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Slain in Sheriff's Office Listening To Election Results

Friend Kills South Carolina State Senator

BENNETTSVILLE, S. C. (UPI)—State Sen. Paul A. Wallace was shot to death Tuesday night in the sheriff's office at the county courthouse just as his victory in the state Democratic primary was assured.

The killer was County Court Clerk Henry A. Rogers, 63, a longtime friend and business associate of Wallace.

Wallace, 56, a farmer and veteran state senator, was sitting in a chair in the small private office of the sheriff on the ground floor of the Marlboro County courthouse when the quiet court clerk entered.

Rogers was hardly noticed as he walked into the office crowd, pulled out a .32 caliber pistol and fired five times.

Wallace slid from his chair to the floor, mortally wounded. The sheriff and several others, rushing from their initial shock, leaped to disarm Rogers who offered no resistance and made no attempt to escape.

Friends and acquaintances of both men could offer no explanation for the shooting. They said the two men had been close friends and had had extensive business dealings with each other. Wallace died at the Marlboro County general hospital 40 minutes after the shooting.

Menshikov had been ushered into the hall under close police escort an hour ahead of his scheduled arrival, avoiding a direct meeting with the pickets. Most of them were native Europeans—Ukrainians, Poles, and nationals of other Russian satellite states.

"We are determined to bring about a merger," McDonald said. "Admittedly," Menshikov told the lawyers, "there is no easy road to the settlement of international problems and lasting peace. And we cannot shut our eyes to the presence of a constant, continuing dangerous tension today."

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Premier Confers With Algerian Insurgents Today

WASHINGTON (AP)—A flying trip by Secretary of State Dulles to confer with Premier Charles de Gaulle in Paris next month is planned primarily as a two-way fact finding mission.

Officials said today the meeting will give Dulles an opportunity to learn first-hand De Gaulle's views on a whole range of problems from the continuing crisis in North Africa to the possible summit conference.

It also will give De Gaulle a chance to find out what kind of United States cooperation and support he can expect in carrying through his program.

The State Department said Wednesday that Dulles would fly to Paris on July 5 and be back here in time to go with President Eisenhower on a visit to Ottawa three days later.

His meeting with De Gaulle will take place against a background of worry about France's role in the western alliance under De Gaulle's leadership.

Possibly one of the most difficult problems which De Gaulle will face is that of cooperation between France and the United States in the field of atomic weapons development. France has been reported at the point of producing nuclear weapons for test purposes and De Gaulle is believed to be determined to make his country the world's fourth nuclear power along with the United States, Russia and Britain.

He may confront Dulles with a strong request for information sharing between France and the United States to the same extent this country is able to share its atomic weapons secrets with Britain under legislation now pending in Congress.

Meanwhile, Premier De Gaulle called Jacques Soustelle on the carpet today in another show of his determination not to let the colonists in Algeria dictate how he runs France.

Soustelle is the political front man for the insurgent movement of army officers and French settlers who banded together in combat. Continued on Page 4, Column 2.

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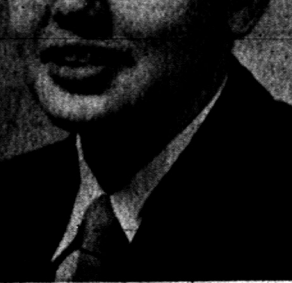

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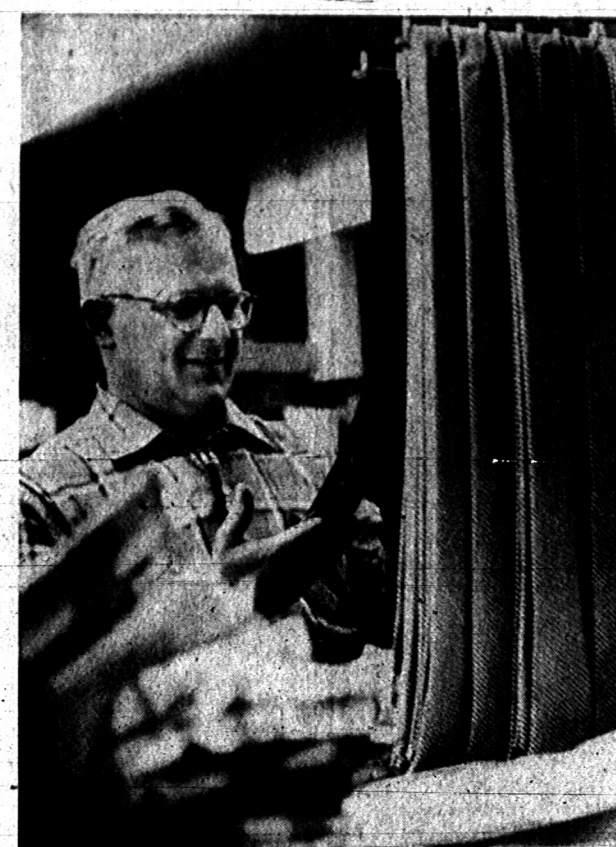

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Driver's License Makes The Man

In Grandpa's day, long trousers were used to separate the men from the boys.

