**Frigid Weather  
Covers East,  
Spreads To Dixie**

Carolinas, Virginia  
Covered By Snow;  
5 Die In Norfolk

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS  
Dixie shivered with the rest of the Eastern half of the nation today as snow and freezing cold spread across the Southland.  
It was freezing in northern Florida. And it wasn't so hot in the southern section as temperatures dropped into the low 30s during the early morning.  
Snow piled up to a foot and higher in parts of the Carolinas and Virginia.  
Twenty-four hour accumulations of snow ranged this morning from 16 inches at Elizabeth City, N. C., to 5 inches at Quantico Point, R.I., and Nantucket, Mass.  
The morning's cold extreme was 27 degrees below zero at Presque Isle, Maine.  
Driving conditions in the snow-stricken Southern areas were reported hazardous.  
Schools were ordered closed in more than a score of Virginia communities. Five persons, including four children, died in fires in the 20s in parts of Georgia and near freezing in sections of Mississippi and Alabama.  
Although no snow was reported in other Southern states, it was cold. Temperatures were in the 20s in parts of Georgia and near freezing in sections of Mississippi and Alabama.  
The cold air embraced most areas from Montana eastward to the Atlantic Coast.  
The Weather Bureau didn't see much hope for immediate relief from the cold weather.  
In the east, freezing temperatures and lower were reported from Virginia into New England. It was below zero in parts of northern New England.  
In snow-covered Oswego, N.Y., residents almost could look back on it all today. The worst snow storm in the history of this city of 23,000 by Lake Ontario appeared to be over. A bright sun broke through Thursday and a heavy snow was in sight today.  
But maintenance crews had a great deal of work remaining from the storm which began on Wednesday.  
A snowstorm moved into southern New England today but wasn't expected to be as bad as first predicted.  
The Weather Bureau said the vigorous coastal storm which buried parts of the South with snow is moving too rapidly out to sea to give New England much of a storm.  
But bitter cold tonight was expected to follow.

**Stalled School  
Bus Struck  
By Train, 2 Die**

ESSEX, Ont. (AP) — A Detroit-bound passenger train speeding 80 m.p.h. through morning fog sliced the rear end off a school bus stalled at a grade crossing near here today and killed two boys on the bus.  
The driver and eight children aboard the St. Ignace school bus of Holy Name Catholic Parish in Essex escaped with relatively minor injuries. Only two were kept in hospitals after first aid treatment.  
The dead boys were Paul Bosse, 11, and David Purvis, 8, who had been riding on the back seat of the bus.  
The train was the New York Central's crack Detroit, 30 minutes late on its run from New York to Detroit. Engineer Louis Jago of St. Thomas, Ont., told provincial police he was running about 80 m.p.h. with his headlights light shining and his horn blowing.  
HE SAID HE saw the bus moving across the tracks and applied his brakes, but the bus stalled.  
Albert Stock, 45, the bus driver, said it was foggy and his windows were frosted over. When I saw the train I put the brakes on, but it seemed as though they wouldn't hold and I started to slide. When I realized what was happening I gunned her and the motor cut out on me.  
Stock said only the rear three feet of the bus hung over the double-track unguarded crossing.  
Stock suffered multiple bruises. Raymond King, 13, was hospitalized in Windsor with a possible fractured leg. Also hospitalized in Windsor was Candace Kasko. She had undetermined injuries. The crash is a steeply inclined on both sides and was ice-coated this morning.

**Another Near Zero  
Night Predicted**

Kankakeans, already shivering under several sub-zero blows this week, had better get ready for another. Old Man Winter plans to push the mercury to near zero again tonight.  
Thursday night's low was a frigid -5. The high Thursday was a balmy 23 as reported at the Kankakee County Weather station.  
In downtown Kankakee the low was one below zero at 7 o'clock this morning. Thursday's high was also 23. A year ago today the high was 22 and the low was 21.  
Forecasters said there's a chance for some further snow tonight and Saturday, but no heavy accumulation appeared likely.  
THE ILLINOIS Highway Division reported today that a few scattered spots of packed snow and ice still remain in the northwestern part of the state. Highways in all other parts of the state were clear.  
The U. S. Weather Bureau reported a 110 degree difference between the highest reported temperature Thursday—87 degrees at Burbank and Santa Maria, Calif.—and today's lowest reading, 23 below zero at LaCrosse, Wis.  
Even the five day forecast doesn't offer much relief. Temperatures will average 8 to 14 degrees below the normal high of 31 to 38 and low of 21 to 24.  
Temperatures are expected to moderate somewhat Monday or Tuesday.

**Reds Seek Summit Talks,  
Won't Discuss Berlin, Unity**

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union put in another bid Thursday night for a summit meeting on causes of international tension. It included the Berlin situation but ruled out discussion of German reunification.  
The statement from the official news agency Tass also warned that any Western use of force to maintain access to Berlin would be met by Soviet force and would touch off a nuclear war.  
SOME WESTERN officials have proposed that Berlin be discussed only in connection with the German unification problem. Tass renewed the K-remlin stand against discussing ripened questions of German reunification, Berlin and international tension.  
The Communists contend that German unification should be negotiated by the East and West German governments, meeting as equals.  
Preliminary negotiations, for a summit conference broke down last June when the Kremlin published secret minutes of meetings in Moscow. The West was insisting on searching talks at a lower level to insure likelihood of agreement before the heads of government met.

