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## 4 Dead As Train Hits School Bus

PACKLER, Ala. (AP)—A freight train crashed into a school bus near this northeast Alabama town today, killing at least four children and leaving three critically injured.

Highway Patrolman T. W. Freeman said the train, a local freight out of Chattanooga, had sliced through the bus just behind the middle and dragged part of the wreckage three quarters of a mile before it stopped.

"It's obvious the driver just didn't see the train," said Freeman. The driver, Charlie Beavers, was in critical condition.

FREEMAN SAID the train was traveling about 55 miles an hour on a straight track in clear weather when it smashed into the bus at the dirt road crossing. Freeman said he understood there were about 10 children on the bus.

The dead and injured were taken to hospitals and funeral homes at the nearby towns of Stevenson and Scottsboro.

At Scottsboro, hospital officials said there were two dead and two injured critically.

At Stevenson, hospital officials said they had received two dead and one critically injured.

## President To Start Soviet Trip June 10

Will Return Visit Made By Premier Nikita

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower's crusade of world travels to promote peace and freedom will take him behind the Iron Curtain into the Soviet Union for 10 days starting June 10.

Dates for the President's trip, planned since last summer, were announced Sunday by the White House and the Soviet government.

The U.S. announcement was made in Albany, Ga., shortly before Eisenhower flew back to Washington after a weekend of quail hunting.

In going to the Soviet Union Eisenhower will be returning the two-week visit which Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev made to the United States last September.

THE PRESIDENT will go first to Moscow. He also will visit a few other cities in the Soviet Union but "there has been no final decision as to which ones."

There were no immediate announcements as to whether the President will be accompanied by Mrs. Eisenhower and their four grandchildren. Khrushchev invited the youngsters when he met them at the President's Gettysburg, Pa., farm.

Diplomatic sources in Moscow said Eisenhower will stay in a guest house in the Kremlin rather than the Kremlin palace.

EISENHOWER'S trip will be part of his campaign of worldwide travel in behalf of what he terms "peace and friendship-in freedom."

Khrushchev's two weeks in this country seem to have made no basic improvement in relations, and now he is pushing a new pressure drive to force the Western leaders to give up protection of West Berlin.

That will be a main issue at the Paris summit conference starting May 16, less than a month before Eisenhower's arrival in the Soviet Union. The President, Britain's Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and French President Charles de Gaulle will meet with Khrushchev at the Paris session.

Thieves and break-in artists put in a busy weekend in the Kankakee area, looting business places in St. Anne, Morocco, Ind., Beecher, Manteno, a Kankakee service station and attempting to loot a Kankakee home and stealing a number of hubcaps here in the city.

However, lawbreakers are going to find it more difficult to operate in Beecher, as a result of action taken Sunday in an emergency meeting of the village board of trustees.

Norman Holdt, village president, called the board into special session to hire another night patrolman to give the village around-the-clock protection. Previously there was no night policeman after 3 a.m. A cleaning establishment was looted Friday.

Hired Sunday to fill the gap in full-time protection is Arnold Menke, who had been a part-time policeman up to this time. He begins his duties immediately.

Entered in Beecher were the R. L. Reising Sales, Inc., and Beecher Recreation, a bowling alley. Thieves tried to enter a pastry shop next to the Reising firm, but succeeded only in knocking the knob off the front door, without gaining entry.

The St. Anne Grain Co. was entered and in Manteno the Frederick's Jewelry Store.

Here in Kankakee the Floyd Schweigert service station was looted of two large wall mirrors from the ladies' rest room, and someone tried to enter the first floor of Mrs. A. D. Green's home, 1451 E. Oak St., after getting in-

## Strike Closes Most St. Louis Grade Schools

Other Buildings Also Due To Halt Classes

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A strike of 550 custodians and matrons today forced officials to close most of the city's 139 elementary schools. Some 80,000 pupils were affected.

