### Twin-Motored Bomber Missing With 7 Aboard

Four Western States  
Searched For Trace  
Of The Ship

McClure, Wash. Jan. 17.—Four twin-engine bombers were missing today in a search for a twin-engine bomber missing with seven men aboard.

The B-17 Douglas was bird-bombed yesterday on a training flight from the McClellan field base to the Mojave desert in southern California. The bomber was reported missing at 11 a. m. yesterday.

A patrol of men will start out over the desert today to search for the plane.

Look Off Thursday Noon  
It will be under favorable visibility conditions at 12:20 p. m. (est.) yesterday under orders to stop at Sacramento, Calif., an estimated four hours later. No radio report was received from the ship after 12:30 p. m.

A search was reported in the northern California Sierran region, but no commercial line was seen through the clouds.

Col. Walter Peck, announcing plans for an air search today, said the plane probably started by covering the region as far east as Bend, Ore., and south as far as Mount Shasta in California.

Colonel Peck said the plane might have been far enough to the south to get into Nevada.

One day of hope at the air base came from the experience of a bomber crash in southwestern Washington last year, when eight men parachuted to safety before the big ship crashed.

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The United States and Mexico, it was learned today, will open formal negotiations immediately after President Roosevelt's inauguration next week, with the objectives stronger bond of "good neighbor" friendship and close collaboration on international defense.

### Some Unusual Weather Over The Nation

Topsy-Turvy Situation  
Causes Mixup In Rain  
And Snow Precipitation

This doesn't look anything to do with the European war or national defense, but we thought you might be interested in knowing that this nation is having some unusual weather.

The weather map showed a topsy-turvy situation that brought rain in regions where there should be snow and warmer weather in sections where it should stay cold this time of year, and the U. S. weather bureau explained it all with one word—pressure.

First, there was a storm that had brought thunderstorms to Texas. Today this storm was moving northeastward up the Mississippi river valley, decreasing in intensity as it rolled along.

Meanwhile, a high pressure system moved out of Canada and spread southward over the plains region and Minnesota, bringing colder weather and forecasts of snow.

Mixed rain and snow fell in a wide band that extended from the Rocky mountain states and Oklahoma eastward to the Atlantic states. There was rain in Mississippi and Alabama and in the northwest Pacific states, too.

The weather bureau reported a high pressure area over California and Idaho, but along the northwest Pacific coast the pressure was comparatively low. Over New England, pressure continued high, but a disturbance has developed along the North Carolina coast.

Temperatures were rising in New England and the Great Lakes region and were dropping over the plains states, the Rocky mountain region and East Texas.

The shifting and conflicting pressure areas, the weather bureau predicted, will result in further muddling of the conditions with cloudy weather giving way to rain which in turn will yield to snow and then to cold over most sections of the country.

### See Swift Action On Request For 200 Cargo Ships

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Swift congressional action was expected today on President Roosevelt's request for "immediate" steps toward construction of 200 new cargo ships to protect the United States against a possible world shortage of such vessels.

Informal sources said a special joint resolution to provide \$313,500,000 for the work probably would be given a brief hearing before the house appropriations committee tomorrow and prepared for house consideration early next week.

In a special message to congress yesterday, the President said he was "convinced the national interests demands that immediate steps be taken upon an emergency to provide against the effect upon the United States of a possible world shortage of cargo vessels."

"There is," the chief executive wrote, "I feel that there should be undertaken with the least possible delay the construction of not less than 200 steel cargo vessels, suitable for use in the present emergency and of such type and design as will permit of their most rapid construction."

### Superintendent Of Schools In County Dies

Gilbert Willis, III  
2 Days Of Pneumonia,  
Succumbs At Mommence

Gilbert A. Willis, 54, county superintendent of schools, died this morning at his home in Mommence.

He had a severe cold for the past two weeks, which two days ago developed into pneumonia. His condition was not regarded as critical until this morning when his strength failed rapidly. Death took place at 11:06 o'clock.

The body is at the Canaday funeral home in Mommence. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

Mr. Willis is survived by a sister, Mrs. Raymond Krall, with whom he resided in Mommence, and a brother, Fred H. of Chicago. He had never married.

Elected In 1938  
His election to the office of county superintendent of schools took place in November of 1938 and he took office a year ago last Aug. 7. For the past several months he had been in poor health, although not seriously ill.

Even before he became county schools superintendent, Mr. Willis was one of the best known figures in the educational field of Kankakee county.

A lifelong resident of Mommence, he graduated from the schools here, then taught rural schools near Mommence and in Pembroke township, without leaving the national committee, in a talk at the Rotary club Thursday noon in the Hotel Kankakee.

### Cantania, Sicily Airdrome Raided By The British

Cairo, Egypt, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The British Royal Air force announced today another air raid on the airdrome at Cantania, Sicily, reported to be the base for German dive-bombers in the axis offensive against the British Mediterranean fleet.

Buildings and several aircraft were fired, the communique said. The raid was made Wednesday night.

A heavy explosion and a large fire were caused at the northwest hangar by the first aircraft over the target, the RAF reported.

"This fire burnt fiercely throughout the attack and was visible from over 50 miles away. It assisted following aircraft to identify the target."

### Greek Submarine Sunk By Italians

Rome, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The Italian high command reported today a submarine rammed and sunk by an Italian torpedo boat Dec. 29 had been identified as the Greek "Proteus" of French construction.