**4 Balloonists Take Off  
In Atlantic Flight**

SANTA CRUZ DE TENERIFE, Canary Islands (AP) — A small balloon took off early today with four daring Britons aboard in an attempt to cross the Atlantic.  
The balloon — The Small World — carries a crew of four — Arnold Beaupre, Eilonart, a British businessman who is expedition leader, and two pilots, Timothy, a Cambridge student and radioman; Colin Muelie, pilot, and his wife Rosemary, copilot, photographer and cook.  
The destination is Barbados, in the British West Indies, 3,000 miles away.  
HILDAAT EXPECTS the crossing to take from 10 days to three weeks but the party has concentrated food for three months. If successful it will be the first free-balloon crossing of the Atlantic.  
Under the patronage of Prince Philip, husband of Britain's Queen Elizabeth II, the flight is to study weather conditions and wind currents.  
The balloon is 46 feet in diameter, 19 1/2 feet long and 7 1/2 feet wide, which serves as a gondola for the crew or as a lifeboat should the balloon be forced down.  
The crew plans to drift along at about 1,000 feet, sitting fast to face, two abreast in the gondola.  
A series of vases on opposite sides of the gondola to guide the craft are operated by seas or pedals.

**Secretary, Ike  
Confer Before  
Europe Flight**

Hopes To Iron Out  
Differences Between  
W. Germans, Britain

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles confer today on efforts to obtain solid Allied unity in the face of mounting Soviet pressures against West Berlin.  
Their afternoon conference was scheduled between Dulles' discharge from the hospital and his takeoff for a series of conferences starting next week in the French capital.  
Dulles plans to fly directly to Paris aboard Eisenhower's plane Columbine III, arriving at noon local time Saturday.  
IN ADDITION to State Department aides and Mrs. Dulles, the Columbine's passenger list includes Col. Benjamin Sullivan, an Army physician.  
Lincoln White, State Department press officer, said Dulles appears to be "sufficiently recovered and everyone feels he can take the trip without danger to his health."  
White said under questioning that Dulles never before has taken a doctor along "but his extensive travels."

Dulles has been in Walter Reed Hospital since last Friday undergoing treatment for diverticulitis, an intestinal inflammation.  
His chief task at Paris so far as the Berlin issue is concerned apparently will be to try to reach an understanding between the West and Germany.  
The two powers differ on the kind of reply which should be made to the recent Soviet proposal to convert West Berlin into a free city and end the Western occupation there.  
Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of West Germany has taken the position that the Berlin issue should be disposed of before any new proposals on Germany are made to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev. Some diplomats say that Adenauer wants the Western powers simply to reject Khrushchev's proposal.  
BRITISH Prime Minister Harold Macmillan is expected to arrive in West Berlin on Saturday.

**Batista Wins Full  
Emergency Rule**

HAVANA (AP) — Cuba is under a state of national emergency again today, giving President Fulgencio Batista even more sweeping powers to combat the rebellion led by Fidel Castro.  
The Senate approved a government bill Thursday night establishing a state of emergency for 45 days.  
Under the state of emergency Batista can decree any measures he deems necessary to deal with Castro's rebellion. The last such period, lasting 90 days, ended in July.

He crawled up the tree with hooks and ropes. Down he came with the cat eight minutes later.


## UPI Editors Rate Integration Top Story

NEW YORK (UPI)—The continuing struggle over the racial integration of schools was chosen by editors of United Press International today as the biggest news story of 1958.  
They noted that the battle was waged all the way from the Supreme Court of the United States to remote hamlets in the South. Integration confronted the American people with one of the most acute sociological problems since the days of reconstruction.  
The other nine top stories picked by the editors:  
1. AMERICAN AND RUSSIAN probes into outer space, bringing within the range of possibility interplanetary travel by human beings.  
2. The Democratic victory at the November polls, giving the party the biggest congressional majority since the high tide of the New Deal.  
3. Anglo-American intervention in Lebanon and Jordan.  
4. The resignation of Sherman Adams and the indictment of Bernard Goldfine on charges of contempt of Congress.  
5. The death of Pope Pius XII and the election of John XXIII.  
6. The economic upturn in the United States.  
7. The Red government's consolidation of its rule over the Chinese mainland, and the bombardment of Quemoy. It was year

8. THE CHICAGO school fire.  
9. The stabbing of Johnny Stompanato by Lana Turner's daughter.

J.; Pasternak rejects the Nobel Prize; Alaska wins statehood; the Springfield, N. S. mine disaster; plane collision over Nevada kills 48; death of Mike Todd in an airplane crash.

## Successful Kidney Transplant Makes This Happiest Christmas

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. — Christmas this year should be the nicest of all for the Mercurian twins Bill and Danny Sam.

The reason for this happy outlook is that the 27-year-old brothers are in good health although they have only one kidney. And, actually, both of them belong to Sam.

It happened this way:

Bill was gravely ill from diseased kidneys. His doctors told him he had only a chance in five would be to take one of Sam's kidneys and transfer it to him. Then, if the kidney functioned properly, another operation would be made to remove his bad kidneys.

Sam was happy to help his brother, whom he had seen waste away gradually.

"I'll do the best I can do," he said.

A YEAR AGO today the first operation was performed at *Virginia Medical College in Richmond*. It was a success and Sam's kidney is working fine.

For the more serious surgery —

This time was successful, although the medical authorities said it was the first time they had accomplished this with only one operation.

Bill, too, regained normal health. He is now at *McGill University* studying for a master's degree in accounting and management at *Ohio State University*.

Danny Sam, 26, gave up a career in the *U.S. Forest Service* to return here with his family.

The twins also have something in common — a mother named Helen. Bill has two young sons, Kathy, 3, and David, 4. Sam has a 2-year-old son, Danny.

A family reunion was held at the Christmas celebration at Bill's home.

"We are really looking forward to another Christmas," Bill said. "and we are more than thankful for the many kindnesses during our period of trouble, especially by the people of Richmond."

