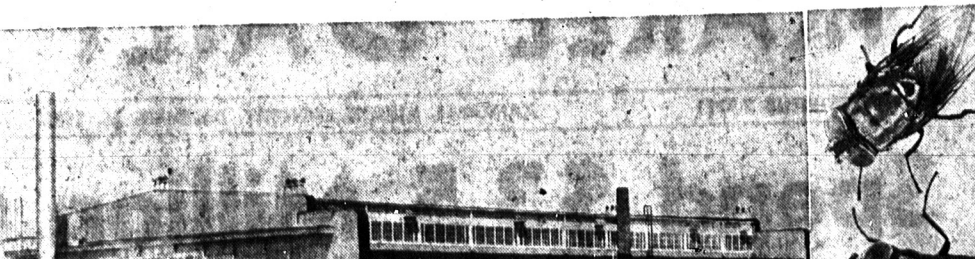

Arrest 7 Carrying Arms Into Minnesota Plant

ALBERT L. E. Minn. (AP)—Police today arrested seven men entering the strike troubled Wilson & Co. meat packing plant here for carrying firearms through the gates.

There were no disturbances however, as cars carrying nonunion workers streamed into the grounds of the plant, reopened today under federal court order.

The wife of the Freeborn County sheriff said the seven men were jailed and seven weapons confiscated. In the absence of the sheriff, who was on duty near the plant, she did not know what charges had been lodged against the seven, she said.

THE PLANT resumed operations under protection of National Guardsmen, sent here 2½ weeks ago to quell picket line violence. The United Packinghouse Workers of America had only taken pickets at the gates as cars carrying workers streamed into the grounds this morning.

Martial law in Albert Lea and surrounding Freeborn County was lifted at midnight in compliance with the court order that reopened the plant.

Nixon Easier To Defeat, Demos Think

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Democrats claimed today that Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's withdrawal from the Republican presidential race has boosted Democratic chances of capturing the White House.

They said Vice President Richard M. Nixon would be an easier candidate to beat than Rockefeller. These Democrats described Rockefeller's decision as a victory for old guard Republicans which would backfire on the GOP.

In Republican quarters, there was speculation that Nixon would revive his campaign plans and then primaries which would have kept him away from Washington at perhaps crucial stages of the next session of Congress.

HOWEVER, NIXON said Sunday that his plans "always have been made independently of what other people might say or do."

He said it was "too early" to discuss his plans for 1960.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) said a potential presidential candidate, summed up the general reaction of the party when he said Rockefeller's announcement nailed down GOP nomination for Nixon.

He also said it showed "there is no place in the national Republican party for the able and progressive governor."

Forecasting a Democratic victory next November, Johnson said "the Democratic president" should seriously consider drafting Rockefeller for a high appointive post.

Loony Larcenies Of 1959

This Year They Even Took The Bathtub

NEW YORK (NEA)—They finally stole the bathtub in 1959. In fact, 28 of them were stolen by an enterprising thief in Bilston, England.

While police were cleaning up that one, a family in McCann, Calif., after losing a stove and furniture in previous years, returned to their summer camp to find the entire cabin gone.

Other big items, too, had their day. Pike County, Ind., had a 30-foot bridge cut up and carried off. And two men took up two miles of railroad track in Montana and sold it for scrap.

Probably the longest item on record ever to be stolen was a 20-foot sign taken from a railway station in Wales. The name—Llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogorthchwyllynllwngyllwg—was 185 characters long.

Animals were also featured in 1959's queer thefts.

A grocery store was robbed in Brooklyn while the watchdog calmly watched. The same watchdog then bit the police captain in the leg when the officer was making his investigation.

"Man bites dog" was given still another twist in a prison camp in Waycross, Ga., when bloodhounds dug under the prison fences and escaped. Prisoners were used to round up the poached reputation intact, a dog in Montpelier, Vt., snuffed out 40 bottles of liquor stolen earlier from a country club. The dog was hunting rabbits at the time.

A parrot in Charlotte, N.C., squawked out "When a man steals, he steals from me," when it attempted to remove a ring from a thief's finger.

PICKPOCKETS had a busy year in 1959.

Thirty-five wallets with a total of \$2,000 were lifted during

they seem. Two thieves in Czechoslovakia, Poland, bought up her rent. Two youths in Niles, Mich., caught with a stolen car—explained that they had only borrowed it because hitchhiking was against the law.

