Prepare for Major Battle In Greece

Five-Day Old Battle Of Balkans Nears Showdown
With Fears Of German Attack On Turkey Spreading

Athens, April 10.—(AP)—The Greek government today announced that it had been "found advisable" to transfer a considerable part of the army to the Balkans.

The announcement followed only a few hours after the Rome radio broadcast a report that Germany's foreign minister, Franz von Papen, announced that Turkey had reiterated the assurance that Germany has no intention of attacking Turkey.

It is less than 100 miles from the German-occupied Bulgaria to the Greek border.

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46 Will Leave Early Monday For Army Duty

Draftees From Rural Towns Of County To Board Train At 5:40

A list of 46 young men who will leave Monday for induction into the U. S. army for one year's duty was announced today by selective service board No. 2.

The board No. 1, the quota to be filled includes 47 men of the white race and five colored. This list was not ready for release today.

Secretary Vaughn McIntyre of board No. 2 announced that the re-check examination for a group of 22 other men will be held Thursday afternoon, April 17 at St. Mary's hospital.

The 46 from board 2 who will leave Monday for induction into the U. S. army for one year's duty was announced today by selective service board No. 2.

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Royal Air Force Drops Powerful Bombs On Berlin

Nazis Make Heavy Raid On British Midlands But Lose 10 Bombers

London, April 10.—(AP)—British air raiders dropped "powerful high explosive bombs" in the center of Berlin last night and started large fires, the air ministry announced today.

Overnight attacks also were made on an aluminum plant in Germany, occupied Norway and a radio station in Denmark, the British declared.

They acknowledged the loss of eight planes in these operations and in daylight assaults yesterday on Breslau and other targets, but declared that 11 German bombers were downed in heavy attacks last night on the English Midlands and North-east.

The Berlin radio, in a broadcast heard by NBC and CBS in New York, said the cities of Birmingham and Newcastle were the chief targets of the German air raiders.

Number of casualties acknowledged "a number" of persons were killed or injured in the Berlin raid but asserted 13 British warplanes had been shot down. They said the Berlin State opera and the Prussian State library were fired by incendiary bombs and reported two hospitals and apartment houses hit.

It was the first British raid on Berlin since March 23. An informed source said the attack was not comparable in size with Monday night's assault on Kiel.

Smaller forces of British night raiders were said to have struck at Emden and Vegesack, near Hanover.

Other German raiders fanned out over the west of England, the east and southeast coasts and other scattered sections. London had an alarm but there were no reports of bombs falling in the capital.

Rescue workers in the west Midlands town told amid a hail of bombs dropped by waves of raiders which kept up the assault for several hours. One Nazi plane shot down fell on a house, causing casualties.

"Complete Loss"—The gay State opera house on Unter den Linden, Berlin's downtown boulevard, was viewed as a complete loss today by firemen as a result of an attack on the German capital last night by British air raiders.

A dense cloud of smoke hung over the center of the city this morning, attracting hundreds of curious spectators, but the scene was roped off by hundreds of yards of big fire hoses criss-crossed the broad avenue.

It still was not established how many incendiaries had hit the state library opera house, which is one of Hitler's favorite theaters.

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Al Hattenburg's Efforts Successful

Span Over Illinois Central Tracks Will Be Built At No Cost To Taxpayers Of Kankakee

Mayor Albert F. Hattenburg announced today that after months of strenuous effort construction of a modern new viaduct over the Illinois Central railway on Court street is assured without any cost whatsoever to Kankakee taxpayers.

This badly needed improvement will be of great benefit to the entire city, but especially so to residents and property owners of the west side.

Mayor Hattenburg was much elated in being able to announce the new viaduct, since this has been a matter uppermost in his mind and a project which he considered vital to the continued development and prosperity of Kankakee.

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Acquisition Of Danish Cargo Ships Asked

U. S. Action Intended To Bolster British Convoys

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asked congress today for broad statutory authority to take over any "foreign owned vessels" lying idle in our ports.

This authority, he said in a message to the legislators, should be subject to the payment of just compensation.

Although the chief executive had asserted Tuesday that he would recommend legislation to permit the purchase or charter of 39 Danish vessels which have been taken into "protective custody" by the coast guard, the language of his message today was not limited to the Danish ships.

The president cited a provision of the merchant marine act of 1936 which authorizes him to requisition or purchase any American-owned vessels in time of national defense emergency or when national defense makes it advisable. The section provides for a method of compensation.

Ships in American ports include two German and 23 Italian cargo vessels which have been taken into custody on grounds of sabotage or attempted sabotage during and Rome protested the seizures.

Informed persons predicted congress would grant the requested authority and that soon thereafter the President would use the acquired ships in some form helpful to the British.

Mr. Roosevelt told his press conference Tuesday this government had the right to declare the 30 axis ships forfeited to the United States but could not turn them over to the British under such a procedure.

However, through the United States merchant marine might permit the release of some American vessels.

