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# CITIZENS OF SUMNER TWP. HEAR ISSUES

MEETING OF REPUBLICANS HELD LAST NIGHT IN WHITAKER HALL

## CANDIDATES PRESENT

Talks By Charles Kurtz, Luther Bratton, And Judge Ruel Feature Meeting

You people are here at this meeting because you are interested in your state and county government. You know that your state taxes have been increased 1-3 percent and you want to find out why they have been increased, and what can be done to prevent the situation. I am confident that when the voters of this community have considered and analyzed the tax issue, and other issues of the campaign, Sumner township will vote the regular Republican ticket from top to bottom.

These remarks were made last night in the Whitaker town hall by Charles W. Kurtz, assistant county clerk of Kankakee county, who is one of the speakers at the meeting of the township voters. The meeting was opened by Edgar Williams, township chairman, and was presided over by E. M. Godes, supervisor for several years.

**Tax Increase**

It is common knowledge to you people, continued Mr. Kurtz, "that one of the first actions of the present governor was to demand and secure from the state legislature more than \$100,000 in appropriations more than previously, these appropriations being directly responsible for the one-third increase in state taxes. The enormity of this increase will be brought home more closely to you when I show, through records in the county clerk's office, that this increase amounts to \$1.33 on every foot of land owned by you people must be taxed to meet this increase, and every one of you must contribute your share."

The Miller-Judd minority, having previously failed to win votes by the "Lower Tax" catch-phrase, this year stood upon the title of "Eminent Domain." They are not Republicans at all, but anti, and the only reason they took this name is because they want you to believe that the primary is a continuation of the old fight between Governor Small and Emmerson. They are entirely heedless of the fact that by this alliance they are rallying and approving of Emmerson's 1-3 percent increase in state taxes. Their own candidate seems to be proud of his "rubber stamp" status when he says he has always supported Emmerson's ideas in the past and will continue to do so in the future. He was a member of the legislature when the appropriations causing the increase in taxes were passed.

**Candidates Present**

Attorney Brian Taylor of Kankakee introduced the candidates as follows: Luther B. Bratton, for county judge; O. A. Burdick, for clerk; Ed Hoennicke, for sheriff; L. B. Johnson, for county superintendent of schools.

These men are fairly and impartially assessed by secret ballot and then unanimously endorsed at the regular spring meeting of the Republican Central Committee.

# TWO YOUTHS INJURED AS CARS CRASH

ELDON JOHNSTON, 14, AND LLOYD PETKO, 16, TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

## HURTS ARE SERIOUS

Ernest Betourne Suffers Broken Leg When Skates in Front Of Automobile

Eldon Johnston, 14 year old son of Mrs. Beattie Johnston, 310 West Court street, and Lloyd Petko, 16 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Petko, 347 West Oak street, were both seriously injured this morning in an automobile accident in this city.

Immediately after the accident, the boys were taken to St. Mary's hospital where it was found that young Johnston had suffered a bad fracture of the right leg that it was necessary to amputate the foot just above the ankle. He also suffered a frightful cut in the face, losing a great deal of blood, possible internal injuries, and numerous other cuts and bruises. The Petko boy complained of considerable pain and possibly may have internal injuries. His condition is not regarded as serious as that of young Johnston, who may not recover.

The accident occurred about 10:30 this morning at the intersection of East Station street and South Wildwood and was a collision between the delivery truck of the Brouillette grocery, 204 West Court street, and a car driven by George Watts, 905 South Evergreen avenue. At the impact, witnesses said, the boys were thrown violently out of the truck several feet in the air. Adolphe LePlante, 147 North Entrance avenue, an employee of the store, was driving the truck and the boys were riding with him.

Immediately after the accident, the Johnston boy was picked up by W. Roy Beach, of the Kankakee News agency, and was rushed to the hospital. The Petko boy was taken to the hospital by a Baird-Swanwell hardware store truck.

Ernest Betourne, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Betourne, 1129 East Merchant street, suffered a fracture of the right leg about 4:45 o'clock last evening when he was struck by an automobile driven by Mrs. Ben Jaffe, 919 South Myrtle avenue.

According to the police report, the accident occurred at the intersection of West Court street and South East avenue. The boy was on roller skates and was coming down the west slope of the Court street viaduct, when he went directly into the path of Mrs. Jaffe's automobile.

The boy was removed from beneath the car by Gene LaFontaine, city traffic officer and Alex Ernest, city fireman, and was taken to St. Mary's hospital in Mrs. Jaffe's car.

