More Delay In Court Street Project Seen

The Court street improvement project is fast becoming one of a "believe it when it comes" status as another delay in construction appears imminent.

Sees Boost In Budget For Defense

Might Add Half Billion Dollars To Military Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Dennis Chavez (D-NM) said today he expects the Senate Defense Funds subcommittee to add another half billion dollars or more to the annual military money bill.

Chavez is chairman of the subcommittee, which Tuesday added more than 600 million dollars to the bill already passed by the House. Further additions of the size he predicted would put the total more than a billion dollars above the amount President Eisenhower asked for the fiscal year which starts July 1.

CHAVEZ PREDICTED in an interview the subcommittee would:

1. Add 294 million dollars for production of B-70 supersonic missiles eliminated by the House when it passed the bill.
2. Provide 285 million dollars additional for development of the supersonic B-70 weapons system which the House and administration limited to 70 million for two prototypes.
3. Approve part of the House increases of 250 million for quick expansion of the military airlift and 207 million for modernization of the Army.

Chavez discounted any idea that recent rocket rattling and tough talk by Premier Nikita Khrushchev and other Soviet spokesmen had caused support for bigger defense spending.

Expect Cuban Crackdown On Oil Companies

HAVANA (AP) — The Cuban government is expected to crack down on two U. S. oil companies and a British firm after their rejection of a government order to refine Soviet crude oil at Cuban refineries.

The two American companies, Standard of New Jersey and Texaco, notified the Cuban Petroleum Institute they could not depart from their traditional Venezuelan sources of supply. The third foreign operator of a refinery in Cuba, British Shell, reportedly sent a similar letter to Prime Minister Fidel Castro's regime.

The government is expected to deny the companies dollar exchange to purchase Venezuelan crude, forcing them to operate at a heavy loss or suspend operations. Government seizure of the refineries would almost certainly follow a shutdown.

The institute announced May 27 that the three companies each had been allotted 300,000 tons of the Soviet oil to refine this year. By this, the Cuban government expected to save 24 million dollars annually in dollar exchange, nearly a third of the dollars it normally pays for oil imports.

Cuba is getting the Soviet oil in exchange for sugar under the trade agreement signed earlier this year.

Nixon Encouraged By California Primary Results

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon said today the vote he received in Tuesday's California primary provides "great encouragement" for Republican prospects of carrying the state in November.

"I am gratified by the heart-warming vote of confidence from the voters of my home state," Nixon said in a statement.

"The surprisingly large McLain vote indicates that independent Democrats still control the balance of power in California's election and that, despite the higher Democratic registration, Californians continue their tradition of independent voting."

George H. McGovern, vice-presidential promoter, polled about 30 percent of the Democratic vote in his contest with Gov. Edmund G. Brown for control of the state's delegation to the Democratic National Convention.

Acquit Trucker In Sniper Slaying

PAINESVILLE, Ohio (AP)—A jury today acquitted Floyd E. Hargrove of the Christmas Eve sniper slaying of Charles R. Clark, husband of the woman he loved.

The 35-year-old former truck driver heard the verdict after less than six hours of deliberation by the jury of 11 men and one woman. His trial lasted more than three weeks. Hargrove was charged with first degree murder.

New Building Ordinance For Bourbonnais

Provides Higher Fees, Inspectors, Sets Regulations

A new and comprehensive building ordinance for Bourbonnais was adopted Tuesday night by the village board.

The ordinance provides for a building inspector, increased building permit fees, and sets regulations for inspection, plumbing, electrical and construction work.

The ordinance prohibits any type of remodeling, construction, additions or demolition of existing buildings without a permit. The minimum fee is \$1 for repair projects costing under \$100.

A FLAT \$5 FEE was set for garages and utility buildings. Remodeling projects over \$100 have a fee of \$10 for work up to \$500 with an additional fee of \$1 for every additional \$100 work.

The minimum fee for homes is \$50 for the first \$9,000 with an additional \$5 for each \$1,000 cost. For multiple dwellings there is an additional cost of \$10 for every unit above the first unit.