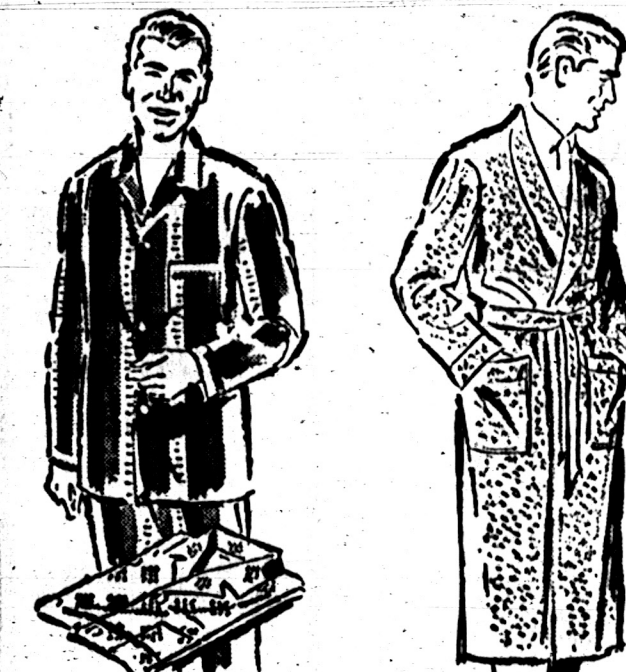





## Urges State School Tuition Fee Increase

CHICAGO (AP) — Increased tuition fees at the state's universities was proposed today by a spokesman for the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce.

David C. Hanna, manager of the chamber's education department, also endorsed a recommendation by the Illinois Commission on Higher Education for stricter entrance requirements.

Hanna presented the chamber's views at a meeting of the commission.

"Universities should raise resident tuition and fees gradually to a level approximately equal to the fourth of the annual cost of education to the institution," he said.

OF ILLINOIS universities, he said, only Eastern Illinois collects total fees which exceed the average of 20.4 per cent of cost which is the average of 28 schools covered by a chamber survey.

A 25 per cent tuition-fee rate, he said, would boost fees received annually by the state's six universities by more than 3 million dollars.

Hanna said the survey showed that first year dropouts are heavier in Illinois universities and colleges than the average for comparable institutions elsewhere.

In the 1957-58 school year, he said, 20 per cent of all freshmen enrolled did not return for the second semester. The survey average was 17.7 per cent.

"Illinois institutions are not using as strict entrance requirements and are faced with heavier dropouts than other comparable state institutions," Hanna said.

## Orders Parents To Whip 6 Boys Involved In Hoax

PETERSBURG, Va. (AP) — Juvenile Court Judge Benjamin Campbell has ordered whippings for six youngsters who perpetrated a bomb hoax at Bolling Junior High School.

Campbell said parents of the boys, ranging in age from 13 to 15, should carry out the whippings at home. But "they will have to prove that the whippings were satisfactorily carried out," the judge said.

He also ordered Thursday that the parents help pay for the trouble caused by the youngsters' prank.

Bolling Junior High was closed Dec. 2 after the bomb scare report was received.

Authorities withheld the youngsters' names.

## Vote To Place A & P Stocks On New Exchange

NEW YORK (AP) — Stockholders of Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. today voted in favor of a plan which eventually will put the company's new common stock on the New York Stock Exchange.

First preferred stockholders voted 224,584 shares in favor of the plan and 2,802 shares against. All the common shares totaling 1,150,000 were voted in favor of the plan.

The proposal approved earlier by directors eliminates preferred and nonvoting stock and substitutes a single class of voting common.

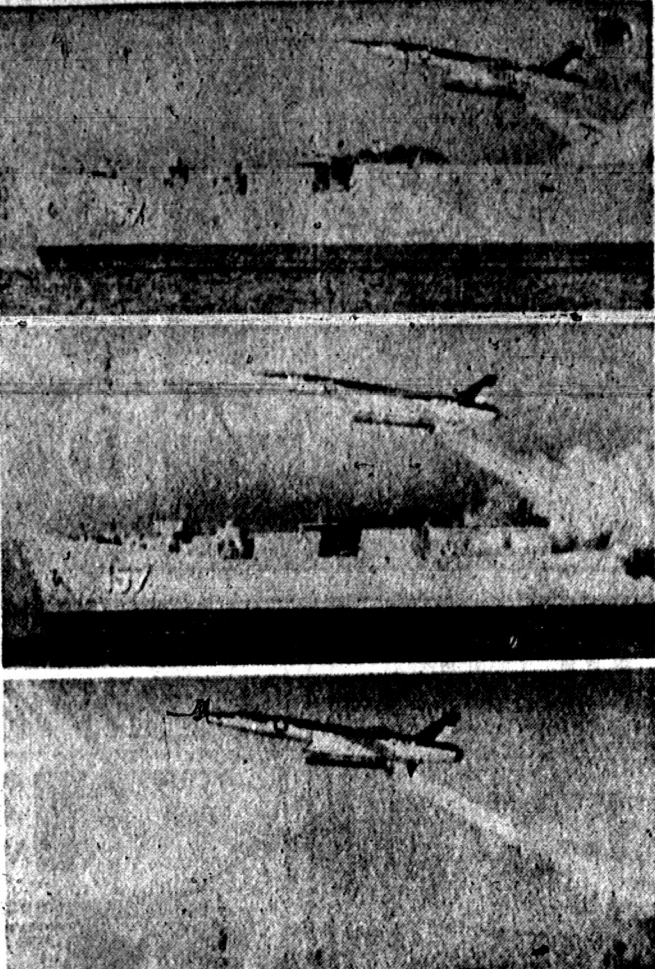
The first public stockholders meeting in the company's 99-year history got under way with about 150 shareholders present.

## District 4 Road Projects To Top \$25 Million In '59

PEORIA (UPI)—Gov. Stratton today announced the 1959 highway program for District 4 will top 25 million dollars.

The biggest project—estimated cost \$9,267,000—involves work on Interstate 74 in Peoria and Tazewell counties.

This money was included in the \$15,350,000 which Stratton said would go for interstate highways in the district. He said \$11,898,000 was for other primary but non-interstate projects.

DISTRICT 4 INCLUDES the counties of Mercer, Warren, Henderson, McDonough, Hancock, Fulton, Knox, Stark, Peoria and Tazewell.

