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Seven Million Dollar Ordnance Regulating Plant To Be Built At Momence

Washington, July 28—(RN Special)—The office of Scott W. Lucas, United States senator from Illinois, today announced the selection of Momence as the general location for a new central ordnance regulating station.

The announcement said that \$7,000,000 has been authorized as the initial expenditure for the construction of the huge plant. The project will take approximately 3,000 acres of land, the announcement said, and about 500 persons will be employed at the

station when completed, it was stated.

Rumors of the establishment of such a plant have been circulated for some time, but not until today have there been any definite indications that there would be such a project. The announcement from Senator

Lucas' office did not give any details other than those above recited.

Several months ago a group from the Momence Chamber of Commerce was attempting to get the government interested in a site west of Momence along the river.

RED ARMY SWINGS TO OFFENSIVE

High Humidity Adds To Heat Effect Locally

Thirteen Dead In Illinois As Result Of The Hot Weather

BULLETIN
The weather bureau predicted the beginning of the end today in the nation's most severe heat wave this year but said there was a "joker" in the forecast.
Showers and somewhat cooler weather tonight were predicted for some of the plains states. The relief was expected to spread slowly Tuesday into Wisconsin, Michigan and late tomorrow into Illinois and Indiana, continuing eastward at snail's pace.
Forecaster G. L. Canaday at Chicago said, however, that the "joker" was that it would warm up again after three or four days of a cooling off process. But he calculated that the humidity which has oppressed millions would be driven away.

Many Kankakeans came to work this morning with sleep still in their eyes.

Last week-end's oppressive heat made sound sleep almost impossible for most residents. The highest recorded temperature—96 degrees at the Republican-News office and 97 degrees at the Kankakee Water company pumping station, occurring about 3 p. m. Sunday—belied the severity of the weather.

Lots of Moisture
The old bugbear of humidity was blamed for most of the discomforts which gave one a feeling of compensation for those who must live and suffer daily in the tropics. The heavy moisture content of the air was still much in evidence today, making freshly laundered shirts and blouses sticky five minutes after putting them on and causing women no end of trouble with their cosmetics.

Even the river temperature rose to 84 degrees and made swimming less agreeable. The water in the Kankakee river was a tub. Nevertheless, bathing and swimming were still about the best means of cooling off.

Three Decatur Men Held In Watseka Jail

Money Theft Occurs During Fight Over Punch Board Number

Gilman, July 28—(RN Special)—Three Decatur men were prisoners of Sheriff Guy E. Redman today charged with robbery and riot Sunday afternoon at the restaurant operated by George Hudson.

The prisoners battled with at least five men who came to assist Hudson during the free-for-all fight in which the restaurant was badly damaged. They made their escape once but were recaptured when they returned to look for the fourth man who came with them from Decatur but took no part in the fracas.

Fourth Man Released
Held in the county jail at Watseka are Lester Cook, 25, a painter; Albert Bowers, 27, owner of a cab company in Decatur; and Forrest Bodiu, 27, cab driver, of Decatur. The fourth man, who was released, was Orlando Floyd Jr., 24, also of Decatur.

All entered the Hudson cafe about 3:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon and ordered sandwiches and coffee. While waiting, they began playing a punch board in the jackpot section. Bodiu claimed to have punched a \$5 number and asked for his money.

Hudson looked at the card and informed that he didn't have the right number, whereupon Bodiu made a pass at Hudson and the battle started. The others pitched in and started throwing utensils and furniture. Hudson was alone in the restaurant and called for help from the adjoining service station.

Loy Hudson, brother of George, Bud Wasmmer and George Whittier came running to assist and by this time Cook had rifled the cash drawer of \$27 and picked up a butcher knife. Whittier flooded him but when Whittier let up, Cook broke off a table leg and struck Whittier in the stomach. Loy Hudson was injured in the groin and Wasmmer was hit on the head with a chair.

As the trio dashed out of the restaurant to their car, Mayor Alvin Mulder and Officer Rouse arrived.

Floors Of Paint Company Plant Fall To Basement

An interior section of the main part of the American-Marletta Paint company's factory building at 925 North Greenwood avenue, collapsed about 8:30 o'clock Saturday night when one of the supporting columns gave way.