Fees for commercial units are \$100 for the first \$20,000, \$25 for the next \$50,000, \$15 for the next \$75,000 and \$5 for each additional \$5,000.

These fees are in addition to regular sewer and water connection charges. In the past home permits have cost \$1 per \$1,000 with a minimum of \$10 and garage and remodeling permits \$1 per \$1,000 with a \$2 minimum.

The sewer tap fee is \$18 and the water tap fee \$75 including meter.

THE ORDINANCE prohibits use of trailers for dwellings or businesses other than construction site offices. It sets a minimum of \$9,000 on new homes or buildings converted from one use to another.

Permits are not to be granted unless architect's plans or adequate plans drawn by a person building for himself are submitted.

All water and sewer installations are to comply with the state plumbing code. New plumbing, whether in a new or remodeled building, must be inspected and no drain or storm water will be permitted to drain into sanitary sewers. Clean-out traps are to be installed at the head of sewers outside of buildings.

The building inspector is in charge of issuing permits, collecting fees and making all inspections including open-wall inspection for wiring and plumbing and final inspections for clean-up and road repair.

The owner or agent is to notify the inspector so he may make the open-wall inspection within three days.

THE BUILDING inspector is also in charge of seeing dangerous buildings are repaired or conditions remedied and has the power to stop construction or wrecking of buildings where done in a reckless manner.

Jets Crash In Illinois; Two Killed

CARROLLTON (AP) — Two F101-B Voodoo jets collided in the air, exploded and crashed in flames today, killing two of the four test pilots aboard.

The sleek planes, capable of more than 1,000 miles per hour, fell to earth about seven miles south of this southwestern Illinois community.

The dead were engineer pilots employed by the McDonnell Aircraft Corp. of St. Louis.

Their identities were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

The other two pilots, identified as Lt. Cmdr. Albert Moro and Lt. Cmdr. John F. Ebersbaker, both of the Navy, parachuted to safety.

Cause of the air collision was not immediately known.

A spokesman at McDonnell said the two Navy men were in one jet testing it for final acceptance by the Navy.

Illinois State Police reported the planes were from the McDonnell Aircraft Corp. in St. Louis. The collision occurred southeast of Carrollton, north of St. Louis, and the wreckage landed in two counties.

Wreckage of one plane fell in the southeastern part of Greene County and its occupants parachuted to the ground. The other plane crashed in a corner of Jersey County which adjoins Greene County on the south.

Names of the victims and survivors were not learned immediately.

3 Chicago Men Elude Police Net

CHICAGO (AP)—Three gunmen broke out of a police net near Barrington Tuesday night by kidnapping three persons, forcing two of them to drive to Chicago.

Kidnaped were Mr. and Mrs. Fred Vallery of Barrington, who were released unharmed on the Near North Side, and Lakewood Police Chief Ed O'Neil, who was released after being pistol whipped.

Scores of policemen had tracked the gunmen south from Fontana, Wis., where they had held up a store.

NEAR LAKEWOOD they were stopped by O'Neil. But one of the gunmen forced his way into O'Neil's squad car and ordered him to drive into Lakewood.

The gunman pistol whipped O'Neil when he tried to escape but a short while later fled himself, boarding a car following the squad car.

A few hours later, police said, the trio, driving a stolen car, forced the Vallery car off Roberts

Station Street Plan Approved

Engineering plans for the resurfacing, curbing and sewer project on W. Station street, in planning for some time, have been state approved, and are back in the hands of city engineer Charles Gregg.

Next step on the project will be advertising for construction bids, but this may be delayed for a time, depending on the possible conflict with work scheduled on the Court street improvement project.

"I do not want both streets tied up to traffic at the same time, nor do our people want it either," Mayor Ed P. Madison said.

The Station street project, which calls for resurfacing, installation of storm sewers, curbs and gutters from the Illinois Central tracks west to the Kankakee River bridge, bears a 90-day work time limit, according to engineer's specifications.

