## Taxes, And Taxes

This is no time for any unit of government, either state, county or city, to increase any taxes not connected with the nation's war effort.

All branches of government have always had the fundamental duty of keeping the burden on all taxpayers as light as possible. When public officials forget this, the voters remind them about it on election day.

Today, when every private citizen is called upon to do his part in time of need, it is the duty of all state and local governments to make a special patriotic effort to keep all taxes low.

Every increase in state or local taxes prevents the citizen from putting the amount of the increase into federal taxes or government investments which are so important in bringing the war to a successful and speedy close.

There will be no public approval of the excuse that it cannot operate on present income. Every citizen knows that the reasonable and patriotic solution of the problem is to reduce expenses to meet income.

The Republican organization of Kankakee county has always advocated the lowest possible taxes while maintaining proper public service. Today, it considers keeping all taxes low as one of the most important and it will seriously oppose any attempt to increase any local taxation.

## Kankakee Is Health Zone For Defense

Kankakee County is one of 19 Illinois counties set up today as emergency health defense zones after their designation yesterday by State Health Director Roland R. Cross acting under powers given him by the recent special session of the state legislature.

The legislature empowered the health department to establish and maintain full-time local health departments in these areas, but Cross said lack of funds at present would make it impossible for the state to set up adequate local public health agencies in all defense counties.

He said the department could provide the defense service only by strengthening established programs in existing districts. He said several existing offices of the department would be abandoned when field staff members are transferred to defense units.

According to the law, the health defense zones may be altered with changing circumstances, but Cross emphasized this would probably mean the addition of other counties rather than the removal of any already named.

## I. C. Railroad Has Big Part In War Effort

### Modern Methods Move Troops And Supplies Through Kankakee

The railroad's part in a nation at war was described by Charles A. Heisell of Chicago, general attorney of the Illinois Central railroad, in a talk at the Exchange club meeting Wednesday noon in McBroome's cafe.

He said that 600,000 troops were moved within the boundaries of the United States in less than seven weeks after Pearl Harbor was attacked. The roads pooled their cars and equipment and ran thousands of extra trains, yet the public scarcely knew troops were being moved, so little was regular traffic disturbed.

The Illinois Central operated 687 special trains during the period.

The railroad has learned an important lesson from the previous war, according to the speaker, who recalled that at one time in 1918 during government operation of their lines, 200,000 freight cars loaded with government material choked sidings and yards for hundreds of miles back from the Atlantic seaboard. The roads, cooperating with the War department, have now made plans that will prevent a costly repetition of this mistake.

**New Equipment**  
In addition to handling soldiers and munitions, the rail carriers had an increase of 163 per cent in other traffic last year. Millions now being spent on plant improvement and new equipment are evidence of the optimism of railroad management after 10 years of operating losses during which 30 per cent of all Class 1 mileage was in receivership.

## Brazil Brands Axis Powers As Aggressors

### Confiscates Up To 30 Per Cent Of Funds Of Enemy Subjects

Rio De Janeiro, March 12—(AP)—An angry crowd of several hundred persons, some shouting "kill them!" broke the show window of a black-listed German firm today on Rio de Janeiro's main street, Avenida Rio Branco.

The outburst, directed chiefly at the German store, Casa Lohner, came just after noon and followed upon anti-Axis measures taken by the Brazilian government.

Brazil today confiscated up to 30 per cent of the funds of Axis subjects in this country in a decree which branded Germany, Italy and Japan as aggressors and strengthened belief that a declaration of war might follow.

The decree by President Getulio Vargas said the confiscations were based on "acts of war practiced against the American continent," and singled out Germany as particularly responsible.

Since Germany, Italy and Japan are allies, they are "united in aggression," the decree stated.

It blamed Germany for failure to pay admitted obligations for damages to a Brazilian ship in the Mediterranean some time ago and for attacks on peaceable unarmed Brazilian merchantmen—at least four of which have been sunk recently off the Atlantic coasts of the United States.

Brazil broke off diplomatic relations with Germany, Italy and Japan on Jan. 28.

**To Take Over Embassies**  
Legal sources said that a phrase in the decree calling for seizure of property held by "juridical persons" practicing acts of aggression referred to the Axis governments themselves and meant that Brazil would take over the embassies and consulates of those nations.

Foreign Minister Oswaldo Aranha said Brazil "views the situation with calmness and serenity" but he added grimly:

"The government will take all necessary steps to safeguard the welfare of the country and observe commitments to hemisphere defense."

