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Vote Saturday On Rural School Bond Issue

Special Election On
\$30,000 Settlement
Of Tuition Fees

A special election for taxpayers of a non-high school district of Kankakee county, in which they will vote for or against a proposed \$30,000 bond issue to pay off the district's debts to various high schools of the county, will take place Saturday.

This election affects only that territory in which there are no high schools and does not affect taxpayers of the city of Kankakee in any way. The election was announced today by the non-high school board of education of Kankakee county.

The board is arranged for 30 voting places in non-high school territory.

Tuition charges. According to an explanation by Mr. Kankakee and the other members, non-high school districts are assessed tuition charges for the students who are sent to various high schools of the county from non-high school territory.

Unpaid tuition claims totaling \$103,988.66 have accumulated since 1935 for the reason that the maximum tax levies of the non-high school districts have not been sufficient to pay these claims, the non-high school board claims.

These claims can be reduced to judgments, according to Mr. Kankakee, and thereafter would be paid by the non-high school districts. Interest to add to the indebtedness against the taxpayers. Several of the high schools have already threatened to take action, it is stated.

Offer Settlement. However, according to Mr. Kankakee and the other board members, the various high schools have agreed to accept 75 percent of their claims as payment in full for immediate settlement. This would reduce the total of claims to \$28,000, a saving of \$125,000 to the taxpayers.

The actual saving to the taxpayers will be far more than \$125,000, states Mr. Kankakee. "If the bonds are authorized, the non-high school board of education will be able to recover from former non-high school territory, which has been annexed or organized into high school districts, a just proportion of the debt. Funds thus recovered will be used to retire the bonds."

The bond issue, if authorized, would be for seven years. Principal and interest would increase the tax levy, in non-high school territory only, about 12 or 14 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

The voting time for the 30 polling places, to be announced later, will be from noon Saturday to 7 p. m.

New York, April 8.—(UP)—All danger of the Brooklyn Dodgers getting into a rut passed today, and the news of each new quarrel on the club broadened the smiles of the fan of Flatbush.

For a few tense days this spring it seemed that the Dodgers were going to let the customers down and turn into a well behaved group of athletes, sending out waves of sweetness and light. It looked deceptively like Manager Leo Durocher and General Manager Larry MacPhail were going through spring training without a controversy, and Pitcher Van Mungo was so well behaved that there seemed only one chance in a million that he would fall against a door knob and come up with one of his classic shins.

But the dark days have passed. Robins wheeled and twittered. Ebbetts field today, sublime turned the sludgy Cowans canal into a shining river of optimism; the tough guys in Greenpoint slapped one another on the back without benefit of brass knucks.

Spring Mud Here
The Dodgers are fighting among themselves and spring has come to Brooklyn. No spring can be official across the Brooklyn bridge until Mungo has been pitched, killed and reinstated. That formality has been taken care of. The slugging fans would have been satisfied to open the season a week from today without any additional fireworks.

But, to behold, their cup of joy was filled to overflowing when they learned that Durocher and MacPhail were in controversy. Some of the more optimistic of the Flatbush fans even expressed a naive opinion that this year's team had a chance to equal the classic outfit that featured Babe Herman—only big league outfielder ever to be struck on the head by a ball while attempting to catch a pop fly and only man ever to steal second base while it was occupied by a teammate.

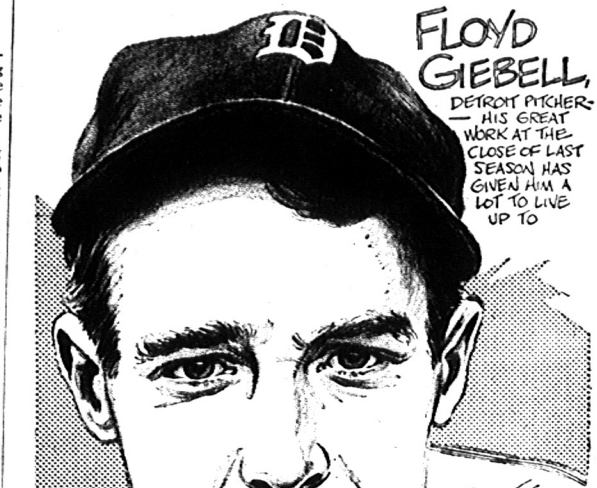

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Yugoslavians Claim Capture Of Scutari

Italians Claim Fighting Is Only Between Advance Forces

Bern, Switzerland, April 8.—(AP)—Advices received by the Yugoslav legation here said today that Yugoslav forces had captured Scutari, Albania.

Reports received by telephone from the Yugoslav government's new headquarters at Vranje in the Serbian mountain also said the Italian town of Zari, on the Dalmatian coast, had fallen to the Yugoslav army. Advices said Yugoslav troops were smashing further south into Albania after capturing Scutari in an apparent attempt to cooperate with the Greeks in squeezing the Italians out of Albania.

Trend of Operations
Rome, April 8.—(AP)—Italian troops in Albania have gone into action against the Yugoslav army, while other units have repulsed attacks by the Greeks and captured many prisoners, the Fascist high command reported today.

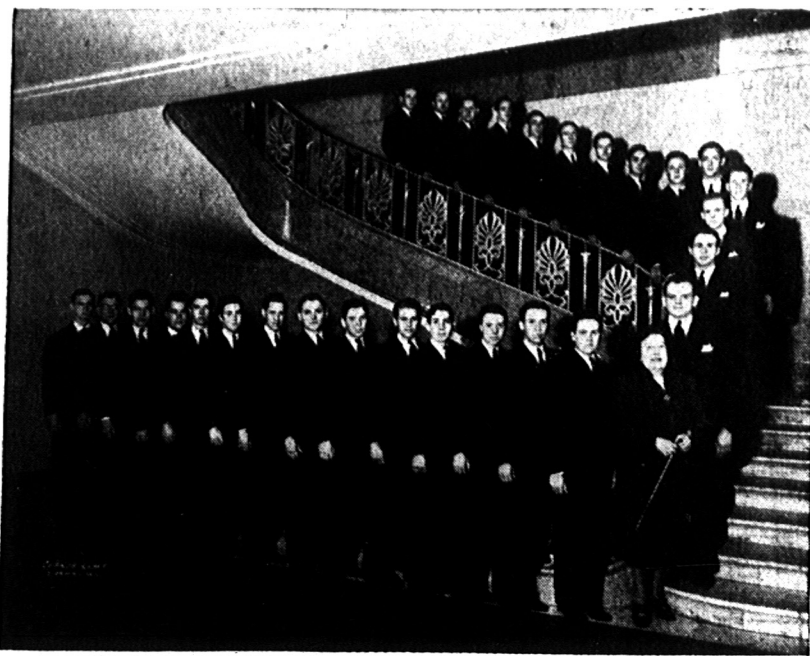
Fighting between Italians and Yugoslavs thus far has consisted of actions between advance elements, the daily war bulletin declared, but there was no indication of the trend of operations.

The Italians said they had repulsed local attacks by Greek troops in the ninth army sector and that their warplanes had heavily-bombed Greek positions.

The German airforce was credited with shooting down three "enemy" planes and destroying 17 on the ground in attacks on Yugoslav ammunition dumps and air bases Sunday.

The average weekly loss of shipping during March was placed by the admiralty at 98,000 tons.

Amended losses for the week ended March 2 listed 30 ships totaling 150,700 tons—the biggest loss of any week this year. For the week ended March 16 amended losses were given as 27 ships of 146,098 tons.
