LIVESTOCK DAY AT FAIR TOMORROW

HORSE SHOW OF UNUSUAL IMPORTANCE

THOUSAND DOLLAR AND FIVE
HUNDRED DOLLAR STAKES
EXHIBITED TODAY

TUESDAY'S WINNERS

Best Thoroughbreds Of Country
Being Shown at the Inter-
State Fair Here

With one \$1,000 Hunter and Jumper Stake and one \$500 Pony Stake included in the seventeen of the Wednesday program, today's afternoon and evening Society Horse Show of the Kankakee Inter-State Fair will be one of the high lights of Fair Week.

The beautiful, perfectly groomed show horses with their sparkling equipment and faultless handling are arousing the interest of Fair goers and an ever increasing amount of attention is centering in the resplendent show horse events at the Fair.

Yesterday's Horse Show was one of the finest ever seen at the Kankakee Fair, for many years an outstanding leader in this event. Competition in every class was keen, and many events had such large fields of high stepping vying for honors that it became increasingly difficult to choose the winners.

Complained a spectator, "They're all so good, how can I pick 'em?" This was especially true of the class for roadsters in pairs, shown yesterday evening. Entrants in this event were so closely matched that it was some time before the decisions were announced. Signal honors were carried off by the entries of George Peak, veteran Illinois horseman, Second and Third went to the horses of Hutchinson & Hutchinson, and W. D. Alexander, respectively.

The Five Hundred Dollar Junior Stake for five-gaited saddle horses four years old or under, was the feature of last night's show, with a galaxy of peppy youngsters competing for honors. Entries of the Ballard Stables, West Baden, Ind., newcomers to the Fair this year, carried off first and second, third went to W. D. Alexander's Zaida Acres.

The Ladies' Driver Class shown yesterday evening was the most beautiful event seen at the Show this year, and simply belittles adjectives used to describe it. Mrs. A. C. Thompson driving her Earl of Leicester received first, G. A. Nichols and the Hurl Pony Farm were awarded second and third respectively.

The Hunters and Jumpers are receiving their full share of attention at the Kankakee Fair Horse Show this year. Two events of this nature featured yesterday's program. A class for Hunter Pairs jumping abreast was a novelty to many spectators of the large audience which remained to witness it in the afternoon.

The jumping class shown in the evening—the last event before the opening of Thaviu's matchless Cycle of Hits—was featured by some of the best jumping ever seen here.

International Harvester Company
Has a Gigantic Exhibit, also
Other Exhibitors

Following the customs of the past, there is this year at the Kankakee Inter-State Fair this year another gigantic display of trucks, tractors, and farm machinery of all kinds, except that this year's exhibit is much more extensive than it ever has been with more manufacturers and dealers showing.

This exhibit is located at the north end of the midway at the Fair and covers a considerable portion of the grounds. In the day time especially, this department of the fair is a spot of much activity, with the tractors and other machinery in operation, showing the features of each. The display has attracted many farmers and those interested in modern farm machinery.

As usual, the International Harvester Company of America has a large exhibit, showing International trucks of various sizes and with many different bodies adapted to uses of all kinds, McCormick-Deering farm machinery, tractors and farm implements, also cream separators. A giant cream separator, that stands fully twenty feet high, is one of the interesting features of this display.

Sears, Roebuck
Another big display in this department is that of Sears, Roebuck and Company, showing a complete line of David Bradley farm equipment. It is one of the largest of the farm machinery exhibits on the grounds.

Lueth Brothers of Kankakee are showing the new Fordson tractors, manufactured by the Ford Motor Company in Cork, Ireland. John Deere farm machinery, Birdsall farm wagons, John Deere tractors, and repairs for farm machinery.

O'Neill Brothers of Manteno and John C. Gooding of Kempton are showing Massey-Harris implements and tractors, Wallis tractors and New Idea corn pickers and farm machinery.