The entire interstate program for the district lists right-of-way acquisitions along about 32.2 miles of roads. Also listed was construction of 3 interchanges, 13 grade separations, 2 bridges, 6.5 miles of four or more lane divided pavement, and other construction.

Projects in the non-interstate program included an interchange, 11 bridges, and road work including 49.5 miles of new construction and 11.8 miles of widening and resurfacing. Night-of-way acquisition, future construction and miscellaneous construction also were included.

On the Interstate 74 project, Stratton said "We expect to complete the construction of the interstate highway from Columbia Terrace, in Peoria, to Morton" in 1959. This will include six grade separations, three interchanges, a bridge and 6.5 miles of four lane pavement.

Other major projects, listed by county, included: Peoria: Reconstruction of U.S. 24 from Glasgow Junction to Kingston Mines to complete improvement from Peoria to Canton. Cost \$484,000. Improvement of U.S. 150 to provide four lanes from Glen Oak Avenue and Adams Street. Cost \$172,000.

TAZEVELL: Four lanes of U.S. 116 from East Peoria to a point near the Spring Bay Road and grade separations with FA 172 to be extended east towards Washington. Cost \$1,801,000. FA 172 project calling for initial step to provide a connection from North Peoria to east via Washington and Eureka by improving three miles of new highway east of Ill. 118 and McCullage bridge. Cost \$410,000. Ill. 9 project calling for improvement of Court Street from Eighth Street to the easterly limits of Pekin, providing four lanes. Cost \$400,000. Improvement of Ill. 9 between Bloomington and Pekin. Cost \$400,000. Knox: U.S. 150 and Ill. 78 project which calls for 3.21 miles of

improvements on Henderson Street, Monmouth Boulevard and East Main Street in Galesburg, including four laning and resurfacing. Cost \$1,023,000. Four laning of U.S. 150 from the North Galesburg limits to Lake Storey, about 2.8 miles. Cost \$606,000.

Woodford: Improvements of U.S. 24 and U.S. 150. Total cost \$340,000.

McDonough: Widening and resurfacing of U.S. 150, including widening of two bridges. Cost \$679,000.

Hancock: Improvement of SR 9. Cost \$500,000.

Mercer: Reconstruction of curves and narrow bridges on Ill. 94. Cost \$270,000.

Stark: New concrete paving on 5.71 miles of Ill. 78. Cost \$950,000.

Fulton: Modernization of Ill. 78 between Farmington and Norris. Cost \$455,000.

## Sees \$285 Million Boost In Illinois School Operating Cost In 2 Years

CHICAGO (AP)—The cost of operating Illinois' public schools will go up 10 per cent, or 285 million dollars, in the next two years, says a report to the School Problems Commission.

That would bring the total cost of operating Illinois' public schools to \$1,646,000,000.

State Sen. George E. Drach (R-Springfield), chairman of the commission's revenue committee, made the report Thursday. He said the figures cover only the cost of providing services for an enrollment expected to increase 100,000 in the biennium. The report does not include construction costs, he said.

### Population Soars

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Census Bureau Thursday estimated the nation's population at 175,356,000 as of Nov. 1—an increase of 2,854,000, or 1.7 per cent, compared to Nov. 1, 1957.

These other possible sources of revenue:

A 1 per cent corporation tax; a 1 per cent personal income tax; a 5 per cent oil and coal severance tax; a 5 per cent hotel and motel tax; a state property tax of 30 cents per \$100 valuation; and a commodity futures tax of 3 cents per \$100 valuation.

THE COMMITTEE estimated that a 1 per cent personal income tax would bring 180 million dollars in annual revenue.

The commission took the report under study.

In other action, the full commission recommended state aid for junior colleges remain at the present \$200 yearly per pupil level. But it added that aid should be extended to students enrolled in the junior colleges' television and summer school programs.

It also recommended a 10 million dollar state grant to local school districts for building schools. In addition to elementary schools, this would include high schools for the first time.

### Note Aftershock

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A mild aftershock of an earthquake that jolted the San Francisco Bay area was recorded Thursday afternoon on the University of California seismograph. The quake measured 3.0 on the Richter scale of 10, compared to an intensity of between 4.75 and 5.0 recorded for the big one that roused thousands of persons at 1:55 a.m.