Hospital Here Asked To Help Provide Nurses

To Give "Refresher" Courses To Prepare Inactive Nurses

Washington, D. C., July 28—(Special)—St. Mary hospital has been asked by the federal government to assist in alleviating the "present acute shortage of qualified professional nurses vital to national defense," it was learned here today.

Officials of the hospital will be asked by Surgeon General Thomas Parran of the United States Public Health service to submit all estimate and outline of the basis on which the hospital would be willing to conduct refresher courses to prepare inactive nurses in Kankakee for active work.

Congressional Appropriation
Cost of the course will be paid out of a recent appropriation of \$1,200,000 for training nurses for national defense, it was stated.

Dr. Parran has asked the hospital to submit to him by August 1 a statement of its willingness to conduct refresher courses to prepare graduate nurses for active duty, and estimates on the program cost, the number of nurses in Kankakee who might be expected to apply for such training, and an outline of the proposed refresher course.

Although federal funds cannot be used to pay nurses while they are taking the refresher course, Dr. Parran said, the need for public health nurses in cantonment areas and industrial centers is expected to increase greatly, offering attractive prospects of employment to qualified nurses.

Sharpened interest in health and preventive activities already has brought about a shortage of well qualified public health nurses, and greater shortages may be expected in the future," Dr. Parran said.

Ron Hensel, chamber of commerce secretary, was the guest soloist last night, singing "Desert Song" and was called back for an extra chorus.

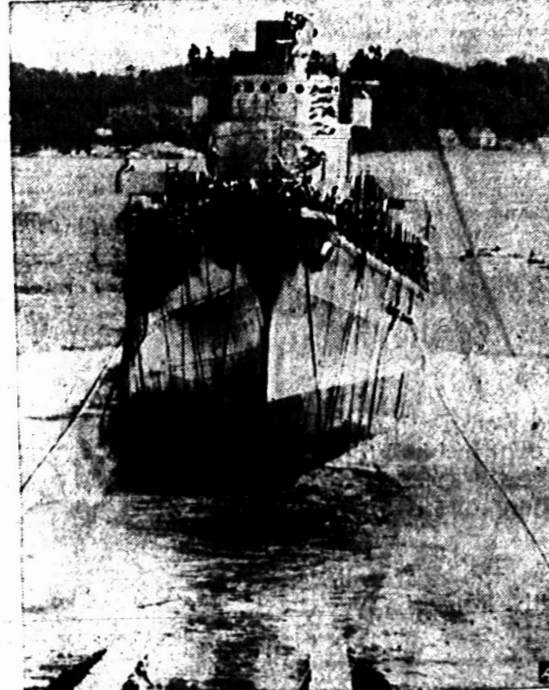
Yale Kesterson, the band's regular soloist, sang "The World is Waiting for the Sunrise" and "Missouri Waltz."

Blitzkrieg Is A Washout Say The Russians

Now An Old-Fashioned Siege; Claim Destruction Of Two Nazi Divisions

Russia declared officially today that Adolf Hitler's 37-day-old blitzkrieg was "a washout," with the conflict now settled down to an old-fashioned siege, and reported the destruction of two German divisions (about 30,000 men) over the week-end.

Countering the Russian assertion, Hitler's high command reported that the "battle of Smolensk," a phase of the German onslaught toward Moscow, was "drawing to a successful conclusion."

The Nazi high command said all Russian attempts to prevent annihilation of their trapped Red armies in the Smolensk sector, 230 miles west of Moscow, had failed.

On the north front, the German news agency, DNB, said advancing Nazi columns had lunged within 48 miles of Leningrad, Russia's second biggest city.

Nazi military leaders also claimed the annihilation of two Russian divisions near Mogilev, at the southern base of the Smolensk salient, with the capture of 23,000 Red army troops, 61 cannon, 80 anti-tank guns and 750 vehicles.

Violent Two-Day Battle
It was apparently in this same area, around Mogilev, that the Soviets reported the smashing of two German divisions in a violent two-day battle.

"At the end of the second day's fighting, our troops assumed the offensive," a Red army bulletin said. "Our tanks annihilated remnants of the enemy batteries and machine-guns. Our tanks and brave infantrymen hurled themselves against units of the German infantry division. Tanks going at full speed crushed and machine-gunned the Fascist soldiers at point-blank range."