ANOTHER EL PASO woman, arrested for stealing and cashing a government check said: "I didn't think it was wrong to steal from my mother-in-law."

After thefts in a Columbus, Ohio, penitentiary of shaving lotion, razors, a fountain pen, chop ham, deodorant sticks, radio plugs and a pair of gloves, an editorial appeared in the penitentiary paper:

"We are appealing to each inmate to help eliminate these low-type characters that are in our midst."

And alibis really hit the top in 1959.

Charged with passing four counterfeit \$100 bills, a gambler in Louisville testified he had won the money with crooked dice.

An El Paso landlady stole, forged and cashed a government check belonging to a tenant, in

blocks away to the pocket of the charged shoplifter.

A carefully conducted search was made in London by Scotland Yard detectives, after a counterfeit one-pound note turned up in the bar of the House of Commons.

And a possibly reformed striptease artist in Leeds, England, was fined for stealing some clothes.

A shoplifter's coat in Memphis, produced four sport shirts, two raincoats, a two-pound box of candy, a hat, several belts and two bottles of cologne.

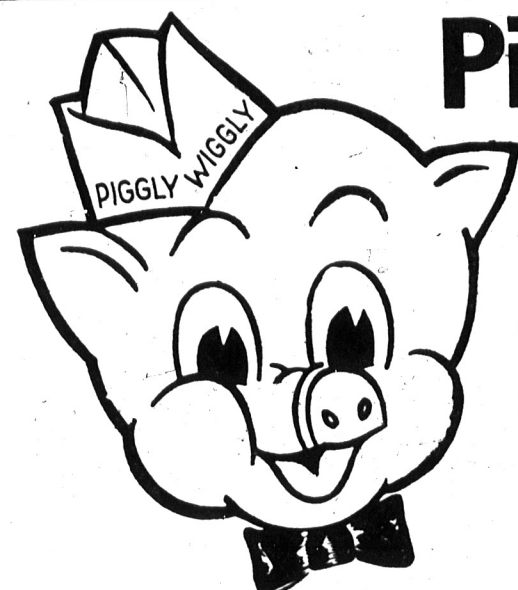

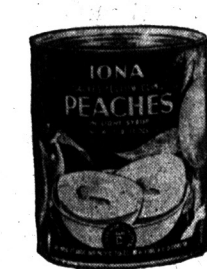

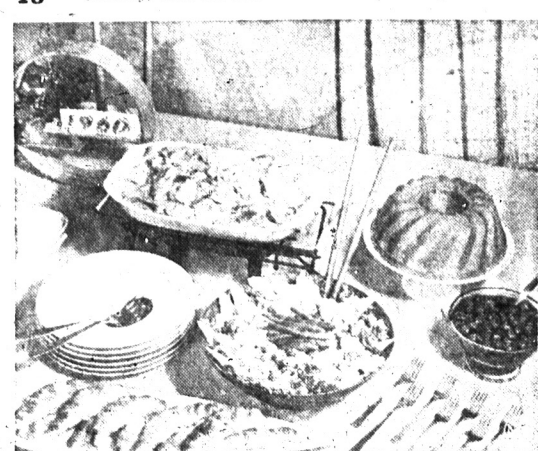

Here's How To Plan Happy New Year's Eve Party

If you are having a New Year's Eve party, put your guests the honor of your company. That means planning and preparing your menu well in advance so you won't be in the kitchen during the party.

Buffet service allows a greater number of people to be entertained. It also makes for better use of a small apartment or home. At the buffet, one can select from a variety of dishes. The chicken is served over rice with green salad and hot rolls. Toss salad greens with mayonnaise. Cooked vegetables such as artichoke hearts, mushrooms, green beans and jamocha.

For a superb dessert, use a chocolate mousse, made a day in advance. Serve with a bright sauce of canned tart red cherries. Decorate the table in advance.

If you have a dining room, the buffet table can be set ahead of time. If the buffet table must be set in the living room, use a table decorated with the same theme as the dishes and food. It is a good idea to serve drinks from a separate table. Keep extra helpings of food warm in the kitchen. Have plenty of coffee and ice salt drinks.

