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# MEXICO PREPARES FOR WAR

## County School Children Buy \$24,592 Bonds

Rural Pupils Also Salvage 170,918 Lbs. Of Waste Materials

During the past month, Kankakee county school children outside of the Kankakee Dist. 411, have purchased \$24,592.95 in war bonds and stamps and have collected 170,918 pounds of salvage material for war purposes.

Announcing these figures, County Schools Superintendent Ruel E. Hall said that stamp and bond purchases have increased 100 per cent over the previous month, waste paper collections 500 per cent and scrap metals 100 per cent.

Explaining it is impossible to list all the exceedingly fine efforts being made by the various schools, the schools superintendent lists "a few outstanding accomplishments:

**1 Boy Sells Ton**  
Marvin Payne, senior in the Manteno high school, personally collected and sold more than a ton of paper. The student body of this school collected more than 13,000 pounds of paper and 86,100 pounds of scrap iron.

Weirach school No. 131 and Jackson No. 19, one-room schools, each had collections of almost three tons of salvage material. Other county schools listed as outstanding in this activity are—Petersburg No. 4, Barrie No. 18, Keigher No. 29 and Brown No. 80.

St. Anne grade school No. 101 led all schools in paper salvage by reporting 15,973 pounds. Other schools high in this activity are—Petersburg No. 4, Campbell No. 15, Lake No. 46, Bourbonnais No. 53, Frogtown No. 83, Talmadge No. 88, Wicher No. 97 and Union Hill No. 140.

Skirts will prevail in all cases. For summer there's khaki cotton twill and bagginess. For winter there's olive drab covert cloth.

The hosiery will be cotton and rayon, but no one in the department had a word to say about the underthings, either summer or winter.

A WAAC officer in the wintertime will wear a single-breasted, four-button dark olive drab jacket or covert cloth and a six-panel flared skirt of light or dark olive drab. A covert cap will have a semi-stiff crown, a visor and a cloth chin strap.

## Want 1,500 To Take Course As Air Wardens

Response Of Public To Date Has Not Been Satisfactory

Another call for volunteer workers in the Kankakee citizens defense corps was issued today. More than 1,500 men and women are needed to do some of their spare time for training as air raid wardens, emergency firemen, policemen, nurses, aides, canteen corps workers and other defense groups.

To date only a few have clipped the blank which appeared in Wednesday evening's edition of this newspaper, filled it out and forwarded it to the chamber of commerce office or Illinois State Employment office.

At a meeting of the executive staff Friday in the Hotel Kankakee, at which Eugene Anderson, coordinator, presided, it was pointed out that the general public doesn't appreciate the seriousness of this defense work. "Bombs won't wait for defenses to be set up," the committee is anxious to get workers recruited as quickly as possible. Within two weeks, evening courses of instruction are to be started to train each of the groups in their respective duties.

**Need 500 Wardens**  
An air raid warden is needed for every block in the city—more than 500. Hundreds of auxiliary firemen and policemen are wanted along with fire watchers, emergency medical personnel, demolition and clearance crews, decontamination squads, bomb squads, rescue squads, messengers, drivers and others.

These units must be trained to go into immediate action in event of bombing attacks, acts of sabotage or other emergencies which may develop. Every leader in the corps hopes such events will not occur but realizes that the community must not wait until something does happen before organizing to combat it.

The executive committee, district and zone chiefs already have completed courses in first aid instruction, taught by Red Cross instructors, Walter Flanner, Harry Brook and Walter Gall.

The first course of the county defense radio school closes Wednesday night with 24 men receiving certificates of graduation. A new course is to be announced soon.

During the past 21 weeks, prospective military servicemen have studied electrical fundamentals, radio fundamentals, Morse continental code and touch typewriting. They have used the War department's technical manuals as textbooks, are capable of sending and receiving code at the rate of 15 words per minute and know the typewriter keyboard and fundamentals of touch typing.

Gordon Changnon, whose WCLS studio at 362 East Court street has been the classroom, is the teacher in electricity and radio; James R. Wiles, 360 North Prairie avenue, is code instructor, and Miss Mary Gallagher of the Gallagher School of Business provided typing instruction.

