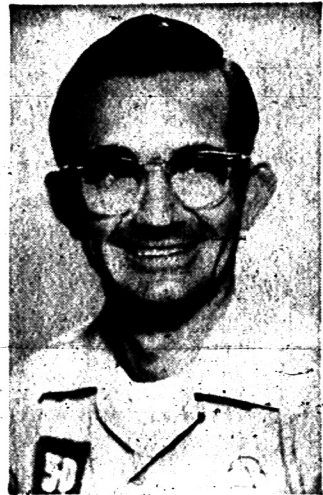

## DULLES ASKS CEASE-FIRE

### New Box Plant To Locate In Kankakee

The formation of a new company that will be located in Kankakee has been announced by a former official of a Kankakee, Iowa, box manufacturing concern.

The new firm — to be known as Kankakee Container Co. — will manufacture corrugated shipping containers in a warehouse on Grinnell road near Hobbs avenue.

The company has been organized by Edward H. Finning, who will be its president and general manager. He resigned as vice president and general manager of Hoerner Boxes, Inc., at Kankakee, Sept. 10. Hoerner Boxes operates nine plants in the Midwest and one in Mexico.

The Hoerner company had been considering locating a plant of its own here. Several sites had been studied, including the County Home property at the northeast corner of Entrance Ave. and Mertens St.

Finning says he expects the new company to get into full operation during the early part of January, 1959. The company will employ about 15 people when production starts but as sales grow employment should expand from 20 to 30 people.

The company will be equipped with new machinery for converting corrugated sheets into boxes or inner packing. The machinery is being purchased from S. Eastland from S. Eastland College, Brooklyn, N. Y.

The plant will be located in 32,000 square feet of warehouse space leased for two years from Hammes Leasing Corp. The warehouse is located behind the McCarthy Ford Tractor Sales building.

### Ford Pact May Set Pattern For Industry

DETROIT (AP) — The Ford Motor Co. looked hopefully forward today to a period of labor peace based on a new three-year agreement with the United Auto Workers Union. The pact is expected to set a pattern for the entire auto industry.

Ford and the UAW announced settlement of their differences Wednesday several hours after some 88,000 workers walked off their jobs in Ford plants across the nation. The strike remained in effect at some plants, pending agreement on local problems.

### Tells U. N. Reds Aim For Island Conquest

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles declared today the Chinese Communist campaign against Formosa poses a grave threat, with ominous implications. He called for a prompt cease-fire.

Dulles made his comment in a major policy address before the U. N. General Assembly as that 81-nation body opened general debate in its 13th regular session.

He expressed hope the talks now in progress in Warsaw between U. S. and Chinese Communist ambassadors would end the current crisis, but reserved the right to bring the problem to the U. N. if the talks appeared headed for failure.

Dulles charged that the Chinese Communist regime is now attempting to extend its authority to the offshore islands by the use of naked force.

"THE ISSUE is thus a simple one: Armed conquest," he said. He said the current actions of the Peking government demonstrate again that Red China is not a "peace-loving" — a phrase used in the U. N. charter in defining requirements for membership in the world organization.

Dulles spoke a few hours before the Assembly's Steering Committee was expected to reject an Indian proposal for such a debate. U. N. should debate the question of seating Red China. The committee was expected to reject an Indian proposal for such a debate.

"We seek a prompt cease-fire and equitable conditions, which will eliminate provocations and leave for peaceful resolution the different claims and counter-claims that are involved," Dulles said of the Warsaw talks.

"If it seems that the bilateral talks between ambassadors are not going to succeed, the United States reserves the right to bring this matter to the United Nations."

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko was expected to speak at the Assembly's afternoon session.

### Labor Probe Questioning Of Hoffa Ending

Answers Not Too Enlightening Over Dealings In Iowa

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Teamster President James R. Hoffa returned before the Senate Rackets Committee today and promptly ran into questioning about his dealings with firms in Des Moines and Omaha.