CHICKEN IN HERB SAUCE
(Yield: 12 servings)
Three tender-roast chickens, cut in serving pieces, 3 cups "after 12" sauce, 1/2 cup lemon juice, 1 tablespoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon each thyme and basil, 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1 large onion, finely cut in strips, 4 cups coarsely cut celery, 1 tall can (1 1/2 cups) evaporated milk, 1 cup flour, 3 tablespoons soy sauce.

Put chicken into large kettle, add water, monosodium glutamate, salt, thyme and basil. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer 45 minutes. Cool. Remove chicken from bones in large pieces. Measure liquid (there should be 3/4 quart). In large kettle, melt butter, add onion, pepper and celery, and cook until crisp tender but do not brown. Blend in flour. Combine evaporated milk and chicken broth. Add to vegetables. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick. Add soy sauce and chicken. Heat to serving temperature. Serve with rice. *Next see tomorrow's article for recipes.*

Relax and enjoy the telecast of your favorite football team engaged in New Year's Day Bowl competition. Dinner, in the meantime, can be easily prepared. A standing rib roast of beef will produce leftovers. What is the homemaker's answer to this problem? It can be solved in any number of ways but have you ever thought of using leftover jammed slices of beef as an appetizer?

If not, here is a magic recipe called Meat Appetizer Supreme and in addition to the meat features onion, seasoning, lemon juice and sour cream.

For family or friends, this dinner finale of the holiday season is in the best of taste. Lucky is the family who will receive this traditional treat and lucky is the homemaker who will prepare it.

For it is this homemaker who will spend the time with her family or friends even though she is in command of the kitchen. How is this done? It started back last week when the menu was planned. The day devoted to something special should be planned and why not serve a juicy, done-to-perfection standing rib roast of beef?

Next, the homemaker asks the most retailer to fashion for her a 3 to 4-rib standing rib roast of beef. In doing such, ask him to remove the chine bone to make the carving easier.

Now, it's up to the homemaker. Remember, it's best to cook a rib roast at a constant low temperature. So, set the oven at 300° F. Slice a 4-rib roast, fat side up, in an open roasting pan. Do not cover and do not add water.

TO DETERMINE whether the roast has reached the right degree of doneness, insert a roast meat thermometer in the thickest part of the meat. The thermometer resting in fat or on bone. Roast until the desired degree of doneness—that is 160° F. for rare as indicated by the thermometer; 160° for medium and 170° F. for well done. Generally, allow 18 to 20 minutes per pound for rare; 22 to 25 for medium and 27 to 30 for well done.

Before carving, allow the roast to set 20 minutes.

An appropriate accompaniment for this king of beef cuts is the matching trio. Slice 4 green onions thinly and mix with salt, pepper, lemon juice and sour cream. Pour over meat and chill 1 hour. Place chilled mixture in lettuce cups. Slice remaining onions and sprinkle over meat. 8 servings.

Meat Appetizer Supreme
1 pound cooked beef or lamb, sliced 1/4 inch thick
6 green onions and tops
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup dairy sour cream

3 tart apples
1 medium onion
1 small dill pickle
1/4 cup vinegar
1/4 cup granulated sugar
Quarter and core apples. Put apples, onion and pickles through coarse food grinder. Add vinegar and sugar, and mix thoroughly. Yield: approximately 1 1/2 cups.

Apple-Dill Pickle Relish
Made from apples, onion, dill pickles, vinegar and sugar, the relish is bound to win a round of applause. It can be made in advance and stored.

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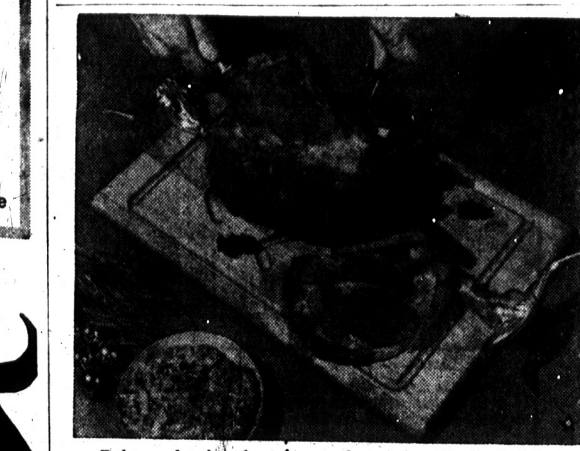