"According to preliminary reports, 4,000 German officers and soldiers found their graves on the field of battle. Our stretcher-bearers picked up about 3,000 wounded. A large number of prisoners was taken."

S. Aid At Sea

Pictures U. S. Bombers As Devastating Powers Of Destruction

London, July 26.—(AP)—The British people had the assurance of Harry L. Hopkins, President Roosevelt's lend-lease coordinator, today that American and British ships in the north Atlantic "are patrolling on parallel lanes with only one object in view—to guard the world's life-line."

Hopkins' statement was made in a broadcast address last night in which he also pledged all possible American aid—"and immediately"—to Soviet Russia, in the war against Germany, and to China.

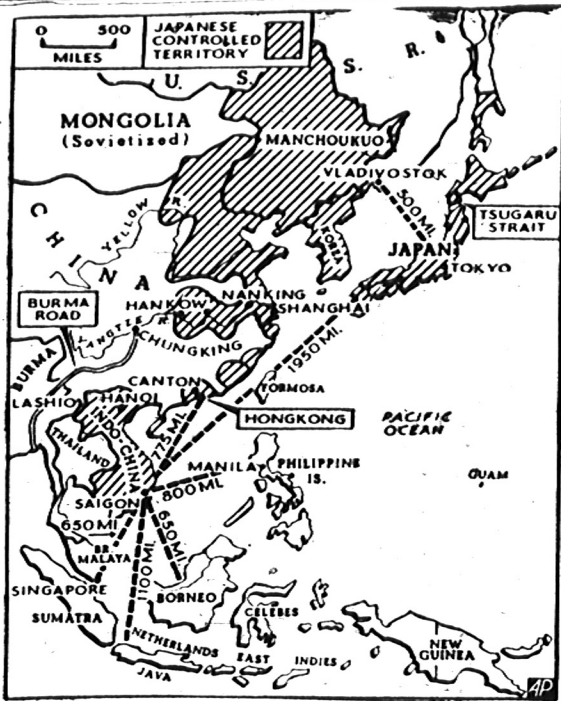
"President Roosevelt, speaking for the people of the United States, is rendering more than lip service," he declared.

"Even now as I speak sleek grey destroyers flying the American flag are plunging their bows into the waters of the north Atlantic. "Once upon a time this mighty ocean separated us. Now it joins us."

Between Hostile Camps Hopkins pictured Germany as caught between two hostile camps supplied by American war industries. He asserted the United States program of turning out bombers for Britain is "far advanced and Hitler will not be able to move his factories far enough to the east to escape their devastating power of destruction."

The presidential emissary, who said he was here to find out exactly what Britain needed for her war effort, added:

"I have found out that there are certain things which you need in order to fight this war for the

democracies. I am confident America can supply them."

He then recounted that in the past several months American-made planes "numbering in the thousands" have been flown or shipped across the Atlantic.

Several hundred tanks have been transferred and food supplies provided along with "a thousand miscellaneous articles all important to the war effort."

Don't Give Religion A Vacation

By Garry Cleveland Myers, Ph.D.
In the United States, many people who live in cities are accustomed to let children take vacation from Sunday school during the summer vacation from day school. At the same time parents also tend to take a vacation from church and Sunday school.

This summer vacation from Sunday school is not so prevalent in rural areas. For example, in a fine large rural Sunday school I visited last June, I observed on the bulletin board that the attendance was the record one for the last twelve months.

Attitude of Parents
The implication of summer vacation from Sunday school and church is that we need to rest from these "labors."

Furthermore, most city children quit Sunday school attendance a few

weeks before school vacation begins and return to Sunday school in the fall several weeks after day school opens—reflecting the parents' attitude toward the value of religious education.

Father Should Attend
As a rule the child who goes regularly to Sunday school will get the most out of it. The earlier the child returns to Sunday school after vacation, the less likely he will be to refuse to go to Sunday school each Sunday morning. Children whose parents always go with them to Sunday school making it a regular Sunday morning family event, rarely object to going.

Whatever our religious faith or preference may be, I sincerely believe that in these terrible times we parents and our children ought to have special reasons to go to church together.

Solving Parent Problems

Q What in your judgment should intelligent parents of young children emphasize in their efforts to cooperate in defending our democracy?

A Bringing up their children to respect the rights of others, to learn self-control, to learn to do hard things, to exercise themselves in self-sacrifice, and to bear responsibility.