COURT STREET WORK, when approved and under construction, will be far more of a major task and require approximately four months.

Backs Advance Approval Of Japan Security Treaty

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. J. William Fulbright (D-Ark) voiced his full support today for Senate ratification of the new U.S.-Japanese security treaty in advance of President Eisenhower's visit to Japan.

He and other members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, of which Fulbright is chairman, said they are convinced Eisenhower will go to Tokyo June 19 unless the Japanese government should ask a delay.

THE WHITE HOUSE said Tuesday "no change is contemplated" in plans for the three-day visit.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter gave the committee what Fulbright called a "persuasive case" in support of a trip now,

despite left-wing demonstrations and riots in Japan.

Herter discussed the situation with the committee during a 30-minute closed door session. That followed his public appearance to urge Senate ratification of the new treaty.

But Fulbright said Herter still did not set entirely at rest his misgivings about the advisability of the trip now.

SEN. RUSSELL B. Long (D-La.) told a reporter "it is up to the President to decide," but added: "I still hope he will not go unless he has reasonable assurance he will not be subjected to the kind of indignities the Communist sympathizers heaped on Vice President Nixon in Venezuela."

Fulbright said he will ask the committee to consider approval of the treaty next Tuesday with a view to speeding it to the Senate floor for ratification later in the week.

"I know of no opposition in the Senate to its ratification," he told reporters. "If there is, the treaty could run into a delay. But if it is possible, I'd like to see it ratified before June 19, the date of the President's visit to Japan."

Senators generally refused to discuss Herter's case for the trip but presumably he told them the President could not back down on a commitment to the Japanese government, or run the risk of losing face.

School Principal Shot; Nab Suspect

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP)—A suburban school principal was shot and killed today with two blasts from a shotgun as he sat at his desk.

Within an hour police arrested Lester Betts, about 40, a mail carrier and former president of the Parent Teachers Association of Blaine, on the northern edge of Minneapolis and St. Paul.

There was no immediate explanation for the shooting.

Betts is married and has two children.

Keep In Trim Jolt-Off Emergency Fare For Discouraged Dieters

By IDA JEAN KAIN

"I am just about ready to give up..." This "Mayday" distress call from a Maine dieter is typical in late spring. The most distressed letters come from dieters who have taken off 20 some pounds by dint of diet and then run into a brick wall. This one writes: "I made up my mind two months ago to diet without any help from pills or medicine."

"I wrote for your Hunger Control Diet and 'Calorie Chart.' I lost line at first. In two months I have taken off 20 pounds. But I still weigh 167... and for the last three weeks, trying, the pounds bound back. I'm just about ready to give up. The only thing that keeps me on the diet path is the fact that I look and feel so much better with this weight off. Please tell me how I can start losing again. What can I be doing that is wrong?"

All dieters in the same predicament, tune in. It will be easier to keep your spirits up during a weight plateau when you realize this leveling off is part of nature's rhythm during a reducing period. For a stretch of three, four, or more weeks you may not lose. Don't give up now!

AT THIS POINT YOU will find it helpful to change your diet a little and cut down to 800 or 900 calories a day, but for two days only. Ordinarily this dietitian does not favor rigid diets made up of a few foods. So-called "quick diets" are of no help. To begin with, the idea that any diet followed for a few days can be of

any permanent value in solving your weight problem is a snare and a delusion: You can lose on such fare, but as soon as you go back to your regular ways of eating, the pounds bound back. Then, too, short term diets do nothing to help change your food habits. In the long run it is only by making a definite change in your food habits that you can control your weight.

However, for those who have lost 20 pounds and appear to have stuck rock bottom, here is an emergency menu:

Mistakes That Spoil Perfect Appearance

4. Eyebrows rough? All too few women are conscious of eyebrows. They should be styled with, and their short sleeves, put elbows in the public eye.

5. Slip straps marring your necklines? No need for this! In the dime store you can buy lingerie straps, which are pinned to the shoulder seams of your dresses. These ribbon straps snap around slip and bra straps, pulling them toward the shoulder and keeping them from intruding on a wide neckline.

