## Fight On TB's World Wide

"With all our emphasis on tuberculosis, we sometimes forget that the United States is not alone in this fight," says Albert Keller, Jr., chairman of the campaign.

Keller said the Kankakee County-Tuberculosis Association has received a sheet of Canadian Christmas Seals. They picture the three wise men visiting the Christ in the manger. The background is done in alternating rows of blue and white with the red and white seal of the fight against tuberculosis, featured prominently on each seal.

"THE IDEA OF Christmas Seals," Keller reminded, "came from Denmark where a kindly man, Einar Huijbelt, worked in the post office. He was fond of children and it hurt him to see them suffering from tuberculosis. He wished he could do something about it."

"One year, as he sorted the heavy Christmas mail, the thought struck him. Suppose we could get people to buy a special Christmas stamp while the holiday spirit of giving is strong. There are so many letters and packages that just a penny seal on each one would bring a lot of money to help sick children. There might even be enough to start a hospital for children."

"THE DANISH postmaster liked the idea and the King of Denmark himself asked his people to support the plan."

"The first Seal sale in the world took place in Denmark in 1904, the same year that the National Tuberculosis Association was formed in this country," Keller pointed out. "The Christmas Seal campaign to raise funds for the TB fight has spread to many lands."

## Polar Station Busy During Balmy Antarctic Summer

(The following was written by David C. Beeder, Associated Press Centralia correspondent who spent a week in the antarctic in November on a 30-day tour of active duty with the U. S. Air Force.)

MEMPHIS SOUND, Antarctica (AP)—The job of supplying remote scientific stations in Antarctica is expensive and dangerous. Big airplanes, operating off an ice runway, keep the stations stocked with everything from T-bone steaks to nine-ton crawler tractors.

Cargo is dropped by parachute in the antarctic solely from C-124 Globemasters, a three-engine transport plane. It is FLYING THE HUGG plane is tricky business for more than 20 pilots assigned to the month-long mission.

"You can't make a mistake," one veteran said before a 1,000-mile round trip to the South Pole. "One slip down here and you're dead."

A crash last year took six lives. Bad weather was the cause. The flying safety record was perfect for the more than 100 flights this year.

Military expenditures are estimated at \$15,000,000 and include the job of transporting men and supplies from the United States. Their projects are just getting under way.

Geology, mapping and biology are three major areas of investigation for U. S. scientists in the antarctic this year and next year. Their projects are just getting under way.

Specific investigations range from a study of the salt intake of penguins to overland explorations of the perpetual ice cap.

Several men are at work on the station.

## Yanks Warned To Toe The Line When Abroad

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The State Department has this bit of advice for anyone traveling abroad: Don't get into trouble. Once you're in, the department says, there's not much that can be done to get you out. Other countries have standards of justice that are not always the same as those in the United States.

State Department officials emphasized that an American visiting a foreign country must acquaint himself with the laws of that nation and understand that he cannot expect exactly the same treatment he might get at home.

AN EXAMPLE, they said, are traffic codes in Mexico. These laws are still more so than in this country, and violators are usually jailed until trial, which may be delayed for days.

The department follows a routine procedure once an American is arrested. In every case where the U.S. citizen applies to a consular official for help, the official gathers the facts in the case, reports them to the State Department, follows the trial closely and appraises it from the legal standards of the foreign country.

This is what is being done in the case of Miami Herald reporter James Buchanan, arrested in Havana on a charge that he aided the prison escape of American Austin Young. Young had been sentenced to 30 years by the Fidel Castro government for anti-Castro activity.

The State Department emphasized that a trial must be judged by the standards in the foreign country itself, rather than on U.S. standards. The United States tries foreign citizens under U.S. codes when they break the law.

As a matter of fact, officials said, Americans generally have fared better in trials abroad than do foreign nationals convicted of the same crime.