The dapper little labor leader, who bristled at questions late Wednesday was responsive but not particularly enlightening in his answers at the outset today.

Counsel Robert F. Kennedy of the Senate Labor Rackets Committee, recalling Hoffa to the stand, started questioning him about his dealings with Law Farrel, a former Des Moines beer distributor and with Midwest Bur- ings and Bag Co., Omaha.

Hoffa said he dealt with Farrel only in connection with the latter's former beer distributorship although he regarded Farrel as an "acquaintance" with whom he talked informally on the telephone from time to time.

Hoffa said he sometimes called Farrel to find out what was going on in Iowa. He said he felt Farrel was a "good position to know" but he did not elaborate immediately.

THE TEAMSTER President was nearing the end of his marathon appearance before the Senate committee, but faced a new twist in the union's "watchdog" monitors who Wednesday sought to head off his plan to do a new election.

Two of the three monitors asked Federal Judge F. Dickinson Letts to block the proposed election in February on the ground a demonstration of the board's refusal to accept the election was made in the giant union. Letts plans to hold hearings on the petition in about a week and will rule later.

Hoffa made it plain the purpose of the election would be to get rid of his court-appointed "watchdog" monitors.

Filing the petition were Martin F. O'Donoghue, chairman of the monitor board, and Godfrey Schmidt, representative of the rank and file who charges that Hoffa's election last year was "rigged" led to creation of the board. N. D. Wells Jr., monitor representing Hoffa's leadership, filed an objection to the petition.

### Virginia Schools May Be Closed

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Gov. J. Lindsay Almond Jr. indicated today he was ready to announce the closing of two Charlottesville schools. He held a press conference here, noting that U. S. Dist. Judge Walter E. Hoffman is due to rule on the Norfolk school situation later today.

But the governor would give no word on whether he expects Warren County's 1,000-pupil high school to remain closed for days or weeks.

"No one could pinpoint that, sir. I certainly can not," Almond replied to a reporter's question.

The governor has a conference scheduled for late today with John Battle Jr., counsel for the Charlottesville School Board. He said he did not want to make any statement on the Charlottesville situation until after that.

WARREN COUNTY officials looked to a meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association tonight for an indication of public sentiment.

In Norfolk, where schools closing is threatened, an attorney for the board said Hoffman would be asked for a stay of his integration order. If Hoffman denies it, the attorney said the board would lead the school to the U. S. 4th Circuit Court of Appeals.

Hoffman prepared to rule on a motion in Norfolk that would allow the board to assign 17 Negroes to air, white schools.

If the Negroes are assigned, schools with an enrollment of some 10,000 pupils apparently will not open as scheduled Monday.

One school—Warren County High at Front Royal, with an enrollment of about 1,000—already has been closed under the state anti-integration laws. Lane High and Venable Elementary in Charlottesville, with a combined enrollment of 1,700, also face the threat of state closure Monday.

THE NORFOLK school board, which has been ordered to desegregate, is under a federal desegregation order. The board is believed to have been seeking the cause of the school's closing.

### Court Hands Down Splash Guard Ruling

SPRINGFIELD (AP) — The Illinois Supreme Court today upheld a 1955 law requiring splash guards on trucks and said a 1957 amendment exempting certain type trucks is invalid.

The case had been appealed from the Sangamon County Circuit Court where Judge Samuel Smith ruled the entire act unconstitutional because of the amendment exempting nine classes of farm and dump trucks.

Justice Walter Schaefer, who wrote the high court opinion, agreed the amendment was "arbitrary and capricious" but said the Legislature in 1955 intended that the act should be operative without the exemptions.

"There had been no clearly expressed intention to repeal the 1955 provision and we see no significant indications that would support a repeal by implication," Schaefer said.

Referring to this permissive authority, Schaefer said: "If we are to assume that the Legislature intended to exclude from compliance those vehicles which make only occasional use of state highways, it is difficult to see why the specified splash guard would be required on foreign vehicles passing through this state."

THE RUDOLPH Express Co. of Bradley and three other trucking firms brought the original suit against the law, which had drawn protests from truck operators since its enactment.

