FRANCE URGES SPAIN TO SURRENDER

TEACHERS OF COUNTY FORM ASSOCIATION

Head of Mommence Schools Elected President

The Kankakee County Education association, composed of school teachers of the county, was formed in yesterday's teachers' institute in the high school auditorium.

The teachers approved the organization and a committee-prepared constitution by a vote of 321 to 12.

J. B. Stout, superintendent of schools at Mommence, was elected president, representing the administrative group of teachers. Clarence O'Connor, principal of Mommence elementary school, was made vice president, representing the elementary group, and Mrs. Reba Schriener of Kankakee, of the rural teachers group, was elected secretary. The county superintendent of schools is treasurer.

Seminary Choir
One of the principal features of the all-day program was the appearance of the speech choir of St. Joseph seminary of Kankakee, directed by Phyllis Palmer, a student, and taught by Mrs. McNeerney O'Brien.

Organized last year, the choir normally has 50 voices but illness reduced yesterday's white-robed group to 26.

During the morning session of the institute there was a concert by the Kankakee high school band, directed by George Piersol.

Other entertainment features were two dramatic sketches by Agnes Mathis Cherry of Western Springs, Ill., sister of Mrs. Victor Boudreau of Kankakee.

"Applesauce" Good
The current use by young people of the euphemistic "applesauce" is a good sign, according to Judge Fred C. Bale of Columbus, O., chautauqua and lyceum lecturer, former college teacher and former juvenile court judge who was one of the speakers.

The word, he said, indicates a critical mind in the young generation but, he added, youth needs education in the proper values of the skepticism.

"It is one thing to be critical of the wolves who are ever ready to take advantage of the sheep," he said, "but it is quite another thing to be skeptical of established teachings, such as those of the bible," he said.

"When we educate the minds of youth but not their character," he continued, "it is like putting high-powered rifles in the hands of young savages."

Woman Dies in Fight at Manteno Hospital

In a violent struggle between four women this morning at Manteno state hospital, one died.

The dead woman is Florence McNeal, 35, colored, committed to the institution from Robbins, in Cook county, described as a "quarrelsome" patient.

Coroner A. E. Keger, who conducted a preliminary investigation, was told that she attacked Miss Cecile Mullinix and Miss Carrie Masala, nurses in Cullen ward, No. 2.

She was getting the best of them, it was said, and they called for help. Jeanette Arnold, 30, white patient from Champaign, came to their assistance.

She, an unusually strong woman weighing 265 pounds, grappled with the colored woman, struck her on the head with her fist, knocked her down and sat on her.

After the fight was over, it was thought that the colored woman was only unconscious. Examination revealed, however, that she was dead.

Coroner Keger ordered an autopsy to determine whether the colored woman died from being struck in the head or from the effects of being sat upon.

He will conduct the inquest at the hospital Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

LABOR CHIEFS URGED BY FDR TO MAKE PEACE

Asked To Name Committee to Negotiate Terms

Miami, Fla., Feb. 25.—(P)—President Roosevelt, in letters today to the heads of the country's rival labor organizations, said labor "faces a challenge in finding itself divided into opposing camps" and called upon them to name a committee to negotiate peace.

In letters to John L. Lewis, chairman of the congress of industrial organizations, and William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, identical except for the final paragraph, he declared the American people "sincerely hope that a constructive negotiated peace with honor may come about between the A. F. of L. and the C. I. O. within the early months of the new year."

Desire For Unification
"The secretary of labor," he added in the letters made public at the temporary White House here, "tells me that after careful investigation and prolonged conversations with respective leaders in both groups there appear to be no insurmountable obstacles to peace and that in fact there is a real and honorable desire for unification in the labor movement among all parties concerned."

The President was still at sea aboard the cruiser Houston when his letters, making a dramatic plea for labor peace, were given out by acting Secretary William Hassett.

In asking the C. I. O. and A. F. of L. at loggerheads nearly three years over the organization of labor by industry and by craft, to appoint committees to negotiate "terms of peace," Mr. Roosevelt based his request on four grounds:

First, because it is right.

Second, because responsible officers in both groups "seem to me to be ready and capable of making a negotiated and just peace."