In Dad's day being allowed to smoke in the house and maybe stay up past midnight on prom night heralded the approach of manhood.

Today it's the automobile that makes the man, or at least the young man. Eight out of 10 teenagers we interviewed in a nationwide survey indicated that their first turn at the wheel of the family car meant more to them as a sign of maturity than their first kiss, their first date or their first crashing of the midnight curfew.

To the modern teenager the sweetest thing about being sweet sixteen is that most states allow you to get a driver's license at that tender age. In fact, nearly six out of 10 lost no time whatever in their driving careers and dashed down to pick up the operator's license on the day they were 16.

"GETTING A DRIVER'S license means that you can be entrusted with a growing responsibility," said 16-year-old Barry Endop of St. Louis when asked to explain the importance of the driving license as a symbol of mature achievement.

Nearly one out of every five boys knows how to drive before reaching the legal minimum driving age, although some states require learner's permits at age 14. Most are taught by their fathers.

Among the girls, the first time a 16-year-old drove before reaching age 18, but three out of 10 can drive through the garage doors. No kidding, I guess I kind of forgot you have to open them first.

WHICH BRINGS up the point, driving experience with his first driving mishap. "I was so excited when I got my license," he confessed sheepishly, "I almost crashed through the garage doors. No kidding, I guess I kind of forgot you have to open them first."

"We just got a bum rap," complained Fred Brandell of Austin, Texas, set by insurance companies for drivers in their age group. Teenagers are insistent that they are safe, conscientious and responsible drivers.

"The American teenager can and should be the best driver on the road today. At that age, reflexes are faster and their ability to perceive a traffic situation is better," concluded Petersen.

Sometimes, as many teenagers admitted, their natural driving talents are the cause of the trouble. Explained a New Haven, Conn., youth: "We are good drivers. The only trouble is that because we're so good some of us get too sure of ourselves and take too many chances."

EVEN MORE revealing was this comment from 16-year-old Bob Hatter of Los Angeles: "Of course teenagers are the best drivers around. Could an adult drive in a drag race?"

In the same city, 16-year-old Pat Egan delivered a stinging rebuttal. "Teenagers," she said, "are the worst drivers. They're reckless. In fact, some of the ones I've ridden with are downright dangerous. They think they know everything, but someday they'll get told off by a morgue attendant."

After learning how to drive and passing the license test, youth's growing achievement, a sure sign of manhood, is owning a car of your own, your very own.

By age 16, our survey indicated, nearly one boy in 20 but less than one girl out of 100 had their own car. Of these, two out of three were in the jalopy class, 1951 models or earlier, and almost all, with few exceptions, came from a used car lot rather than a family hand-me-down.

From the time he has a car to call his own, a young man's life begins to revolve around his most treasured possession. Besides the dating and outting opportunities, the young driver begins to take an

New Twisters Hurt 5 Kansans

WICHITA, Kan. (UPI)—Black thunderstorms packed with tornado funnels swirled over Kansas during the night causing considerable damage to the northeast section of Wichita and some rural areas. One twister, clipping along at rooftop level, sheared off parts of 25 or 30 houses in an area five or six blocks long and a block wide in Wichita.

Five persons were treated for small puncture wounds and lacerations at Wesley Hospital here and released. Several others were given first aid treatment at the scene of the twister damage.

THE WEATHER Bureau reported 25 or 30 houses were damaged in northeast Wichita. Police Capt. Warner Spann said the extent of the damage could not be determined, because the twister hit during the night.

Rejects Douglas' Appeal To Cut Taxes, Car Prices

DETROIT (AP)—Harlow H. Curcio, General Motors president, has joined Henry Ford II in rejecting an offer by Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.) to sponsor repeal of the 10 per cent excise tax on passenger cars if auto makers would reduce prices six per cent. In a letter to Douglas Wednesday, Curcio said he believes the question of a cut in the excise tax and a reduction of car prices are unrelated problems.

He said, "If the excise tax can be justified in principle and in amount, it should remain in effect; if not, it should be repealed regardless of car prices."

He added that current car prices "reflect competition which is intense and ever-present. Prices cannot be subject to sudden and arbitrary increases and decreases other than those that control economic life in our free enterprise system. This is true whether the price changes would be accomplished through government regulations, government bargaining or any other means or agreement."

The Ford president rejected Douglas' offer in a similar letter last weekend.

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17 Physically Handicapped To Graduate At U Of I

CHAMPAIGN (AP)—Seventeen physically handicapped students will be among 2,500 new graduates Saturday in commencement exercises at the University of Illinois.

Wheelchair ramps are a familiar sight on the Illinois campus. Marcus W. Orr of Texarkana, Ark., will be the first wheelchair student to win a doctorate degree. Orr, a World War II veteran, was hit by shrapnel in Germany, studied sociology.

Another graduate, H. Edward Reeves, is a quadriplegic. Reeves, whose home is at 8-N.