The State Safety Department has been given permissive authority to exempt certain vehicles, such as those operating within or near limits, ready-made cement trucks and grain trucks.

Referring to this permissive authority, Schaefer said: "If we are to assume that the Legislature intended to exclude from compliance those vehicles which make only occasional use of state highways, it is difficult to see why the specified splash guard would be required on foreign vehicles passing through this state."

### He'll Continue Segregation Fight In Courts, Gov. Faubus Declares

LITTLE ROCK, AR. (UPI) — Gov. Orval E. Faubus said today that the only way to keep the Little Rock School system from turning into a racial conflict is to fight it out in the courts.

Faubus refused to say whether the formation of a private corporation to reopen Little Rock's closed high schools as private, segregated institutions is his idea.

The Little Rock private school corporation held its first meeting to select officers and decide whether to try to issue the closed schools before or after a special integration election Sept. 27.

The trip starting Sept. 27 will visit Hawaii, Okinawa, Japan, Korea, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Thailand, Pakistan, Iran, and Greece.

"The purpose of this corporation is to get the schools open and by that I mean all the schools, Negro and white," J. C. Mitchell, a member of the corporation, said.

FAUBUS SAID in a television interview today that he will call out the National Guard to protect life and property if racial conflict comes.

"But am not going to send troops to the high school to tie up the honor system and it will be determined later whether the National Guard will be used," he said.

He said he is not certain if he would use the guard to enforce integration if a majority votes for it.

"I have answered a direct question about that by saying, 'No, not unless I choose to,'" Blossom announced that three television stations will broadcast four hours of lessons a day for Little Rock's 3,600 high school students.

THE BROADCASTS will begin not later than Monday and may be on Saturday. The televised classes will be mainly in English, mathematics, history and science.

Blossom said the courses will be given on the honor system and it will be determined later whether the National Guard will be used to enforce integration if a majority votes for it.

Faubus said he is leaving Friday for the Southern governors' conference in Lexington, Ky., and the other governors there ask him about the situation in Little Rock. He will say that Arkansas and Virginia have not defied the Supreme Court by closing schools to prevent integration.

### Nationalists Down 5 Red MIGs In Duel Over Quemoy

TAIPEI, FORMOSA (AP) — Nationalist air force headquarters claimed today it shot down five Communist MIGs and possibly a sixth in air battles over Quemoy today. A communiqué said all Nationalist planes returned to base safely.

The communiqué reported two aerial engagements in the late afternoon in which four Sabrejets took part against more than 30 MIGs. The Sabrejets were providing support for the MIGs which they shot down.

AIR FORCE headquarters also claimed it shot down three Red planes and damaged a fourth in the Quemoy area.

The last previous encounter with MIGs took place Sept. 8, when the Nationalists claimed they shot down seven Red planes and damaged two more near the mainland airport of Swatow.

The American command on Quemoy has indicated that U. S. jets will join in fighting off the Communist warplanes that try to prevent supply drops to the offshore islands.

So far the Chinese Communists have made no attempt to attack Nationalist C-46 cargo planes parachuting supplies to Little Quemoy island. Two more drops were made without incident Wednesday, the Nationalist Defense Ministry said.

American fighters flew high over the Formosa Strait off Little Quemoy while the drops were made, ready to swoop down on any Communist MIG fighters that might appear.

### Body Of Fireman Missing From Cab Of Train In Bay

BAYONNE, N. J. (UPI) — The body of the fireman who should have saved a Jersey Central commuter train from plunging into Newark Bay but didn't—still was missing today, leaving wide open the question of what tragedy occurred.

Investigators had expected the body of fireman Peter Andrew Wilburn to be found in the wreckage of the train that ran through an open drawbridge Monday night, killing possibly as many as 48 persons when the train plunged into the water.