UNION PACIFIC TRAIN WRECKED INJURING MANY

Keels Over 20-Foot Embankment in Wyoming

Laramie, Wyo., Feb. 25.—(P)—Injured when five cars of the Union Pacific "Pony Express" passenger train "keeled over" a 20-foot embankment in southern Wyoming, 13 persons were under treatment today at a hospital here and five others were in Hawkins, Wyo., hospital.

Three persons were able to leave the Laramie hospital after receiving first aid.

W. W. Jaeger, one of several insurance executives bound for the Golden Gate Exposition at San Francisco, said his fellow passengers "kept heads pretty well" when the cars jumped the track and overturned near Bosler, Wyo., at 10 p. m. last night.

Jaeger said he and his wife were sound asleep in their berth but awoke when they felt "the bumping of the wheels over the ties."

"There was a smash; a crash and I sensed the car sailing through the air," Jaeger said. "Then the car keeled over on its side and came to rest."

Fog Hampers Rescue
There was little screaming or other confusion among the passengers, Jaeger related after he and his wife were brought to the hospital here. Bosler is 17 miles north of Laramie.

Ambulance drivers were impeded by a blinding fog while driving to the scene of the wreck, where the injured were swaddled in blankets against the zero cold.

Dr. E. W. Dekay, Laramie physician, said he had to kick out a window before he could enter one of the pullmans and start boosting out the injured passengers. He cut one of his legs on the broken window glass.

Aiding four Laramie doctors was Dr. J. R. Nilsson of Omaha, chief surgeon for the Union Pacific. N. A. Williams, general manager at Omaha for the Union Pacific, also was here to superintend clearing of the wreckage.

None of the injured, with the possible exception of a Negro porter, was believed injured dangerously.

Hazing Stunt at Peotone is Cause of Suit

Joliet, Ill., Feb. 25.—(P)—A suit asking \$10,000 for injuries allegedly suffered during a fraternity hazing stunt was filed in circuit court yesterday on behalf of Kenneth Lott, 15, of Beecher, Ill.

The complaint charged that Lott was taken into a woods by six students of the Peotone high school and hazed. He suffered a fractured skull, the bill charged.

Named defendants in the action were Orville Stadt, Meredith Reich, Elmer Beske and Richard Boethe, all of Beecher.

The boys were fined \$50 and costs each by Justice William E. Meade last June for their participation in the initiation stunts. The fines were remitted after they paid costs of \$9.50 each.

Attorney Francis J. Loughran filed the suit.

Priest Attempts to End Strike of Miners in a Pit

Hazleton, Pa., Feb. 25.—(P)—A parish priest took a leading part today in renewed attempts to end an underground strike of Wolfe Collieries company miners who have been "holed up" in a pit at nearby Onondaga for four days, demanding wages they claim overdue.

The priest, the Rev. Joseph Baran, who once went down into the mine to plead with the men to come out, helped arrange a conference between a committee representing the strikers and Hugh V. Brown, district president of the United Mine Workers, to discuss the situation.

Brown has declared the strike was "unauthorized."

Five miners have been brought to the surface for treatment since the strike began, but 56 remained in the mine on levels 250 and 500 feet below the surface. Nick Sengy, president of the union local, said they were determined to stay there and "fight for their rights."

They are demanding payment of \$28,000 in wages, they claim have been due since 1937, payment in cash of current wages due February 20, and a twice-a-month pay schedule.

Mrs. Harrell Guilty of Manslaughter in Shooting Principal

Marion, Ind., Feb. 25.—(P)—Mrs. Rilla Harrell, 44, was convicted today of first-degree manslaughter in the fatal shooting of Paul Bartholomew, 37, Lagro high school principal and coach.

The jury of 10 men and two women returned the verdict after 15 hours' deliberation.

The verdict carries a prison sentence of two to 21 years. Sentencing of Mrs. Harrell was deferred until next week at the request of her counsel.

Mrs. Harrell, who was tried on a murder charge, was outwardly unmoved by the verdict.

Bartholomew, one-armed, was shot fatally November 12 while in Mrs. Harrell's home at Lagro.

The prosecution charged the woman shot Bartholomew because of jealousy over the principal's reported engagement to Miss Marguerite Gillespie, Lagro school teacher.