Members of Local 118 of the Public School Employees Union went on strike this morning. Pickets were established at various school buildings.

At least two high schools also were closed. Three more were due to suspend classes at lunch time because cafeteria employees would not cross picket lines.

Those schools remaining open have automatic gas or oil heating plants, serviced by stationary engineers. Many of the engineers went to work before pickets were posted.

SCHOOLS HEATED by stoker-fired furnaces, tended by custodians, did not remain open although principals, teachers and pupils reported for classes.

H. Lee Bruns, president of the Board of Education, said he would call a special meeting this afternoon to deal with the strike. There was a possibility the board would seek an injunction against the strikers.

The board was to decide this afternoon whether to request students to report for classes Tuesday.

School bus drivers, landscape and maintenance employees, also members of the striking local, stayed away from work.

The custodians and matrons are seeking an average wage increase of \$200-a-year per man. They threatened a strike last November when the board turned down their demands. At that time the board said it did not have the funds to finance the increase.

Custodians earn \$3,001 to \$5,521 annually, with average salaries amounting to \$4,000. Matrons earn from \$2,880 to \$2,312 annually.

## Berserk Woman Shoots Husband, Five Children

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP)—A woman recently released from a sanitarium went berserk in her home today and shot her husband and five children. The husband and one child were killed, and three other children were critically wounded.

Police said Martha A. Hall, 38, reamed the house with a .22 caliber pistol about 6 a.m., shooting her husband and four of the children in the head.

Hall, 40, and Kevin, 4 months old, were dead on arrival at Hollywood Memorial Hospital.

Three other children—Curtiss, 2; Christa, 8; and Mary Jean, 5—were rushed into emergency.

The fifth child, Judith Ann, 12, grappled with her mother and was just grazed by a bullet. However, she also was taken to the hospital in shock.

Judith Ann called police after her mother had emptied the gun. Mrs. Hall was jailed on an open charge.

## Ike Proposes Tax Hike On Gasoline

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower today sent Congress his election-year budget and said it promises a \$4,184,000,000 surplus that can pave the way for a tax cut, possibly next year.

For the present, however, Eisenhower proposed raising more revenue. He said Congress should increase the federal gasoline tax by half a cent a gallon—to 4½ cents—and add a penny each to the 4-cent letter charge and the 7-cent air mail rate.

The President implied that unless Congress votes these and other revenue measures—and resists any urge to boost spending—the predicted surplus will melt away and with it, hopes of broadscale tax relief sometime after the November election.

For the 1961 fiscal year that begins July 1, Eisenhower estimated record revenues of \$4 billion dollars. He called for spending of \$79,816,000,000.

THIS WOULD produce the biggest surplus in 13 years—a margin of black ink which the President said should be used to reduce the record national debt of \$292 billion dollars. He said a debt cut would counter inflation and spur savings needed to stimulate new economic growth.

Eisenhower said the projected spending level will permit small increases in both the military and foreign aid budgets, a major step-up in space exploration and record outlays for water projects.

Although allotting 50 million dollars more for defense, the budget proposes small cuts in purchases of missiles and ships and a big reduction in aircraft purchases.

CUTS IN non-military programs generally were small and scattered. Eisenhower asserted that if the fiscal blueprint can be translated into reality, the president and Congress to be elected in November will have an opportunity to cut taxes, assuming prosperity continues.

"Soundly conceived tax revision can then be approached on a comprehensive and orderly basis, rather than by haphazard piecemeal changes," he added.

Eisenhower did not say specifically that a tax cut should be considered in 1961. He merely pointed to this as a possibility during the two-year tenure of the Congress that will convene next January.

He also commented the legislators might prefer debt reduction to tax reduction.

THE LAUNCHING of four probes toward the moon or the planets, along with the eight satellite ventures, is not a great advance in number from the current program. It is a rate NASA hopes to continue for the years ahead.