# REVOLT NEAR ON TYRANNY IN HOSPITAL

PATIENTS AND EMPLOYEES SUBJECTED TO BAD TREATMENT

## BY MILLER - JUDD

Voters Will Arise In Revolt Against Oppression In State Hospital

Wholesale rebellion of the voters, expressed in their ballots on next Tuesday in the county primary, appeared inevitable against the tyranny and oppression to which Kankakee State Hospital employees are subjected under the Miller-Judd gang rule.

Hospital employees themselves, speaking with the rancor and resentment of months of browbeating and despotism in their hearts, declare that in all the long history of the hospital there has never been a time when there was such commotion, uproar and revolt within the locked gates of the institution as there is today.

Employees are conscientiously trying to perform their duties as best they can under the conditions, but they are ordered about at cross purposes in such a hasty manner by incompetent and amateurish new bosses that they are at their wits' end to know what their duties really are.

Of course the patients themselves, helpless and frightened in this turmoil, are the real sufferers and are being neglected in a shameful manner by the heads of the institution. Having made the institution a political pawn rather than a home for unfortunate people, the new so-called hospital executives are utterly disregarding the well being of the patients, who are being cowed and frightened rather than being carefully and kindly treated.

Ordered about by the overbearing new bosses, the employees are being told how they must vote, and promises of dire punishment hang over their heads if they do not follow the Miller-Judd gang. During the recent township election, only those cars which bore "Lower Tax" stickers were allowed with the locked gates, and the same condition will exist on next Tuesday when only those autos bearing the Miller-Judd stickers will be allowed within the grounds.

Employees leaving the institution are subjected to a search of their pockets and bundles. It is reported, like criminals, to see if they are stealing hospital property. Every way, employees are subjected to utter contempt and disregard of common decency and respect.

Resources of the institution, its buildings, its equipment, the livestock, and the grounds are all being neglected, and will soon go to rack and ruin at the tax-payers expense. Employees are being subjected to longer hours, their wages are being reduced, and on top of this, they declare in disgust, the state taxes have been increased.

Employees have been discharged, in disregard of the Civil Service law and years of faithful service, so that they can be replaced by friends of the Miller-Judd gang, some of whom were imported from other states. Qualifications, previous experience, and training were not considered in hiring these replacements.

What are the voters of Kankakee county going to do about it? Are they going to stand for this treatment of state patients and employees or are they going to revolt against the high-handed methods of the Miller-Judd group? Are they going to stand for the attempted commercialism of the voters of their fellow citizens? The answers will come emphatically and the certainty in the primary election next Tuesday.

# Republican Party Or Jaybird Miller

Shall Kankakee county be governed by the Republican party or shall it turn all of its affairs over to the dictatorship of J. Bert Miller and his tools!

Every movement which is started in the sheriff's office will have to have the O. K. and sanction of the anti Republican dictator. Arrests will be made upon his orders and from what we know of his past history there will be plenty of them, because it is a well known fact that he is out to punish scores of people in every part of the county.

Persons who have lived in this county for the short space of ten years recall how he ran the office of sheriff and state's attorney when he had control of these two branches of Government a few years ago. Innocent people were arrested and thrown into jail simply because they failed to agree with Miller's high handed conduct of political affairs.

Through a slip of the tongue a few nights ago, one of Miller's star speakers let it be known that Charles Judd is slated for the office of Chief Deputy Sheriff in case Goodknecht is elected. Of course, Goodknecht may try to deny this, but when the time comes, if it ever should, Miller will walk into the sheriff's office with his mailed fist and order Judd's appointment.

A flagrant example of how Miller conducts things when he gets into control is shown by the condition of things at the Kankakee State Hospital.

Do you want Kankakee county to be run the way the Kankakee State Hospital is now being run? Wages reduced, old civil service employees discharged, inexperienced men and women put in charge of patients and patients being neglected, some of them actually begging for food. All being done on J. Bert Miller's orders.

Already in this campaign Miller has hurled aside every man and woman who has offered even a suggestion as to how the campaign should be conducted. At least two men, who started out to take an active part in Miller's campaign, have withdrawn completely and are making the open prediction that never again will they participate in any campaign in which Miller is the dictator.

The issue is squarely up to the people: Shall the Republican party with its record of competency and efficiency continue to govern the affairs of Kankakee county, or shall Bert Miller rule with his iron hand?