11 Firemen At Univ. Of Illinois Fire College

A fire official believes that the ardor of fire fighters sometimes needs to be cooled off.

"It isn't always the fire which creates heat," said Fred W. Kempf, chief officer of the Chicago Fire Insurance Patrol.

He spoke at the 34th annual University of Illinois fire college in Champaign. Eleven Kankakee firemen are attending sessions of the college.

Kempf said that it's a poor policy to send "a large number of men rushing into buildings with poles, axes and other equipment as they frequently break lighting fixtures, household furnishings, or merchandise and soil floors and carpets."

Kankakee firemen attending the college include: Chief James J. Marrell, Capt. Donald Curry, Lt. Fred Dattilo, Edwin Bertrand, Edmund LaPorte, Fred Carstens Jr., Richard Guimond, George William.

Not all handicapped graduates will be in wheelchairs. Some use crutches. Others have artificial limbs.

Helping to make school as easy as possible for handicapped students is the Job-Corps Rehabilitation Program. Since 1968, more than 125 disabled men and women have been graduated and obtained jobs, been

married or gone on with their studies.

SEVERAL COED graduates of the program have married. For the job holders, average pay is \$5,500. Eight of this year's grads have jobs in sight. One coed is married and another is engaged. Four students plan to go into advanced studies and two, including Orr, will travel to foreign countries to continue their studies.

The handicapped program has the largest since the program began in 1968. Since then 125 disabled men and women have been graduated and obtained jobs, been

The Queen's 32nd birthday actually was April 21, but for ceremonial purposes every British monarch chooses an official birth.

Officers Block AFL-CIO Merger

CHICAGO (UPI) — Peter Gavin, special assistant to AFL-CIO President George Meany, said Wednesday the only obstacle to merger of the two labor groups in Illinois was that of selecting officers.

The two-day meeting here of representatives from the AFL and CIO resulted in virtual assurance the merger would be effected next week at Springfield, McGavin said.

A meeting of state AFL and CIO committees is scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday of next week. McGavin said the meeting should result in the merger which has been deadlocked since 1955.

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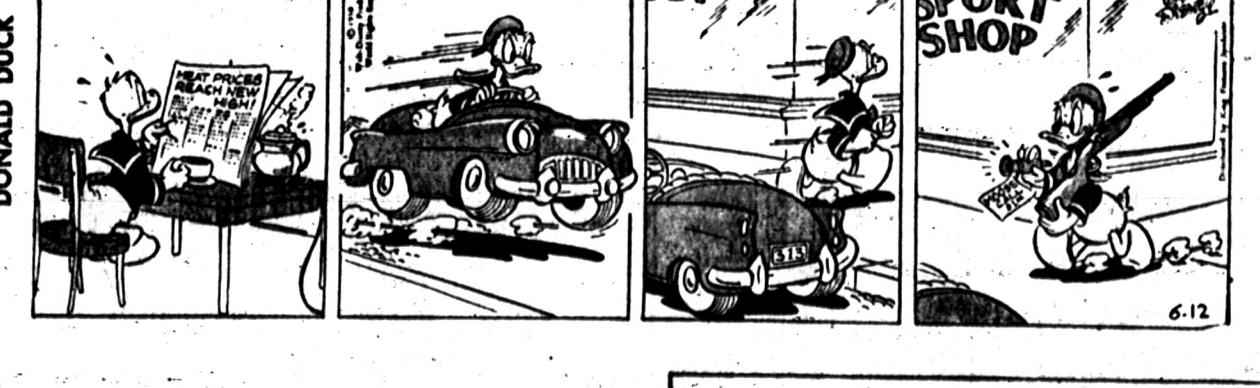
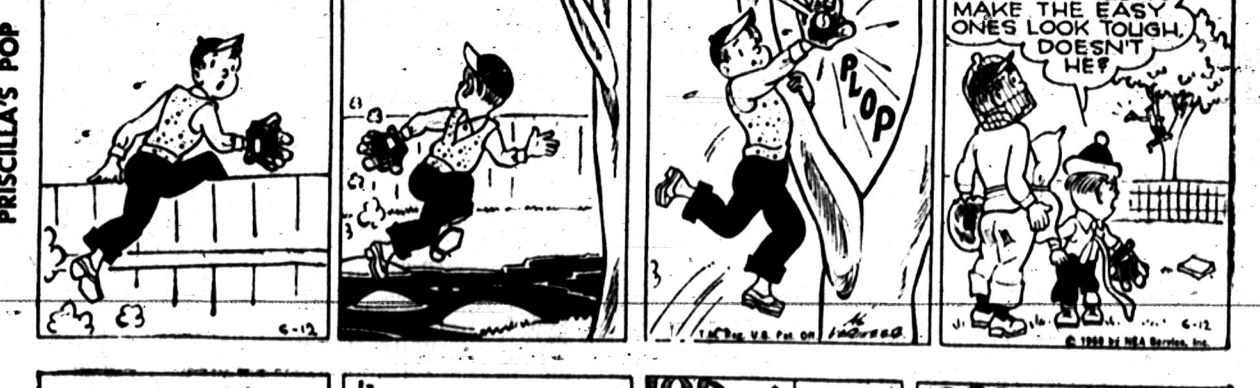
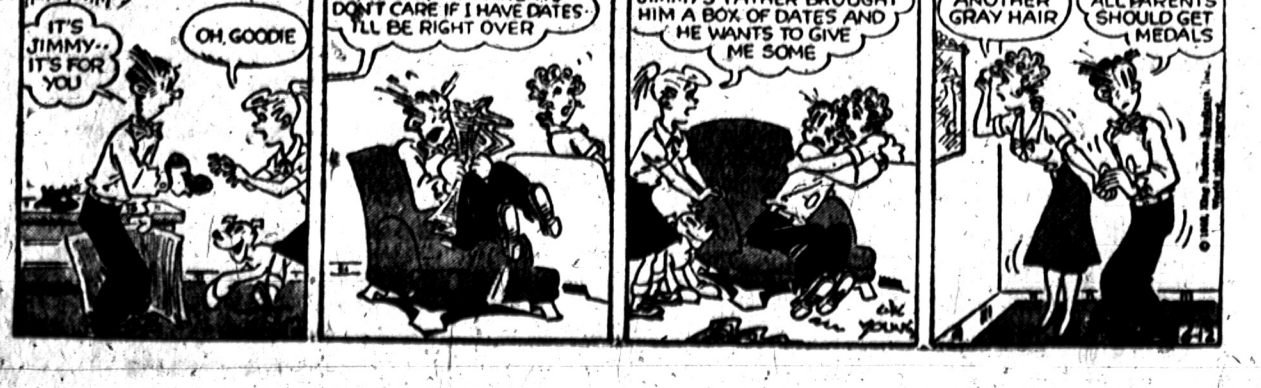