The Martin Steel Products Company of Mansfield, Ohio, is showing the latest in corncribs, made of steel, in many sizes. The Monroe Road Building Machinery, manufactured by N. S. Monroe and Son of Arthur, Ill., also has a space on the grounds.

William Molthan of Kankakee is showing Allis-Chalmers tractors of many sizes, adapted to various uses. The Habeneht Fresh Water System, manufactured at Tinley, Ill., which provides a water supply for farm homes, also has an exhibit at the Fair.

The Economy Housing Company, manufacturers of big incubators, brooder houses, and self waters, has an exhibit sponsored by Franklin and Franklin of Kankakee. The Joliet Brooder House Company is showing steel buildings for the farm. At another corner of the fair grounds, Edward Rantz of Kankakee is showing Whiteless Wire Stretchers, giving an interesting demonstration.

ENDURANCE MARK BEATEN IN ST. LOUIS

JACKSON AND O'BRIEN EQUAL
HUNTER BROS. MARK
THIS MORNING

AND STILL FLYING

Encounter Storm Shortly After
Equaling Record and Take
On More Gasoline

Lambert-St. Louis Field, St. Louis Mo., Aug. 13—(P)—The veteran endurance team, Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien, flew through rain and the threat of a storm today to a new world's record for sustained flight. They officially regained the record at 9:52 a. m. (CST) when they had been up 554 hours and 41 minutes, slightly more than 23 days.

The new mark exceeded by one full hour the record established last July 4 at Chicago by Kenneth and John Hunter, Illinois farm boys, who after several attempts had wrestled the flight championship from Jackson and O'Brien. The latter pair set a 626 hour record July 31, 1929.

With the record regained, Jackson and O'Brien had no thought of landing but drove on toward a goal which they now have set at 1,000 hours, or about six weeks.

A downpour of rain deluged the field and soaked the crowd, crowd of 2,000 persons who had assembled when the record was broken.

As a burst of sirens, aerial bombs, automobile horns and cheers went up Jackson and O'Brien dropped down low over the field and discharged a green flare. Then they came down to within a few hundred feet of the crowd and waved.

A crowd of about fifty airplane factory workers paraded across the field carrying a banner which read "again Red and Oble." Factory whistles in industrial St. Louis with a chorus of shrieks.

The fliers' monoplane, the Greater St. Louis, a sister ship of the St. Louis Robin in which they set their record last year, appeared to the observers and the ground crew to be functioning.

Lambert-St. Louis Field, St. Louis, Aug. 13—(P)—The monoplane Greater St. Louis, piloted by Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien, equalled the world's record for sustained flight at 8:52 A. M. (CST) today. It had one hour to go to officially break the record of 553 hours, 41 minutes, established July 4 at Chicago by Kenneth and John Hunter.

A light, cold rain began falling a few minutes before the old record was equalled and the endurance plane hovered low over the field.

As radio announcers shouted that the Hunter Brothers' mark had been tied, the crowd, which had scurried to hangars and tents for shelter, burst into cheers and a siren on the field began shrieking.

No sign of a demonstration came from the endurance plane, however, as it continued to drone steadily around the airport.

Fearing that a storm might break, the refueling crew, P. V. Chaffee and William Brewster, went up at 9 A. M. with an additional supply of 70 gallons of gasoline and five of oil, ordered earlier by the fliers. About an hour and a half before that, they had taken up 65 gallons of gasoline. The additional supply was expected to be sufficient to permit the endurance fliers to ride out a storm.

Both Chaffee and Brewster said the steady beat of the Greater St. Louis' motor indicated it was in excellent condition.

BRITISH DIRIGIBLE STARTS RETURN TO HOME PORT TONIGHT

St. Hubert Airport, Montreal, Que., Aug. 13—(P)—Officers of the R-100 were eagerly scanning weather reports today preparatory for the takeoff tonight of the dirigible on the return voyage to England. It was planned to start the flight at 9 p. m. (EST).

