NAZIS TIGHTEN TRAP ON ALLIES

National Safety Council Warns The Mortarist

Summer Trek Starts On Memorial Day And Many Lives At Stake

Chicago, May 29—(UP)—Five hundred lives will be at stake when motorists start their summer trek on Memorial day, the National Safety Council said today.

If present trends continue, the council predicted, more than 8,500 persons will be killed in traffic during June, July and August—500 more than met such violent death during the same period in 1939.

April death figures compiled by the council showed an increase over the previous year for the fourth consecutive month and composite figures for the first third of the year revealed a 6 per cent increase in fatalities over last year.

From Jan. 1 through April 30, there were 9,390 traffic deaths in the United States, 2,370 of them in April.

Ways to Reduce Toll

The council suggested four ways to reduce the toll:

1. Check your car before a trip—especially tires, brakes and steering apparatus.
2. Take it easy on the road. Start in plenty of time. Don't speed or take chances in passing.
3. Don't drink if you drink.
4. Don't take anything for granted at railroad crossings intersections and side roads.

Twenty-one of the 43 states reporting showed decreases in fatalities in April, compared to 1939, and 16 states registered improvement for the four-month period.

Much of the increased death rate can be attributed to city traffic, figures revealed. April traffic deaths in cities were up 7 per cent, and cumulative figures showed an 8 per cent increase over the January-April period in 1939.

Honor States

Delaware led the state death reduction honor roll for the four-month period with a 45 per cent drop, which saved 10 lives. Idaho's toll was reduced 32 per cent.

South Dakota went through April without a traffic death. Oklahoma, Calif., led the honor roll of lesser states for the four months with 21 fewer deaths, a 66 per cent decrease. Jersey City and Washington reported reductions of 50 and 46 per cent.

Jersey City, Providence, R. I., Toledo, O., and Dallas, Tex., were the only other cities with population above 250,000 to report perfect records in April, with no deaths.

Say Farmer Cusses In Front Of Woman

Arthur Legacy, farmer residing five miles south of Kankakee, was arrested yesterday by Constable Joseph Pettit on a warrant charging him with disturbing the peace, using profane and obscene language in the presence of a woman and threatening to do bodily harm.

The complaint is Claudia Martin, a neighbor, and the dispute was said to have arisen over turning of cows out to pasture along a public thoroughfare. The case will be heard at 3 o'clock next Wednesday afternoon before Police Magistrate Edward Hennicke and a jury.

Red Cross Wires Local Chairman For More Funds

Original quotas in the Red Cross drive for war relief funds are to be regarded only as minimum contributions, the national office telegraphed President Irving Munson of the Kankakee county chapter today in stressing the vast need for aid of civilians caught in the European war zone.

The telegram read in part: "When the American Red Cross asked for \$10,000,000 no one could foresee in two short weeks greatest tragedy in all history unfolded. Impossible to describe pitiful plight of millions of refugees in France, sick, wounded, hungry and homeless.

Neighbors File Protest Over Dairy Plant

A complaint filed for the circuit court today alleges that if Howard Beedy goes ahead with his plan to establish his Ash Grove dairy plant in Hobbie Heights, the following conditions will result:

Loading of trucks will cause harsh and loud noises in the early morning hours.

Flies, mosquitoes, rodents and other insects and animals will be attracted and infect the neighborhood.

The structures will be of such material, shape and size to be inconsistent with the neighborhood.

There will be noxious and offensive smells, tainting and corrupting the air.

The suit against Beedy is by Mary Lang, Neal M. Saville, Alice Woody and Elmer Kirchner, all of whom say they own property near the proposed site of the dairy plant. They name Ray Benoit, alleged to have contracted with Beedy to erect the buildings, as a party defendant.

The plaintiffs, who say their neighborhood is an old established residence section, asked a temporary injunction against the dairy establishment and a hearing on a permanent injunction. The temporary restraining order was issued yesterday afternoon by Circuit Judge Luther B. Bratton.

The plaintiffs are represented by Attorney Donald Gray.

Blitzkrieg On Treasury Says Thos. E. Dewey

Charges Incompetents At Washington Plan To Handle Defense Cash

Birmingham, Ala., May 29—(AP)—Thomas E. Dewey, candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, declared today the Roosevelt administration "blatantly proposes" to use defense expenditures "to turn the country into a collection of 'incompetent' and 'half-witted' managers to squander billions of dollars."

Dewey said in a speech prepared for Republican party members that after "seven destructive years" under President Roosevelt, "we must face the menace of a warring world with our business life restricted, our industry weakened and our whole system suffering from artificial economic anemia."