The Terror Campaign Has Closed Mouths, Doors
Things Are Different In The Casbah Today
By RELMAN MORIN
ALGIER (AP) — In a hole-in-the-wall shop, an Arab merchant starts to answer a question. "De Gaulle? Well, in my opinion—" He breaks off abruptly. Two red-hatted French Zouaves, carrying tommyguns, come down the narrow alleyway, heavy boots clattering on the ancient cobblestones. "AS I WAS SAYING," says the merchant, smoothly changing the subject. "Business is slow. So many people buying on credit." Even after the Zouaves have passed, he says no more. Doors slam shut suddenly as you approach. A Moslem woman pulls her veil up to the level of her dark eyes. This is the Casbah. The Algiers Casbah, locale for comic movies and scene of countless love stories, is a place of fear and festering hatred now. Last year French paratroops went through it—in effect with fire and sword — turning down members of the Moslem revolutionary force that has been fighting for nearly four years to shatter French rule in Algeria. The paratroops blew up great chunks of the thick-walled jumble of buildings, killed some people, wounded others, carried still others off to prison. In the Casbah is quiet now except that murders still take place there. CASBAH MEANS fort in Arabic. You can see why the one on the hill in Algiers was an ideal fort for the Moslem rebels. It is a fantastic maze of twist: alleys and passageways barely wide enough for two persons to pass. They coil into each other like serpents through tunnels and secret doors that pierce the walls of this vast pile of masonry, interconnecting houses and dwelling places. You could travel miles in the Casbah and never be seen. In 500 years little or nothing changed there—until recently. Then, when the savage Moslem rebellion flared against France, and the city's hospitals came in for attack, the Casbah was changed.