### 24 Die, 48 Missing In Typhoon's Wake

TOKYO (AP) — Twenty-four persons were reported dead, 48 missing and 108 injured as Typhoon Helen lashed Tokyo and eastern Japan this morning, spout out toward the Pacific Ocean, then headed back toward the northern Japanese island of Hokkaido with renewed fury. One American airman was among those reported missing.

More than 3,000 persons were made homeless by torrential rains and flooded rivers that accompanied Helen on its rampage through Tokyo and eastern Japan.

ON OTHER WORLD problems Dulles made his point: Hungary and Germany — The United Nations cannot let itself be discouraged by the refusal of the Soviet Union to end the "brutal suppression of the Hungarian people" and by its refusal to help reunify Germany.

Middle East—The United States, he said, is not wholly reassured by the recent course of events in the Middle East. It is going ahead with the withdrawal of another contingent of U. S. forces from Lebanon. Further, the United States will discuss with the new government of President-elect Fawzi Chehab a specific schedule for early withdrawal of other U. S. forces.

### U.S. Red Chinese Plan Sunday Talks; Meet For 2 Hours

WARSAW (UPI) — Ambassadors of the United States and Red China spent nearly two hours behind closed doors here today, bargaining hard for peace in the Far East. They will meet again Sunday.

Jacob Beam and Wang Ping-nan entered the conference room at Myslawiecki palace punctually at 10 a.m. They made no comment on the discussion.

Genuine secrecy cloaked the progress of the talks, and the best newsmen waiting outside the white-and-gilt doors of the conference room could hope for was a revealing intonation in the non-committal comments made by the two men on arrival and departure.

One clue to progress in the talks came from the Communist New China News Agency in Tokyo. It quoted the official Peking newspaper as saying there would be no cease fire in the Formosa Strait during the Warsaw talks.

Today's meeting was the fifth in a series of generally unproductive ambassadorial conferences that began in Geneva more than three years ago.

### The Adams' Drama: An Agonizing Decision

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — Whether Sherman Adams quits or stays, it's one of the strangest cases in a long time-packed with drama. As was the case 10 days ago right after the Republican political disaster in the Maine elections, no one close to President Eisenhower at the summer White House would bet you that Adams will weather the storm and continue as Eisenhower's chief aide.

Those in the inner circle insist they just don't know. What is more, they insist that Eisenhower himself doesn't know—simply because, they say, Adams knows whether he has changed his mind about Adams having to stay on because "I need him."

For the first time since Adams returned to his Washington office Monday after a 10-day vacation, the President and Adams talked Wednesday-by telephone.

They had no consultation since Sept. 6, when Eisenhower interrupted his vacation and returned to the capital for a few hours. That was two days before the Maine elections.

James C. Hagerly, White House press secretary, told a Newport news conference the Eisenhower-Adams conversation Wednesday dealt only with government business—that it touched in no way on the big question of whether Adams is in or out.

Earlier in the day, Hagerly said he still had not the slightest indication that Adams might be planning to resign—or that Eisenhower might fire him.

Hagerly put it that way in commenting on Washington reports that GOP leaders had prevailed on Adams to recognize that he has no alternative but to resign for the party's good.

Then on Sept. 8 in Maine, the Republicans were shellacked by the Democrats. The Goldline case was an indirect issue there, and GOP candidates in other states set up a new howl for Adams' scalp.

SINCE THAT howl started, Eisenhower has been publicly silent.

### Boy Scouts Find Out What Makes Little Boys Tick

## Take A Bow, Father, And Closer Look At Your Son

NEW YORK (UPI) — This isn't Father's Day, but take a bow anyway, Pop.

To most adolescent American boys, according to a survey released today by the Boy Scouts of America, Dad is their No. 1 hero.

The reasons are a little surprising, too. It's not because Dad is a big, handsome all-powerful fellow that his sons choose him as their hero.

Ninety per cent of the boys questioned said they admire father for his character, judgment, personal qualities, and vocational and social skills.

DURING THE BSA-SPONSORED survey, a scientific sampling

of the attitudes and desires of boys aged 14 to 16, the youngsters were contacted by experts from the Social Research Institute of the University of Michigan.

