor, said he will correct the situation and to give extra pay for remote and isolated duty are now being prepared by the Defense Department.

Says Lights Illegal In Pennsylvania

HARRISBURG, Pa. (U) — Bureau of Highway Safety Director O. D. Shipley says those new cars with four backup lights on the rear are illegal. The state motor vehicle code states that cars may not have more than two such lights, one on each side.

Shipley said the bureau will consider the law satisfied if the wiring and light bulbs are removed from the extra lights, leaving the covers for ornamental purposes.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Internal Revenue Service said today a new expense account question on income tax forms will be warning to employers—fat cats and thin.

It amounts to this: The government wants without full detailed information on all expense accounts.

New Segments Of Industry Fall In Business Dip

By SAM DAWSON
NEW YORK (AP)—Slowly but surely the slight dip in industrial activity which began last spring is widening today—even as the stock market falters.

It shows in figures for the steel and oil industries, in textile output cutbacks and weak prices, in factory employment, and even in the slowing of new car sales.

Consumers are doing their best to hold on to the goods and services. But many manufacturers of durable goods rather than defense items are finding they must produce fewer units if they are to keep their stocks from piling up.

Higher prices and more use of services color the consumer's spending totals.

THE ECONOMY is still riding high and no great drop is feared. But every month new segments of the economy enter into the current business picture.

Steel production this week is lower than at any time since early August 1956, when it was affected by the summer strike.

Even products long in short supply, like structural steel, can be had quickly from the mills.

And steel makers are saying they look for little improvement in the rest of this year or early in the next, unless the auto customers order better.

The oil industry is being warned that a rough year may be ahead. Demand still tops last year's, but the margin expected, and production is running ahead of consumption.

Gasoline prices have been made recently in scattered sections of the nation.

At the American Petroleum Institute meeting in Chicago oilmen are being warned of the price weakness which could result from crude oil itself unless production is tightly curbed.

THEY ALSO ARE being told that the Russians have world trade weapons as well as satellites. APT President Frank Porter says that the Iron Curtain countries have boosted output of oil 40 per cent in two years and that vast untapped resources may lie within their borders.

Troubles of the overworked textile industry have brought some new price weakness in some lines. To hold down rising costs several of the bigger textile firms are planning an eight per cent price cut, distributed between the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

Food consumption continues to increase. But store customers are more selective under the new prices.

One of the most discussed shortages of recent years is that of skilled technicians and such white collar workers as secretaries.

The supply is fairly tight. But here and there in the nation workers are reporting it isn't as easy now as formerly to switch jobs.

Total employment remains near a peak. In October it rose again, but this time chiefly because of an unexpected demand for farm workers. The ranks of factory workers grew slimmer.

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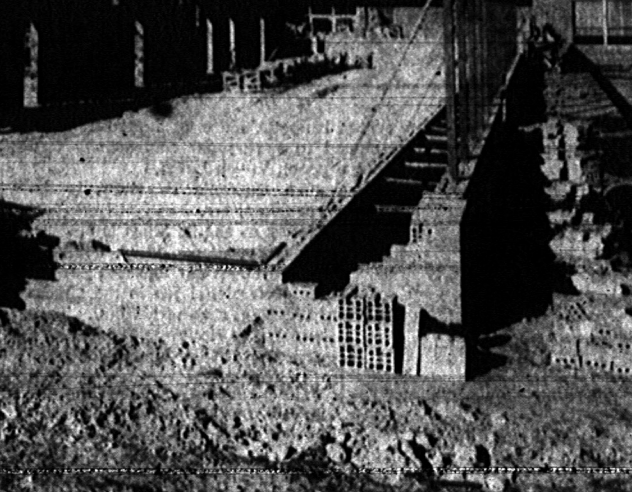

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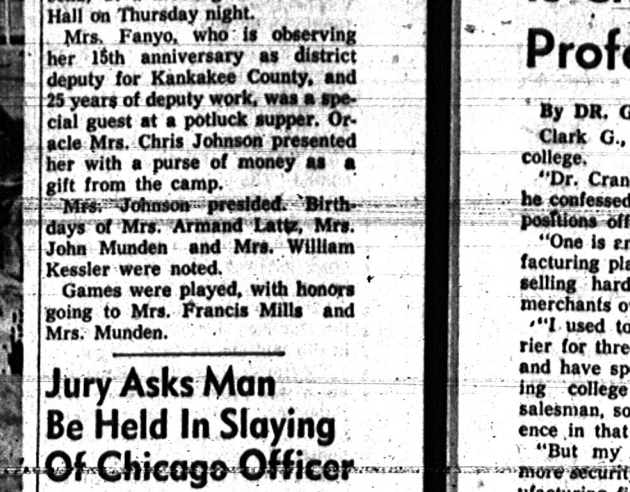

Stir thoroughly, cover and cook in a heated 375 F. oven for 20 minutes or until the rice is done. Garnish with a small-sized can of Pepp-Pois (2 ounce small peas) and 2 pimientos chopped.

