## NEW COLLEGE TAKES VIATOR

### JAPAN RESENTS U. S. ATTITUDE AVERS PREMIER "America Does Not Try to Understand"

Tokyo, Feb. 7.—(UP)—Suggestions that all Americans withdraw from China are of such grave importance that a definite decision regarding them cannot be reached immediately, Foreign Minister Hiroshi Arima said in parliament today.

Arima was asked whether it was the intention of the government to advise the United States that all American residents should withdraw from China.

"That is a grave question," Arima answered. "I cannot reply at present."

Premier Admiral Mitsumasa Yonai also discussed United States requests for guarantees of the security of American nationals in China.

Has No "Ill Feeling"

Yonai said that he had no desire to interpret the American request for a security guarantee for American nationals in China "with ill feeling" but he said that Japan would have to reconsider the status of Americans in China if the United States continued pressure against Japanese activities in China.

Earlier Yonai told parliament: "If the United States does not try to understand the true intentions of Japan and attempts to exert more pressure we are prepared to take a firm attitude."

Tada Matsumoto, questioning Foreign Minister Hiroshi Arima in the lower house, said that a speech which American Ambassador Joseph Grew delivered before the recent expiration of the Japanese trade treaty insulted Japan because it implied that the United States was conversant, but Japan was not conversant, with the situation in China.

In the speech Grew said frankly, at a luncheon at which many important Japanese were guests, that the United States did not like the course Japan was pursuing in China.

Arima replied that he was not able to make public all the 600 incidents in China of which Grew had complained as having been against American interests.

Regarding Russian relations Arima, asked if Russia showed sincerity in negotiations with Japan, said:

"There are degrees of sincerity." He disclosed that he was "emphasizing" to Russia the importance of ceasing assistance to China.

### BRITISH SHIP, MUNSTER, SENT TO THE BOTTOM

**All Passengers and Crew are Believed Safe in Port**

London, Feb. 7.—(UP)—The British passenger-cargo steamship Munster of 4,300 tons, sank today after an explosion which was reported due to striking a mine.

A mine struck the forward part of the vessel and blew away the wireless and aerial making it impossible for the ship to call for help," The Evening News said.

The authoritative Press association said 180 persons were aboard the ship. All were saved and landed at a northwestern port in England.

Four of five crew members and about 15 passengers were taken to hospitals suffering from minor injuries and shock. Only one crew member, who was scalded, was detained at a hospital for treatment.

"Nobody from the ship was lost," said an official of the company owning the Munster.

**Estonian Ship Lost**

Three persons were known dead and three were missing from the crew of 19 of the Estonian steamer Aina, 590 tons, which struck a mine off the east coast of England Tuesday night, it was learned today. The captain and his wife were lost. Thirteen survivors drifted ashore on a raft after a hazardous journey.

### TWO MEMBERS OF OUTLAWED I.R.A. EXECUTED

**Extra Police Are On Duty in Various Cities**

Birmingham, England, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Two members of the outlawed Irish Republican army died on the gallows today in bleak, fog-shrouded Winton Green, gaol, and Great Britain waited vigilantly for the execution of Irish Nationalists.

As a clock chimed nine, the hour of doom, those in a throng outside the prison bared their heads in the chill mist. There was no sign of a demonstration.

Silently the crowd watched when, seven minutes later, a prison official tucked up notices of the execution on a small door in the center of the prison gate. The notices disclosed that the men, James Richards, 29, and Peter Barnes, 32, went to death at the same moment.

Extra Police Guard

Thousands of police reinforcements were held on overtime duty in London and other large cities on the possibility that the execution might signal a new outbreak of terrorism.

Extra guards had patrolled the prison grounds and Birmingham police the nearby streets to block any attempt at delivery of the condemned men.

There was the first civil trial and execution of Irish Republican extremists since the 1867 hanging of three men for the killing of a Manchester police sergeant.

There also were the first death sentences handed down since the I. R. A.—outlawed in Great Britain and Ireland—began its violent campaign a little more than a year ago for the avowed purpose of "driving the British out of Ireland."

The I. R. A. wants a union between Ireland (Akreir) and northern Ireland (Ulster), which as a part of the British united kingdom pays fealty to the British crown.

Authorities were confronted, above all, with the possibility of a renewal of time-bomb explosions such as thundered yesterday at London's Brompton railway station and at post offices in Birmingham and Manchester when it appeared all chance of escape from the noose had vanished.

