Harvard's Historian Objects To Poverty Stories

Cambridge, Mass., Feb. 11.—Harvard's esteemed historian, Albert Bushnell Hart, declared today that the story of Abraham Lincoln's descent from poverty is a "poor white."

"The closest I have come to great poverty in my life was when I was a boy of 11. He added in an interview on the eve of Lincoln's birthday anniversary that the story of Lincoln's descent from poverty is a "poor white."

"This family, during his childhood, was as well off as most southern white people of that time. It is an immense mistake to think that it did not come up to scratch. They lived as all their neighbors did."

"Recent researches that I have made show that Abraham Lincoln was a descendant of a Lincoln family which prospered for 100 years in a town in southwestern England."

Batavia Army Alert To Balk Fifth Column

Tricks And Disguises Tried On Troops In Practice

Batavia, Java, Feb. 11—(UP)—Netherlands East Indies soldiers maintain a night-and-day watch against fifth columnists as they guard a valuable storehouse of materials vital to a nation at war.

The watch is still largely in the drill stage, but not to the soldiers. They are not informed about the state of world affairs when they march from their barracks. They tramp to their posts with full cartridge belts and fixed bayonets with every intention of using both if necessary.

Realism is the keynote of the drills, even if they appear to take on comic opera aspects at times. A certain section of the Batavia militia may be told that 50 fifth columnists will try to enter the city on a prescribed date and on these occasions anything goes. The "fifth columnists" use disguises of all types and individual ingenuity is encouraged.

Various Ruses Practiced
Few "fifth columnists" get into Batavia during these drills. On one occasion, however, a policeman in uniform on a motorcycle appeared at the barriers. He was asked for his papers. Complaining that he had to be at headquarters at once, he pointed to his uniform and demanded to know if that was not proof enough. The guards let him by—and a "fifth columnist" entered the city.

Another group slipped by, posing as a Chinese funeral, corpse and all.

One of the most daring performances was by a man who decked himself in a judge's robe. He waved a greeting as he approached the barrier in a sedan and the guards let him pass without question.

When the pseudo judge reached Batavia, he decided to carry the farce further. He entered a court, mounted the bench and proceeded with the first case before he was exposed.

The successful disguises do not work more than once, for drill notes are compared and each succeeding practice cuts down the number who manage to slip past the barriers.

Bitter Lesson Learned
Dutch sentiment is best expressed by the motto across the facade of the department of war. It reads: "If peace is desired, prepare for war."

The Dutch learned a bitter lesson in Europe and are sparing no effort to prepare for any eventuality here.

Militia service, conscription of Europeans from Holland and regular recruiting are progressing. A modern, highly mobile army is being trained and the wheels of war production in ordnance and power factories at Bandung are turning at top speed.

An invader would have to face formidable Dutch naval forces. Since small, swift vessels are best adapted to defense of the Indies, a large number of motor torpedo boats have been added and are being built in the naval dockyards of Sourabaya.

The Dutch have a number of old cruisers, but these are used chiefly for training ships. They also have a number of modern British-type destroyers, 18 modern submarines, and at present are concentrating on building up the naval air arm. Present equipment consists chiefly of Dornier flying boats, but the Dutch hope to get a number

of the United States navy's new PBYS flying boats.

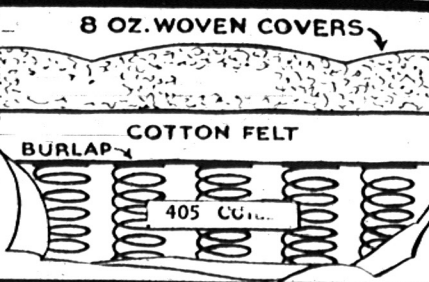

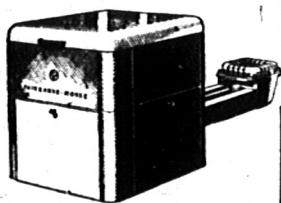