"Knute never even answered him. He turned to me and said: 'Chick, maybe you'd better stay here another week before we go back to work.'"

# ITALIAN REPRIMAND TO FRANCE

TIRE OF ANGLO-FRENCH NEGOTIATIONS ABOUT FRENCH DEMANDS

## CLAIM UNCHANGED

Spokesman Says France Is After Them To Accept Decreased Strength

**BULLETIN:**

London, April 4.—(AP)—Signing of a three power pact by the United States, Great Britain and Japan and quick adjournment of the naval conference was said in an authoritative quarter late today to be quite possible.

This would involve leaving the knotty questions of French security and Franco-Italian parity to be signed in other fields, and would provide so that France and Italy would be in a position to sign as soon as these difficulties have been ironed out.

**BULLETIN:**

London, April 4.—(AP)—The American delegation this afternoon tentatively engaged reservations to return home on the Leviathan April 22.

It was stated at American headquarters that this date was regarded as the limit to which the conference could meet.

It also was authoritatively stated that the delegations feel that conference must be brought to a close within a comparatively short time.

London, April 4.—(AP)—The Italian naval delegation announced in London conference today by London through its official spokesman, a statement which observers interpreted as not only a statement of Italian policy but also a statement of Italian attitude toward the conference.

The Italian delegation has been known in conference circles several days ago today's headlines was the first official recording of sentiment.

The spokesman declared that Italy's claim to parity with France is unchanged, although France wants to accept inferiority in naval strength.

He further announced that Dino Grandi, chief of the Italian delegation, felt that the security pact which France demands as compensation for cutting her naval figure is a matter for the League of Nations and should not be discussed at the London conference.

"After all," he said, "we came to London to talk disarmament and not to talk about the League of Nations Covenant."

The Italian statement brought expressions of gloom from the French delegation this afternoon. The French were freely inquiring among themselves whether any useful purpose could be served by their remaining long in London.

Conference circles in general admit that the Franco-Italian situation is none too good but they recall that other international conferences have produced crises, and that some times statements which are issued in moments of stress appear worse on the surface than they ultimately prove to be.

But this much was evident in all conference quarters today: Everybody is eager for a showdown and the termination of the long drawn out negotiations.

The British and French are still working for a security formula, and if they should obtain it the conference expects to turn its attention to the Franco-Italian party question.

The impatience of all concerned has become accentuated since the Americans, British, and Japanese have reached an agreement which would permit a three-power treaty even if all else fails.

The Italians are particularly anxious that there be a plenary session as soon as possible so the cards of all the delegations can be put on the table.

### JOHN H. WALKER ASKED TO QUIT POST BY GREEN

Springfield, Ill., April 4.—John H. Walker, president of the Illinois Federation of Labor, who was elected vice-president of the United Mine Workers of America here last month, has been asked to resign as president of the state federation by William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor.

A letter published today by provisional officers of the Illinois district of the United Mine Workers of America revealed that Green requested Walker's resignation on March 20. So far Walker has taken no action in the matter.

On March 20, a letter addressed to Walker by Green calling his attention to the fact that he had participated in the convention held in Springfield beginning March 10, that he had accepted an official position with the newly formed organization of miners and because of this fact his resignation as president of the Illinois State Federation of Labor was both necessary and inevitable. Green wrote in the letter which was addressed to Thomas Kennedy, secretary-treasurer of the Lewis faction of the miners' union, that the resignation of John H. Walker as president of the Illinois State Federation of Labor was requested.

The order of the appellate court in this case was as follows: "This court upon examination of the question of law and fact involved in this controversy has reached the conclusion that the order of the Circuit Court of Sangamon county entered in this cause, denying a motion to dissolve the temporary injunction issued herein, is not erroneous but is in accordance with the law applicable to the facts in this case and the order is therefore affirmed."

The formal opinion of the court will be prepared and filed later. When Judge Norman L. Jones refused to dissolve the injunction in January, Lewis appealed to the appellate court. Oral arguments on the appeal were concluded yesterday.

The decision handed down by the appellate court this morning did not go into details of the case but simply upheld the Circuit Court.

State officers of the union announced that they will enforce "both the letter and spirit of the injunction and will ask that anyone violating it be cited for contempt."

Since the injunction was issued, President Lewis has again revoked the Illinois State charter and ousted the officers. His second revocation order charged that the Illinois officers promoted a "dead union" and charges were based on the organization of a "United Mine Workers of America" at a convention here last month in which State President Harry Fishwick and other Illinois union officials were leaders.
