## Girls State Opens Today, Jacksonville

Five Kankakee County girls left this morning to join 480 other high school juniors at the 21st annual Illinois Girls State opening today at MacMurray College, Jacksonville.

The girls left by bus from the American Legion hall at 9:30 a.m. and were to be joined by 22 others at Gibson City and other points along the route.

The week-long event, sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, will provide citizenship training for girls from every county in Illinois.

Girls State is a mythical state patterned after Illinois and it is divided into city, county and state units. The girls create the rules, elect officials and conduct the affairs of government.

EACH GIRL WILL be assigned to a political party—either the Democrats or the Republicans—at the start of the activities. Each party adopts its platform, campaign slogan and motto at a state party convention.

Elections will be held Friday and Saturday and the new state, county and city officials will be installed Saturday evening at a banquet in McClelland dining hall.

A BUS TRIP to Springfield will be a highlight of the event for delegates, and Gov. William G. Stratton has promised to be on hand to greet them. The girls will visit the governor's mansion and various state buildings.

## Expect Business Pickup By Fall, Chicago Banker Tells Kiwanians

"Our recovery from the present recession will not be spectacularly fast. We'll bump along during the summer, but by fall business should be picking up."

These are the opinions of George W. Mitchell, vice president in charge of research, Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, expressed to Kiwanians Monday.

"Our country is at a turning point in its economy," he said, "and to bring unemployment down we not only have to recover, but also progress because new graduates are bringing up the labor force."

Mitchell estimates that, before this whole cycle is completed two or three years might have passed. He expects the consumer price index to remain stable, and may be lower slightly during the next 12 months.

TRIGGERING the recession was the sharpest inventory adjustment since the post-war period, he said. Sales in September, October and November 1957 were too far below inventories, Mitchell said, and merchants began to slack off on their buying.

However, he pointed out, the

continued. About 50 per cent goes for soft goods like food, 30 per cent for services and 12 per cent for durable goods.

In the construction field, he said residential building is picking up and the future looks good. But he expects expenditures for plants and equipment to drop another 10 per cent before the recession level is off. It has already dropped about 10 per cent, he said.

The vice president said he also proves the various plans to bolster the economy, like making credit and loans easier to get and some wage increases, to long as they are done cautiously. "Otherwise we will go to the opposite extreme and have inflation," he concluded.

At present the village has two dog ordinances. William Barwegen, village president, said that al-

though both have good points they are sometimes in conflict.

One says dogs must be chained or fenced in, while the other says dogs that are tagged and have rabies shots may run loose.

Drolet was instructed to draw up a new ordinance combining the two, and including a new provision that nuisance dogs will be picked up by the village.

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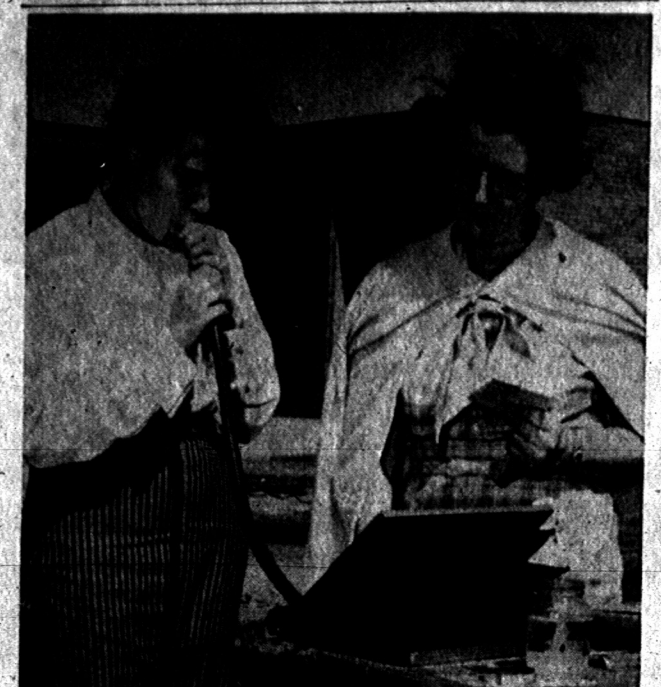

## County 4-H Hold Fitness Field Day

Forty Kankakee 4-H boys and girls took part in the county's first Keeping Fit Field Day held at the Limestone Grade School grounds Monday.