Five persons, postal employees, were injured at London and two at Birmingham in yesterday's renewal of a sporadic, year-long campaign of terrorism attributed to the I. R. A.

In the past year, time-bombs have been planted or sent through the mails to burst in public places—particularly railroad stations and post offices—in power stations and under bridges.

The bomb which Barnes and Richards carried was exploded.

### WOMEN'S GROUP ATTENDS CLINIC AT INSTITUTION

**Dr. Morrow Tells Popular Fallacies on Insanity**

Dr. G. W. Morrow, acting managing officer of the Kankakee state hospital, conducted a clinic in the diagnostic building Tuesday evening for members of the Kankakee Business and Professional Women's club.

As a preamble to his talk on certain types of insanity, Dr. Morrow pointed out nine erroneous ideas held by many regarding mental disorders. These are: Everyone is insane on some subject; some people are insane on one subject and sane on others; all suicides are at the hands of an insane person; insanity is rare (the pointed out the fact that in this county alone there are over 5,000 insane patients in institutions); insanity is hereditary; only one form of insanity; most cases caused by moral degeneracy; syphilitic infections are the cause of most insanity.

**Today's Factors**

All these, the doctor said, have been proved fallacies by scientific research. Referring to the increased number of persons having mental disorders today, Dr. Morrow said that many factors enter into the cause. The complicated conditions of modern life, alcoholism which is one of the most important, and civilization itself, are some of the main reasons.

The speaker said the most prevalent type of mental disorder is dementia praecox, which generally strikes its victims shortly after adolescence. In this type patients are unable to interpret or evaluate the ordinary events of life about them. Dr. Morrow said. Some gradually recover under the proper treatment and care but some never regain complete control of their mental faculties. Dr. Morrow described case histories of several affected with this type and questioned them before the audience.

Another type of patient presented at the clinic were those suffering from alcoholism. In two of the cases presented Dr. Morrow said that under proper conditions, there is no reason why the persons should not abstain from drinking providing they want to and are able to curb that desire. In the other case the physician said that continued

### New Diplomats Nominated Today

Washington, Feb. 7.—(UP)—President Roosevelt today nominated former Governor George H. Earle of Pennsylvania as minister to Bulgaria.

Mr. Roosevelt also nominated David Gray of Florida as minister to Ireland, succeeding John Gaudy, who recently was promoted to the ambassadorship to Belgium.

In a third nomination sent to the senate for confirmation, the president designated Louis G. Dreyfus, Jr. of California, present minister to Iran also to hold the title of minister to Afghanistan.

Earle has served previously in the diplomatic corps as United States minister to Austria. The Bulgarian post has assumed considerable importance recently in view of the strategic role that nation plays in Balkan neutrality.

Watseka, Feb. 7.—(RN Special)—Clarence Gilliflawn, 44, of Watseka was killed near Wansmaker, Ind. Tuesday night when a car crashed into his house trailer as he was repairing a tire.

Gilliflawn was lying under the trailer and was crushed by the impact. The other vehicle was driven by Russell Williams of Indianapolis who was injured slightly.

A former employee of the engineering staff at the county building here, Gilliflawn obtained a position with the federal government and, his wife, the former Gladys Hammond, had made their home in Ohio recently, but were planning to move to Peoria.

### 17 MEMBERS OF THE CHRISTIAN FRONT INDICTED

**Charged With Conspiracy to Overthrow Gov't**

New York, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Seventeen members of the Christian front, arrested by federal agents three weeks ago, were indicted by a federal grand jury today for seditious conspiracy and conspiracy to commit offenses against the United States government.

J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, whose agents rounded up the 17, said at the time of their arrest that they had plotted to commit acts of terrorism in the hope of establishing a dictatorship in the United States.

The indictment charged that between Jan. 1, 1939, and Jan. 15, 1940, the defendants conspired among themselves and with other persons unknown "to overthrow, put down and destroy by force, the government of the United States and did willfully and unlawfully, knowingly and feloniously conspire, plan, combine, confederate and agree together and with each other and

### NAZARENES TO MOVE SCHOOL FROM OLIVET

**Open Next September with Enrollment of 600**

The St. Vistor college property in Bourbonnais will be taken over by Olivet Nazarene college, it was learned today following a meeting of the trustees of the latter school, now located at Olivet, Ill., about 15 miles south of Danville.

Trustees of the Olivet school voted to buy the Bourbonnais institution buildings and grounds and move their college here. The Olivet school was damaged by fire last Nov. 19.