One finding was that boys today often feel a greater need for parental guidance than they show. Most regard decisions about "when to be in at night," money and personal problems to be in the province of their parents.

It may come as a blow to the girls, but the boys said they worry more about achievement, winning, school grades, vocational choice and job success than they do about girls.

Girls and other friends are, however, their second most

important worry, although the boys indicated that they also worry about personal resources, family finances and problems.

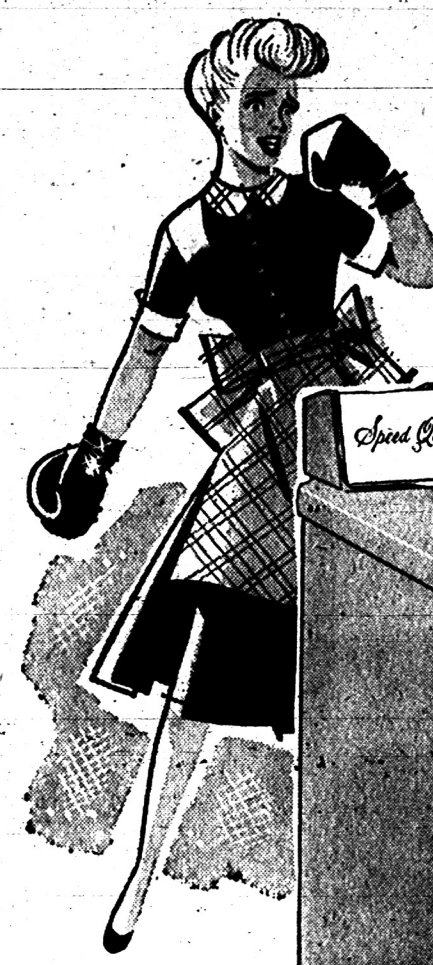
The boys were asked what makes them feel important and useful. More than half replied that "taking responsibility" gave them this feeling.

Parents may be surprised to hear what the boys say about "why parents make rules." Eight out of nine said "for the benefit of boys." The ninth boy had a notion the rules were made to suit parents only.

If her feelings are vitally involved, it is only fair to give her every chance possible. You'd be glad to have someone give you that chance, if the roles were reversed. Girls already have a reputation for being unscrupulous in competition and they ought to start living it down. If it means a great deal to your girl friend, you ought to hold out until she and Al have broken openly.
2. What do you think is Al's motive in wanting to date you? That would also influence your decision. Is he simply trying to punish his girl for something? Trying to make her jealous? Once a child has mastered the basic skills of reading and arithmetic, the doors of the world open before him. He wants to know. He is hungry for information. He is into everything—not with his fingers as he was some years ago—but with his mind. He has discovered that marvelous thing, the ability to think for himself.

These few exciting years—for the child and for the parents who can see what's going on. It is during these years that we send our children to school to be taught by experts; by people who have studied how to teach children. And while our children learn a great deal in school, they keep right on learning every minute they are awake.

It's exciting to make discoveries but it's more exciting still to be able to share these discoveries with the important people in your life.

Encourage your child's projects. It's easy to become interested in your child's ability to sing if you are musical—but just suppose you're not. You can still pay attention to his songs, listen to his records with him, encourage him to devote deeper into the world of sound.

Do you listen to his questions? Answer them if you can but don't over-answer; don't deluge him with your whole adult store of knowledge. Tell him enough to stimulate further interest. Help him to find some answers for himself.

Many times your children ask questions you do not know how to answer. Don't brush the child off but go look it up. A good child's encyclopedia is almost as necessary as a kitchen stove and a lot more necessary than an expensive electric gadget. Why do leaves turn red and yellow in the fall? Do you know? You too might be fascinated to learn about the green pigment chlorophyll and the changes that take place in your skin when you get a black and blue spot.

