Special Session Of Legislature Is Considered

To Deal With Emergency Measures In Defense Of Illinois Plants

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
With the legislature subject to call for a special session, probably before the Christmas holidays, the Illinois state defense council today met to file Illinois in the nation's wartime role.

Governor Green announced last night he would convene the legislature to deal with emergency measures, and said he might set the date following the meeting of the defense council in Chicago.

The call to be issued by the chief executive will specify the subjects which the special session may consider, although the governor said earlier in the day the police force, limited to 350 men, would have to be enlarged to meet any emergency.

Other needed legislation to strengthen state defense efforts, he said, would be submitted to the department directors with whom he met before issuing the announcement.

The public service committee of Cook county board yesterday considered the possibility of postponing the statewide primary from April 14 to June 1. It argued that \$100,000 might be saved if the primary were held on the same date as the supreme court election which is fixed by the constitution and cannot be changed by legislation.

Sen. T. MacDonnell, Macomb Republican, in urging a special session of the legislature to enlarge the state militia and equip it to guard against sabotage urged that its members, now serving without pay, be compensated for their services.

In Chicago Mayor Kelly directed the defense commission to choose a ward for every block in the city and instruct them to become acquainted with every resident in the block and watch for subversive activities. The mayor also announced he would ask the city council to enlarge the police and fire department personnel. The police commissioner said he would ask for 100 additional firemen to bring the force to 7,000, and the fire commissioner said he would ask for 800 additional firemen to bring the force to 3,200. The treasurer would cost \$300,000 a year.

Doyle at Springfield asked Governor Green to caution state highway police and county and local law enforcement officers not to apprehend Japanese aliens but to notify the federal bureau of investigation of all Japanese nationals believed to be dangerous to public peace and safety.

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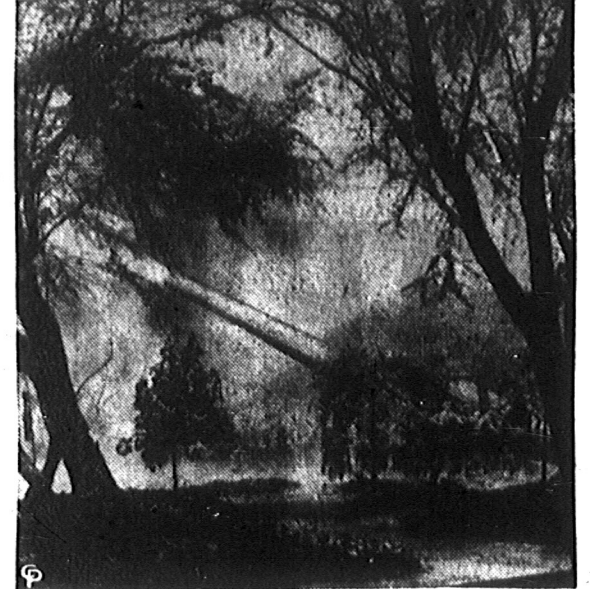

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West Coast Is Guarded Against Air Attacks

Planes Reported Turned Back In Attempt To Reach San Francisco

San Francisco, Dec. 9.—(UP)—A night of blackouts and air raid alarms ordered by military authorities brought the war close to the west coast today.

Army authorities asserted enemy aircraft was operating off California shores, and before dawn two blackouts had been ordered for the San Francisco bay region while the Pacific northwest and San Diego remained in darkness night-long.

Considerable confusion surrounded the alert signals which many persons assumed to be practice alarms and which the police twice mistakenly announced were test warnings.

The first was ordered when planes were detected about 100 miles off San Francisco. Brig. Gen. William Ryan, commanding the fourth interceptor command, was convinced they were enemy craft.

He said the navy was attempting to "locate and give battle" to the invaders.

The second warning presumably was caused by U. S. navy patrol bombers that failed to identify themselves.

"We're in a hell of a spot here and we just can't take any chances," Ryan said.

Near Golden Gate
The initial "enemy" force was believed to number 60 planes, which were reported to be flying low over the Golden Gate. The planes were flying too high to be caught by searchlights. They disappeared to sea.

The report was relayed up and down the coast. Radio stations were ordered off the air lest their signals afford direction to the enemy.

Blackout operation of commercial aircraft was halted because radio direction beams also were ordered off the air. Operations until the beams are restored will be possible only in daylight and during the best weather.

How long the radio "blackout" will continue was not announced by the federal communications commission.

