LEWIS WINS
SENATORSHIP;
LANDSLIDETREMENDOUS PLURALITY IS
GIVEN DEMOCRAT IN RACE
AGAINST TWO WOMEN

WETS ARE VICTORS

Illinois Voters Express Them-
selves As Opposed To The
Prohibition Laws

Chicago, Nov. 5.—What had appeared to be a Democratic landslide throughout the state looked more like a personal victory for the senatorial candidate, James Hamilton Lewis, as belated returns came in from downstate Illinois today.

Whereas the former senator, in piling up a margin that promised to reach more than 700,000, had carried downstate counties by comfortable pluralities, the rest of the state Democratic ticket was running behind the Republicans outside of Cook county.

Cook county gave the entire Democratic ticket a lead that, although much less than Col. Lewis' margin, would have put all of the candidates in office had the downstate sector given them a fairly even break.

The slower returns from downstate, however, showed Republicans considerably ahead in the contests for congressman-at-large, state treasurer, state superintendent of public instruction and trustees of the University of Illinois.

The two Democratic candidates for congressman-at-large were ahead in the whole state by virtue of their plurality received in Chicago but their lead was being cut down by downstate returns.

Meanwhile Col. Lewis continued to increase his lead over Ruth Hanna McCormick, Republican candidate, with downstate counties adding to the enormous Cook county plurality.

Downstate Illinois joined with Chicago to put the state on record as favoring repeal of the 18th amendment, modification of the Volstead Act and repeal of the Illinois Prohibition Act.

The contest for congressman-at-large was close and gave prospect of getting still closer. William Dietrich, Democrat, led in the state and his party mate Walter Nesbit, was next. Frank L. Smith trailed. Downstate Illinois, however, was going stronger for the two Republicans and with not quite half of the precincts reported gave Yates a lead of 60,000 and Smith 50,000 over Dietrich.

Edward J. Barrett, candidate for state treasurer, held a lead of 100,000 over the Republican, Clarence F. Buck, although downstate gave Buck a plurality.

On most of these returns downstate Illinois was less than half reported while 3997 of Cook county's 5470 precincts had been tabulated.

The complexion of the Illinois delegation in the house of representatives remained in doubt with Republicans leading in eleven contests and Democrats in ten. Two of the remaining six seats seemed likely to go to Republicans on the face of very incomplete returns while the Democrats had the edge in two others. In two districts returns at noon were so meagre that any prophecy of the result was impossible.

In Cook county the Democrats appear to have gained four, or possibly five, state senators, and three members of the house of representatives.

The Democrats also appeared to have annexed a seat in the 49th, or East St. Louis district, where E. P. Kline was leading Ed. P. Petri, Republican. This seat is now held by Ernest J. Abt, Republican.

The returns indicated the Republicans had a net loss of four seats in congress, having apparently lost

DRIVE OPENS SOON

Annual Roll Call To Take Place
On Thursday, Friday And
Saturday, Next Week

Rev. G. A. Ekstrand, Red Cross chairman of the Kankakee County chapter, reports that encouraging co-operation has been evidenced from every one who has been asked to take part in the fourteenth annual Red Cross Roll Call to be held in Kankakee Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week, November 13, 14 and 15.

The Kankakee County chapter quota this year is only 1900 memberships, which is much less than the board of directors thought would be allotted to our county, owing to the increased demands on the National Red Cross organization funds. With the fine record of the Kankakee County chapter, there seems to be no reason why the county quota will not be oversubscribed.

Many civic-spirited and loyal women of Kankakee are offering their services during this roll call, and within a few days a complete list of committee workers, together with locations each committee will take care of, will be printed in the daily newspapers. In order that the public will be familiar with the program, and particularly where they may renew their Red Cross enrollment this year.

"The American Red Cross is called one of the most worthy enterprises which we have in the United States. It is a permanent organization which provides relief made necessary where disaster occurs. According to its charter, it must continue to carry on a system of national relief in times of peace and to apply the same in mitigating the suffering caused by pestilences, famine, fire, floods and other great national calamities," says the committee.

President Hoover expresses the opinion "That the American Red Cross is one guarantee to the American people that in calamity, loss of life shall be prevented and suffering lessened to the utmost degree. The Red Cross is chartered by Congress but receives no financial support from the government. The scope and effectiveness of its service depends upon the measure of support given by the citizens through individual memberships annually renewed."

The local chapter is certain that Kankakee will respond to its annual duty and opportunity for participation in the work of the Red Cross and will contribute liberally.

Late Figures
On Election
Of Tuesday

Chicago, Nov. 5.—Superintendent of Public Instruction Francis G. Blair was the first person on the Republican state ticket to take a lead over his Democratic opponent today as election returns continued to be compiled. Gradually wearing down the plurality given Eva Batterton, Democratic candidate in Cook county yesterday, Blair jumped ahead on the compilation of 5,324 out of the state's 7,109 precincts. His vote was 707,158 compared with 696,571 for Mrs. Batterton. Other candidates, with the exception of Ruth Hanna McCormick, Senatorial nominee, were picking up votes in the downstate counties but still running behind the Democrats.

Amsterdam, Nov. 5.—The huge German flying boat, D-4, arrived at Amsterdam at 4:30 p. m. on Nov. 5.