6. Are shoes shined and well-heeled? Don't forget you have feet! We've seen all too many otherwise well-groomed women wearing shoes that are either in desperate need of polishing or definitely very down-at-the-heels.

Regular Check-Ups Prevent Baby Ills

It costs money to go to the doctor. Is it important? Grandmother says it's all a lot of nonsense running to the doctor all the time. Her children never saw a doctor unless they were really sick, and they did all right.

But did they? Maybe she has forgotten Uncle Ben's running ear that developed into a mastoid infection and caused deafness in his left ear. Maybe she doesn't believe that Aunt Alice really didn't have to suffer from flat feet all her life.

Statistics tell a little of the story. In 1900, of every 1,000 babies born in this country about 100 died before they were 1 year old. By 1950 this figure had dropped considerably and by 1959 only three babies out of each 1,000 born died within the first year.

IMPRESSIVE AS these figures are they do not tell the whole story. It isn't only that medical knowledge has increased to the point where we can keep babies alive, it is that we can prevent little ailments from becoming lifelong handicaps.

Tessy's mother thought her baby was just about perfect. She ate and slept and gurgled her contentment with life. She came in to the doctor's office for her one month check up. Her weight was good. She looked pink and healthy. But as the doctor laid her on her stomach and stretched her legs down he noticed that the folds in her plump little buttocks and legs were not symmetrical. He turned her over and pulled on her legs and hips.

"We have trouble here," he said gently to Tessy's mother. "I want an X-ray of these hips."

The X-ray showed, as the doctor feared, that the left hip bone was not properly in its socket. Tessy's legs and hips were put into a cast. It took her a year-old now and runs and jumps like every other 2 year old.

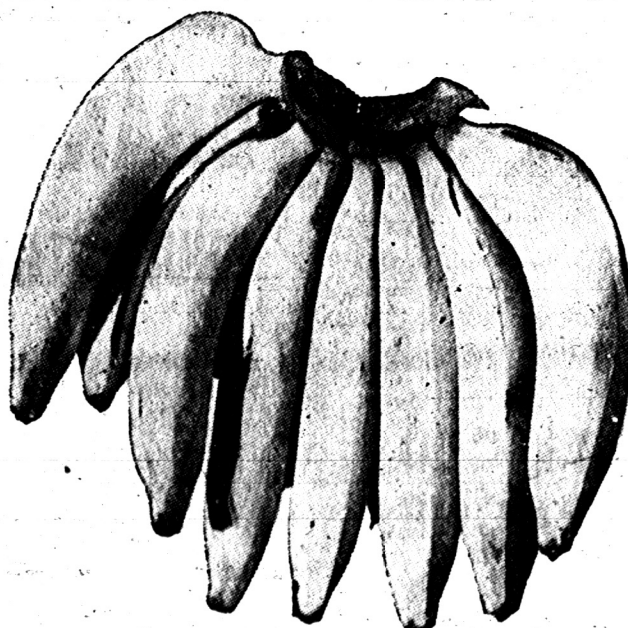

Interest Rates Fall; But U. S. Has Troubles

NEW YORK (AP) — Interest rates are falling, but the U. S. Treasury is still struggling with the seemingly endless task of handling the huge federal debt on terms that the investing public will take.

It's trying new schemes from time to time. Huge chunks of the federal debt floated back in the days of 2½ per cent interest keep coming due. The Treasury hasn't the cash to redeem them and retire them. It must raise new money to meet them—and pay a lot more for it than 2½ per cent.

And it must do this without upsetting the other investment channels—that is, the markets for corporate, state and local bonds, for short-term business and consumer borrowings, and for home mortgages.

Also it can't float a bond paying more than 4½ per cent that has won't let it pay more, and even with weakening interest rates investors aren't yet buying long-term bonds at that rate.