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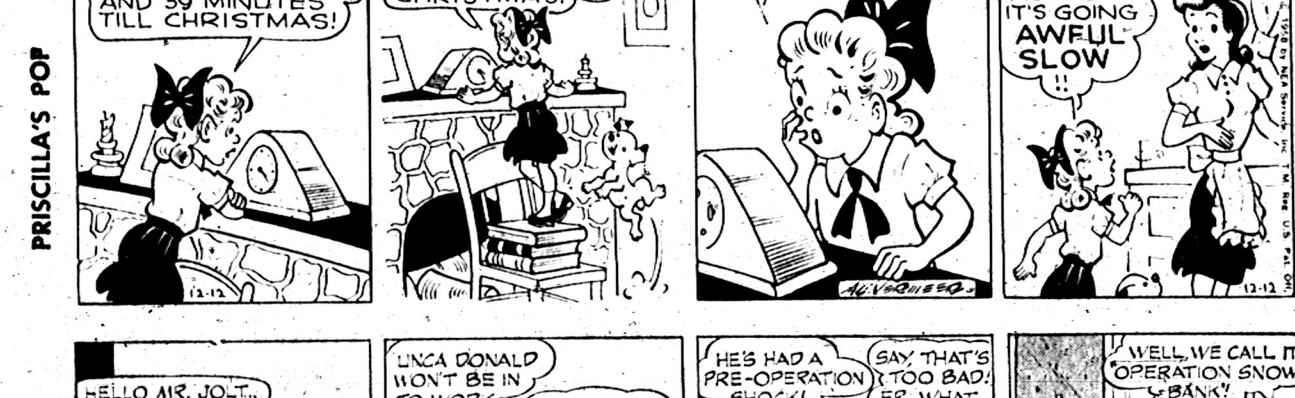
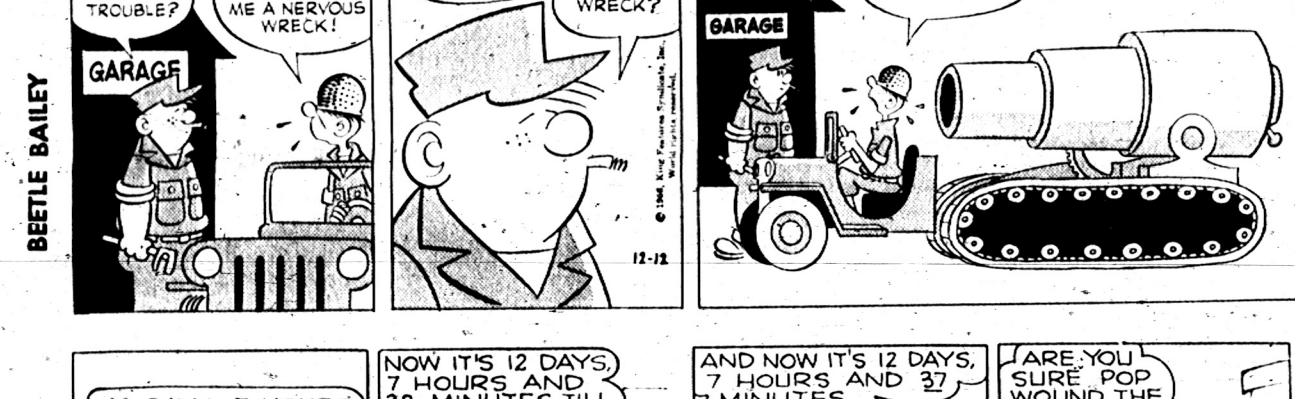
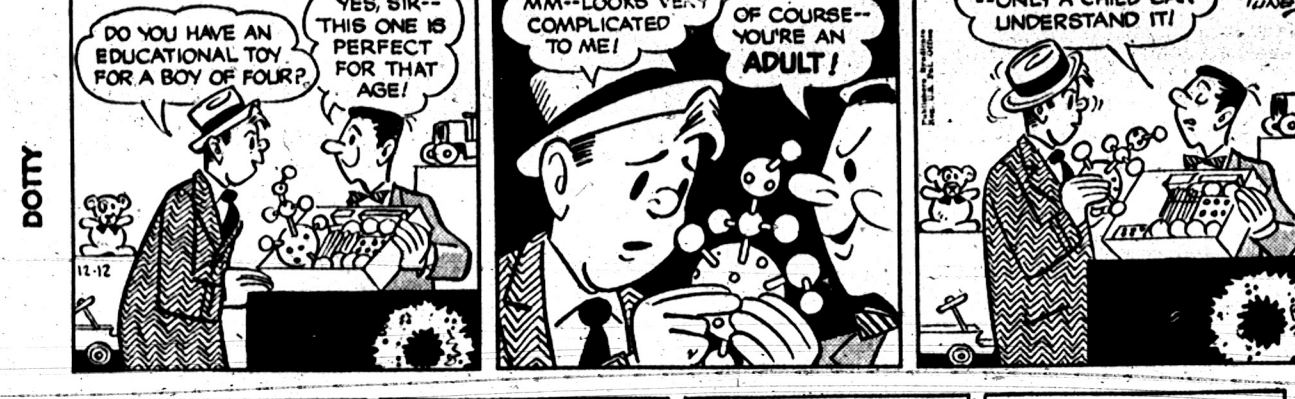
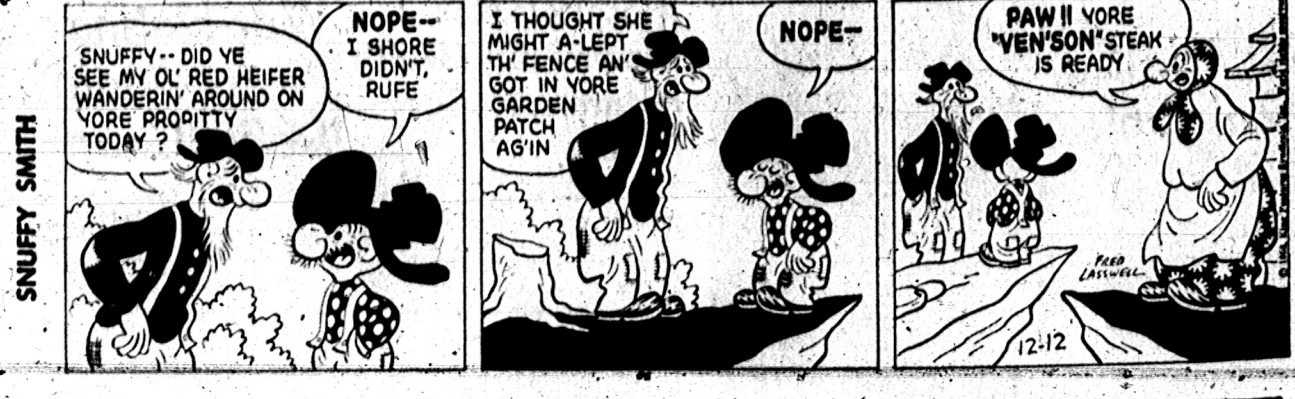
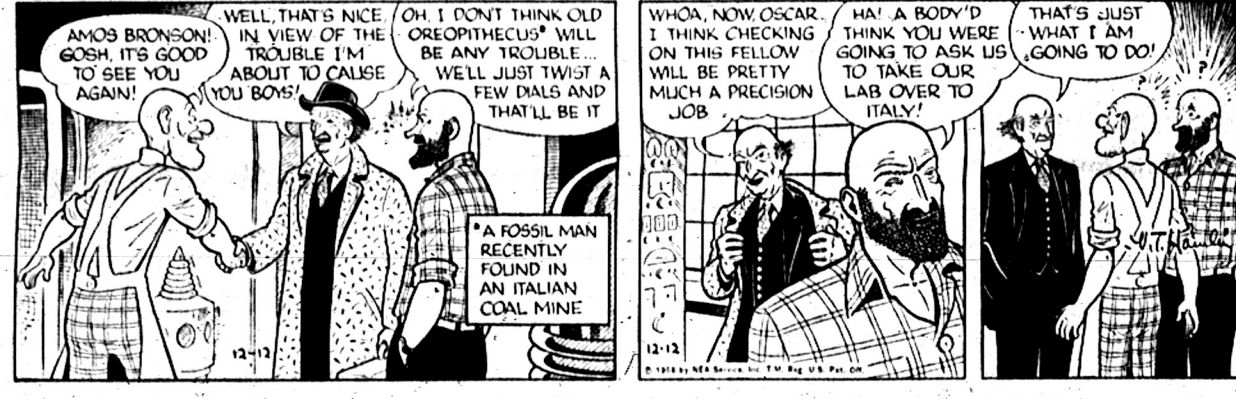












