## WEST COAST BRACES FOR ATTACK

### Deputy Chief Of Gestapo Dies From Wounds

Inflicted By Assassins In Prague Eight Days Ago; Reprisals

#### BULLETIN

London, June 4.—(UP)—A new wave of Nazi terror that may include mass executions was reported following the death of Reinhard (The Hangman) Heydrich, deputy chief of the Gestapo, from wounds inflicted by assassins in Prague eight days ago.

Berlin (From German broadcasts) June 4.—Reinhard Heydrich, 38, Reich protector for Bohemia and Moravia, died in Prague this morning of wounds suffered in an attempt on his life May 27. It was announced officially today.

The assassination of the man known among scores of millions of Europe's oppressed peoples as "Der Henker"—"The Hangman"—is expected to bring about the shooting of hundreds of an estimated 5,000 hostages rounded up in addition to the 163 already slain in swift reprisals. Czech circles in London asserted.

London sources declared Heydrich recently was appointed Gestapo chief for occupied Europe and it was pointed out ironically that the "Butcher of Moravia" died in virtually the same manner as hundreds of hostages he had ordered shot in France, Holland, Belgium, Norway, Poland and other countries during his Nazi career.

A Czech source in London said automatic rifles used by two men to shoot Heydrich were from the ordnance of the disbanded Czech army and possibly were dropped by parachute. The Czech government appealed by radio to the Czechs to stand firm against the Gestapo bloodshed and not disclose those connected with the shooting.

More Czechs Executed  
(Forty-six more Czechs were reported executed yesterday. Among the 163 thus far shot were 29 women.)

"There is no doubt the Gestapo has just begun to kill," a Czech government source said in London. "Hostage shootings will run into the hundreds."

### Soldiers' Pay Increase Bill Is Watched By Senate Members

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—The senate prepared the way today to follow the house in a declaration of war against Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria, but members watched with far greater interest in a maneuver by administration leaders to avoid an immediate showdown on the political-potential issue of a soldiers' pay increase.

With President Manuel Quezon of the Philippines scheduled to address the chamber, Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky said he hoped attention on a proposed motion by Senator LaFollette (Prog-Wis) to bring the pay question back before the senate could be delayed.

LaFollette said he was ready to press for a vote on a motion to discharge the senate conferees, who thus far have refused to agree to a twice-expressed house demand that the minimum pay of the armed forces be raised to \$5 a month.

### Quezon Urges The Senate Remember The Philippines

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—Manuel L. Quezon, president of the Philippines, expressed the hope in an address to a crowded United States senate today that the American people would adopt still another slogan of war—"Remember the Philippines."

The Philippine leader told the senators:

"I am not in this country to persuade you to send forces at once to the Philippines to drive the invader out of my beloved fatherland. Nor will I try to convince you that the Pacific is more important than the European or the Atlantic theaters of war. Those decisions are to be made by you."

### Nazis Routed From Desert Stronghold

British Drive Enemy Out Of Tamar, Southwest Of Tobruk

Cairo, Egypt, June 4.—(AP)—British imperial armored forces were reported today to have routed Axis soldiers from a desert stronghold in a fierce engagement while their Free French allies held fast against efforts by Field Marshal Erwin Rommel to seize the key position of Bir Hacheim.

A middle east command communiqué said British forces, attacking at the "last light of June 2," drove the enemy out of Tamar, 21 miles southwest of Tobruk, a track center around which has occurred much of the fighting in this latest Libyan campaign.

"The enemy is known to have lost at least 14 tanks in this engagement," the communiqué declared.

German Objective  
The German field commander apparently desires to capture Bir Hacheim, southern end of a severed line which once extended to Ain El Guala, to make impossible a British counter-attack from that tiny oasis, about 50 miles southwest of Tobruk.

There are British Indian troops at Bir Hacheim, but British sources said the main force consists of Free French metropolitan troops plus a battalion of the French foreign legion which now is about 85 per cent French.