THE TREASURY'S latest gimmick is borrowed from Canada. This is to offer holders of some 11 billion dollars in 2½ per cent bonds maturing in November 1961 around \$½ billion dollars worth of new notes and bonds paying 3½ to 3¾ per cent, depending on maturity dates.

This may look like a windfall for such holders. They will get the higher interest between now and the time the old bonds come due.

But that isn't the Treasury's purpose. It wants to extend the payment date, because of the crash of bonds and other securities coming due next year, and thus free it of some of next year's refunding task. The higher interest offer might work.

The U. S. Treasury had its big success when it offered individual bonds paying 5 per cent for less than five years, but it figures it can do better now.

The Treasury also is plagued by the excess of redemptions of savings bonds over new sales. So it has raised the interest rates on these bonds, with some but less than full success. It would like to see more of these bonds held by the public—and not redeemed—because they are less inflationary than the Treasury securities, especially the short-term ones, that can be marketed.

SALES TO SERIES E and H savings bonds rose in May to 340 million dollars, 11 million better than the year before. Redemptions dropped to 412 million from 432 million a year ago—but the Treasury drain was still there, if smaller.

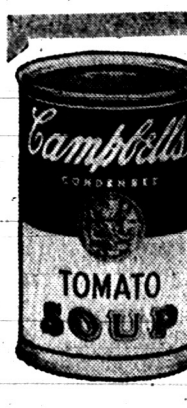

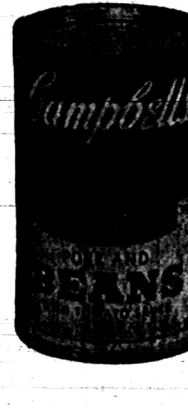

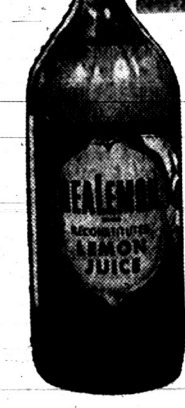

Plan Counter To Anti-Ike Drive, Japan

TOKYO (AP) — Japanese conservatives today made plans to rally 600,000 Japanese to give President Eisenhower a rousing welcome, countering leftist demonstrations against his visit.

Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi's Liberal-Democratic party and Japanese business leaders joined in a "National Welcome Committee" to ensure a warm reception when the President arrives June 19.

An organized reception for the President was made necessary by mounting leftist opposition to the visit and student threats to stage a giant sit-down strike on the highways of Tokyo's International Airport to impede the President's landing.

Behind the students are Socialist, Communist and left-wing labor groups contending that Eisenhower's visit amounts to interference in the bitter dispute over ratification of the new U.S.-Japan security treaty.

KISHI IGNORED a boycott by the Socialist minority in Parliament and opened a debate in the upper house aimed at final ratification of the treaty.

Kishi and Foreign Minister Aichihiro Fujiwara explained government arguments for the new treaty, which permits continued American use of Japanese military bases for at least another 10 years but gives Japan more say in controlling deployment of U.S. forces from Japanese bases.

Without upper house action, the new treaty automatically would take effect on June 19—the day Eisenhower arrives—or 30 days after his approval by the lower house. Apparently the government felt earlier final ratification might take some of the steam out of the anti-Eisenhower demonstration.

The government planned to designate 10,000 civilians to help 9,000 police quell any disorders when Eisenhower arrives.