If you are the kind of person who enjoys finding out about new fields you will quite naturally talk about a wide variety of topics at home. You will show your children by example that reading is fun, that there is always something new and interesting to find out about. The more you talk at home the better will be your children's vocabulary. Knowing plenty of words is always a great help. You can express yourself accurately and your children will be able to read and understand a far greater range of material if they know what the words mean.

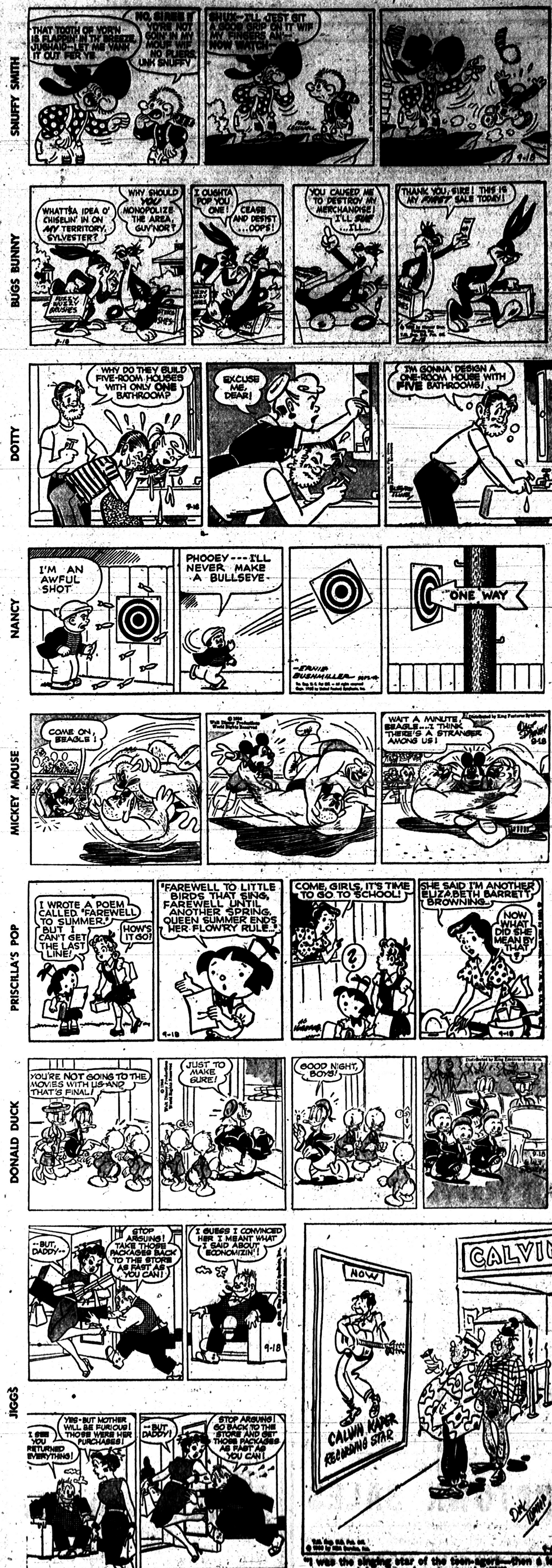

## Anticipate Return Engagement For Home Made Bread

By MARY JEAN HOUE  
Even though summer has its advantages, the Gordon Thomsons family has good reason to look forward to winter. As soon as the weather cools, Mrs. Thomson resumes such kitchen chores as baking bread. She bakes all the family bread during the winter months and she uses a simple recipe which is reprinted here, along with other family favorites.  
The Thomsons reside at 297 S. Nelson Ave. and have two children, Pamela, 2, and Craig, 8. Originally from Indiana, the Thomsons lived at Carney's Point, N. J. for six years before moving to Kankakee a year ago. They are active here in Presbyterian church groups.  
Mrs. Thomson's recipes include a tempting casserole of hamburger and noodles and Pumpkin Cream Pie, sure signs of a change of season. Like many other home-bakers, Mrs. Thomson changes her recipes along with the season, and the opportunities for culinary art are more plentiful in cooler weather.