Italian troops and some German tanks approached the defending positions at Bir Hacheim, but the attack "was not pressed home."

"Our columns in the neighborhood attacked the enemy in the rear," the communiqué said, while the RAP successfully engaged Stuka dive bombers which assailed Bir Hacheim.

Strong Free French and British forces were said to be assaulting German supply lines which flow around the British position at Rotunda Segnali, 44 miles west of Knightsbridge.

The communiqué made no reference to the situation developing north of Bir Hacheim, where Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's armored columns previously had been reported attempting to widen a nine-mile breach in the British line through which the Axis leader was feeding supplies to his hard-pressed forces at Tamar.

### Congress Votes For War Against Balkan States

Senate Approves Resolutions Of House Without Dissent

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—Congress formally voted war against Bulgaria, Hungary and Rumania today, with the senate unanimously approving resolutions passed by the house without dissent yesterday.

Without debate, the senate quickly voted to include the three Axis puppets with three other nations, Germany, Japan and Italy, against which the United States declared war last December.

On vote on the resolutions was 71-0 on Hungary, 73-0 on Rumania.

The balloting was completed in 32 minutes.

Extend Activities  
Congress had been informed by President Roosevelt that Rumania, Hungary and Bulgaria were fighting against the United Nations and were preparing to extend their activities.

Introduced in response to a special message from President Roosevelt, the resolutions directed the chief executive to "employ the entire naval and military forces of the United States and the resources of the government" in war against the three Axis satellites. Rumania declared war on the United States last December 11 and Bulgaria and Hungary followed suit on December 13.

### Armed Japanese Transport Sunk; 12,000 Aboard

Allies Also Send Two Jap Supply Ships Down; Third Damaged

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters announced today that an Allied submarine had sunk a 6,000-ton armed transport with the probable loss of 12,000 Japanese troops in the waters of the southwest Pacific, while four Japanese midget submarines were listed as sunk in the abortive raid on Sydney harbor last Sunday.

Previously, only three of the Tino two-man Japanese undersize raiders had been reported sent to the bottom by harbor batteries and depth charges.

In addition to the troopship, United Nations headquarters said an Allied submarine sank two heavily-laden Japanese supply ships and damaged a third.

A communiqué also reported that Japanese submarines operating close off the east coast of Australia attacked three Allied cargo ships and sank one of them.

The communiqué text  
"In a raid on enemy shipping lanes, one of our submarines successfully sank two heavily-loaded armed supply ships of 6,000 and 10,000 tons, badly damaged a third of 7,000 tons, and sank an armed transport of 6,000 tons with probable loss of all troops."

"The Japanese are notorious for overloading troop transports. It is known that they put more than 12,000 soldiers on some 6,000 ton ships."

Apparently this is the work of our submarines in cruise."

Earlier, General MacArthur's headquarters announced that Japanese submarines had sunk one ship in an attack on two vessels off the east coast of Australia, and Prime Minister John Curtin said at Canberra that three of four Japanese submarines which entered Sydney harbor last Sunday were sunk before they could attack.

Curtin told parliament that the fourth submarine, alone able to fire its torpedoes, also was sunk.

Previously it had been reported that only three midget submarines had been sunk in Sydney harbor, by gunfire and two by depth charges. The only Australian loss in the Japanese foray was a vessel used as a naval depot ship.

### Major General A. E. Inglesh Commander

Springfield, Ill., June 4.—(AP)—Major General A. E. Inglesh of Kankakee was sworn in, by Governor Green today as commander of the Illinois Reserve Militia, succeeding Maj. Gen. John V. Cline, who was retired two months ago when he reached the compulsory retirement age of 64.

### Matinee Slayer Of Sweetheart Taken To Prison

Chicago, June 4.—(AP)—Seventeen year old Clarence McDonald, convicted of the matinee murder of his high school sweetheart, Dorothy Broz, rode to the Joliet penitentiary today to start serving a life sentence.