If your family enjoys a fluffy refrigerator type pie, we have no hesitation in recommending this recipe to you. It produces a dessert with real pumpkin flavor that cuts well and may be made quickly and easily.

Use a rich thick flaky pastry as a base for the pie and garnish the filling with whipped cream and toasted coconut. Or use a graham cracker crust and plain whipped cream minus the coconut for the garnish.

THE HEAVENLY PUMPKIN PIE

Ingredients: 1 package (30 ounces) vanilla pudding and pie filling; ¾ cup dark brown sugar (firmly packed); ½ teaspoon nutmeg; ¼ teaspoon cinnamon; ¼ cup margarine; 1½ cups canned pumpkin; 1 baked 9-inch pie shell (made from graham or plain crackers); 1 cup heavy cream, confectioners' sugar, vanilla, toasted coconut (if desired).

Method: Empty vanilla pudding and pie filling into a 1½ quart saucepan. Add the brown sugar, salt, ginger, nutmeg and cinnamon. Stir thoroughly. Gradually add the milk, stirring until smooth after each addition. Cook and stir over moderate heat until mixture comes to a full boil; remove from heat. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring twice. Add pumpkin; stir until blended. Turn into prepared pie shell. Chill until firm. At serving time, whip cream and sweeten to taste with confectioners' sugar; flavor with vanilla. Garnish pie with whipped cream, or serve separately as a topping. If pastry shell is used, whipped cream may be sprinkled with toasted coconut.

Look For Patterns, Not Isolated Instances

Normal Vs. Neurotic Misbehavior

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series in which Dr. Fritz Redl, a leading psychologist, discusses the problem of child misbehavior. Today he tells how a parent can distinguish between "normal" and "neurotic" misbehavior.)

WASHINGTON (UP)—All children misbehave. Most misbehavior is entirely normal. Once in a great while, misbehavior is the surface symptom of emotional illness which requires professional treatment. Unfortunately for parents, it is not always easy to distinguish between normal misbehavior and neurotic misbehavior. But there are significant differences which can be spotted.

For this, you have the word of Dr. Fritz Redl, who has many years of experience in the study of "disturbed" children. Redl is chief of the laboratory for child research at the National Institute of Mental Health.

"THE FIRST THING I would impress upon parents," he said in an interview, "is that you cannot judge the seriousness of a child's misbehavior by the degree to which it happens to annoy you."

"Some of the most 'normal' things that children do are a great nuisance to adults. On the other hand, conduct that is very odd, such as a child who is sitting quietly in a cot when you expect to find some circumstances to be indicative of severe neurotic problems."

Redl said it is impossible to draw up two lists of behavior traits and normal children who have them. It is not a matter of degree, but of kind. A child who is in a situation which causes him to panic. But you might begin to

Missiles To Add \$1 Billion To Budget

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower discussed with his security advisers today a defense budget which is expected to go to about one billion dollars next year.

retary James C. Hagerty described as "another discussion" of defense spending.

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TUNISIA TO GET BRITISH, U. S. ARMS; DEFY FRENCH

WASHINGTON (UP)—In the face of French objections, the United States announced today it is sending 500 M1 rifles and 50,000 rounds of ammunition to Tunisia and that Britain is delivering other arms.

This was reported today in the wake of dispatches from Paris reporting that the new government of French Premier Felix Gaillard had objected strenuously. Tunisia borders Algeria where French forces are locked in civil war with Arab rebels.

French Ambassador Herve Alphand and his top advisers spent about 30 minutes at the State Department. They talked with Asst. Secretary C. Burke Elbrick, presumably going over the situation.

Meanwhile, it was reported that a crisis had arisen suddenly Wednesday night because of the decision by the French government to ship arms to Tunisia.

Secretary of State Dulles was reported to be convinced that Tunisians would eventually be able to take over the government of Tunisia.