## Calls Priests 'Abominable Snowmen'

REGENSBURG, Germany (UPI)—A German missionary back from 13 years in Tibet reports the "abominable snowmen" of the Himalayas are really native priests living in the icy wilderness of nearly inaccessible mountain ranges.

The missionary, the Rev. Franz Eichinger, reported he had photographed one of the priests. The picture was published today in the official organ of the Roman Catholic episcopate of Regensburg, which said it was the first authentic photograph of an abominable snowman.

The newspaper, the Regensburg or Bismarck (Regensburg Diocese Newspaper) published Father Eichinger's story of his meeting with one of the priests nine years ago on a trip through a desolate mountain range. The heading on the story was "meeting with the snowman of the Himalayas."

Father Eichinger described the priest as a primitive human being living in the nude in the subzero temperatures and wearing a crude breech cloth only when he approached travelers.

"In a way which we cannot understand, they are immune from the influences of nature and the needs of human life," Father Eichinger said.

Father Eichinger, now attached to the Steyl mission seminary at Ingolstadt, Germany, was traveling somewhere in Germany today and could not be reached to comment further on the "snowman."

The picture published by the paper showed the "snowman" in a jacket with wild hair and eyes closed—but no doubt, a human.

## Stratton Opens Bridge Over Illinois River At Peoria

PEORIA (UPI)—Gov. Stratton today dedicated the new \$45,363 Murray M. Baker bridge over the Illinois River between Peoria and East Peoria.

Taking part in the ribbon cutting ceremonies with Stratton was a Peoria philanthropist for whom the span was named.

The western terminus of the bridge leads into downtown Peoria and local civic leaders have hailed the span as a "new East-West gateway to a vast midwest empire."

The bridge is 3,216 feet and 11 inches long, with a roadway width of 36 feet. Its construction required 3,388 tons of steel.

The bridge is part of the interstate highway program. The development also includes the "Illinois Expressway" part of Interstate Route 74 which eventually will stretch from Cincinnati, Ohio, to the Rock Island-Moline area.

Work on the highway is now under way. It will cost a total of \$7,500,000 on the eastern side of the river and \$3,000,000 on the Peoria or western side.

On the east it will connect with Ill. 87 and U.S. 150.

## 2 Officials Resign To Escape Testifying In Civil Rights Case

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—A federal versus state power clash loomed today on the federal court's demand that an Alabama judge and five voter registrars show their records to the U. S. Civil Rights Commission.

After District Court orders were issued Thursday, rapid-fire developments indicated further possible difficulty for the year-old federal agency probing complaints of discrimination against Negro voters.

Macon County Registrars E. P. Livingston and Grady Rogers, two of the five who silently defied the commission at its first hearing Monday and Tuesday, resigned on grounds they were being intimidated.

They said they would obey orders to appear at a second hearing here before the six-man commission or a subcommittee Dec. 15.

## Galesburg Water Main Break Causes Crisis

GALESBURG (UPI)—Galesburg kept a close eye on its dwindling water supply today during a state of emergency created by a break in the city's central water main.

The 36-inch pipeline cracked open Thursday night near the West Main St. pumping station, cascading freezing water into the streets. Cause of the break was not immediately known.

City Manager Ray Harbaugh proclaimed a state of emergency and urged careful conservation of water during the two days he estimated it would take to mend the damage.

The city's five-million-gallon water reservoir is currently being repaired, and a second major pipe in the city's water system, the Mississippi River, is untested.

With the reservoir shut down, Galesburg's 30,000 residents have been getting water from three deep wells with three booster pumps propelling the flow into fountains.

The break in the water main reduced water pressure from 40 to 50 pounds to seven.

## Ranch Foreman, Tired Of Working, Kills Self, Son Dies

MILTON-FREEWATER, Ore. (AP)—After placing two notes in front of the house, Alvin C. Gentry phoned police. Come quickly, he said.

Then the 54-year-old ranch foreman went into the basement and all the lid of a can. It contained cyanide and broken arm. Scherrer is a real estate broker.

Police arrived a few minutes later and saw a scribbled sign on the porch that said "Keep out—poison gas." They sniffed, and then shouted.

Ralph Lee Gentry, 19, and his sister Nina, 16, and Delores Ann, 12, dashed out of the house. Police told them it was filling up with gas.

Officers were able to restrain the girls, but Ralph dashed back to rescue his father. He collapsed and died at the bottom of the stairs, near his father's body.

Later Thursday, police read the notes on a stake on the front lawn.

One said to contact Gentry's wife, who was away at work. It said: "Better get her before she gets in this house or she will get it too. Poison gas in this house, burning time of working and fighting for a living."