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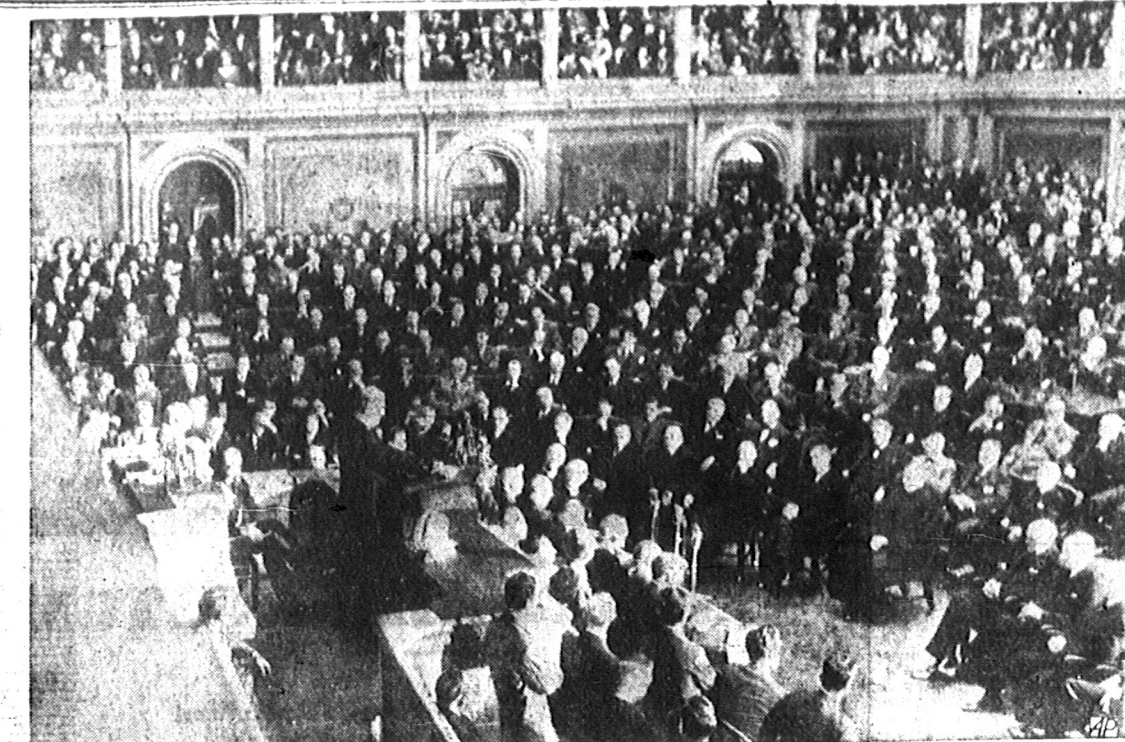

Study Of The Causes And Meanings Of Dizziness

By LOGAN CLENDENIN, M.D.
Meniere's disease, the vertigo in this condition is severe. It comes on with attacks of dizziness, which according to Dr. K. M. Simonson of the Sacramento river valley, means. A person may say he is dizzy when he means he has a sense of confusion, light-headedness, staggering or faintness. Some people use the term to describe the sensation of dizziness, which is a feeling of dizziness brought about by over-work or the faintness of the brain.

True vertigo is a sensation of rotation. The sensation may be that external objects or the walls of the body are rotating or that your own body is spinning in space in the midst of them.

All these things are symptoms and the first duty of the examining physician is to find out what the underlying cause is. The underlying cause may vary from something of slight importance such as indigestion or a transitory attack of constipation to a serious disease of the nervous system.

Some Causes
Spells of confusion, light-headedness or staggering usually indicate a disturbance in the circulation of the brain. This may come from emotion or fear—we have all had patients faint during a life insurance examination or the examination of a draft for the army—or from a sudden pain or blow, etc. Of course, sea sickness, sea sickness, over-use of tobacco, and, as shown in the so-called comic aspect of the blackboards, alcohol causes some form of dizziness.

Severe Vertigo
True vertigo in which either the surroundings or the body seem to rotate is usually a disease of the organ of equilibrium which is part of the middle ear. This organ is affected by transitory toxicosis, constipation, focal infections from teeth or tonsils, gall bladder disturbances, over-use of tobacco, and the causes can, with the cooperation of the patient be treated and relieved.

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Taking Care Of Ailing Children

By Garry Cleveland Myers, Ph.D.
Few children will entirely escape all diseases. One of the most trying problems of a mother is to manage the child from three to ten, when, ever he has a slight illness or is of hapless to him.

Suppose the doctor orders your child to bed, or to remain in bed, but he wants to be up and moving about. Suppose he has never learned the alphabet or restraint or confidence in authority. Then the chances are that he will have a very bad time of it, and he is almost sure to be less cooperative than usual.

But how you suffer, as you beg and plead and argue with the child, all the while aware of your helplessness and distressed by the knowledge that staying out of bed is likely to prolong the child's illness, endangering his health, possibly his life.

Prepare for Next Time
You do not need scolding; you have punishment enough. We hope you will succeed in getting the child to stay in bed when he should. But in any event, as soon as he has entirely recovered, work out a careful program to prepare him for better cooperation in the next possible emergency.

Let us prepare our children while they are well for the times when they are going to be sick. Frequently in this column I have stressed the importance to the child of his learning

ing at an early age some basic habits, as a means to help further his own conduct later in life. Building in him good habits and attitudes of citizenship, also as a guarantee of his own future.

The child who has learned very early that there are some things he must not have and some things he must not do, and who by and by discovers also that there are a few things he will have to do, who, in short, has acquired respect for authority, has learned it from a parent, always firm and just and sympathetic—such a child in an emergency will with little or no emotion, adapt himself when authority needs to be exercised.

Here again the mother's success will depend on what she has done to cultivate cooperation in the child to stimulate wide interest in his habits of self-amusement by creative work, or by listening to stories. Fortunate then is the child who from the time when he could handle crayons, scissors and paints, has spent many happy hours in making things, most fortunate any ill or convalescent child who has enjoyed being read to from the time he was less than two years old.

Anything we parents do to help young children to develop healthy restraint, cooperation, and wide participation in the family life, but for the children in later years.
