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Labor Council Hears Criticism On Unions

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (UPI) — The AFL-CIO Executive Council opened a winter meeting here under a cloud of criticism that "by-night shakedown unions" soon would have more than a million Negroes and Puerto Rican workers in their power in New York City.

John H. McNiff, executive secretary of the New York Association of Catholic Trade Unions, made the charge in a statement issued on the eve of the meeting. He said the situation was worse now than it was 18 months ago when he first brought it to light.

"IT IS A SAD truth that today, after all the exposure and all the promises of reform and assistance, after all the committees and banquets, the exploited worker is still very much in the same position as he was before his cause became popular," McNiff said.

He said phony independent unions and crooked AFL-CIO locals were expanding so fast that there is no hope whatsoever for an internal shakeup which would drive out the racketeers.

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10 Persons Die In Texas Crash

ALAMO, Tex. (AP)—Ten persons were killed on a rain-slick highway Sunday in a shattering automobile crash that jammed the speedometer on one vehicle at 80 m.p.h.

Four of the dead were children. The head-on collision occurred seven miles south of here in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, practically on the Texas-Mexico border.

Muddy rescue workers pried and tugged for more than an hour to remove nine bodies from one crumpled automobile.

Highway patrolman M. L. Dailey said the speedometer on the car of John T. Closser, a father of eight, was stuck at 80 miles per hour. Closser was traveling east and the other car west, Dailey said.

Details of the crash, which killed every occupant of the two cars, were meager. Tom Handy, a nearby resident, said he stepped onto his porch about the time they collided.

"It just happened so fast... all I know was that one car was going east and one west," Handy said.

Domingo Cantu, Handy's neighbor, said he "heard something go boom" and saw "a big fire" in the air.

Meaning Of Lent

The Lenten season is of course properly a time when, as Christians, we meditate upon the fact that God has demonstrated the kind of love He has for us "in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8).

But to meditate alone upon the sufferings of Christ and our own unworthiness of those sufferings, and to let it go at that, would be abortive meditation. If no gratefulness wells up from our lives because He died for our sins, and no new resolves gain ascendancy in our wills as a result of that gratefulness, the whole purpose of Lent has miscarried within us.

Our Lenten testimony ought to be, as expressed in 1 John 3:16, "by this we know love, that He laid down his life for us; and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren." And having declared as much we must proceed to do that very thing!

Bradley Board Approves Pay Hike For Trustees

Bradley Village Board of Trustees unanimously approved an ordinance Monday night giving a pay increase to board members and the village president. It also doubles what they receive now.

The new ordinance consummates action begun by the board last April, when it voted that the pay schedule for trustees and the president should be brought up to the maximum stipulated in the state statutes.

It goes into effect after the upcoming elections in April, and for the present concerns only the three board members to be chosen in that election.

Hence it will not apply to the current president, William Barwegen, or Trustee Charles Crosby, William Uech and Glenn Mulligan. To get the raise they would have to be reelected two years from now when their terms expire.

TRUSTEES WHOSE terms expire this April are William Larkins, Robert Kowalek and Clifford Coash.

Under the new ordinance the president will get \$2,500 a year, an increase of \$120 over what he gets now. His present salary is \$1,200, paid at the rate of \$105 a month. The new salary will also be paid monthly.

Trustees now get a flat \$35 a month, no matter how many board and committee meetings they attend.

Under the new plan they will get \$15 a meeting, for a maximum of four meetings a month, giving them a possible maximum monthly salary of \$60. The pay is for regular board meetings and committee meetings.

The ordinance stipulates they will be allowed only two paid absences a year. All meetings they miss after those two they will not be paid for.

AS IN THE PAST salaries for the president and trustees will come out of the general fund.

A clause is contained in the new ordinance which invalidates all previous pay ordinances for the persons concerned when there is any conflict between the ordinances.

At most the new ordinance will mean an additional \$3,000 for salaries of the seven men concerned, or it affects all of them two years from now. It will give each trustee \$300 a year more, and the president \$1,200.

For the next two years while it affects only three trustees it will mean \$900 a year more.

Action for the increase was begun April 16, 1958 by Barwegen when he recommended it, saying "Board members spend many hours outside of regular and special meetings working for the betterment and progress of the community, and I feel they should get the maximum permissible under state statutes."

The April vote to increase pay was unanimous also, after a motion by Trustee Mulligan to amend the ordinance was taken after a motion by Mulligan.

State Senate Gets Hospital Building Bill

SPRINGFIELD (UPI)—A bill appropriating 20 million dollars for improvements at the Dixon and Lincoln state schools for the mentally retarded went to the Senate today with House approval.

Both chambers cut short their session for this week because of city elections and scheduled only perfunctory sessions today.

The 20-million-dollar bill was passed by the House Monday, 156-4.

Introduced in the House were proposed constitutional amendments calling for annual sessions of the Legislature, along with six-year terms for senators and four-year terms for representatives.

THE LEGISLATURE now meets only in odd-numbered years, and Senate terms are four years, representing terms two years.

Also introduced was a bill providing a fine and jail term for persons distributing publications "contributing to juvenile crime."

The bill was introduced by Rep. Ralph T. Smith (R-Alton) and would prohibit sales to youths under 18 of magazines and other publications dealing with "crime, horror, terror, brutality, violence, passion, depravity, lust and immorality."

Offenders would be punished by fines from \$25 to \$500 or a year in prison, or both.

The House advanced bills to bar 14 and 15 year olds from operating motor scooters, and to ban the death penalty on a six-year trial basis.

Three emergency appropriation bills were passed by the House and sent to the governor for signature. They provided \$3,850,000 for the Public Welfare Department, \$2,248,000 for the Public Safety Department and \$136,000 for the Finance Department.

Another bill introduced would provide a maximum life sentence for the sale of narcotics to minors. Sponsored by Rep. Nicholas Zagone and Chester Wiktorak, both Chicago Democrats.

WASHINGTON, N.C. (AP)—One of two Navy blimps on a north-bound cruise crashed and burned in a swamp before dawn today. Four members of the seven-man crew died in the crash, or subsequently. The other three were critically injured.

This led to the belief that the blimp was flying at cruising speed, and went directly into the earth, a rhyolite almost unknown for that type of aircraft.

After the crash, the sister ship hovered above the area relaying distress signals and marking the area before proceeding.

The three injured men were in a state of shock when they arrived at Beaufort County Hospital here, said Dr. W. C. Piver. "Each had been burned over about 25 per cent of the body."

The blimp was listed as Lt. Linford May of Oswego, Ore., and enlisted men Roy Lyon of Ferndale, Mich., and Orville L. Moore of McAllister, Okla.

Names of the dead will be released after next of kin have been notified. They were two officers and two enlisted men.