"In this situation," he asked, "what course does the administration choose?"

"It blandly proposes to handle the present emergency with the same methods it has used to meet the many emergencies of its own creation during the last seven years. It says all that is needed is that congress vote more billions of dollars."

Rabbi Mirovitz Found Dead On Floor At Home

Members Of Flock Find Body After Two Days' Absence From Services

The Rev. Joseph Mirovitz, 53, rabbi of Bnai Israel synagogue, was found dead last night in the living room of his home, 834 South Schuyler avenue.

The body was found at 7 o'clock by a party which had gone to the residence to investigate his absence from services at the synagogue. He had been dead for some time and death was apparently due to cerebral hemorrhage.

The rabbi had been at home alone for several days because Mrs. Mirovitz had been called to Chicago by the illness of a daughter. He was not present for services Friday night but members of the congregation surmised that he had gone to Chicago.

When he did not appear for services yesterday afternoon, Samuel H. Shapiro, Harry Portnoy and Hyman Arnow, members of the congregation, went to the residence to investigate, accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Gene LaFontaine.

They found the body lying face down. There had been a hemorrhage.

The body was immediately taken to Chicago where funeral services were conducted at 2 o'clock this afternoon, standard time, at the Weinstein funeral parlors, Central Park avenue and Roosevelt road. Burial was in Chicago.

Rabbi Mirovitz is survived by the widow, Besie, a son Louis of Chicago and daughters Mrs. Ruth Kite and Miss Sadie Mirovitz, also of Chicago.

Here 21 Years

He had been rabbi here for 21 years. The synagogue at 334 South Dearborn avenue was erected soon after he assumed charge here.

Coroner A. E. Kerger issued the required burial permit last night and will conduct an inquiry into the cause of death later.

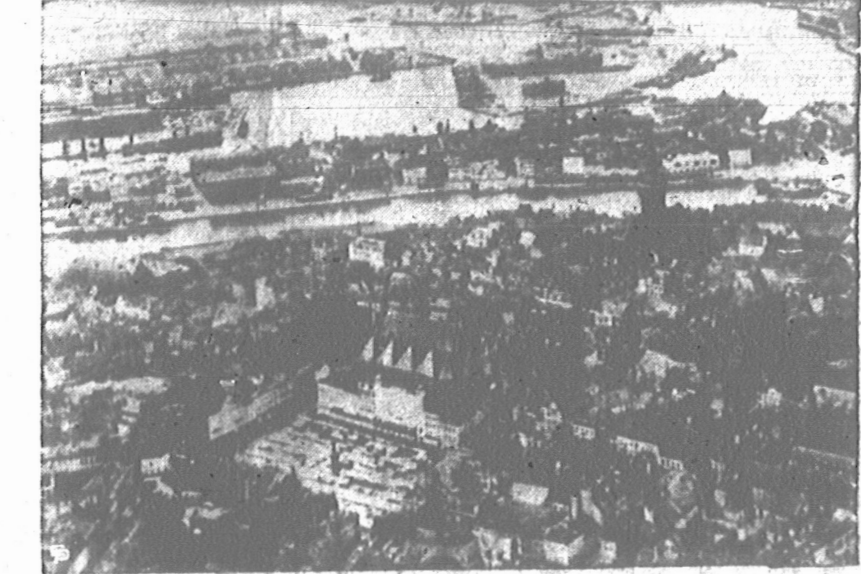
Hold Scholarship Exams On Saturday

War Fever Rises In Italy After Belgium's Fall

Million And Half Volunteers Enlist Through Fascist Party

Rome, May 29—(AP)—The surrender of the Belgian army on the western front appeared today to have ended any chance the allies may have had to keep Italy out of the war by relaxing their blockade restrictions.

Italy's war fever heightened with the Belgian collapse, and active Italian intervention in the conflict seemed to many to be but a question of days.

Civilians began today to take over some of the pasts left vacant by men called to arms and the government prepared to make many other such replacements in case a civil mobilization is put into effect.

Young Fascists served as traffic police and women and girls were seen in Rome in uniforms and helmets riding motorcycles equipped for air raid precaution duties.

Cites Reasons For Plight Of British, French Air Forces

Washington, May 29—(AP)—The plight of the British and French air forces, described recently as "inferior" to Germany's, was ascribed today by John H. Jouett, president of the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce, to part or full government ownership of their aircraft plants.