Passengers for the return trip of the R-100 include a Canadian technical officer and a number of British and Canadian newspapermen.

FEAR COMMUNISTS WILL TAKE NANKING

Nanking, Aug. 13—(P)—Fears that Nanking, seat of the Nationalist government, would fall into the hands of Communist bands arose today with reports from the countryside saying alleged Reds in peasant garb and armed with rifles had appeared in large numbers 20 miles away. Nanking was virtually defenseless.

Lack of adequate defense forces here resulted in uneasiness as it was believed the city would be easy prey for the Reds if they attacked. The presence of Communists was reported in several nearby towns.

MILLION DOLLAR LIVESTOCK PARADE AT 4 O'CLOCK AND SPECIAL AIRPLANE STUNTS

TUESDAY'S ATTENDANCE BROKE ALL RECORDS FOR ILLINOIS DAY: MRS. MCCORMICK AND OTHER CANDIDATES IN ATTENDANCE; ANOTHER HUGE CROWD ON HAND FOR KANKAKEE AND INDIANA DAY TODAY.

With such notables present in the grandstand as Congresswoman Ruth Hanna McCormick, Republican nominee for U. S. Senator; Chairman T. J. Doyle of the Republican state central committee; Carlos Ames, Republican nominee for sheriff of Cook county; Representative J. L. East and James Snyder, manager of Mrs. McCormick's senatorial campaign, yesterday's attendance at the Kankakee Inter-State Fair broke all records of previous years for Illinois Day. The grandstand was jammed both in the afternoon and evening and the crowd overflowed to the race track infield where standing room was roped off.

Tomorrow, designated as Livestock Day, promises to excel the first four days of the Fair—even today which was Kankakee and Indiana Day. All Kankakee turned out for the Fair today as stores, factories and offices closed at noon in order to permit all employees to witness the day-time exhibition with their families.

HEARING FOR 5 PRISONERS HELD TODAY

GEARYS OF CHERANSE, LESTER BOHANNAN AND CHARLES DAVIS
HELD FOR TRIAL

Bonds Fixed at \$25,000 on Each Charge with Several Counts Against Each

George Cleary, his wife Nellie, his brother Willard, all of Cheshan; and Charles W. Davis and Lester Bohannon, both of Peoria; who are all charged with the recent series of holdups in the vicinity of Kankakee, this morning waived preliminary hearing before Judge Bert L. Fitzgerald and were held for the grand jury.

Bond for each prisoner was fixed at \$25,000 for each individual charge. As several charges have been made against each prisoner, the bonds are quite heavy. There are nine counts against George Cleary, six against Nellie Cleary, seven against Lester Bohannon, four against Charles W. Davis, and three against Willard Cleary. None of the prisoners had secured the services of attorneys.

Mrs. Cleary protested at the hearing. "I never done anything," she said when asked by the court whether or not she wished to waive preliminary hearing or to have evidence heard. "I was just sitting in the car and I never stole anything."

"Did you make any effort to report the robberies to the police?" asked Detective Ed Imming. "No, I didn't," she answered. "You knew about them and were present weren't you?" was the next question. "Yes," was the answer.

Relatives of the Clearys yesterday protested to the statements that watches alleged to have been stolen in the series of robberies were recovered by the police from their hiding place in the Cleary home at Cheshan. They stated that the six watches alleged to have been stolen but in the barn.

DR. RONGETTI GETS ONE TO 14 YEARS

Chicago, Aug. 13—(P)—Dr. Amaneto Rongetti, denied a new trial from his third conviction of a charge of causing the death of Loretta Enders through an illegal operation, was sentenced to 1 to 14 years in prison yesterday by Judge Daniel P. Trude.

A stay of 60 days was granted for an appeal to the supreme court, during which Rongetti will be at liberty under \$25,000 bonds. Rongetti's sentence was fixed at death by the jury in the first case but he was granted a new trial. He was found guilty of manslaughter in the second trial, appealed and won a third.