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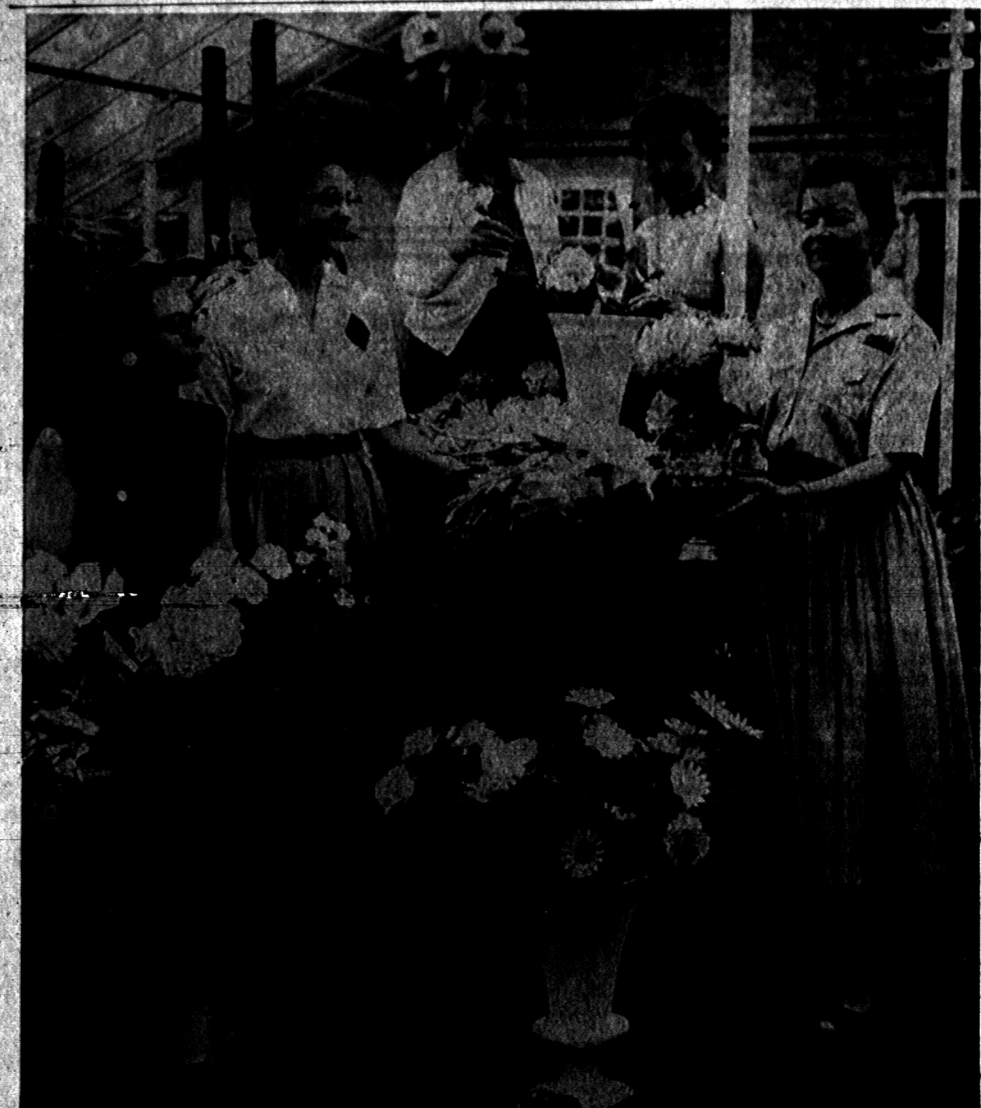

Here's A New Use For Cake Mix

We have just tried a new way of using a cake mix, with good results. Less liquid than is regularly called for was added to the mix, then the batter was stirred with canned drained blueberries and a crumb topping (strawberries being baked). The blueberry kuchen that resulted was served warm, with butter passed for those who are not weight-watching.

The cake mix we used is a spanking new one designed to fit one 8- or 9-inch square or round cake pan, one 6 by 10 or 7 by 11 inch pan, as well as a number of other baking pans and dishes. The mix comes in four flavors—white, chocolate, yellow and marble. The white and yellow varieties are particularly good for upsidown cakes—not only because of their texture but because the amount of cake they yield balances the amount of fruit usually used.

We used the white cake mix for our blueberry kuchen. It would be fine to serve at a brunch or a morning coffee.

The topping given in the recipe is the sort often found on bakery products. We note this because several readers have asked us for this particular strudel.

QUICK BLUEBERRY KUCHEN
Ingredients: 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/4 cup flour, 2 tablespoons cold hard butter or margarine, 1 egg, water, 1 loaf-size package (10 ounces) white cake mix, 3/4 cup well-drained canned blueberries.

Method: Butter the bottom of a square cake pan (9 by 9 by 1 1/4 inches); lightly flour the bottom. Stir sugar and flour together in a small bowl; add the hard butter and cut in with a pastry blender just until fine crumbs are formed; reserve. Break egg into a glass measuring cup; add enough water to come up to the 1/2 cup mark. Add egg-water to cake mix; stir until blended. Beat with medium speed of electric mixer for 4 minutes; or beat with spoon for 4 minutes; or beat with spoon for 4 minutes. Turn into prepared baking pan. Sprinkle blueberries over reserved crumb mixture. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) over 25 to 30 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Serve at once, cutting squares in pan and lifting out with a spatula.

Lucania Faces \$1,000 Fine In Will Case

CHICAGO (AP) — Undertaker and politician Joseph Lucania has been convicted by a Criminal Court jury of conspiracy to defraud the rightful heirs of a \$70,000 estate of an immigrant Polish tailor.

The jury Wednesday night recommended a fine of \$1,000 in Lucania's second trial before Judge Grover C. Niemeyer. An earlier trial ended with a hung jury Jan. 14.

Final disposition of the trial was put off when Judge Niemeyer granted a defense motion for continuance to June 23. Atty. Morris Meyers indicated he had not decided whether to ask for a new trial, appeal or recommend Lucania pay the fine.

Lucania remained free on \$2,500 bond posted previously.

HE WAS CHARGED with persuading Mrs. Helen Compell of St. Petersburg, Fla., to pose as the daughter and sole heir to the estate of Frank J. Rozanski, who died in 1954 leaving no will.

The prosecution contended Lucania induced Mrs. Compell to say she was Rozanski's natural daughter although he knew she was a step-daughter.