**WHOLE WHEAT (GRAHAM) BREAD**  
This recipe makes two 1-pound loaves. Bake them at 350 degrees F. for 1 hour.  
1. Soften 1 cake compressed yeast (or 1 package active dry yeast) in 1 1/2 cups lukewarm water. Add 1 cup sifted enriched flour, 2 tablespoons sugar and 1 tablespoon salt. Beat until smooth. Let rise in warm place (85 to 90 degrees F.) until light and bubbly.  
2. Combine 1/2 cup hot water, 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar and 5 tablespoons shortening. Cool to lukewarm and add to yeast mixture. Add 4 cups unsifted whole wheat (Graham) flour, mix until smooth.  
3. Knead dough on floured board. Push away with a rocking motion, using heels of hands. Turn dough one quarter way around on the board and repeat the folding-kneading process with rhythmic motion. If dough sticks, add a little flour to the board. Knead until dough feels smooth and satiny, about 7 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turn to lightly coat all sides and cover.  
4. Let rise in warm place about 1 1/2 hours, or until impression remains when 2 fingers are plunged into dough. Turn out dough on well floured board. Divide in half. Mold into balls. Allow to rest, closely covered for 15 minutes. Shape into two loaves. Place in greased bread pans and cover.  
5. Let rise in warm place until dough fills pans and centers are well above tops, about 1 1/2 hours. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 1 hour. Store when cold.  
**HAMBURGER CASSEROLE**  
1 can tomato soup or tomato puree  
1 can mushroom soup  
1 package noodles  
1 onion, chopped  
Small piece of green pepper or mango, chopped  
Salt  
Mild cheese  
Brown hamburger separated into small pieces. Add onion and green pepper. Add to cooked noodles in greased baking dish with soup. Cover with mild cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 1/2 hour or until cheese is melted.  
**STUFFED PEPPERS**  
4 or 5 green peppers  
1/2 to 1 pound hamburger  
Chopped onion  
1 can Spanish rice  
Salt and pepper  
2 teaspoons paprika

Topping: Two (6-ounce) packages semisweet chocolate bits, 1/2 cup salted peanuts, chopped; 1/2 cup any of the above cereals (cereal selected for cookie mixture should be used as topping).

Combine butter, peanut butter, marshmallows and milk in a heavy pan. Place over low heat and stir constantly until all ingredients are melted and smooth. Add cereal and stir until all cereal is coated with peanut butter mixture. Remove from heat and turn mixture into 2 greased pans 11x9x1 1/2 inches. Press into even layer. Melt chocolate bits in top of double boiler. Spread half of chocolate over each pan of cookies and sprinkle tops with chopped peanuts and cereal. Cut into bars or squares.

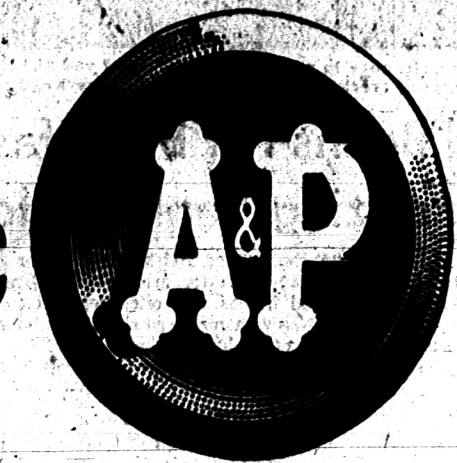

## Calls Racial Intolerance A U.S. Plague

CHARLESTON (AP)—Politicking of 100 years ago pushed the current election campaign some what into the background today as Charleston commemorated its Lincoln-Douglas debate.

There was speaking today, as there was five score years ago when Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglas brought their battle for a U. S. Senate seat to this southeastern Illinois city in the fourth of their famous series of seven debates.

As on Sept. 18, 1858, the scene today was the fairgrounds at the west edge of town.

In a prepared speech, Gov. William G. Stratton condemned racial intolerance as a plague. "Privately and publicly we suffer from this illness, this sickness. We are ashamed by it and ashamed of it, like the loathsome disease," Stratton said.