## \$175,000 Blaze Razes Warehouse

CHICAGO (AP)—Flames destroyed a refrigerating firm warehouse west of the Chicago River early today. Total damage was estimated at \$175,000.

Firemen used trucks and fireboats to bring the fire under control. No one was injured.

Russell Geaslen, president of Trif Products Co., which rents a warehouse, said about \$125,000 worth of merchandise was destroyed. He set damage to the building at \$50,000.

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## 2 Ill Guests Mar President's Party

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The illness and sudden departure of two guests marred President and Mrs. Eisenhower's million-dollar state dinner at the White House Thursday night.

Mrs. Howard E. Simpson, wife of the president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, suffered a minor heart ailment shortly after the oyster course.

Port, R.I., resident Mrs. Harold Tinsley was escorted from her seat in the state dining room, reportedly suffering from a virus "bug."

One of President Eisenhower's heart doctors, Brig. Gen. Thomas W. Mattingly, also a dinner guest, attended to Mrs. Simpson. Mattingly told reporters Mrs. Simpson's trouble was a "very rapid" heart beat which had occurred frequently in the past and was more annoying for her than serious.

THE PRESIDENT's personal physician, Dr. Howard Snyder was summoned from his apartment to attend Mrs. Simpson.

Both departures were so unobtrusive that few of the 78 dinner guests and none of the some 200 others invited to the post-dinner musicale noticed that anything was amiss.

The Eisenhower's earlier had been disappointed by the illness caused absences of two main honor guests at their dinner honoring the Supreme Court, first affair of this year's White House social season. Chief Justice Earl Warren is confined to his apartment with a virus and Associate Justice Felix Frankfurter was unable to attend because of a recently suffered heart disturbance.

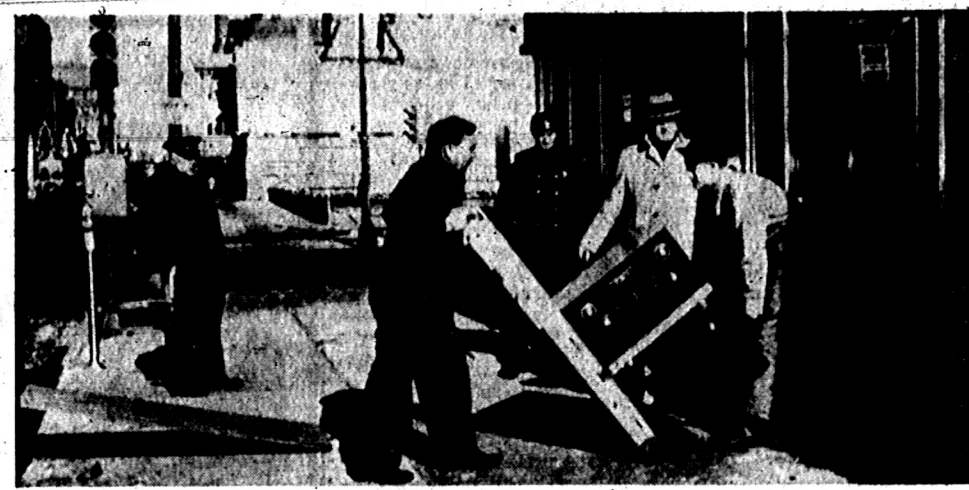

Henry Outlines 10-Year Needs For UOI

EAST ST. LOUIS (AP)—University of Illinois president David D. Henry Saturday outlined the university's needs for the next 10 years and termed the need for increasing faculty salaries "the key concern" of the university.

Henry listed the university's basic financial requirements for the 1950-51 decade as \$18,834,000 dollars and said "this could be doubled."

He said this figure includes only the minimum needs, the critical requirements of the fact there are other pressing demands for state funds.

The educator told a group of Illinois newspaper editors that sizeable salary hikes are required in the next four bienniums to bring faculty salaries in line with comparable salaries in other universities.

"The most serious problem facing higher education in the next decade," Henry said, "is recruiting enough personnel to staff classes for twice the present enrollment."

He said the university's building fund request for the 1950-51 biennium is \$54,879,000, including \$35 million for the new graduate division expansion in Chicago and \$19,879,000 for the Chicago-Urbana campus, 10 million for the undergraduate division in Chicago and \$19,879,000 for the Chicago-Urbana campus.

For the 1961-63 biennium the building request will be \$68,949,000, including \$35 million for the new graduate division expansion in Chicago, \$19,879,000 for the Chicago-Urbana campus and \$14,000,000 for the Chicago-Urbana campus.

For the 1964-66 biennium the building request will be \$83,019,000, including \$35 million for the new graduate division expansion in Chicago, \$19,879,000 for the Chicago-Urbana campus and \$28,141,000 for the Chicago-Urbana campus.

## Cold Sticks With Us; It's Worse In South!

As far as the weather is concerned, things may get worse before they get better.

The Weather Bureau said it would be cold and cloudy in Kankakee today and that some snow was likely. After a high of 15 during the day, skies were expected to clear tonight and force the temperature down to zero to 10 below.

The outlook for Monday was partly cloudy and continued cold. After hitting six degrees below zero in downtown Kankakee about 7 a.m. Saturday the mercury began climbing and reached a high of 10 degrees in mid-afternoon. Then the temperature headed down again. At 8 p.m. it was four degrees above zero at Kankakee police headquarters.

MEANWHILE, SNOW AND COLD spread across the South. The snow pattern stretched from Texas and Oklahoma eastward to Georgia. It was expected to extend northward toward Virginia and the middle section of the Atlantic coast during the night.

The snowfall measured 10 inches in Pine Bluff, Ark., 5 in Helena, Ark., 4 in Clarksville, Miss., 3 in Memphis, Tenn., and Tupelo, Miss.

A dozen deaths in Dixie were attributed to the weather. Included were nine in North Carolina, and one each in Texas, Arkansas and South Carolina.