## Gandhi Sees No Signs Of Terms With British

### Thinks Imperialism Has Been Greatest Crime Against His Country

Berlin (From German Broadcast), March 12—(AP)—Premier Hildebrandt today, addressing a special session of the diet, declared today that Japan was determined to wipe out the last vestiges of British control in India, and warned Australia to fall in line with the "greater east Asia sphere" or be conquered, dispatches from Tokyo said today.

**BULLETIN**  
Wardens (From March 12—(AP)—Despite the British government's announcement of plans for post war dominion status for India, the supreme leader of Hindu nationalists, Mohandas K. Gandhi, professed today to see no sign of settlement for the Indian question.

The frail little man, who renounced the title of Mahatma (saintly one) and even formal leadership of the all-India congress party, said in an interview that Britain must confess "the greatest crime against India"—which he defined as imperialism—and undo it.

Replying to the question, "what should the British government do immediately to settle the Indian problem?" Gandhi said:

"You put a difficult if not awkward question. I hold extreme views about the British connection.

**Crime Against India**  
"In spite of my love for the British, I think their imperialism has been the greatest crime against India. The immediate crime there—what the British government should do is to confess the wrong and undo it."

"Of the undoing there is yet no sign visible in the Indian sky. Yet I cannot help thinking that before Britain can claim moral superiority she must take this first step."

"The all else follows as day follows night. I will not make impertinent suggestions by way of practical steps. Their (the British) conviction of the wrong will show the way."

At I say, Mohammed Ali Jinnah, president of the All-India Muslim league, reiterated that the only solution of the Indian problem acceptable to his organization would be "India's division into separate."

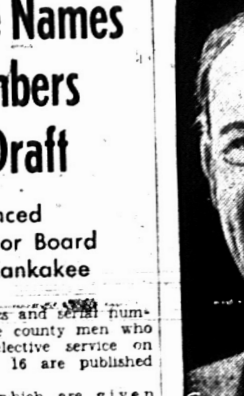

## Premier Tojo Claims 210,000 Allied Prisoners

Japanese Naval Minister Declares Allies Have Lost 130 Warships

Tokyo (From Japanese Broadcast), March 12—(AP)—Premier General Hideki Tojo told a special session of the Japanese diet today that Japan has captured more than 210,000 prisoners since the start of war in the Pacific.

To the diet, summoned to celebrate the conquest of the Dutch East Indies and hear reports on the first three months of the war, Tojo repeated the claim that "the main fleet of the United States and British already has disappeared from the surface of the Pacific," and that "all enemy strongholds in the southwest Pacific are in our hands."

He added that "Japan's defense position along the northern border (the frontier with Soviet Russia) is solid."

General Tojo said Japanese planes and guns had shot down or destroyed on the ground more than 1,600 planes and Japanese forces had captured 2,100 pieces of artillery, 180,000 rifles, machine guns and pistols, and 28,000 tanks, motor cars and railway cars.

The premier said many "industrial establishments and other vital resources" in the Netherlands Indies had been found to have suffered relatively little damage and were being rehabilitated.

**Ship Losses**  
Tokyo, March 12—(Japanese Broadcast Recorded by United Press at New York)—Navy Minister Admiral Shigetaro Shimada told the diet today that Japan had lost 27 transports and 19 warships in the Pacific conflict so far but asserted that the allies had lost a total of 130 warships, including seven battleships and three aircraft carriers.

In a report to the diet, Shimada said that the allies had lost 128 merchantships sunk and 502 captured, while he said that 1,554 allied planes had been destroyed. The Japanese, he said, have lost 122 airplanes.

## Financial Difficulties Increase For Allied Nationals In China

Kinchua, Chekiang Province, China, March 9—(Delayed)—All news obtainable from evacuees and other sources indicates that the financial difficulties of Allied nationals in Shanghai and other occupied cities of East China are increasing, their food is limited and their freedom restricted in varying degrees.

In Shanghai, Shaoching, Chefoo and some other cities movement is permitted within the city, but in Wuhu, Nanking, and many inland cities missionaries are confined to their homes.

I estimate there are 1,500 American and British missionaries in all the occupied areas of China and there is little hope for their release now. Many married couples have been separated and there is small prospect of their being united at present.

In some cities churches are closed. In others they are open under Japanese observation.

Many mission hospitals are open under Japanese supervision, but their medical supplies are insufficient.

Most relief work sponsored by American funds has been stopped or taken over by the Japanese, or will be stopped soon because of financial difficulties and confiscation of supplies.

The Hongkong and Shanghai bank in Shanghai has been liquidated by the Yokohama spec bank. Depositors are allowed to draw 2,000 Chinese dollars and 500 Chinese dollars weekly thereafter up to 50 per cent of their deposits.