(The Proteus, a 235-foot, 770-ton submarine boat, was constructed at Nantes in Oct. 1937. Her normal complement was 41 men.)

### Daylight Attack On German Bases; Bristol Bombed

British Fliers Again  
Blast Base Of Nazi  
North Sea Fleet

London, Jan. 17.—(AP)—British bombers roared across the channel in brilliant sunlight today and the rumble of heavy explosions along the German-held French coast indicated an intense bombing attack from the Calais area to Boulogne.

The daylight foray followed the second successive night of heavy raids on Wilhelmshaven, Germany's great North sea naval base. A communique said the RAF also had smashed at the German port of Emden, the Belgian port of Ostend and at Calais and Boulogne overnight.

The attack on Wilhelmshaven, carried out despite "severe fog conditions and electrical storms," was on a smaller scale than the raid the night before, but achieved "highly successful results," the communique said.

It acknowledged that five British planes had not returned. The RAF's daylight bombers streaked across the channel without fighter escorts but at great height.

Nazi Attack Bristol  
The important shipping center of Bristol on Britain's west coast bore the brunt of German air attack on England during the night. British said today, acknowledging that "serious fires" were started by incendiary bombs.

The raiders also struck at London, at towns in the southeast, south and southwest, the government reported.

An official announcement said "an enemy bomber was shot down into the sea off the north coast of Scotland this morning."

Royal Air Force bombers, at the same time, smashed at the German naval base at Wilhelmshaven for the second successive night, authoritative sources said, with a "highly concentrated" and "highly successful" attack.

Fires Controlled  
Of the German raids a British communique said: "A number of fires, some of them serious, were started in a town in the west country. These were effectively brought under control by the fire service but some damage was done to commercial and other buildings."

The government said the number of casualties was not large in this town nor in other places raided. "Thousands of incendiaries in addition."

# Mexicans Get Still Broader Land Reform

Avila Camacho's Decree Will Add 15,000 Communal Farms

Mexico City, Jan. 17.—(UP)—President Manuel Avila Camacho's new agrarian reform, which works a great change in Mexico's communal farm system by giving peasants individual title to the land, is hailed as a "turn of the right" which will restore confidence in the government's agricultural program and increase farm production at a time when both were most needed.

The division of the communal lands has been one of the cardinal forces of the Mexican revolution. Huge haciendas were expropriated and their acres divided among the peasants to give them security in the process was evolved the system of communal farming, the "ejido," which reached the height of its development—embracing almost all the available land of the nation—under the regime of Lázaro Cárdenas, who was succeeded by Avila Camacho.

Avila Camacho's decree, fulfilling a promise made during his election campaign, directly affects 1,423,885 "ejidatarios" working 15,000 communal farms with a total area of about 52,000,000 acres and makes them eligible to become individual landowners.

The decree also provides for the abrupt overthrow of the communal system of cooperative farming, specifically in the joint use of machinery and cooperative storage and marketing. While the peasant gets property title to the land, he cannot sell or mortgage his property but his family can.

Called "Final Cereals," the decree provides for the abolition of communal farms and the substitution of individual ownership. It is the end of the communal system in Mexico in the private enterprise. It marked, too, according to one noted agricultural expert, the start of the final cycle of land reform in Mexico.

When the last stage of the land reform was completed, the land in Mexico will be approaching its end, because there is no more land left to divide, "ejido" as the land is called.

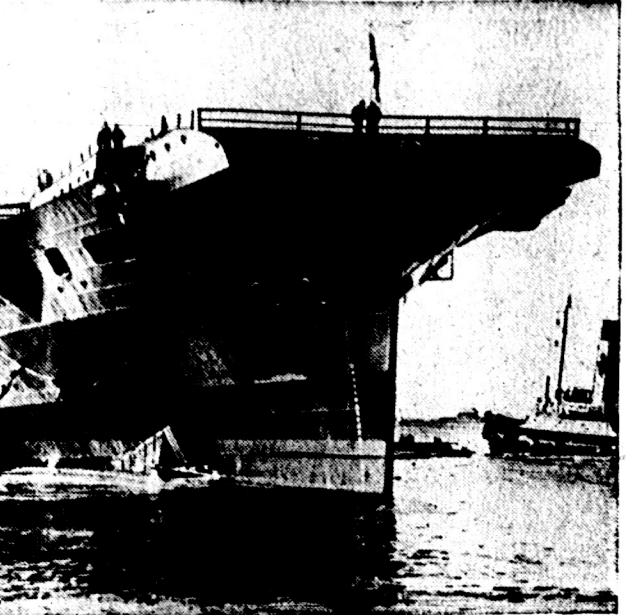

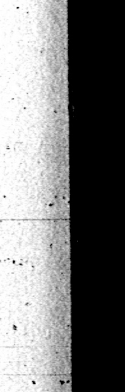

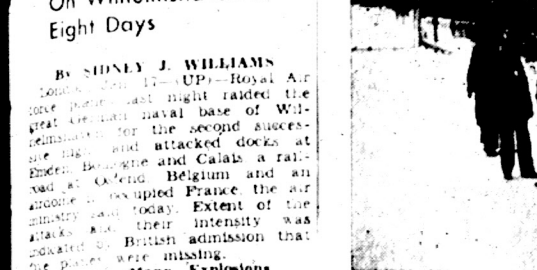