Four former students are in service and several others will be soon. Louis Pahnke, 1210 Cobb boulevard, is now at Camp Grant assigned to the signal corps. Robert Roland, 362 East Court street; Donald Gillette of Dwight, formerly of Bradley, and John Reid, 449 East River street, are in the signal corps school for radio technicians in Chicago.

When the school opened Jan. 7 there were 34 enrolled.

## U. S. Ship Sunk In The Gulf Of Mexico

36 Missing In Worst Shipping Disaster; Survivors Landed

Washington, May 23—(AP)—The navy announced today that enemy submarines had torpedoed one ship and shelled another in the Gulf of Mexico.

Both were small United States merchant vessels. Survivors have been landed at gulf coast ports.

New Orleans, May 23—(UP)—Two Axis submarines torpedoed and sunk a United States passenger cargo ship in the Gulf of Mexico May 19, with 36 missing in the area's worst shipping disaster, the eighth naval district announced today.

The vessel carried a crew of 48 in addition to a six man naval crew and eight passengers. Believed dead were 30 members of the crew, five of the gunners and one passenger.

Two torpedoes struck the port side of the blacked out ship at 2 a. m. A third torpedo hit 30 seconds later on the starboard. The first torpedo destroyed the radio room and killed five of the gun crew.

Failed to See U-boats  
Six lookouts failed to see the U-boats. One of the undersize raiders surfaced later, but made no attempt to rescue the survivors.

John Marotta, of Algiers, La., the surviving gunner, said his five companions were killed, and he was blown overboard.

Many of the missing were believed to have been trapped below decks and drowned when the ship sank.

Most of the survivors were in two lifeboats under the command of the ship's master, Lieut. Comdr. Erwin F. Colburn, USNR, of Chatham, N. J. Some of the survivors were able to keep afloat by clinging to bits of wreckage.

A plane sighted the survivors after 15 hours and guided fishing boats to the rescue.

Injured crew members in the marine hospital here included: Joseph Bortels, of Plainfield, N. J., and Ralph Johnson, of West Somerville, Mass. The injured passenger was Clarence T. Balderach of Galveston, Tex.

Missing gun crewmen are Robert Griffin, of Florida, B. B. Drummond, of Baltimore, Mr. Gray of North Carolina, Platts, of San Francisco, Mashack, of Connecticut. The missing passenger is Robert J. Beach, an American from Cristobal.



## 6 Missing, Many Homeless In Flooded Area

Eastern Pennsylvania Transportation Appears Paralyzed

Philadelphia, May 23—(AP)—Streams swollen by recent rains rampaged through eastern Pennsylvania today, causing millions of dollars damage, loss of life, and compelling the vast war material producing plant of the Bethlehem Steel corporation at Bethlehem to suspend operations temporarily.

Two women died of heart attacks. In the borough of Honesdale isolated with transportation and communications cut, residents reported houses collapsed and at least six persons missing, possibly drowned.

The Lehigh river at Bethlehem overflowed and disabled the power plant of the sprawling four-mile long Bethlehem steel plant, navy inspectors stationed there by the government, said.

How soon operations could be restored to normal was a matter of conjecture. City officials called an emergency meeting to plan "all aid possible" to the management.

At Honesdale the Lackawanna river, fed by recent rains, burst through the Seelyville dam three miles above this northeastern Pennsylvania community and sent a six-foot wall of water rushing through the streets just before daybreak.

Telephone company officials reported several houses were toppled over by the flood and it was believed these missing were trapped in their sleep. Communication with the town was difficult.

Residents reported "only four or five houses" remaining on Delaware street in Honesdale where there had been 15.

"Most of the occupants of these houses were evacuated last evening but several may have stayed in the buildings," one said.

Marian Bussa, Honesdale correspondent for the Scranton Times, reported that she saw a house collapse and "there were people in it" because she "heard them scream."

