McAdoo Dies Suddenly

William Gibbs McAdoo, former senator from California and one-time secretary of the treasury, died today of a heart attack. He was 77 years old. Death came about 10 a. m. (9 a. m. est.) in Garfield hospital. With him were Mrs. McAdoo, and his daughter, Mrs. Brice Claggett, wife of a Washington attorney. McAdoo has been chairman of the board of the American Presidents line since leaving the senate. McAdoo, who was secretary of the treasury during the world war, was named head of the shipping line shortly after he was defeated for renomination by Sheridan Downey in the 1938 California Democratic primary. Downey succeeded him in the senate.

## Germans Renew Bombardment Of Kentish Coast

The shelling started three hours before dawn in the area which would be the first objective of a German invasion attempt, and was continued sporadically at times with only a single gun apparently in action.

Paris, Ill., Feb. 1.—(UPI)—Oliver N. Wagoner, 80, long prominent in business and politics, committed suicide today by shooting himself in the head. He was a former treasurer of the Edgar county Democratic committee and was walking in the washroom of a hotel when he shot himself. He left a note addressed to his wife and a letter to his children. A coroner's inquest is being held to determine the cause of death. He had been suffering from financial reverses in recent years.

## Wegand Appeals To Troops To Support Petain

### "Stay Out Of War And Accept Armistice With Germany"

Algiers, French North Africa, Feb. 1.—(UPI)—General Maxime Wegand appealed today to some half-million French African soldiers under his command to stay out of the war, to accept the armistice with Germany as final, and to support the "national revolution" of Marshal Philippe Petain. "I appeal to you," he said, "not to leave the path of order and discipline, which would only mean the destruction of France and peril for all who take part in this undertaking."

Two suits for divorce were filed today in the office of Albert Tetrault, clerk of the circuit court, by Mrs. Juanita Hetherington and Mrs. Carrie M. Madison. Mrs. Hetherington seeks divorce from Harold Hetherington, whom she charges with excessive use of intoxicants. The complaint filed by Attorney John Holland says the couple was married at Cairo, Egypt, on May 26, 1914 and lived together until last Jan. 2. Mrs. Madison, formerly of Clifton, charges John T. Madison, now of Newton, Ill., with desertion. The couple was married at Lake City, Ia., Aug. 11, 1913 and lived together until Oct. 30, 1938. Her son is of age.

## Anson Weeks, Leader Of Famed Orchestra, Injured In A Crash

Marengo, Iowa, Feb. 1.—(UPI)—Orchestra leader Anson Weeks was injured seriously today when the bus in which he was riding with members of his orchestra crashed into a snow plow and skidded to a ditch a half mile south of here. Dr. C. Franklin Watts of Marengo said that Weeks, who was thrown clear of the bus from a front seat position, suffered "some" concussions and a severe left arm injury. The doctor said that both bones in Weeks' forearm were fractured and that he suffered a compound fracture of the upper left arm. The fingers on his left hand were severely lacerated. Dr. Watts said. The Weeks' bus was enroute to Chicago from Des Moines, where the orchestra played at a dance for the National Young Republican Federation's convention last night. Dr. Watts figured in the original crash and the Weeks' bus hit the wreckage and slid into the ditch. R. W. Anderson of Omaha, a driver of one of the trucks, was injured seriously and the driver of the Weeks' bus was injured slightly, Dr. Watts said.

## New York Importer Reports 10-Year-Old Son Disappeared

Los Angeles, Feb. 1.—(UPI)—The Los Angeles Examiner said today that Eugene Weiner, wealthy New York importer and estranged husband of actress Lillian Roth, had reported to police the disappearance of his 10-year-old son, Eugene Jr. The newspaper said Weiner had brought the boy from a military school to his apartment for the week-end and had tucked him in bed last night, only to find him gone a short time later. Weiner was quoted as saying that from the appearance of the room the boy had left willingly. Efforts to reach Weiner were unavailable early today. Police said they had no record of the case. Miss Roth, former wife of New York Municipal Judge Ben Shickel, sued recently for a divorce from Weiner, whom she married last year several weeks after charging him with assault, on a complaint that he struck her on the jaw at a New York night club. It was the third marriage for both Miss Roth and Weiner.

## Senator Wheeler Charges F.D.R. With Attempt To Discredit Him

Washington, Feb. 1.—(UPI)—Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) declared today that he did not say in 1934 or at any other time that Nazi domination of Europe was inevitable—a statement attributed to him yesterday by President Roosevelt. Wheeler, now recovering from influenza at the home of Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy in Florida, said in a statement issued through his office here that "this is a desperate attempt to discredit me because I stand unflinchingly for American peace and against the entry of the United States into any foreign war." "This slanderous attack on me—attributed to a dead man—is absolutely false," Wheeler said. "This is the second time that the president has assailed me personally. The first time occurred after I branded the lend-lease give bill as the New Deal's AAA foreign policy to plow every fourth American boy under European or African soil. 'This time I am attacked because, in my humble way, I will not cease warning the American people that the foreign policy of this administration is taking the United States into a war that is not ours.'"