The purchase price was not made public. St. Vistor college, founded in 1868 and operated 72 years by the Clerics of St. Vistor, was closed in June of 1938 when creditors foreclosed on a mortgage of \$320,000 on its physical plant.

The Bourbonnais school was valued at well over \$500,000.

Have 144 Churches

Trustees of Olivet represent 744 Nazarene churches in Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Wisconsin, Michigan and Ohio.

The Nazarene board of bishops is expected to approve the purchase. Olivet plans to open classes in its new location next September with a prospective enrollment of 600 students taking ministerial and missionary training.

Dr. Edwin Burke of Chicago, board president, said Dr. A. L. Farrott would continue as president of the college. Prof. E. W. Willis of Boston will head the department of psychology.

The Nazarene board of St. Vistor college was held by the Massachusetts Life Insurance company, which also is said to have an interest in the school property at Olivet.

St. Vistor turned out hundreds of young Catholics for the priesthood. Its athletic teams, particularly the baseball team, were well known members of the old Little Nineteen conference and at least one graduate, Bud Glancy, later became a major league player.

Never richly endowed, St. Vistor struggled through the depression years depending almost entirely on tuition from students for operating income. Several unsuccessful attempts were made by local alumni to solve its financial difficulties.

The first two steps of Maternity church in Bourbonnais are said to be located on the grounds of the campus sold to the Nazarene institution.

### Sells Auto Radio Reported Stolen

### Scandinavia Resents Neutral Ship Attacks

Copenhagen, Denmark, Feb. 7.—(UP)—Resentment rose in Scandinavia today against Germany's airplane attacks on neutral shipping.

There were evidences at the same time of increased Scandinavian solidarity and of growing determination to aid Finland to hold off Russia's army.

Norwegian and Danish newspapers, regarded as reflecting strong public opinion, sharply criticized Germany's bombing and machine gunning of neutral ships.

The important Norwegian liberal organ Tidende of Bergen demanded that the government refuse to negotiate a trade agreement with Germany, and seemed to hint at the possibility of a trade boycott, unless Norway received assurances that its trade with other nations would be respected.

The newspaper Berlingske Tidende of Copenhagen, answering a German complaint that the Danish press played up stories of the British shooting down German planes and played down German successes against British shipping, said that

Germany must not expect Danes to show either sympathy or admiration for their campaign.

Resentment of people throughout Norway, a United Press Bergen dispatch said, was reflected in the Tidende editorial.

"Just about a week ago we mentioned that our policy of neutrality should not be extended so far that we should agree to being treated like dumb animals," the newspaper said. "We asked if it was the intention in official responsible quarters to do nothing. It is natural to put this question to the government."

"The Danish government," the Tidende said, "is the Danish government."

"It ought to be a natural condition for letting through goods to Germany that that country in peaceful manner show regard for Norwegian life and property and refrain from the brutal attacks which are shown toward Norwegian shipping on Norwegian ships going about legal trade."

### Rough Road Rides Cited in Divorce

Watseka, Feb. 7.—(RN Special)—Mrs. Catherine Remuller of South Fifth street, Watseka, filed suit for divorce today from her husband Arthur on grounds of cruelty.

"Charging him with engaging in violent fits of temper, the plaintiff states that in March of last year he hurled a pan of hot coffee at her, in June he seized her with force and dragged her upstairs to her room. At other times he took her on rides over rough country roads as 'punishment.'"

She asks the return of her maiden name of Catherine Coney. The attorney is W. S. Kay.

### Representatives of 10 Nations in Conference

The Hague, Netherlands, Feb. 7.—(UP)—Delegates of 10 nations met today to make a modest start on a study of world economic reconstruction and social betterment which, in the opinion of some European persons, may become the basis for a real and lasting peace.

The Netherlands, Great Britain, France, Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Norway, Portugal, Switzerland and Turkey are represented.

Their delegates had been mandated by the League of Nations to form a central committee for a study of world economic and social problems.

The organizing committee met at The Hague peace palace under the presidency of Joseph Avenol, secretary general of League of Nations, for 10 minutes this morning. It decided to invite former Netherlands Premier Dr. Hendrik Colijn to join the commission as one of its non-official technical experts and then unanimously elected him chairman of the organizing committee. It will meet again this afternoon to elect a central committee.

First of the agenda was the election of additional members, to an eventual total of 24 nations, and of eight technical experts who will represent not their countries but the commission in an impartial study. It was expected that only eight more nations would be invited to join the committee now.