But the new satellites and probes will be more complex and will be designed to gather more advanced information.

"The areas receiving primary emphasis in 1961 are the manned-space flight program—Project Mercury—and the development of very high thrust boosters... under the Saturn and related projects," Eisenhower said.

"In Project Mercury, if the preliminary tests and experiments continued to be successful, actual manned space flights may be attempted in 1961."

## Daley Orders Full Report Of Robberies

CHICAGO (UPI)—The arrest of eight policemen accused of collaborating with a burglar threatened today to mushroom into one of the biggest scandals ever to hit the Chicago police force.

The eight were to appear before a county grand jury today on charges of helping the burglar steal about \$100,000 worth of goods from North Side stores.

Top police officials, meanwhile, investigated records and complaint books of a North Side police station where most of the policemen were assigned during the two years the alleged burglary gang operated.

At least three other policemen were believed under investigation. Mayor Richard L. Daley, who throughout his terms of office has said he wanted to rid Chicago of its reputation for "gangsterism," returned from a Florida vacation Sunday and ordered a full report on the matter.

The eight policemen were arrested Friday by fellow officers in surprise raids at their homes. Each was suspended from the force, subpoenaed for the grand jury hearing and released in \$3,000 bond on burglary charges.

Four truckloads of loot, identified as that stolen from several stores, was carted away from seven of the policemen's homes.

Richard Morrison, 23, a confessed burglar who tipped police off to the operation, charged that the policemen acted as lookouts while he looted stores for goods they had ordered.

## Asks Defense Job Ban For Officers

WASHINGTON (AP)—A legislative ban on defense firm sales jobs for officers and civilian officials just out of military service was prepared for House introduction today.

The bill provides a two-year interval before former defense personnel could sell to the Pentagon. It carries out the main recommendation of a House subcommittee which studied the employment of such officers and officials by defense contractors.

Chairman F. Edward Hebert (D-La.) of the House Armed Services Investigations subcommittee is introducing the bill.

In addition to recommending uniform criminal legislation replacing a variety of seldom-used laws, the subcommittee in a report Sunday called on the Defense Department to issue a code of ethics for retired officers and to draw up regulations against possible abuses in buying.

THE REPORT drew attention to testimony about golf parties in the Bahamas at which the Martin Co.

entertained Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and other high ranking officers.

The report also mentioned the planning, and later canceling, of a dinner by defense contractors at which it said Lt. Gen. Bernard S. Schriever, commanding general of the Air Research and Development Command, had been expected to "discuss... problems affecting his official position."

The subcommittee said service spokesmen agreed such things should be handled by regulation. "We shall await the next move of the secretaries," it said.

# Budget Contains 79 Legislative Proposals

The 952-page budget which President Eisenhower sent to Congress today contained no major surprises.

The President revealed the principal figures 11 days ago in his State of the Union message.

Altogether, the document included 79 legislative proposals, these being the most important:

- Increase postal rates by 544 million dollars a year. This was 150 million more than was requested, and refused in 1959.
- If Congress again bypasses higher rates, as seems likely, spending will be increased by a like amount since postal revenues are used to reduce the department's demands on the Treasury.
- BOOST THE** gas tax to 4½ cents a gallon until June 30, 1964, when the rate would revert to 3 cents. This would produce an extra 500 million a year to speed construction of superhighways—a program handled through a trust fund outside the budget.
- Congress last year boosted the tax from 3 cents to 4 cents for a 21-month period beginning last October and is expected to resist the new request.
- INCREASE** the tax on aviation gasoline to 4½ cents a gallon, from 2 cents, and establish a new 4½ cent tax on jet fuels. These action, also requested in 1959, would add 72 million dollars to revenues.
- Eisenhower also asked that aviation taxes go into the general fund, instead of the highway trust fund.
- POSTPONE** a scheduled June 30 cut in corporation income and excise taxes. Unless this is done,

Treasury revenues would drop at least 3½ billion dollars a year.