Mrs. Compell, 55, testified Lucania, a 43rd ward Republican committeeman and owner of a North Side funeral home, assured her she could get the estate and then divide it with him.

Lucania was one of seven persons indicted in the case and the second to be tried. Charles J. Fleck, former county administrator, whose office handles estates of 14 persons who die leaving no will, was acquitted of a similar conspiracy charge.

Dulles Criticized For Statement

LONDON (AP) — Russia accused Secretary of State Dulles today of failing to take a serious approach to Premier Khrushchev's proposal for increased U.S.-Soviet trade.

Khrushchev wrote President Eisenhower June 3 that Russia could offer a number of raw materials and industrial goods but could order more if U.S. credits were extended.

Dulles at his news conference Tuesday said, "It looks as though the Soviet Union wanted to get credits from us so that it could more successfully pursue its economic warfare against us."

"That is not a serious approach to the question, it seems to me," said a Soviet commentator broadcast to America.

Youth Drowns

PANA (AP) — Three persons stood helplessly by as a Pana youth drowned when his horse stumbled and pitched him into Sportman's Lake.

Arlie Farrell, 17, and his horse were trying to swim a runaway calf across the lake.

The victim's brother, Leon, 13, and two other men who had helped trace the lost calf witnessed the incident Wednesday. None of them could swim.