From the American Express company, however, they are allowed to draw only up to 10 per cent of their deposits.

The deposits of the Associated Missionary Society, which total 8,000,000 Chinese dollars, have been frozen.

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## Wreckage Of Armada On New Guinea Shores

### Total Japanese Transports Out Of Commission Number 13

Caracas, Australia—(Delayed)—Two days of violent air attack which littered the Japanese-won beach-heads of New Guinea with the wreckage of air invasion armada and battered potential Japanese bases gave directly threatened Australia valuable hours today to muster fighting power for a stand on her own shores.

Japan's first spearhead apparently was blunted by the fierce aerial blows yesterday at hangars and runways of Salamaua and Lae, following up the aerial onslaught the day before which sank, burned or beached at least seven ships and brought to at least 13 the number of Japanese transports put out of action off New Guinea and New Britain.

There was, however, no word of new action today to indicate the next turn of the fight, nor any further news of a second strong Japanese convoy last reported headed for Port Moresby, capital of New Guinea, only 300 miles from the Australian mainland.

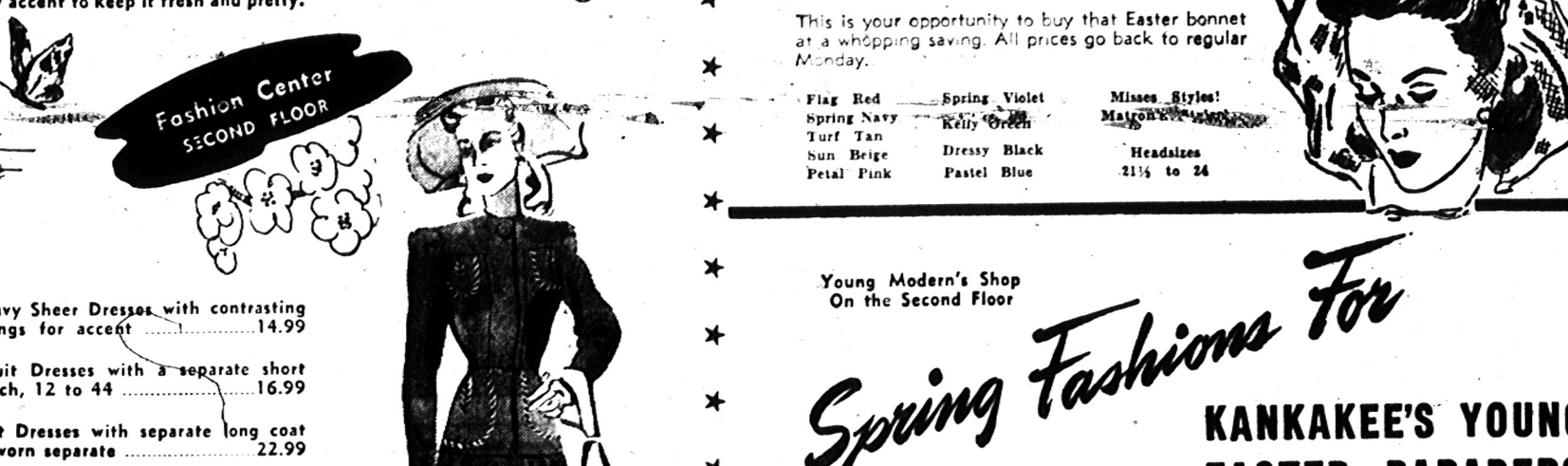

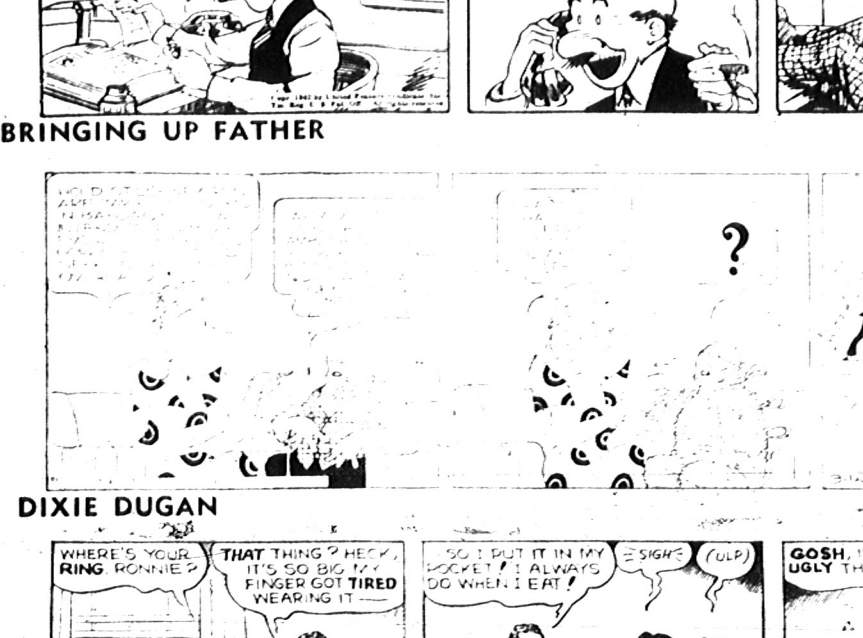

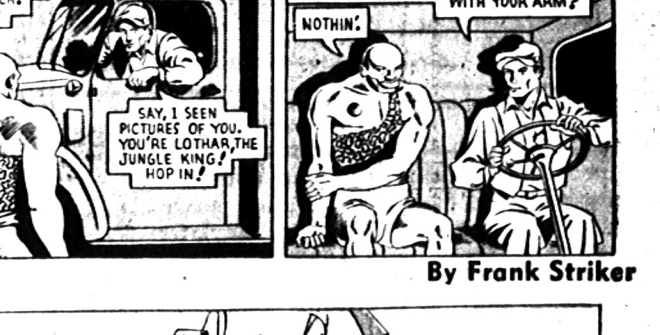

## 49,700 German Casualties On Eastern Front

Soviet Forces Claim To Have Captured 161 Villages And Towns

Moscow, March 12 (UP)—The Soviet army revealed today that it had won a brilliant victory on the Kalinin front, killing 49,700 Germans, capturing 161 villages and hamlets, hundreds of guns, tanks and trucks and breaching the heavily-fortified line Generalissimo Adolf Hitler had commanded his men to hold at all costs.

(Reports reaching London indicated that the Russians on the central front had cut the main road between Vyazma and Smolensk, 135 and 240 miles, respectively, southwest of Moscow, perhaps isolating the Germans in those localities from their main forces.)

A special communique on the Kalinin front fighting said the Germans had been killed and the booty taken from Feb. 5 to March 8. Evidently the communique covered a drive that culminated in breaching the "Strauss line" which the Red army organ, Red Star, announced yesterday.