The legislation which Mr. Roosevelt proposed today apparently would establish the right to eminent domain even in days of limited emergency.

The President sent along with his message for the "possible assistance" of congress a draft of a resolution to accomplish the purpose he outlined. The resolution proposes use of some of the \$700,000,000 appropriation for aid to nations resisting aggression.

Meanwhile, negotiations were reported to be in progress for use of 11 small vessels flying the flags of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia.

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Loeb Slayer Denied Freedom By High Court

The high court held today that the Cook county circuit court did not err in prescribing the death penalty for the two men after they had pleaded guilty to the murder charge.

Riley and Watson were convicted of fatally shooting Policeman Alex Ferguson in a gun battle which resulted from a tavern holdup attempt in May, 1939. Another policeman was killed in the exchange of shots and a third officer wounded.

Killed in Prison

A Clean Home Seldom Burns

A clean home seldom burns. Fire Chief Roy Marquart reminded citizens of this fact today in urging that fire hazards be checked while spring housecleaning is under way.

He emphasized the importance of disposing of accumulated papers and rubbish in attics, cellars and yards and of keeping oily waste, paint, and saturated rags in metal containers with air-tight covers.

Residents can save themselves a lot of grief by checking over the heating plant as soon as they get the fire go out in the spring, according to the chief. Worn, rusted or broken parts should be replaced. Any part of the furnace that gets extra hot should not be near burnable material. It should be protected with sheet asbestos and metal with an air gap between the insulation and the material.

Explosive Fluids

Marquart asserted that it is never safe to use gasoline, benzene or naphtha for any cleaning since all these fluids vaporize quickly, forming an explosive mixture so that only a tiny spark or flame is required to set off a devastating explosion.

No Property Damage

He also has insisted that the vertical clearance of the new viaduct be kept as low as possible in keeping with the height of the train operation and the new structure will have the same level as the present one, thus eliminating any property damage or right-of-way expense.

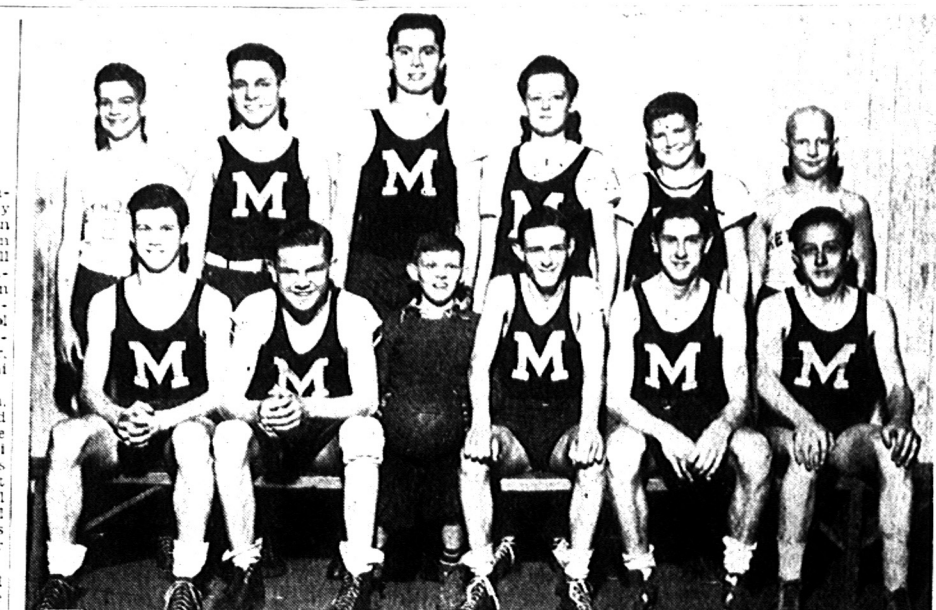

It is always heartening to me to hear from those who have written me before that the advice I offered them worked, rather than these parents had the stuff in themselves to carry out the advice. To quote from a few in today's mail:

"Dear Dr. Myers: I have written you before on several occasions about my eldest boy and am grateful to you for the help you gave me. He is now in the 8th grade and is getting marvelous marks and seems to be growing up. He will have these spells of temper I wrote you about but not so bad. Your suggestion of ignoring his rage works like a charm. Of course, as I wrote you before, I am not gifted with a great amount of patience, but I think I have improved."

Good Little Girl

"Dear Dr. Myers: I wrote you last summer concerning my 3-year-old daughter and her contrary ways. I teach piano in my home but you advised me to take a long, much-needed vacation."

"We considered your advice very good but impossible financially. My husband lost his position and I am paying all bills at present. However, each day I read your reply over and tried to follow the other instructions more attention to the child, more love, a calm manner and quiet voice. And most of all I tried to control myself and my nerves; to overlook trivial incidents and accidents as though they were nothing until I now have a lovable, willing, cooperative little girl of 3½."