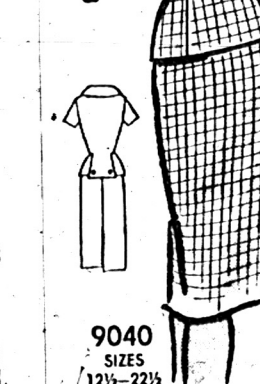

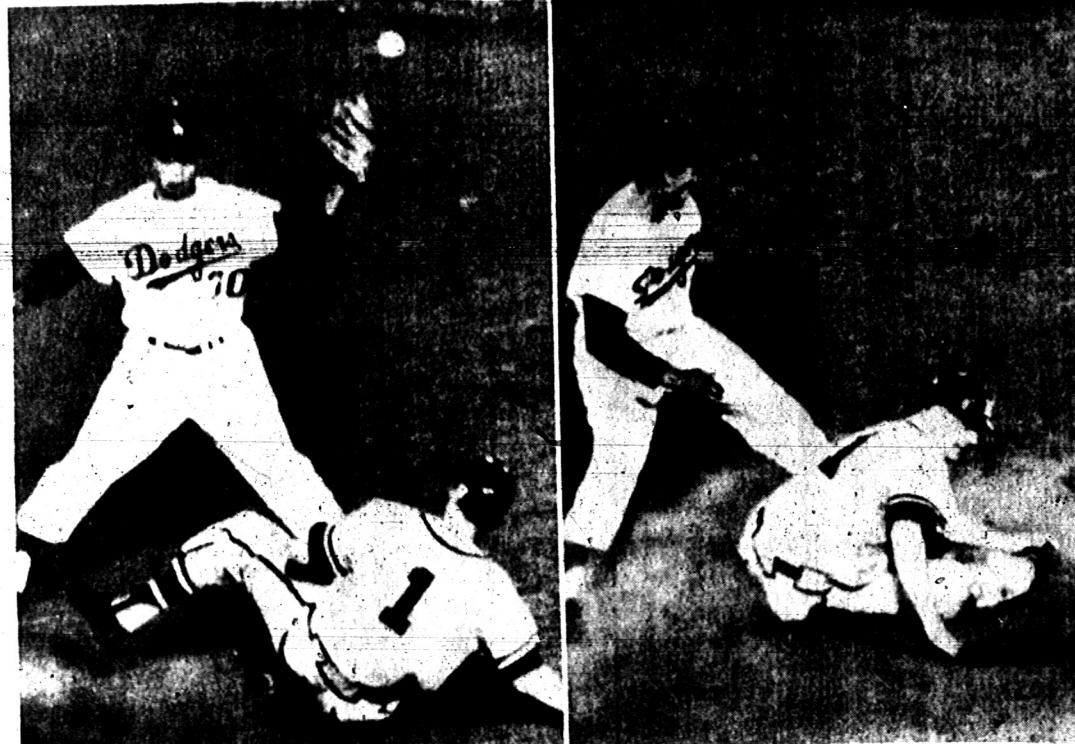

Demo Candidates Start Pincer Play

WASHINGTON (AP)—A pincers movement aimed at squeezing Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo) and Adlai E. Stevenson out of the Democratic presidential nomination race was under way today.

Supporters of Sens. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass) and Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex) worked independently to chop what support they could away from their two rivals.

Johnson's strategists said some Symington delegates had made overtures to them. Kennedy's camp claimed some success in wooing Stevenson backers, including endorsement of Kennedy by three men who had been close advisers of Stevenson in his 1952 and 1956 presidential campaigns.

OUTSIDE OF Symington's supporters, there was a general consensus that Kennedy and Johnson, the Senate's Democratic leader, have come close to making it a two-man affair with the odds pointing to one or the other as the eventual nominee.

The Symington camp contended that the Missouri senator will be the man most available if the two theaders bump into a stalemate.

They hope former President Harry S. Truman, now openly supporting Symington, will be able to help maneuver the Missouri senator into position at the proper time.

Stevenson's backers in Congress are inclined to count Symington out of the running. Their view is that if there is a voting deadlock, the delegates will turn again to Stevenson. They concede the odds are strongly against any such result.

Stevenson, who has said he isn't seeking the nomination and doesn't expect to get it, is reportedly preparing a statement to clarify his position.

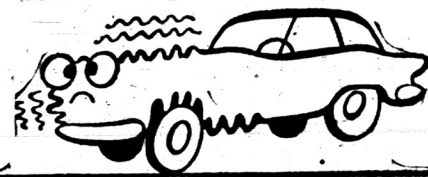

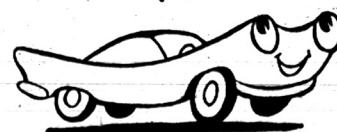