The remaining six places are to be held open for countries which have been members of the league since 1919, but which have not yet accepted a seat, would operate, provided the committee, by working quietly and without fanfare, could convince 19 that its work might prove fruitful.

Most important was the fact that the six non-league countries would be Germany if a way could be found to include her.

The organizing committee held its first full meeting at the peace palace at 3:30 p. m. with Colijn presiding. He made a brief speech of welcome to the delegates. All 10 states were represented. Plans provided for election of a chairman of the central committee late today or early tomorrow.

### Expand Boy Scout Activities Here

Rapidly expanding activities of the Boy Scouts in the Kankakee Trails district are shown in a chart comparing performances in 1939 with the previous year.

In 1938, five troops had a membership of 147 with no district program or council leadership. Last year 15 units operated with a membership of 254, participating in summer troop camping, first aid contest, safety program, specialization training courses, camporee, six courts of honor, five district meetings, a senior scout ball, green bar conference, annual council and district meetings.

Today more boys are receiving scout training than ever before in the history of Kankakee. The cost per scout in 1939 was 50 per cent lower than the five year average cost here in 1933-27. Eighty per cent of the funds raised in 1939 was spent in this city. Constant service was provided by the Rain-bow council staff.

Five new scouting units are waiting to be organized and hundreds of boys in this area want to become scouts. The scout organization will conduct its one-day financial campaign on Wednesday, Feb. 14.

# EUROPE'S FEAR FOUND DARKER BY OBSERVER

## Hoover War Librarian Reports No Light in 23 Lands

Palo Alto, Cal., Feb. 1 (UPI)—Dr. Ralph H. Lutz, director of the Hoover war library, just back from a visit to 23 European countries, paints a gloomy picture of Europe as a whole.

"In December," he said, "I was in Italy—an Italy tremendously concerned with the possibility of future trouble."

"Not until I was there did I realize how much the Spanish campaign (not the Ethiopian) had cost Italy in terms of resources."

"I was forced to doubt if it is wise for Italy to jump to the winner's side."

"The shakeup in the Italian military has not meant complete disappearance of the Axis policy."

"Italy is principally concerned with Russia's threat to Balkans, and almost equally with Turkey's alliance with the western powers."

At Madrid, Dr. Lutz said he found it a country torn to pieces by civil war.

"Wars Devastation Everywhere," he said.

"In Madrid I saw the ruins of a \$100,000,000 educational plant, the University of Madrid, standing today are only the outer walls and a few inner partitions."

"Over the hills, the plowshares and the wreckage of tanks, littered over the ground were guns, shells and grenades."

"The food situation in Spain is worse perhaps than in any other country in the world."

"There is still a fierce feeling of resentment and revenge against the defeated party—1936 is the year they won."

"Germany has resumed France; has brought about the sacred union which only Frenchmen seem capable of forming in times of distress."

"In Switzerland, I saw men studying dynamite in great holes in the hillsides."

"Hungary is apprehensive—neutrality is perhaps its principal policy."

"Rogulavsky is trying to keep out, but every hold together with economic dislocations from France, Germany, Italy and England."

"Approaches a table, all conversations cease."

Dr. Lutz said at Bucharest that Rumania was being "squeezed" by various Soviet officials. He said, "That Rumania will be just as Rumanian as will fight."

"The attempt of the Iron Guard to seize control presents a serious problem for any coalition government."

"One Rumanian official told me that he was not sure they had killed a lot of Iron Guard members—they had only shot 2,000."

Dr. Lutz went from Sweden to Finland on Oct. 10, on the last boat before the Gulf of Bothnia was closed.

"That day and the day before," he said, "Helsinki was being evacuated. The old men, women and children were already gone."

"It did not seem a single person, male, woman or child."

"Finnish defense lines are not built like the Maginot line, but are constructed with supreme regard for the field of fire in situations where such fire gives a perfect defense, with certain material obstacles used by the Finns for defensive purposes."

"There was too much wishful thinking about Germany. Should expect negotiations (and the war) go into the hands of the strategists in the spring, we may expect a long and increasingly bitter war."

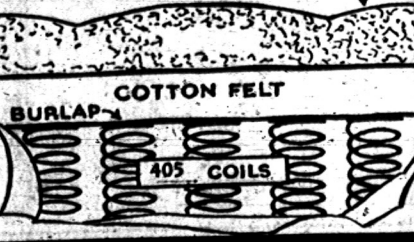
