Reds Repulse Nazi Attackers Of Sevastopol

Long Besieged Crimean
Naval Base Holds On
13th Day Of Offensive

Moscow, June 18—(UP)—Front
line dispatches said today that Red
army counter-attacks had regained
an outer line of trenches at Sevastopol and smashed a German attempt to cross a strategic river (probably the Donets) on the Kharkov front.

The defenses of Sevastopol remain unperforated after 13 days of savage enemy onslaughts, which continue with undiminished intensity, according to a dispatch to the army newspaper Red Star.

In one sector, the dispatch said, during Russian counter-attacks, captured a line of important trenches that had been seized by the enemy. Berlin reported that the northern defenses of Sevastopol had been pierced and the main Russian base seized.

Dispatches said that the pressure of the German's big drives on the Kharkov front appeared to have slackened as a result of fierce Russian counter-blows, but sharp fighting continued on the whole sector.

Heavy Nazi Casualties
A Praya correspondent said the Red army had repulsed "repeated attempts of the enemy to cross a strategic river with huge forces of infantry, tanks and artillery." The attack cost the Germans another 100 dead, 15 field guns and one artillery regiment, the dispatch said.

The Russians seized the initiative on some sectors of the Kharkov front.

Whether the offensive, said to be in progress on "some sector," would develop into another grand-scale bid for the recapture of German-held Kharkov, was problematical. Observers saw promising signs in the Russians' ability to stop the Germans in their tracks, then take the offensive against them.

The Germans still attacked Sevastopol, Russia's great Crimean port, without success and without success.

Well informed Turkish sources in Ankara estimated the combined losses of Germany and Rumania at Sevastopol thus far at 50,000—about one-third of the German 11th army with which Col. Gen. Fritz von Manstein began the assault two weeks ago.

Believe Japanese May Attack Russian Siberia This Summer

Chicago, June 18—(AP)—While informed sources here believe the Japanese may attack Russian Siberia before the summer is over, the enemy now is concentrating on reinforcement of his air strength in the China and Burma theaters.

Army intelligence reports indicated today that the Japanese now have 500 planes in Burma and have increased the number actually in China to 300, with a fresh influx of planes at Canton and Hankow.

The aerial preparations of the foe have weight to indications that the Japanese would intensify their efforts to tighten the cordon around the still free parts of southern China and thereby strangle off Chungking.

The present nutcracker offensive in the eastern China provinces of Chekiang and Kiangsi is an important part of these efforts.

On the Chekiang-Kiangsi front, the Chinese hold on the important railway looping through the two provinces has been narrowed to less than 50 miles. It appeared tonight on the basis of the Chinese high command communiqué.

The Japanese column from the west had reached the railway town of Kweiki by a detour while forces from the east continued their advance from Shanghai, the communiqué said.

Meanwhile, a Japanese threat to Fukien province, south of Chekiang and east of Kiangsi, seemed to have developed further with thrusts by the enemy from Kwangtung, eastern Kiangsi.

Informed sources here, discussing prospects of a Japanese attack on easternmost Russia said the Japanese had taken certain preparatory steps but were leaving one, reinforcement of the air force in Manchukuo, to the last. There was no confirmation of rumors that the Japanese had shifted many planes from southeastern Asia and occupied China to Manchukuo.

The Chinese informants said, however, that reinforcement of Japanese air power in Manchukuo could be effected easily at the 11th hour when the Japanese are ready to launch an attack on Siberia. Awaiting such reinforcements are large numbers of modern aircraft.

Pacific Coast Attack Threat Diminished

War Secretary Declares
Naval Losses Of Enemy
Has Telling Effect

Washington, June 18—(AP)—Secretary of War Stimson said today the losses inflicted on the Japanese in the Pacific had temporarily but substantially reduced the threat of an attack on the Pacific coast which he has repeatedly said might be expected.

War and navy department information is, he said, that the Japanese thus far had made only a "very small landing" in the Aleutian islands off Alaska but he stressed that fog and unfavorable weather obscured developments in the north Pacific.

Information is still incomplete, the secretary also told his press conference, on the earlier air and sea engagement off Midway.

Enemy Fleet Scattered
"But after three days' fighting the enemy fleet was scattered all over the Pacific ocean, hustling away as fast as it could in the opposite direction, without air protection," he added.

In the Aleutians, Stimson said, the American and Japanese forces thus far had had only fleeting glimpses of each other through the eyes of aircraft.

He promised the government would make available "every bit of information we can," about the Aleutians as well as the earlier engagements off Midway island in the Pacific and in the Coral sea near Australia.

Stimson was asked whether the air and naval losses inflicted on the foe in the last several weeks had diminished the threat to the Pacific coast.