**Creeks Receding Slowly**  
A woman died in Montoursville, Lycoming county, of a heart attack after her home was surrounded by water. At Pottsville, near Philadelphia, a 63-year-old widow collapsed and died of heart disease while trying to remove articles from the

## Congress May Take Action In Few Days

Plan To Seize Axis Property And Intern Nationals

**BULLETIN**  
Mexico City, May 23—(AP)—President Manuel Avila Camacho's office announced he would make public late today a call for a special session of congress to declare war on the Axis and enact all measures necessary to put this country on a "full war footing."

Congressional approval was believed to be a certainty, with the public furious over the news that Axis submarines had sunk a second Mexican ship within eight days.

A responsible government source said the war-time measures to be recommended by the president would include seizure of all German, Italian and Japanese holdings in Mexico, strict surveillance over Axis nationals, control of communications, delineation of restricted military zones, and suspension of certain constitutional guarantees. There were reliable reports that troops already were moving to strategic points to guard against sabotage.

Mexico City, May 23—(UP)—Mexico, enraged by the ruthless sinking of its ships, began the formalities of declaring war on the Axis today.

President Manuel Avila Camacho, after a three-hour meeting of his cabinet, called a special session of congress, and announced it not only would be asked to proclaim a state of war with Germany, Italy and Japan, but also to adopt urgent measures to seize Axis property and intern Axis nationals.

In ordering the permanent commission of congress to convene the extraordinary session at once, Camacho set no time limit, but it was believed that Mexico would be at war with the Axis by Monday since there was no doubt that congress would grant Camacho's request.

Until then, however, no government action can be taken toward the declaration of a state of war, as power to declare war rests with congress. The official announcement did not mention that a state of war exists nor was a state of emergency declared.

**Charge Aggression**  
The government announcement said that "in virtue of the aggression of which the nation has been the victim on the part of the sinking of the Axis-first by the sinking of the Mexican vessel, Potrero del

## Committee Agrees On Pay Boost For Men In The Armed Services

Washington, May 23—(AP)—A senate-house conference committee agreed today on a general pay increase measure for men in the lower ranks of the armed services to a minimum of \$42 monthly.

This tentatively rejected house attempts to raise the minimum pay of buck privates and sailors to \$50 monthly, from present minimums of \$21 and \$30.

Senator Johnson (D-Colo.), one of the senate conferees, said the pay raise as agreed to in conference would cost the government about \$285,000,000 additional each year based upon the number of men in the army, navy, marines and other armed forces on January 1.

Johnson said elimination of the house attempt to boost this medium another \$8 monthly would save an estimated \$175,000,000 on the same basis.

Senators on the conference committee agreed to accept a house provision that would require the war and navy departments to report to

congress every 60 days on the commissioning of civilians without previous military experience.

The conference agreement carries pay-increases for all the lower-paid men in the armed forces and a base pay increase for second lieutenants in the army and marines and ensigns in the navy and coast guard. It also carried increases in subsistence and rental allowances for officers generally.

As a possible offset for the \$8 reduction from the minimum voted by the house, Johnson said conferees had discussed a mandatory \$10,000 life insurance proposal. At present soldiers may have this by paying \$6.50 monthly premium and the new proposal would make this mandatory with the soldier and government dividing costs at \$3.25 monthly from each.

Johnson said this proposal might be included in pending legislation proposing payments to wives, children and dependents of fighting men.

# Sea-Borne Invasion Force Fails To Land

## Chinese Armies Repulse Nipponese With Heavy Casualties

Chinese gendarmes reported today that the Japanese invasion force of a sea-borne Japanese army had been repulsed on the beach at a point about 10 miles east of the city of Fukuoka, Japan.

While the threat to Fukuoka appeared to have been repulsed, the Japanese columns driving into neighboring Chekiang province were reported advancing rapidly on the city.

Chinese dispatches acknowledged that the invaders were attacking Wu, 25 miles northeast of Fukuoka, and that the Japanese had captured Wu and advanced south of Yangtze, by reporting the capture of the city of Wu, which does not appear on most maps, Tungting lies about 10 miles north of Wu.

On other fronts in the Pacific, land fighting against Japanese forces was reported continuing in the Philippines against Japanese forces in the Philippines.