- Increase the national debt ceiling temporarily. Eisenhower said the prospective surplus plus cash on hand will permit cutting the debt to 280 billion dollars by the end of fiscal 1961. However, he said seasonal borrowings next fall will make necessary a temporary increase in the ceiling.
- The permanent ceiling is 285 billion dollars and a temporary lid of 295 billion expires June 30.
- REMOVE** the 4½ per cent interest ceiling on money borrowed for more than 3 years. Eisenhower already has submitted a special message renewing this 1939 request but congressional Democrats have shown little enthusiasm.

Here are the spending plans Eisenhower blueprinted for major programs:

- DEFENSE** outlays will inch upward by 50 million dollars to \$40,995,000,000. Aircraft purchases will be cut by 642 million dollars to six billions. Missile procurement will drop by 21 millions to \$3,479,000,000. Funds for the new ships will be seven millions lower at \$1,644,000,000.

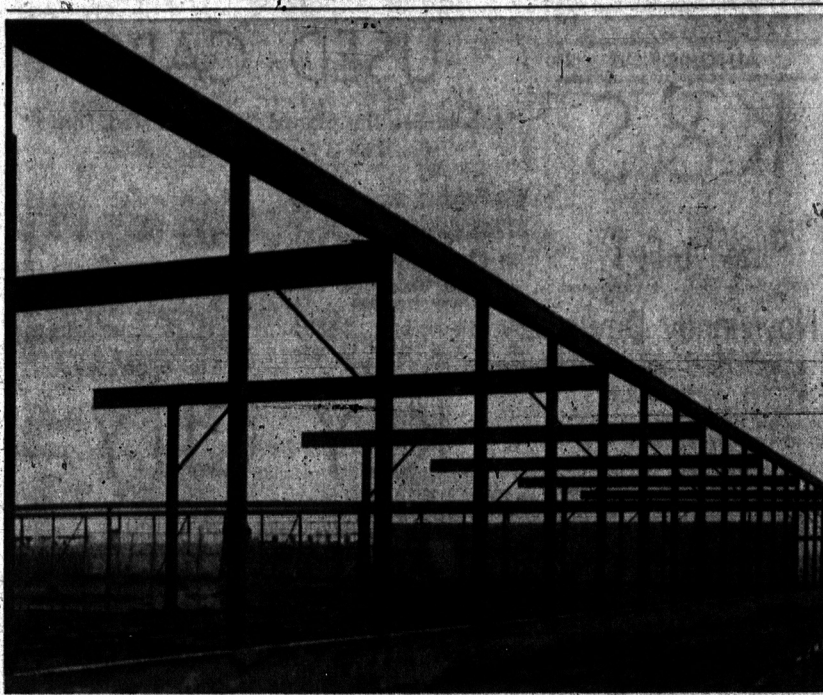

Also on the fiscal 1961 schedule is a new aircraft carrier, but without the nuclear power plant the Navy wanted.

- ATOMIC** energy programs will cost an estimated \$2,689,000,000—about the same as this year. A cut in uranium purchases will be offset by "substantial increases for research and development."

- Space exploration outlays will be increased by 275 million dollars to 600 million.

- Foreign aid spending is pegged at \$3,450,000,000, a boost

- Agricultural programs will cost an estimated \$5,623,000,000 an increase of 510 millions, mostly for the price support programs. These and other farm price stabilization activities would account for 451 millions of the increase and \$3,950,000,000 of the total.

- VETERANS** services and benefits will increase by 314 millions to 15,471,000,000, because of higher pension rates voted last year and an increase in eligible veterans.

- Labor and welfare spending will rise by 128 millions to \$4,569,000,000. The largest increases are for medical research and hospital construction.

- Commerce and housing is the only broad category to show a drop. Estimated spending is down by 293 million to \$2,709,000,000. However, the postal rate request of 544 million more than accounts for this.