The defense maintained Bartholomew was intoxicated and that the shooting was accidental.

German Plane With Ten Passengers is in Mediterranean

Berlin, Feb. 25.—(P)—Lufthansa, German aviation company, announced today a plane carrying 10 passengers and a crewman was lost yesterday somewhere in the Mediterranean.

The plane was on a special flight from Germany. The company said it had not determined exactly where the plane went down.

Mystery surrounded disappearance of the plane, which apparently belonged to the military air force.

Neither its destination nor its passengers' names were divulged by the air ministry.

Lufthansa, Germany's only commercial airline, said the plane was not its property.

Asks \$50,000 for Crash at Reddick

As the result of a train-auto accident last July 22 near Reddick, a suit for \$50,000 damages has been filed for the superior court in Chicago against the Wabash railway.

The suit is by Joseph Robbins who says he was badly injured when the car in which he was riding was struck by a train. He claims there was no warning of the train at the highway 17 crossing.

Snowstorm On Its Way Northward

Chicago, Feb. 25.—(P)—A snowstorm moving up from the southwest to the Ohio valley and lower Great Lakes states today brought one of the winter's heaviest snowfalls to southern Illinois.

Four inches were deposited at Centralia, Ill., heaviest there this season, and it was still snowing today. There were five inches at St. Louis, Mo., and across the Mississippi river in Illinois. Springfield, Ill., had one inch.

Forecasters H. A. Downs said that the storm area centered over eastern Texas this morning moving northeastward. There were showers and thunderstorms in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and in the Mississippi valley; light snow in Oklahoma and Kansas; heavier snow in Missouri, where one traffic death was blamed on the storm, and in southern Illinois and Indiana.

Downs said Chicago would get "several inches" of snow by tonight and that there would be snow in eastern Wisconsin, lower Michigan and Ohio as the disturbance moved eastward.

He added that this time there was no severe cold expected in the wake of the storm, since it was moderately warm in the northern plains and northwestern states.

Wausau, Wis., was the coldest point on the weather map, reporting a minimum of 18 below zero. Other Wisconsin minima ranged from four below at Green Bay and from four below at Milwaukee.

La Crosse to six above at Milwaukee. Temperatures in the 20s were reported generally in Illinois and Indiana. Cairo, Ill., however, had 32. Chicago had a minimum of 18 above.

Downs predicted rising temperatures tonight or tomorrow throughout the north central states.

Illinois state highway officials ordered out snow plows in the Decatur area, where an inch and a half of snow had fallen and was continuing. The highway department reported heavier snow south of Decatur, three inches at Pana, and lighter snow north of Decatur.

CLEAR WAY FOR RECOGNITION OF FRANCO MONDAY

Loyalist Government Fighting a "Losing Battle"

Paris, Feb. 25.—(P)—France and Britain were making a supreme effort today to restore peace to Spain and clear the way for their formal recognition Monday of the Spanish nationalist regime.

Premier Daladier, who informed the French chamber of deputies yesterday of his intention to recognize Nationalist Generalissimo Franco and won a vote of confidence on that proposal, notified the Spanish republican government that France was abandoning it.

Diplomatic sources said the French government, in this final message to Madrid, urged the government of Premier Juan Negrin to give up its "losing" battle.

Sign Three Accords
French press reports from Burgos said French and Spanish representatives, Senator Leon Berard and Foreign Minister Count Francisco Gomez Jordana, had signed three accords concluding negotiations preparatory to French recognition of the nationalists.

The exact nature of the three documents was not made known but it was said they dealt with problems on which recognition hinged.

Well-informed diplomatic quarters expected quick government collapse. Their belief apparently was based in part on reports that General Jose Mija, commander-in-chief in government Spain, had received a French ultimatum from Madrid.

General Mija had given up his dominant role in the defense forces and possibly had been superseded as commander.

In London, officials said Generalissimo Francisco Franco had stated the principles by which nationalists would be guided in administering justice in areas still government-held.

Although Franco was said to have persisted in his demand for the government's unconditional surrender, it was believed he had given assurances of his intention to set up a government for all Spain and restore the country to normal.

