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Epping Guilty To Seek New Trial

SPRINGFIELD — Dapper Edward Epping, once the side of Orylle, now faces a possible 24 years in prison for his part in the \$1.5 million dollar looting of the state treasury.

The 30-year-old Epping, who already is serving one prison term for conspiracy to defraud the state, was convicted Sunday of forgery, confidence game and embezzlement.

A Sangamon County Circuit Court jury of nine women and three men deliberated 5½ hours Saturday and Sunday before adjudge him guilty.

JUDGE DEWITT S. Crow deferred sentencing pending a defense motion for a new trial.

Under the conviction, Epping could be sentenced to 24 years in addition to the four to five years he is serving for conspiracy.

Epping's old boss, former State Auditor Hodge, 53, is serving a 12 to 15 year prison term after pleading guilty in the summer of 1956 to charges he looted state funds.

In Stateville penitentiary, Epping was sentenced to 12 to 15 years in prison for stealing \$11,416 from the state on one of the four forged warrants. He denied ever seeing the warrant.

Hodge was called from prison to testify as the chief witness against Epping. After the trial, State's Attorney J. Waldo Ackerman Jr. said Hodge's testimony was truthful and his actions cooperative. This merited him "favorable consideration" for parole.

For parole consideration, Hodge already has been turned down once by the parole board of the Stateville penitentiary.

Gas Leak Forces 75 Families Out Of Collinsville Housing Project

COLLINSVILLE — The inhabitants of a Collinsville apartment housing project were evacuating their homes today after a liquid petroleum gas escape scare over the weekend caused the evacuation of 75 families.

The residents began trickling back into the project late Sunday after Asst. State Fire Marshal Roy Richardson gave an all-clear to a situation which before had been termed "highly explosive and dangerous."

The first indications of a gas leak were Thursday when two Collinsville city workmen accidentally ignited some of the liquid gas which had escaped into a sewer. The flaming gas traveled to an underground pocket of gasoline, exploding it and frightening residents.

No one was injured. The gas was contained in seven 600-gallon tanks about 75 feet from the nearest apartment building. The system was installed two years ago when a coal heating unit was found to be inadequate.

Plan Chicago Rites For Armstrong
SPRINGFIELD — Col. Paul G. Armstrong, 67, director of the state Selective Service System, died Saturday from a heart ailment.

Armstrong was appointed to the post 1940 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. He was a former commander of the Illinois American Legion.

\$113,500 For County Roads Appropriated

Covers Equipment, Labor And Material For 124 Miles

The Kankakee County Board of Supervisors appropriated \$113,500 this morning for county highway maintenance during 1958.

The money covers labor, equipment and materials for 124 miles of blacktop highways and 30 miles of crushed stone roads, Highway Supt. Howard Schwark reported.

It is in addition to sums appropriated for new construction work. The board certified Schwark's name to the State Division of Highways for reappointment to a six-year term as county highway superintendent. The division must certify his qualifications back to the county before he can be formally reappointed.

DR. R. O. MUDD, county veterinarian, reported that 2,746 cattle in the county were tested for brucellosis during December. The county is vinding up its work to become one of the first in the state certified under its brucellosis eradication program. Brucellosis causes undulant fever in humans.

The board received a report from the January grand jury found the county jail in clean and satisfactory condition.

It approved a plan of the third addition to Walston Acres subdivision near Aroma Park.

Jimenez Squeezes Through Crisis In Revamping Cabinet

CARACAS, Venezuela — President Marcos Perez Jimenez appeared today to have skinned through another crisis as he revamped his Cabinet for the second time in four days. But more street violence indicated Venezuela's troubles were not over.

Perez Jimenez changed three more Cabinet posts in the wake of his ouster of Gen. Romulo Fernandez from the Defense Ministry.

Meanwhile, police and troops scattered antigovernment student demonstrators in downtown Caracas with mackintosh and tear gas. Demands for restoration of civil liberties increased.

Congress Asked To Boost National Debt

Some Legislators Doubt U.S. Can End Up In Black

WASHINGTON — The House of Representatives today asked Congress to boost the national debt to \$20 billion.

Secretary of the Treasury Robert Anderson asked the five-billion boost in letters to Democratic and Republican leaders of the House Ways and Means and Senate Finance committees. Those are the committees which would handle such legislation.

Anderson submitted a draft of suggested legislation that would make the increase effective on a temporary basis from the date of enactment through June 30, 1959.

THE NATIONAL DEBT subject to the ceiling limitation stood at \$274,350,766,593.28 Jan. 9, or just less than three-quarters of a billion dollars under the limit.

There had been an indication in President Eisenhower's budget message Monday that the administration would ask for an increase in the ceiling.

Eisenhower's message said that "the present limit of \$275 billion dollars is too restrictive in view of rising defense expenditures and of the need for more flexibility to permit efficient and economical debt management."

Anderson said in his letter that an increase in the debt ceiling is particularly necessary because government outlays now are at a high rate while the bulk of federal revenue went in until mid-April when income taxes are due.

"As we seek to manage the debt of the great government that we have, we ought to have the ability to use the best and most efficient mechanisms that we can give to us to permit the management of the debt."

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Sales Tax Collections For October

Municipal sales tax collections on business transactions during October netted the city of Kankakee \$23,723 according to the State Department of Revenue.

Total collections throughout the state during October amounted to \$4,390,142. Before distribution to municipalities the figure was reduced by \$1,000,000 for the state's general fund.

U. S. Technicians Bright Spot In Cold War

(Editor's note—All over the world, a small corps of U. S. technicians is hard at work dispensing know-how and saving good will. Despite isolated instances of friction, all signs point to their marked success on a crucial cold war front. This article is the first of a series on the subject.)

Churchill's Daughter Held For Drunkenness

MALIBU, Calif. (UP)—Actress Sarah Churchill slurs today in a court case over a drunkenness charge.

The actress, daughter of former British Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill, was arrested by sheriff's deputies at her home Monday after the telephone company reported she had been using overly loud language for two hours on her wires.

Miss Churchill's case in juvenile court was put off until Thursday and authorities released her in \$50 bail so she could appear on a "Matinee Theater" performance of "The Mikropoulos Secret."

Director Walter Grauman said the actress had been "drunk" on her lines at rehearsal and he was confident that "Sarah will do all right" on the show.

Deputies Barney Miller and George Getzlin described the actress as "obviously drunk" when they arrived at her home early Monday.

The officers said they attempted to quiet Miss Churchill and sought to leave without "making trouble." But Miller said the actress jumped into their patrol car, set upon Governor's lap and refused to get out.