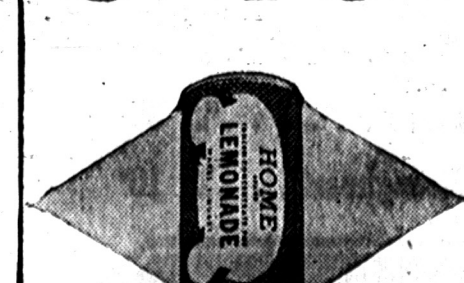

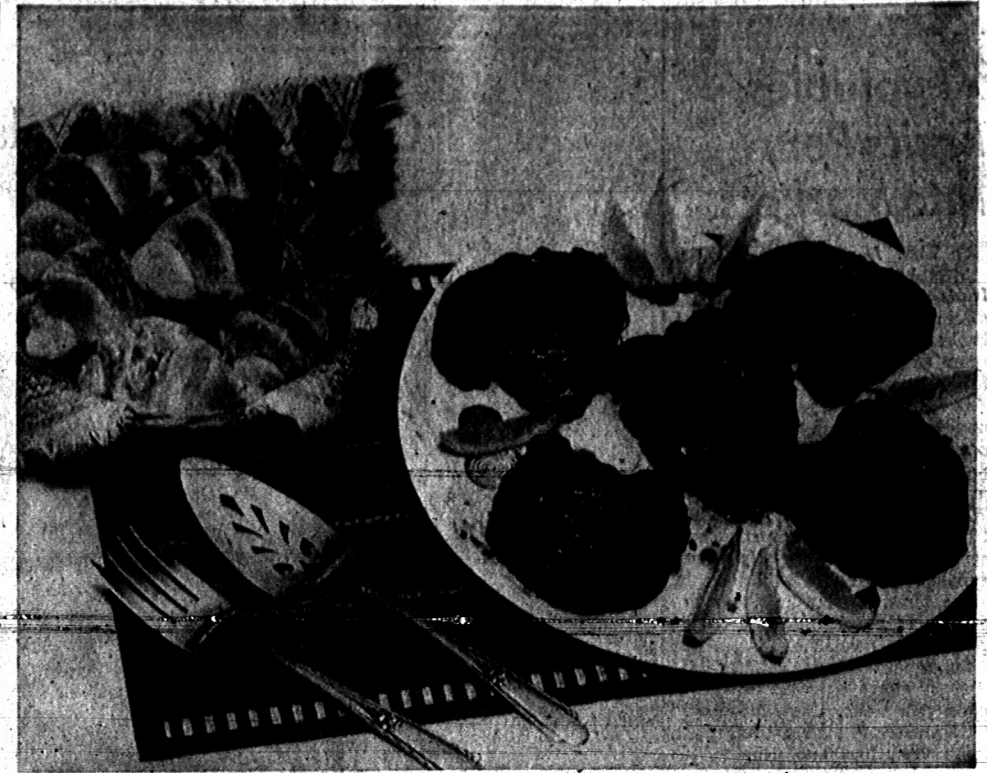

Midwest Barley Combines With Shrimp Cantonese
By GAYNOR MADDOX, NEA Food and Markets Editor
In cosmopolitan Middle West cities like Chicago, Omaha, Minneapolis and Kansas City, Chinese, Japanese, German, Italian and French restaurants have popped up in great numbers. Midwest grains such as barley, oats, wheat and corn are in large quantities in these restaurants in German dumplings, Italian spaghetti, etc.
This barley with shrimp Cantonese is a delicious example.
Shrimp Cantonese in Barley Ring (8 servings)
Barley Ring: One and one-half cups barley, 8 cups water, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup chopped onion, 1/2 cup chopped mushrooms, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon salt.
Shrimp Cantonese: One cup sliced celery, 1/2 cup sliced green pepper, 1/2 cup sliced green onions, 3 cups water, 4 tablespoons cornstarch, 2 tablespoons soy sauce, 1/2 cup cold water, 1/2 teaspoon head molasses, 1 No. 2 can bean sprouts, drained; 2 cups cooked shrimp, 1 tomato, cut into wedges.
To serve, unmold barley ring on to platter and fill center with shrimp Cantonese.
TOMORROW'S DINNER: Tomato juice, shrimp Cantonese in barley ring, carrot sticks, garlic French bread, lemon sherbet, ginger oatmeal cookies, coffee, tea, milk.
A boil over high heat. Boil 2 minutes. Mix cornstarch, soy sauce, cold water and head molasses up-til thoroughly blended. Slowly add cornstarch mixture to boiling vegetable. Cook until thickened and clear. Stir in bean sprouts, shrimp and tomato wedges. Heat thoroughly.
For the barley ring, cook barley in boiling salted water about 45 minutes. Melt butter in a frying pan over medium heat. Add onions, mushrooms, salt and pepper; sauté until onions are transparent. Add barley and stir well to thoroughly combine with butter mixture. Pack firmly into a well-greased 1 1/2 quart ring mold. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 20-25 minutes.
For the shrimp Cantonese, place celery, green pepper, onions and 2 cups water in saucepan. Bring to a boil over high heat. Boil 2 minutes. Mix cornstarch, soy sauce, cold water and head molasses up-til thoroughly blended. Slowly add cornstarch mixture to boiling vegetable. Cook until thickened and clear. Stir in bean sprouts, shrimp and tomato wedges. Heat thoroughly.

Forrest Area Seeks To Form Fire District
FORREST (JNS) — Several months ago, the village board and fire departments of Forrest and Strawn became concerned with the high replacement cost of fire fighting equipment and decided to call a series of meetings to discuss what might be done to obtain fire fighting equipment. A meeting was held in Strawn for landowners and tenants of a proposed fire district. A petition was circulated and a favorable report was received.
A meeting at Wing was held Friday night, with approximately 25 present. It was conducted by William Folmer and Fred Schlipf of the Forrest Fire Department. Reported more calls were made in the country last year than in Forrest. The group agreed a plan is needed to provide better organization and better equipment.
A petition is being circulated in most of the area as a part of the Forrest-Strawn-Wing School District, including Fayette, Forrest and Pleasant Ridge townships. After the required number of signatures have been obtained, it will be presented to a county judge, who schedules a public hearing. At that time, objections can be made. If the judge accepts the petition, he then sets a day for election. If the majority favors the district it will be established and the judge will appoint three trustees.
It is expected no large levy for funds will be made. Plans are to gradually replace the present fire equipment. It is felt a fire station should be maintained in Strawn, as the regulations of the fire district do not approve of property being more than 10 miles from a station.
If the approval of the judge permits, the election to be held promptly, a tax levy could be made in 1959 and funds would be available for 1960 for improving equipment.

Colorado Seeks U. S. Aid To Fight Grasshopper Horde

DENVER (AP)—Colorado launched an attack against grasshopper hordes today, but Gov. Steve McNichols warned the action can be only a limited one unless large-scale federal aid is thrown into the fight.

The funds are needed, he said, to protect the 10-million-dollar wheat crop ripening on the high plains of eastern Colorado and for the hay crop needed to carry cattle through next winter.

Turned down by the White House Wednesday in an effort to have the region declared a disaster area eligible for civil defense funds, McNichols said he will appeal to the U. S. Department of Agriculture for part of 14 million dollars available for emergency relief under the agricultural conservation program.

William B. Person, deputy assistant to President Eisenhower, informed McNichols of the White House decision. Persons said McNichols has ordered that all assistance available through the Agriculture Department be extended to Colorado, Kansas and neighboring areas.

Persons said in a telegram to McNichols and Gov. George D. McCreary of Kansas that a federal survey of the grasshopper threat has been completed.

McNichols announced he will ask the Legislature, when it meets Monday in emergency session, to appropriate up to a million and a half dollars for the struggle with the hoppers. This apparently would wipe out the surplus in the state's general fund.

Paul W. Swisher, state agriculture commissioner, reported the hoppers were estimated to cover more than 10 million acres in 32 counties.

The state agriculture department announced the start of a range spraying program, with five two-engine planes flying out of Cheyenne Wells, in east-central Colorado. It said nearly 50,000 acres will be covered in this cooperative venture at a cost of about 60 cents an acre.

Chief Highway Engineer Mark U. Watrous reported his department will begin spraying roadside weeds along 18,000 miles of roads in eastern Colorado Friday, using 25 planes of spraying machinery.

Reds May Bargain To Free 9 Yanks On Dulles' Terms

BERLIN (AP)—An anti-Communist newspaper today accepted Secretary of State Dulles' reservations that negotiations for return of nine U. S. soldiers would not imply American recognition of East Germany.