The youths were tested for growth and body type, organic fitness and motor fitness by Richard Berger and Charles Tipton, University of Illinois.

Assisted by Thomas D. Lutz, assistant farm adviser, and a dozen parents and 4-H leaders, the two men were able to put the 4-Hers through an exhaustive assortment of physical tests by noon.

First the child's body measurements are all recorded. Then his breathing capacity is checked, arm-pulling strength, running ability, body flexibility and endurance. He also does the broad jump and sit-ups. After the 40-yard and the rotemeter tests the pulse recovery is checked.

## Republicans Expect Adams To Tell All To Probers

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressional Republicans adopted a wait-and-see attitude today toward the political future of Sherman Adams.

Democrats make it plain they think Adams will have difficulty in explaining away charges against him and believe he soon will be on his way out as chief assistant to President Eisenhower.

SEN. EDWARD J. THYE (R-Minn.), who has spoken critically of Adams' acceptance of favors from Boston industrialist Bernard Goldfine, said he hopes Eisenhower's No. 1 aide bares "every incident and fact of his connection with Goldfine" in testimony before a House subcommittee today.

SEN. EVERETT DIRKEN of Illinois, assistant Republican leader, said in a separate interview that whether Adams remains in government appears to depend on his testimony.

"I'm sure he will tell the whole story," Dirken said.

SEN. GILFORD P. CASE (R-N.J.) said complete frankness about his connections with Goldfine is required from Adams.

Rep. Clarence J. Brown (R-Ohio) commented that "if all the charges are true, then Mr. Adams has been very indiscreet to say the least and his value to the administration seems to have been destroyed."

SIMILAR VIEWS were expressed by two other Ohio Republican Representatives William E. Minshall and David A. Baumhart Jr. Adams has denied he used any influence in behalf of Goldfine in cases pending before government agencies. He so informed the House subcommittee last week in a letter in which he confirmed reports that he had been Goldfine's guest in expensive Oriental rug and a vicuna coat from his Boston friend.

In announcing that Adams would testify, White House press secretary James C. Hagerty said Eisenhower had asked him to tell newsmen there is "no individual, in or out of government, that he had more confidence in than Sherman Adams."

## Vacationing In Wilds? Watch Out For Snakes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Man has hated and feared snakes since the time of Adam.

And this is the reason when both people and snakes get out of their homes to explore the woods, fields and streams.

The U. S. Public Health Service does not know exactly how many people are bitten by snakes each year. It quotes one estimate of 3,000, and says this may be "far too low."

Public Health records do show a number of deaths from poison snake bites. It averages about 14 per year in the United States. There are two reasons why the death rate is so low.

Most snakes—and hence most snake bites—are non-poisonous. Prompt treatment of a poisonous snake bite is usually effective. The fatality rate for untreated poison snake bites is 10 to 15 per cent. It is in spite of everything, you are bitten by a poisonous snake, the American Red Cross recommends the following first-aid steps:

Stop all muscular activity at once.

Apply a tourniquet above the bite. Make it tight enough so that blood barely oozes from the wound, but not so tight as to cut off the flow of deep internal vessels.

Sterilize a knife blade with a match and make cross-cut incisions at each fang mark. Try to get one incision into the actual venom deposit, which probably will be below the fang marks; a snake usually strikes downward.

Suck the wound (never mind about the risk to your mouth) for an hour or more.

Get the victim to a doctor or hospital as fast for an antivenom injection.