More snow hit storm-plagued Oswego, N. Y. Three inches of new snow fell early in the day. From 5 to 10 inches of new snow was predicted.

The morning storm raised the month's total snowfall to 80 inches, including 69 inches in the last week.

## French, Rebel Peace Talks Asked By U. N.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The U. N. Political Committee approved a resolution late Saturday urging France and the Algerian rebel government to negotiate a settlement of the four-year-old war in North Africa.

The resolution appeared headed for rejection in the 82-nation General Assembly because of failure to win the necessary two-thirds majority.

The vote in the committee was 32 to 18 with 70 abstentions. The United States and Britain voted in favor of the resolution, and its entire Soviet bloc voted yes.

The assembly was set to consider the resolution at a night session Saturday. It was expected to be adopted by a two-thirds majority.

In addition to being unable to reach any decision, the assembly was expected to be adjourned for the 1958 session over the future of Algeria, U. N. diplomats failed to break the East-West deadlock on other issues.

REPRESENTATIVES of the Asian-African countries pleaded in vain for enough support to assure Assembly approval of the resolution. France boycotted the debate.

## Russians Send New Warning To NATO Lands

Polite Note Again Asks West To Get Out Of Berlin

PARIS (UPI)—Russia Saturday renewed its ultimatum to the Western Allies to get out of Berlin in notes timed to coincide with the gathering of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and other NATO foreign ministers in Paris for a conference on the crisis.

Authoritative Western sources said the note repeated, in somewhat pointed language, the Soviet demand made last Thanksgiving Day that the United States, Britain and France withdraw from West Berlin and that the Western sectors of the city be turned into a "demilitarized free zone."

In Berlin Saturday, East German Communist party officials hinted the Reds would speed up their campaign to oust the Allies.

The Russian note was handed by the Soviet Foreign Office in Moscow to the ambassadors of all NATO nations. According to authoritative sources the Russian note:

REPEATED THAT the Western half of Berlin must be turned into a "free city."

Retorted earlier proposals for a non-aggression pact between the NATO and Communist Warsaw Pact nations.

Called on the West again to accept the plan of Polish Foreign Minister Adam Rapacki for a "nuclear-free" zone across Central Europe.

Proposed reduction of military forces by East and West.

Renewed Soviet proposals for an East-West nuclear test ban, agreement.

Warned again of the dangers of rearming West Germany, particularly with U. S. missiles.

Dulles and the other ministers who will attend the three-day NATO ministers' conference in Paris Tuesday were studying the new Russian note.

Dulles appeared relaxed and rested. There was nothing to indicate he had spent several days in a hospital earlier this week with an abdominal ailment.

## Milwaukee Man Saves 6 Children

MILWAUKEE (AP)—A 39-year-old man rescued six children, including a 3-month-old baby from their burning home Saturday night.

Rescued were Rosemary Hollo-way, 8, twins Ruby and Royce, 3, and a baby, Vincente, children of Mr. and Mrs. Franchine Hollo-way. The parents were not home.

Their 9-year-old son, Herbert Green, carried the infant and herded the other children out of the house ahead of him.

Battalion Fire Chief Edward Canavan said the blaze started in a first floor room, apparently from a defective oil space heater which overflowed.

THE VICTIMS were Mrs. Lois Pendergast, 37, and her children: David, 9; Thomas, 6; Diane, 4½; and Allen, 2½.

Investigators said it appeared that Mrs. Pendergast had been killed first. Her body, with bullet wounds in the left temple and bullet, lay in a hallway of the two-bedroom house in this San Diego suburb.

Police said the two smallest youngsters were killed in the bathroom. They theorized the slayer then waited until David and Thomas arrived home from school.

David's body was on a bed in the front bedroom. Thomas' in the adjoining garage where officers said he apparently had fled.

Pendergast said she found Harrison waiting for him outside the house when he got home from work Friday night. The youth had just been ordered to stop at a service station rest room so they could trade clothing. ## Youth Turns On Good Samaritan, Sought After Slaying Family Of 5

EL CAJON, Calif. (AP)—Aroused by five ruthless slayings, police pressed a door-to-door manhunt Saturday for a teenager accused of wiping out a Good Samaritan's family.

"I was trying to salvage a soul," sobbed the sole family survivor, Thomas J. Pendergast.

The 39-year-old aircraft worker found the slashed bodies of his wife and four young children in their modest home Friday night. All their throats had been cut; the mother had been shot, as well.

Authorities, fearful the killer might strike again, sent officers from house to house through the east San Diego section. They peered inside each dwelling and asked the occupants if everything was all right.

Then late Saturday the British ham reported he had received the "all well" report.

## Survives Test Only To Fall Into Atlantic

One-Pound Gordo Sinks In Nose Cone Of Jupiter Missile

WASHINGTON (AP)—A miniature monkey rode a rocket to the fringes of space Saturday, blazing a trail for man to follow.

He is missing and is presumed to have given his life to science. The tiny, one-pound monkey, Gordo, survived a meteor-like ascent to about 300 miles above the earth but disappeared in the ocean when a technical mishap prevented the recovery of the nose cone of an Army Jupiter missile.

The nose cone in which Gordo rode splashed into the Atlantic about 1,500 miles from the launching point at Cape Canaveral, Fla. The previously proved method for recovering a cone before it sinks failed this time.

The Army announced six hours later it had given up the search for the monkey's little space ship. For about 15 minutes an automatic radio transmitter which was linked to microphones, thermometers, and other equipment sent back data on how Gordo was doing in the nose cone.

In general, the radioed data showed only minor changes. In Gordo's physical condition as the Jupiter roared away from earth and arched over beyond the atmosphere.

His heart beat stepped up slightly as the pull of gravity multiplied in the first phase of flight but remained generally normal thereafter.

For about eight minutes, while the rocket was out beyond the atmosphere and curving along an arc which counteracted gravity, Gordo went through an experience that will come to man in space.