There was no indication where the Russians broke through. The Kalinin front extends as far west as Velikiye Luki, 280 miles west and a little north of Moscow. Rzhev, bypassed by the Russians in their drive west, is the easternmost position of the Germans on the Kalinin front.

**Trophies Captured**  
The size of the victory was indicated by the communique, which said:

"During the period from Feb. 5 to March 8, troops of the Kalinin front captured from the enemy the following trophies:  
"Seventy-eight tanks, 172 guns of various calibers, 209 rifle throwers, 824 machine guns and sub-machine guns, 181 anti-tank rifles, 568 automatic rifles, 3,432 ordinary rifles, 1,177 trucks, 300 cars, eight field kitchens, 30 wireless stations, two locomotives, 9,000 grenades, 10,500 mines, 7,000 shells, 2,000,000 rifle cartridges, two railway trains with ammunition, two ammunition dumps and two supply depots."

"During the same period 277 Ger-

man aircraft were shot down in air combat and by the fire of anti-aircraft artillery and one airdrome destroyed. Our troops also blew up one armored train with an automatic rifle detachment, destroyed 39 tanks, 142 guns, 70 machine guns, 2,829 trucks, 27 motorcycles, 1374 cars, two locomotives, 104 railway cars, 17 petrol tank cars, one petrol dump and seven ammunition dumps.

"During the same period—from Feb. 5 to March 8—the Germans lost in the area of the Kalinin front 49,700 soldiers and officers killed. One hundred and sixty-one populated places were liberated from German occupationists."

**Red Offensive in Crimea**  
(The Germans themselves admitted that the Soviet offensive in the Crimea was continuing. Radio Berlin said a sector held by the Saxton infantry regiment had been heavily attacked 15 times in the last five days by Soviet troops supported by artillery and mortars. It admitted that the Russians had penetrated German positions, but made the customary claim that they were "eventually driven out, leaving many dead.")

(Radio Moscow said recent German losses around Staraya Russa were "enormous," and that, "in addition to 12,000 lost in the destruction of three fascist divisions, another 1,000 Germans were lost in the last few days.")

(It said the plight of German forces encircled at Staraya Russa was illustrated by a captured order from the German command, which said: "This order authorizes all German units to kill horses for human consumption.")

"Last month, 63 inhabited points were recaptured and 40,000 German officers and men killed," Radio Moscow said.