Grundy County Slayer is Returned to Morris

Morris, Ill., Feb. 25.—(UP)—Abner Nelson forgave his slayer as he lay dying of bullet wounds received from the gun of his "best friend," Elvin Wood.

This disclosure was made today by State's Attorney S. J. Holderman, who prepared to attend the funeral of one lifelong friend and to prosecute another for murder.

Wood, who confessed he shot and killed Nelson, a wealthy bachelor farmer, in a scheme to collect ransom, was returned to the Grundy county jail last night from Joliet.

He greeted Holderman, a friend and lodge brother of both himself and Nelson, with an informal, "Hello Jim."

"Hello Elvin," the prosecutor answered in a strained voice and explained he wanted a full story of the killing. He talked with Wood in his office at the courthouse for more than an hour.

Holderman said Wood confessed he had been guided by the kidnap slaying of Charles Ross, Chicago greeting card manufacturer, in making his plans to kill Nelson and obtain money to meet farm debts.

The slayer said he had gone to Nelson's house last Sunday night and made plans to drive to town. Nelson walked ahead to the automobile while Wood pulled his gun.

"Then I shot him," he said. Nelson fell in the driveway and pleaded for Wood to get help. As he lay dying, Wood told the state's attorney, he prayed and finally turned to his friend and said: "I forgive you."

Wood fired another shot into Nelson's head "to end his suffering" and then drove with the body to the Illinois river near Seneca and dumped it in the stream.

Funeral services were scheduled this afternoon for Nelson, whose body was recovered Tuesday.

Holderman said a special grand jury had been called to meet Tuesday and will hear evidence he submits against Wood.

Circuit Judge Frank Hayes summoned the grand jury to convene at 11 a. m. Tuesday.

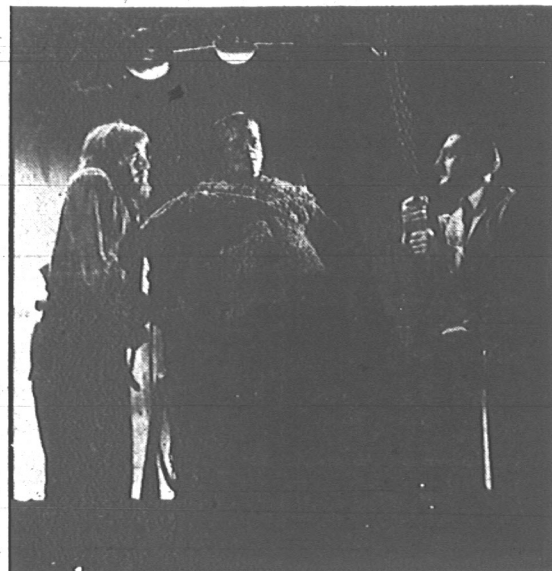

NAZI-HATERS ABROAD WILL BE IGNORED

Hitler and Goebbels
Acknowledge Anti-
Nazi Opposition

Berlin, Feb. 25.—P.—Chancellor Hitler and Propaganda Minister Goebbels have joined in acknowledging anti-Nazi opposition in Germany and attacking "German-haters" abroad.

"German-haters abroad and a small clique at home are seeking to drive a wedge between the people and the leadership," Goebbels declared.

"Even atheistic bolshevism fraternizes in this with the Catholic church because both are enemies of authoritarianism."

Threats, said Hitler, "will make no impression on us—should they ever bring the peoples to the madness of a war, we shall never capitulate. The year 1918 will never be repeated in German history."

Hitler declared: "A few opponents still remain, but they are dying out."

Attacks Democracies
Goebbels attacked democracies, Jews, Marxists and the church in an article in Hitler's newspaper Voelkischer Beobachter. Hitler spoke last night at the annual gathering in Munich of 1,300 of his oldest followers, observing the 19th anniversary of the formation of the Nazi party program.

"When a man started from this place (the Munich Hofbrau beer hall) 19 years ago with only a few dozen comrades around him to conquer the great reich, often faced by howling, hostile mobs, can you imagine for one moment such a man now holding power would quail before threats?" Hitler said. "I never was afraid of them and am not now."

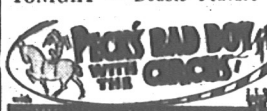