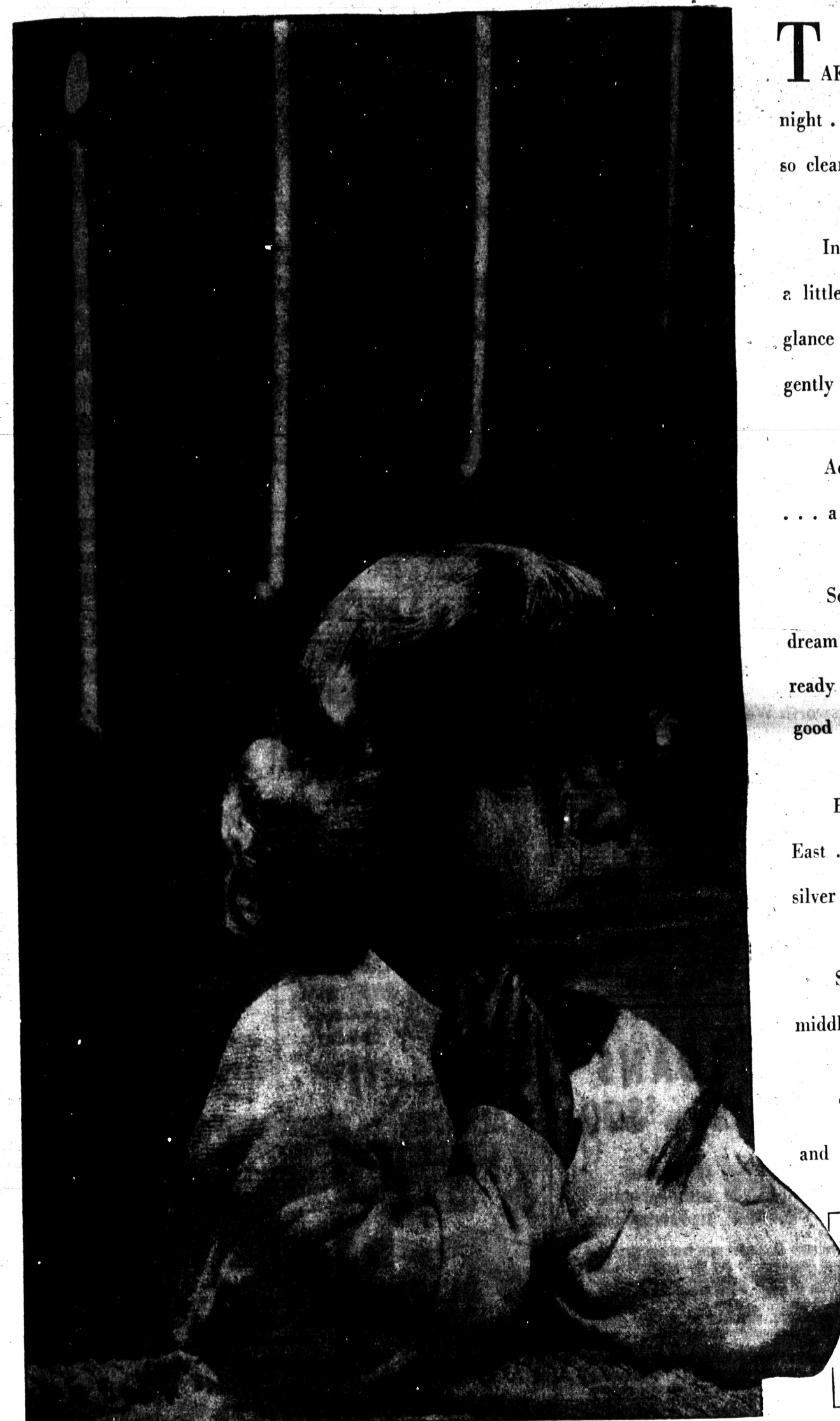

## To Buy Or Sell Bonds Is Question

NEW YORK (AP) — Should you buy bonds now? Should you sell the ones you bought a few years back?

Bond dealers say they have some customers in each of these categories.

Those who are buying are attracted by the high yields that U.S. Treasury and corporate bonds bring today. The return is greater than can be had through the dividend payments of most corporate common stocks at present prices.

Most of the longer term U.S. Treasury securities are selling now at or near their record lows. Although the fixed interest rates on the ones issued some years ago are low, the bargain prices mean that your dollars buy more bonds than if they were selling at par. Therefore the yield on the dollars you spend is high.

THE SAME IS true of many of the older corporate bonds. The U.S. bonds are the marketable variety sold in large denominations. U.S. Savings Bonds can't be sold-only redeemed at fixed prices—and so aren't involved in this discussion.

There has been some switching from common stocks into bonds by those looking for higher yields, and some buying by institutional investment companies for the same reason.

But there is a rub that defers some from buying bonds. That is, when the bonds mature the Treasury or the corporations will redeem them at par. The difference between present low prices and the par redemption will constitute a capital gain and therefore is taxable as income.

Dealers say that those who are selling their bonds come under several categories. Some are selling to set up for tax purposes the loss between what they paid awhile back and what they get today. Some are reported switching from U.S. bonds to corporate bonds where yields may be higher.

DEALERS SEE THEIR current bond holdings likely to go with lower prices if the Treasury comes into the market next year with bonds bearing high interest rates.

The Treasury already is paying 4 1/2 per cent for its shortest term securities, its weekly offering of 91-day bills.

The question of whether you should hold onto your old bonds depends, therefore, on your own circumstances and plans: weighing their low interest against the loss at today's low prices, with an eye on greater returns from other investments to offset the loss.

Whether you should put any idle money you have into bonds depends likewise on weighing their attractive yields and certain capital gains against what you think particular common stocks might do for you, or what other more risky but higher yield investments might bring in.

# Dinner Topper

Does your family like ours? Do you like to end your Christmas dinner with a collection of desserts? Most everyone around our table is eager to taste small servings of the traditional plum pudding and mince pie (or mince turnovers) but there are always enthusiastic takers of an extra sweet.

At our house we often make this "extra" a snow-white dessert and glaze it with color in honor of the season. This year we chose the famous French frivoly, Riz a l'Impatrice—cooked rice fold ed into bavagan cream, with nuggets of candied fruit flavored a special way.