The scout motto is "Be Prepared."

## Award Father \$2,500 For Death Of Son

Barney Gettelbach, Kankakee, today was awarded \$2,500 damages for the death of his son Joseph Vincent as the result of an auto-bicycle accident here in April of 1938. After a day and a half had been spent on the case in circuit court, the jury took it at 12:20 o'clock yesterday afternoon and signed a sealed verdict at 10:40 o'clock last night. The verdict, against Dennis M. Raiche, engaged in the plumbing and heating business, was opened by Circuit Judge Luther B. Bratton this morning. The accident occurred in the 100 block of West Court street at the alley between West and Washington avenues. In the accident was a bicyclist ridden by the Gettelbach boy and by Joseph Palermo, and an automobile driven by Raiche.

## Occupation Of Tepeleni By Greeks Awaited

### British Forces Rumble Along Coast Towards Bengasi, Italian Base

Alger, Feb. 1.—(UPI)—The entire Tepeleni area was reported under Greek control today with the actual occupation of the town only a question of mopping up isolated detachments. The high command said the Greeks had captured Italian machine gun positions of great importance, and Greek dispatches declared recent Fascist efforts to seize the offensive in Albania must now be regarded as failures. The Greeks also were reported to have made important gains both north of Elouira and in the coastal sector where counter-attacks were crushed with heavy losses to the Italians. The fighting in the central sector yesterday was described as one of the major battles since the outbreak of the conflict three months ago. The Greeks now dominate Tepeleni from three sides, dispatches from the front said, leaving only the road to Valona open to the Italians, who were said to be retreating in the direction of that seaport.

## Lease-Lend Bill Debate Opens In House Monday

Washington, Feb. 1.—(UPI)—Secretary Knox testified today he was "tremendously worried" over whether the United States could furnish sufficient aid in time to save Great Britain. Supporting the administration's aid-to-Britain legislation before the senate foreign relations committee, Knox was asked by Senator Nye (R-ND) whether the measure was designed to "underwrite a British victory."

Ron Henrekin, secretary of the Kankakee chamber of commerce and vice president of the Illinois Commercial Secretaries' Association, has been appointed chairman of the annual program committee for the annual meeting Feb. 21-22 in Starved Rock lodge near Ottawa. Twomey, Danville, commerce secretary; and James Cole, who holds similar position at Streator. The committee met last evening in the Hotel Kankakee to plan a program based on the theme "Gearing Our Communities For National Defense Expansion."

McAdoo Dies Suddenly

William Gibbs McAdoo, former senator from California and one-time secretary of the treasury, died today of a heart attack. He was 77 years old.

## Stricken During Night

The former senator was stricken during the night at his hotel apartment and was removed to Garfield hospital where he died. McAdoo was a colorful figure in Washington official and social circles for more than a quarter century. In 1935 at the age of 71, McAdoo was married to Miss Doris Cross, 26-year-old public health nurse. This was his third marriage. His first wife, Sarah Houston Fleming, died in 1912. She had borne him six children. Two years after her death he married Eleanor Randolph Wilson, daughter of President Woodrow Wilson, in whose cabinet he served as head of the treasury. Two daughters were born to them. Mrs. Eleanor Wilson McAdoo won an uncontested divorce in Los Angeles in 1931.

## Headed Steamship Line

McAdoo stepped from the senate to the chairmanship of the Dollar Steamship Line, Inc., which later was reorganized under government supervision into the American Pacific Lines. The common stock of the latter company is controlled by the maritime commission. His salary was \$25,000 a year. McAdoo led the stampede for Franklin D. Roosevelt during the 1932 Democratic national convention, when he announced that the Callaghan delegation would swing from John Nance Garner to Roosevelt. He first won national fame as the man who organized, financed and administered the company which built the first tunnels under the Hudson river. As secretary of the treasury he helped frame the federal reserve act. He was president of the National Association of Manufacturers. Notified of McAdoo's death, President Roosevelt said: "I am deeply shocked to learn of the sudden death today of one of my oldest friends, and one of the nation's great statesmen. Since 1912, it was only last Wednesday that he came to see me. I join with the entire country in mourning him as one who has."

## Crescent City Man Found Dead In Bed

Watseka, Feb. 1.—(RN Special)—Herman Tschentke Sr., 84, who lived alone at the south edge of Crescent City, was found dead in bed this morning by a neighbor. Gustav Pfingsten, the neighbor, missed Tschentke and went to his home about 8 a. m. At the inquiry conducted this morning by Coroner Verne K. Bussert of Sheldon, it was determined that death occurred three days previously. Heart disease was given as the cause of death. A son, Herman Jr., of Chicago was notified. The body is at the Segur funeral home. Arrangements have not been made.

## 890 Unemployed In Kankakee, U. S. Census Report Reveals