"Temporarily, I should say the threat was much less," he replied. One reason the report was still incomplete on the Midway fight, the secretary said, was that many naval vessels were still at sea on aircraft carriers which were prohibited by radio silence orders from forwarding reports.

Difficulties Encountered
Outlining the difficulties of obtaining a clear and complete picture of a modern sea and air engagement, Stimson noted that the only contact between the American and Japanese forces off Midway was by means of hundreds of aircraft.

"They were shooting in many cases at the same target without knowing that the other fellow was shooting at it," he said. "Flying at about 300 feet a second, there is little time for observation."

Police To Resume Rigid Enforcement Of Traffic Laws

Motorists were warned today by Chief of Police L. B. Rogers that rigid enforcement of the city traffic and parking laws will be resumed Saturday.

American Air Power Takes 10-To-1 Toll

Admiral Nimitz Avers
Carrier Strength Promises
Heavier Blows

Pearl Harbor, June 18—(AP)—American air power exacted a stunning toll of 10 Japanese men and planes for every one lost by the United States in the Coral sea and Midway island battles and rapidly is being bulwarked for even greater sledgehammer blows.

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz made the cheering disclosures yesterday aboard a fighting ship in an address to his Pacific fleet during which he urged the heroic veterans of the two titanic sea fights "to hold the line until our reinforcements are ready to take over."

Victory Changing Rapidly
Acknowledging that losses to United States carrier air groups have been heavy since the war opened, due to initial Japanese air superiority, the commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet strongly hinted that the picture was changing rapidly.

Whereas the personnel on aircraft carriers had to fight on with little rest or relief in the first stages of the war, Admiral Nimitz said "it will soon be possible to organize additional carrier groups and to rotate them."

"We can take satisfaction in the knowledge that in every meeting with the enemy since Dec. 7 his losses have greatly exceeded ours, and that in the Coral sea and Midway actions his personnel losses were at least ten times greater than ours, and his plane losses in almost the same ratio."

Increasing Battle Strength
"We are greatly increasing our battle strength. Our ships, planes and pilots are being added in constantly increasing numbers."

Admiral Nimitz praised the teamwork of the army, navy and marines in achieving the Midway victory, and announced medal awards to personnel of the aviation corps and the submarines.

But he pointed out that air power has played the leading role both in the Coral sea and off Midway "and will continue to do so as the war progresses."

Retribution Against Nazi Killings Urged

Hundreds Reported
Slain Following
Heydrich's Death

London, June 18—(UP)—Demands for "eye for an eye" retribution against Nazi killing of innocent Czechs were voiced in the house of commons today as the German deadline for handing over the assassins of Reinhard Heydrich neared.

Nazi authorities threatened to burn Czech villages to the ground and execute entire populations unless sabotage and resistance ceases and the killers of "the hangman" are turned over to authorities by 8 p. m. tonight, according to British reports.

The demand in the house was made by Sir Thomas Moore, conservative member, who asked whether Prime Minister Winston Churchill would consider sending an immediate warning to the German government.

Demand Retribution
Moore demanded Britain tell Germany that "in the future, an undefended German town or village will be obliterated by the RAF in retribution for every innocent person murdered by the Nazis in an occupied country."

Maj. Clement R. Attlee, deputy prime minister, said:

"There would not be enough villages to go around. You may rest assured that our bombing effort against Germany will be directed against the most effective points."

Meanwhile, reports reaching London said Kurt Kaluege, successor to Heydrich in Prague-Moravia, had warned that other villages must suffer the fate of Lidice for "acts against Germany."

Latest reports on Nazi reprisals were that the number of executions in Prague and Brunn for Heydrich's death had reached 472, excluding an estimated 250 slain when the Germans razed Lidice.

World Execute Nazi Leaders
The Czech government in exile today demanded the right to execute Adolf Hitler, Hermann Wilhelm Goering, Heinrich Himmler and other Nazi leaders when the war ends in retribution for the German reprisals.

In an extraordinary session yesterday, the nationalist government, under the leadership of Edvard Benes, former Czechoslovak president, adopted a resolution formally requesting the privilege of executing the German warlords. The ministers of foreign affairs, national defense, interior and justice were instructed to carry out "without delay everything for the early execution of this measure."

Maintenance Suit Is Continued

The Scroggins separate maintenance suit was continued until September yesterday as Circuit Judge Luther B. Bratton entered an order of temporary alimony.

The suit is by Mrs. Opal Scroggins, 574 North Union avenue, who alleges her husband with cruelty and fraud to support, besides separate maintenance she asks custody of a son Vernell, 16.

The husband has entered denial of the charges, alleging quarrelsomeness and desertion on the part of his wife.