When turned out, this frothy mold with its candied fruit, makes quite a showing. Classic cuisine embellishes Riz a l'Impatrice even further by surrounding the molded rice and candied fruit with currant jelly. A prettier and more appropriate Christmas offering could hardly be had.

**RICE IMPERATRICE**  
Ingredients: 1 cup cut-up mixed

candied fruit and peels 1/2 cup glacé cherries and diamond-shaped citron 1/2 cup kirsch (clear cherry distillate) 1/2 cup rice 1/4 cup milk 4 egg yolks 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup milk 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 1 tablespoon cold water 1 cup heavy cream

**Method:** Marinate mixed candied fruit and peel along with cherries and diamond-shaped citron in kirsch. Cook rice in 1 1/2 cups milk over low heat until very tender and milk is absorbed—about 30 minutes. Mix together egg yolks, sugar, and 1/4 cup milk in top of double boiler. Cook and stir constantly over very hot water until thickened. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Soften gelatin in cold water and stir into hot custard to dissolve. Stir in rice; chill until mixture begins to set. Arrange the 1/2 cup marinated cherries and diamond-shaped citron on bottom of a 6-cup ring mold. Whip cream and fold into rice mixture with the 1 cup of marinated cut-up mixed candied fruit and peel; spoon into mold. Chill at least 4 hours; unmold onto chilled serving plate. Makes 8 to 12 servings.

## Crash Of Plane Claims 12th Life

CHICAGO (U.S.)—The pre-dawn crash of a Trans World Airlines plane Sunday, Dec. 20, claimed its 12th victim Sunday. Morris Davidson, 44, an occupant of the plane, died when the plane crashed, died of burns.

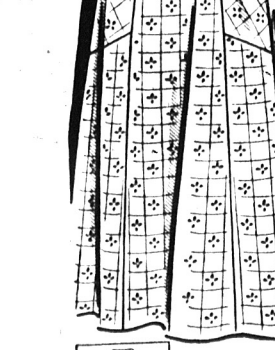

**Ingredients:** 1/2 cup sifted flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup dark brown sugar, 3 eggs, 1/2 cup butter or margarine (melted), 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup fresh pitted dates (sliced), 1 can (3 1/2 ounces) coconut, 1/2 cup walnuts (chopped).

**Method:** Sift together the flour, baking powder, salt and brown sugar into a medium-sized mixing bowl. Beat eggs until lemon-colored; add with butter and vanilla to sifted dry ingredients. Stir in dates, coconut and walnuts. Turn into buttered baking pan (9 by 9 by 1 1/2 inches). Bake in slow (325) degrees oven about 45 minutes or until make tester inserted in center comes out clean. Place on cake rack until cool. Cut into bars with a very sharp knife; remove with small spatula and roll bars in confectioners' sugar. Store in tightly covered container.

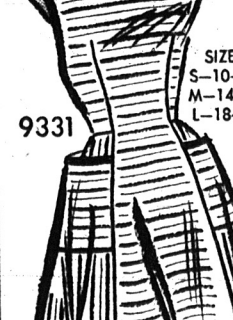

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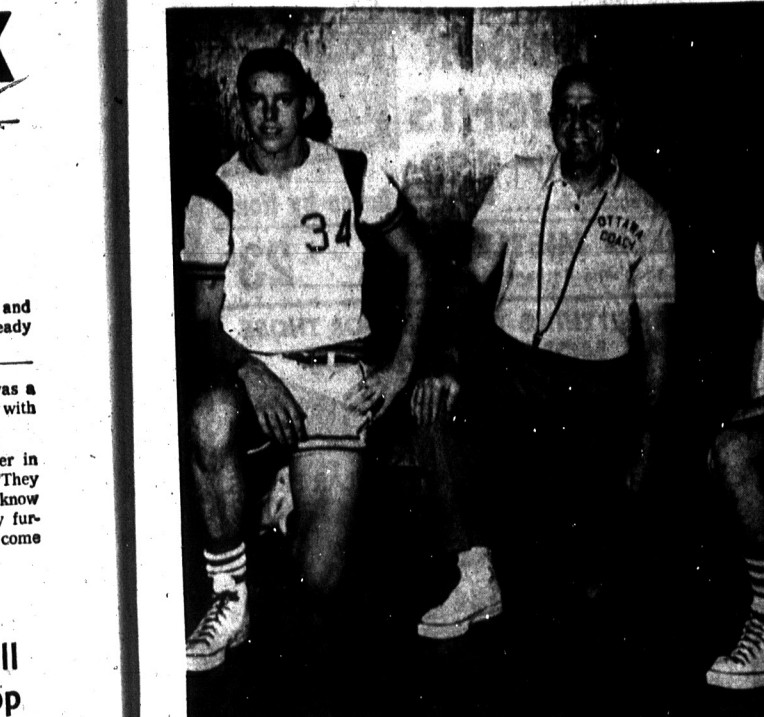