"Most people get bitten because they don't look where they are going. Snakes hide under logs, in thick underbrush, and in rocky crevices. If you are climbing, examine a ledge before you thrust your hand into it. If you are walking through the woods, step up on a fallen tree and look before you step over it. Never step or reach into undergrowth without probing."

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# How Evanston Turns Out Prize-Winning Students

(Editors Note: During the past school year, signs of progress in various scientific fields brought renewed public interest in education. Two of the schools in the Chicago area rank high for their accomplishments. United Press International asked the school heads to review the factors which have kept their institutions among leaders in their fields. The first of two dispatches follows.)

EVANSTON (UPI)—Evanston Township High School produced six National Merit Scholarship winners this year.

That was more than any school in the nation except New York's specialized Bronx High School of Science, which also had six winners. It was more than all the high schools of neighboring Chicago turned out. Together, they produced four.

Winning top awards is old hat for the sprawling, red-brick high school in this Chicago north shore suburb. Community noted for its culture and its institutions of higher learning, including Northwestern University.

LAST YEAR The Evanston school boasted four National Merit scholars. Its science students repeatedly have topped top honors in the annual Westinghouse science search.

No organization attempts to rate the nation's secondary schools in order of excellence. But educators informally rate Evanston high among the best.

Dr. Lloyd S. Michael, superintendent, listed several factors for his students' showing on the rigorous college aptitude tests in competition with more than 250,000 other seniors from nearly 14,000 schools.

The larger number of extremely able pupils who enroll—the intelligence equipment they bring to us—"the support we get from their parents for their education and required homework."

"The honors (accelerated and enriched) classes which challenge students to work up to and even stretch their ability."

"The REAL MEASURE" of our school's greatness is its ability to stretch the talents of each student," Michael said.

Michael said that he keeps scholarship first among values in the school. "That is reflected in the showing in Merit Scholarship competition and in the fact that 75 percent of Evanston's graduates go on to college."

Dr. Jean Fair, who is in charge of the testing and evaluation program, said the task of putting students where they belong begins with an examination of students' records while they are still in elementary school.

In their freshman year students are urged to plot, at least tentatively, their four-year course. If tests show they have aptitude in a particular field, such as science, they are channeled in that direction. If they show exceptional talent in the field, they are enrolled in an honors class where they are required to do work of higher quality than in regular classes.

ABOUT 25 PER cent of the 3,100 students enroll in one or more honors groups. About 50 percent of the accelerated students advance even beyond the accelerated-honors program and enroll in college-level courses which may give them either advanced placement or college credit or both. Evanston was one of six high schools that pioneered the advanced college placement program.

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# Bradley Village Board of Trustees

Bradley Village Board of Trustees saw the results of the new village bookkeeping system, instituted about two months ago, when they checked a new audit of all village books Monday night.

The new system not only breaks down village financial by department, but further details various expenses within the department. For example, in the street and alley department it begins with the salary for the superintendent, his helpers, construction material, repair material, equipment expenses and depreciation, bonded indebtedness and so on.

When checks are written they are now coded not only for departments but for specific expenses. This way a running account can be kept for any one item, with totals immediately available for reference.

Advantage of the new system is not only for complete and exact accounting, but it also will in the future reduce auditing costs for the village. John Ross, village clerk, says, "It will amount to more work for Ross because of the extra posting of bills and checks each month."

In the past some of the village's auditing costs have been unusually high, trustees say, simply because the auditors had had to spend excessive time sorting data.

"Never has there been more need for earnest, frank discussion of farm policy than right now," he said. "Will farming remain a family going to be specialized—nationalized? ... will we channel abundance into a few hands? ... will we have an even more stringent economy of controlled scarcity?" he asked.

Under these proposals, the government's role in agriculture would be greatly reduced.

Benson said that a dairy industry is being forced to compete with other food products in a market that is becoming increasingly competitive.

In his first comment on the legislation, Benson told a dairy industry group that the bill is a "disaster" and that it would "destroy the dairy industry."