Judge Bratton ordered him to pay \$60 a month for the support of Mrs. Scroggins until the September hearing.

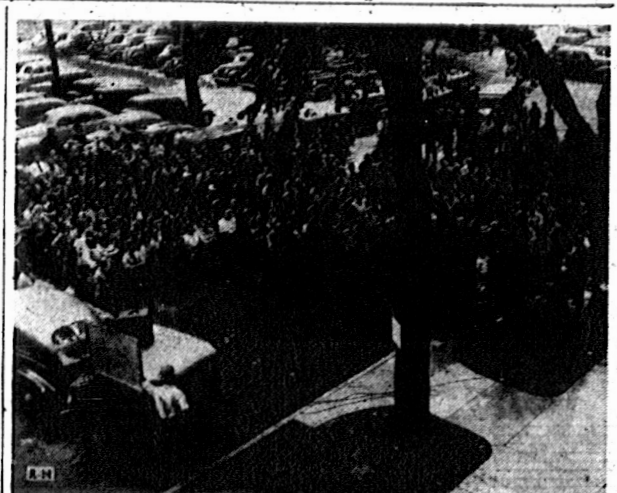
Couple Reconciled In County Court

Mexican Patrol Planes Scour Gulf Waters And Pacific Coast

News of aid to the United States in the war on Axis submarines came from Mexico City today, with the announcement that Mexican patrol planes are scouring the Gulf of Mexico and the Pacific under orders to "sink on sight" all prowling undersea boats.

While the officially announced toll of ship sinkings since Pearl Harbor remained at 276 in the Atlantic and adjacent waters, Gen. Robert Fierro, chief of Mexico's military aviation, said:

"Our pilots are winging far out to sea, searching for the enemy everywhere. We have no news of any encounters yet."

Mexico declared war on the Axis powers three weeks ago.

Fierro said 12 modern patrol planes have reached Mexico in recent days and already are in service.

From Washington, Vice Admiral Robert R. Waesche, commander of the U. S. coast guard, stressed the need for sacrifices by coastal fishermen. Replying to a protest from the Atlantic City tuna club against the 12 mile ocean limit for sport and commercial boats, the admiral said "We must make sure that no contact is made with enemy submarines. We know such contacts have been made and we can't be too careful. Some sacrifices will have to be made. . . . Restrictions will have to be enforced."

The torpedoing of an unidentified Allied merchantman was disclosed late last night with the landing of 15 survivors at an eastern Canadian port.

Berlin (from German broadcasts), June 18—(AP)—The German high command announced today that 15,000 tons of merchant shipping along with one British destroyer, an escort vessel and a submarine chaser had been sunk by a flotilla of German motor torpedo boats' attack.

German Assault On Tobruk Near Critical Stage

Situation Reverts To
Same As During Long
Siege Of 1941

Cairo, June 18—(AP)—The British fell back to fortified positions near the Egyptian frontier today, leaving the famous fortress of Tobruk all but surrounded by Marshal Erwin Rommel's German and Italian divisions.

Only a coastal road remained open to link Tobruk with the Egyptian border 80 miles eastward. Apparently British Gen. Neil M. Ritchie's eighth army split into two forces, one remaining to man the defenses of Tobruk against imminent onslaught or a siege such as that which endured for nearly eight months in 1941.

British forces still were on the perimeter of Tobruk's south and southwest defenses, where they hurried back repeated Axis assaults last year and where they stood when relieved by a British westward offensive on Dec. 10, 1941.

Thus the situation now was almost the same as that during the long siege.

Set Up New Lines
British headquarters reported the removal of the garrisons of El Adem, 18 miles south of Tobruk, and Sidi Barrani, 25 miles to the southeast, strong points of their rearguard defenses since the Axis Gazala-Bir Hacheim line was shattered by German-Italian attacks.

The troops set up new lines between Tobruk and the Egyptian frontier, British observers said.

(The Italian high command asserted aerial reconnaissance showed that the British had started a general withdrawal toward the Egyptian border.)

Tobruk, 80 miles west of the Egyptian border, has been held by the British since they captured it from the Italians on Jan. 22, 1941. Its small but deep harbor is the best for more than 1,000 miles between Alexandria, Egypt, and Tunisia.

In the absence of direct word concerning Axis, 20 miles west of Tobruk, British quarters believed it probable that the British forces had retreated from there.

The 61 year old monarch whose government, one of the United Nations, has functioned at London since the German occupation of Holland in May, 1940, planned to spend a few days in Canada with her daughter, Princess Juliana, and her two granddaughters, before continuing on to the United States.

While in the United States she will visit President and Mrs. Roosevelt. It was officially announced.