Stating the case for the American aircraft industry against any such move, Jouett said, "Right now you talk of airplanes being produced in incredible quantities in a miraculously short time of airplanes which blacken the sky, hurtling forth to defend the country."

"The cold hard fact, however, is that all you will see of American planes in those skies is just what our present regularly-organized, long-established and experienced industry can produce—and no more. Any system, other than orderly expansion directed by our own air industry leaders will fail—and fail miserably."

Storming Ypres, Capture Lille And Ostend

Britain Musters Power To Aid Troops Imperiled By Belgian Surrender

BULLETIN

Paris, May 29—(AP)—The allied rear guard is fighting German troops in the streets of Lille, the war ministry spokesman said tonight, while the main forces retreat toward the channel coast.

The spokesman pictured the street combat at Lille as a fierce delaying action to cover the withdrawal from the Flanders pocket. French and British remnants of the pocketed northern forces were said to be backing toward Dunkerque, some 50 miles from Lille, while this rear-guard action was being fought.

The main German attack was reported directed toward Cassel, northwest of Lille and south of Dunkerque.

BULLETIN

London, May 29—(AP)—Britain's expeditionary force in the Flanders trap was said by reliable sources today to be fighting "a rear-guard action" to cover its withdrawal toward the coast.

The fighting was reported in complete order, without chaos or confusion. Morale of the trapped troops was termed "quite unshaken."

The withdrawing army was said to have established a strong rear line, but it was regarded as "almost certain" that much equipment and material would have to be abandoned. This, it was said, would be "destroyed to keep it from German hands."

Neutral milit observers said the desperate situation of the pocketed B.E.F. and French forces could be relieved only by mechanized agencies equal to Germany's.

In three pulverizing smashes, Hitler's Nazi legions today stormed Ypres—famed world war battlefield—and captured Lille and Ostend, the high command announced, to tighten the steel-jawed trap on 500,000 allied troops encircled in Flanders.

On the strength of these reports, it was apparent that the allies were now retreating to the English channel—seeking that means of escape from the German "surrender or die" onslaught rather than attempting to break through the German salient to the south.

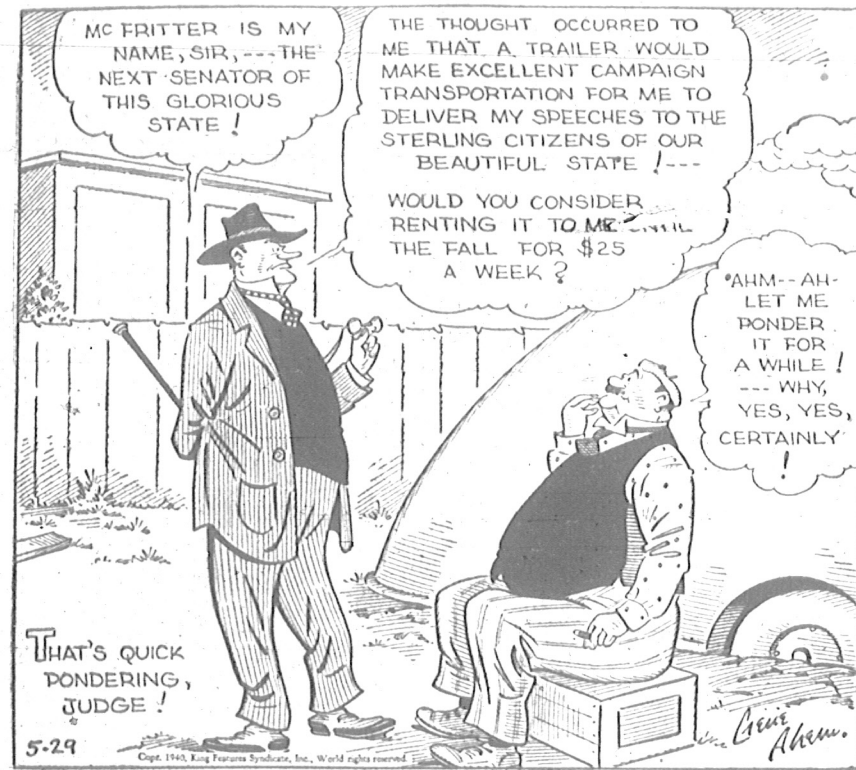
The retreat toward the channel was confirmed subsequently in London, where reliable sources said the British expeditionary force was fighting a "stiff rear-guard action" to cover its withdrawal.

Quantities of war materials, it was said, would have to be destroyed to keep them from falling into German hands.