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Redstone Tested At Missile Base

CAPT. CANAVALL, Fla. (UPI)—The Army's reliable short-range Redstone missile, already in the hands of field troops, was tested Wednesday night at a missile test center, blasting off into a high sky.

The launching, described beforehand as a routine test flight for the 200-000 mile missile, apparently went off without a hitch.

The 65-foot missile got away at 8 p.m. and was visible about two and a half minutes before it disappeared into the sky at high altitude.

The Redstone has been test-fired dozens of times and is already in production.

Venezuela Places Nixon Riot In Unsolved File

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—The Venezuelan government is investigating the causes of the mob attacks upon U. S. Vice President Richard M. Nixon here a month ago. Friday, it has given no indication of what it has learned, and the whole affair has been pretty well expunged from local memories.

The Ministry of Interior says it does not know how many of the more than 100 persons arrested for stone throwing and other violent acts are still in jail or whether anyone has been punished.

There seems to be general agreement everywhere that the incident was Communist inspired. Caracas newspapers published declarations by Junta President Wolfgang Larrazabal after the case of Nixon and his wife were attacked that an intensive investigation would be made. Since then there has been no mention of the inquiry in any newspaper.

Members of the American colony in Venezuela express belief the order of the investigation had been considerably dampened. They think of sending troops and intervening in Venezuelan affairs.

The Communists seem pleased that the responsibility for what they called "a demonstration of national revenue" had been laid at their door.

Issue Tornado Alert For Sudden Midwest

Milford Hit By Windstorm

Belt Extends From Chicago To Akron, O.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower proposed today creation of a new federal aviation agency to make air travel safer.

The new agency would absorb the Civil Aeronautics Administration and the Airways Modernization Board which have been taking emergency measures to stop collisions of planes in flight.

In a special message to Congress, the President asked that legislation setting up the new agency be passed "at the earliest practicable date."

THE SAID HE HAD intended to recommend such legislation early last year but that the recent jetliner collision over Maryland in which 12 were killed—made it apparent "that the need for action is so urgent that the consolidation should be undertaken now."

Accordingly, he said, he was recommending that the new agency be set up promptly with "powers required for the effective performance of the responsibilities to be assigned to it."

The new agency would be headed by an administrator appointed by the President and subject to Senate confirmation.

IT WOULD TAKE over from the Civil Aeronautics Board the issuance of safety regulations.

In addition to having full control over civilian aircraft, the new agency would have under its jurisdiction military air operations to the extent possible without causing "impairment of the national defense."

The President's message said such Defense Department air control functions should be transferred to the new agency "as rapidly as adequate arrangements for their performance and the solution of the personnel problems can be worked out."

He said military personnel, as well as civilians, should have high posts in the new agency to assure that national defense interest would not be neglected.

Clamp Firm Cyprus Curfew After Rioting

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—Only British troops walking the streets of Nicosia today as authorities clamped on the first 100 per cent curfew in an effort to end communal fighting.

Britain also ordered paratroopers to the Mediterranean colony to strengthen her troops trying to end continuing clashes between Greek and Turkish Cypriots. Eleven Cypriots have been killed since Saturday.

Since the outbreak of communal rioting, the Greek and Turkish communities had been allowed out of doors separately for several hours daily to get food and other necessities which have been prohibited and such pass holders as doctors, civil servants and the like, were included in the prohibition.

British plans for the future of Cyprus—to be announced Tuesday—are expected to intensify the violence by failing fully to satisfy the 400,000 Cypriots of Greek descent or the 100,000 Turks.

THE GREEKS WANT the island annexed to Greece. The Turks want Cyprus partitioned if the British leave.

The situation approached civil war Thursday when the bloodiest battle yet. A gang of 300 Greek Cypriots tried to take a Turkish village near Nicosia and was met with gunfire. Three Greeks were killed and nine wounded.

British troops headed off part of the Greek mob and arrested 30. Continued on Page 6, Column 1

Civil Service Pay Hike Bill Is Approved

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate passed today a compromise bill giving a 10 per cent pay boost to the government's 1,021,000 civil service and other employees.

Action came by voice vote adoption of a report agreed upon Thursday adjusting Senate and House differences over the legislation.

With the House in recess until Monday, final congressional action was put off until next week.

The bill's annual cost would be \$42 million dollars. But the first year cost will be closer to \$60 million dollars since the boost is retroactive to Jan. 1.

SEN. OLIN D. Johnston (D-S.C.) said the bill will give all employees equal treatment. Sen. Ralph Yarborough (D-Tex.) said the pay increase was modest compared to those given workers in private industry.

But Sen. Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) said he was "very glad" the bill was passed. "We have made some progress," he said.

SEN. BARRY Goldwater (R-Ariz.) called for plugging more loopholes in law with suggestions McClellan has made for tightening union controls.

As the Senate slugged away in the second day of debate, 44 new amendments, mostly offered by Republicans, contending that the amendments were trivial, and were offered in an effort to give backing to GOP charges that the original version was soft on labor.