"Yet we know we have it, and the real tragedy is that men of good will in our country today have been unable to come to grips with this situation and wipe this sickness from our hearts."

THE GOVERNOR also described racial intolerance as a moral problem that put our prestige as a nation at stake.

Stratton was one of three Republican speakers. Others were Everett M. Dickson and Rep. William L. Springer of Illinois' 22nd Congressional District. Only Springer is campaigning for office this year, his reelection challenged by Dr. Carlton H. Myers of Gifford.

Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.), in prepared remarks, denied Stephen Douglas was an apologist for slavery.

"Instead Stephen Douglas was a passionate American patriot," Douglas declared.

Douglas, the only Democrat programmed for major speech, said Stephen Douglas was intent upon keeping the union from disbanding in 1858 and tried to effect this by political compromise.

The Charleston centenary observance launched by the fairgrounds program will continue more than three weeks, until Oct. 11.

During the gala period there will be a city square flower show, train and historic home tour in Charleston and Coles County, dancing Friday night in city square, slide and folk dancing, musical and dramatic programs.

FISH AND POTATO CHOWDER

Ingredients: 1 pound fish fillets (such as haddock), 3 cups boiling water, 2 cups diced (1/2-inch) pared potatoes, 1 teaspoon (about) salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 4 slices bacon, 2 cups milk.

Method: Place whole fillets in large (at least 3-quart) kettle with boiling water, potatoes, 1 teaspoon salt and pepper. Boil gently until potatoes are tender and fish loses its translucent look—15 to 20 minutes. Using long-handled fork, break up fillets into spoon-sized pieces. Meanwhile cook bacon in skillet until crisp; remove. Add oil to bacon fat and cook slowly, stirring often, until yellowed—about 10 minutes. Add onions (and any bacon fat in skillet) to chowder. Let simmer. Sauté milk and add. Reheat gently; do not boil. Add more salt if necessary. Crumble bacon into soup bowls and pour chowder over. Makes about 2 quarts.

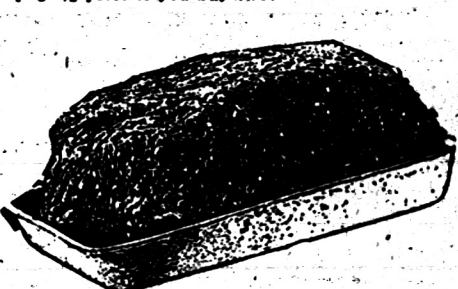

## Ham, Beef Back On Food Lists As Favorites

Ham will appear on many American dinner tables this week-end, judging by the specialty offered by the nation's supermarkets and neighborhood grocery stores.

Beef also will be a popular item. Besides cross rib roast, short ribs, rump roast and regular rib roast are among features cuts prominently displayed. Offerings of beef are somewhat scarcer than in the summer months, and leg of lamb also is the featured item infrequently.

Meat prices are up a little here, down a little there, with no clearly discernible trend anywhere. But it is a cost or two higher in some places. Eggs are up a few cents a dozen in some areas, but slightly lower in others.

ALTHOUGH SUPPLIES of fresh fruits and vegetables are getting a bit scarcer than a month ago, enough are in season to provide almost any shopper with one or two family favorites at bargain levels. When first frost comes, much of the local produce, things may be different.

Cabbage, potatoes, onions, beets, carrots, radishes, green onions and sweet potatoes are the best buys of the week, although cabbage is a shade higher than recent dirt-cheap levels. Good buys are available, too, from snap beans, cucumbers, sweet corn, spinach, squash (both yellow and green), brussels sprouts, cauliflower, broccoli and iceberg lettuce.

Apples are getting an early start at the head of the best buy list. The most recent Department of Agriculture forecast estimated the crop would run 5 percent above last year's and 15 percent above the 10-year average. Peaches still are cheap, although the quality sometimes is irregular this late in the season.