McDonald shot the girl in the darkened balcony of the Palace theater last Feb. 24. After his arrest he said he loved Miss Broz and was afraid he'd lose her to some other young man.

As he left the county jail today, McDonald, told reporters he hoped to become a good citizen and learn electrical engineering while in prison. He will not be eligible for parole until 1963.

### Ten Killed In Explosion Near Stockton, Cal.

Stockton, Calif., June 4.—(AP)—Ten persons were killed in an explosion and fire at an army station near here shortly before midnight.

The dead were nine soldiers and a civilian fireman.

Ten others were in a hospital. Of these, the condition of five was critical and four were in serious condition.

Lieut. Colonel Floyd H. Tull, commanding officer, said the explosion and fire occurred in a building at the army camp about 11:30 p. m.

In appointing a board of inquiry, he said cause of the blast had not been determined.

Among those injured critically was the civilian fire chief at the station, M. H. Bouchard.

### Quiet Restored In The Bahamas After Monday's Riots

Nassau, Bahamas, June 4.—(UP)—Almost 1,400 native Negro laborers returned to work on two American projects today, as quiet was restored after Monday's riots.

Forty natives faced charges of smashing and looting shops on fashionable Bay street. Military patrols still cruised the riot area.

The return of large numbers of the workers to their jobs was attributed to the tranquilizing influence of a radio address made last night by the Duke of Windsor, governor of the Bahamas, who cut short an official visit to Washington and returned by special plane Monday.

The duke continued conferences with officials on the labor situation. Workers still demanded "fair wages."

### Anti-Nazi Frenchmen Blow Up A German Munitions Depot

Vichy, June 4.—(UP)—Anti-Nazi Frenchmen were revealed today to have attacked a strong German military detachment and blown up a German munitions depot at Hazebrunck near industrial Lille in occupied France where disorders and terrorism are spreading.

The attackers escaped despite the fact that the area, lying in the heavily-fortified German anti-invasion zone along the channel coast, is under strict surveillance.

Lille, near the Belgian frontier, is inland from Boulogne, Calais, Cap Gris Nez and other heavily-bombed targets of the British air force.

Japanese Bomb Alaskan Outpost Bringing Air War To North America

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—The navy, describing the situation at Dutch Harbor, Alaska, as quiet at present, reported today that the second wave of enemy planes which flew over the base yesterday failed to drop bombs and probably was engaged only in reconnaissance.

A communiqué declared total damage at the base was not extensive and fires were quickly extinguished after the initial raid yesterday morning.

While the source of the attacking aircraft has not been definitely determined, the communiqué said, they are believed to have been carrier-based.

The communiqué also announced the loss of the U. S. S. Cythera, a small naval patrol vessel, in the Atlantic area and said that next of kin of personnel aboard the converted yacht had been notified.

The Cythera was commanded by Lieutenant Commander Thomas W. Rudderow of Highland Lane, Bryn Mawr, Pa.

The total of men lost aboard the Cythera, which was described as overdue for more than three weeks, was not given although as a yacht the vessel had carried a crew of 28.

Noen Communiqué  
The communiqué, based on reports received up to noon, eastern war time, today:

"North Pacific area:  
"1. The situation at Dutch Harbor is at present quiet. Yesterday's first raid by the Japanese, appears to have been made primarily to test our defenses. High explosives and incendiary bombs were dropped but, as previously announced, our casualties were light and damage was not extensive. The few fires which were started were quickly extinguished."

"2. The second wave of enemy planes which was reported to have attacked six hours after the initial attack (communiqué No. 63) failed to drop any bombs and appears to have been engaged solely in reconnaissance."

"3. The source of the attacking Japanese aircraft has not been definitely determined but they are thought to have been carrier based."

"Atlantic area:  
"4. The U. S. S. Cythera, a small naval patrol vessel taken over by the navy last December, has been overdue in this area for more than three weeks and is presumed to be lost."

"5. The next of kin of personnel on the Cythera have been notified."

"6. There is nothing to report from other areas."

Other Raids Expected
