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BRITAIN FRAMES NEW INDIA POLICY

Germans Heavy Losers In Air Over Channel

Fifty Planes Estimated In Violent Battle Early This Morning

BULLETIN
(Auto. Expt. Aug. 8—AP)—The Italian columns driving into British Somaliland from Ethiopia halted after their capture of Oadweina and Hargeisa "as announced" a British communiqué reported tonight.

An reconnaissance over those areas in the western part of the Somaliland showed little movement, the communiqué said.

It reported continued movement of Italian forces, particularly "motorized transport" in the Italian-Egyptian border region, the "western desert" where the British expect a large-scale Italian offensive shortly.

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
A violent air battle which cost the Nazis at least nine planes and the British two fighting craft raged over the channel and the western coast of England for at least two hours tonight.

Six of the German planes lost were bombers, the other chasers and fighters.

It was estimated that some 50 planes were engaged in the battle, which raged inland over the coastal area.

Observers said that Nazi fighters could be seen speeding out to sea in the early morning.

An aircraft announcement said that British planes had carried the war to German-occupied coast of Norway, with units of the fleet air arm attacking a German base at Narvik, about five miles south of Bergen.

Describing the channel air battle as "a number of engagements" took place, and "the destruction of several other German planes" had been reported without confirmation.

Earlier a German bomber attack on a naval shipping convoy off Enderbury, near the coast, had been reported with indications that the Nazis were increasing in momentum with particular attention to that area.

African Developments
But even as Britons cheered this new evidence of growing power of the RAF, many were concerned with developments in that hot dry corner of northeast Africa where a British force sought to block Italian conquest of the continent.

British military authorities in London, conceding capture of Zeila in British Somaliland, expressed belief that the British would have a tough time taking Berbera, principal port of the country, and connected with Zeila by a 150 mile road.

Meanwhile as the British kept an eye on the menace of a blitzkrieg, the other on Mussolini's African campaign, India was promised "free and equal partnership" in the British commonwealth, as Britain sought to unify the great power of her empire for the future.

Farley Resigns From Cabinet On August 31

Quits Public Life To Become President Of New York Yankees

Hyde Park, N. Y., Aug. 8—(UP)—President Roosevelt today accepted with "sincere sorrow" the resignation from the cabinet, effective Aug. 31, of Postmaster General James A. Farley, the "man behind the ballots" in the New Deal campaigns of 1932 and 1936.

Farley's resignation was disclosed by the president when he made public the letter of acceptance he had written in response to a letter from the postmaster general dated Aug. 7. The president gave no indication who Farley's cabinet successor would be.

The postmaster general already had announced his retirement as chairman of the Democratic national committee, in which post he will be succeeded Aug. 17 by Edward J. Flynn of New York and his resignation from the cabinet was the final step in his return to private life.

To Head Baseball Club
Farley will become president of the New York Yankees baseball club, and in that connection his letter to the president said:

"I know that it will please you to learn that I have made definite arrangements for my future in private business where I know I shall be happy."

Neither the president nor Farley made any mention of the third term issue in their letters, although they exchanged mutual expressions of esteem and regret at severance of their political association which led to the New Deal victories of 1932 and 1936.

"During my life time I shall cherish the associations and friendships which I have made while serving as postmaster general, both in the postal service and in the other departments and agencies of the federal government," Farley said.

"Again expressing my deepest gratitude at the opportunity you afforded me to serve as a member of your cabinet, and with kindest personal regards, I am, faithfully yours, James A. Farley."

Mr. Roosevelt wrote Farley of his "own sincere sorrow that we are losing you as a member of the official family."

"All of us in the administration will miss you deeply; we count on seeing you often," the president wrote.

104 Kankakee Guardsmen To Camp M'Coy

Two I.N.G. Units To Depart For Wisconsin On Special Train Sunday

One hundred four officers and men, comprising the two units of the Illinois National Guard here, will leave Saturday night for Camp McCoy at Sparta, Wis., where they will join 65,000 regulars and guardsmen for three weeks of maneuvers.

Hurricane Blows Itself Out Near The Gulf Coast

Port Arthur, Tex., Aug. 8—(AP)—A tropical hurricane blew itself out inland today after killing at least one person, injuring 10 and damaging property in the Sabine area of Texas and Louisiana.

Scores were marooned as 75 mile winds roared into Texas from the east and struck Port Arthur, Orange and Beaumont.

Houses were unroofed, trees uprooted and advertising signs sent sailing through the air. Six persons were injured at Port Arthur and three at Beaumont where damage to windows and small buildings was widespread. None of the injured was reported hurt seriously.

Unofficially, damage was estimated at Port Arthur at \$100,000. Jefferson County Agent J. P. Combs said damage to the rice crop in that section may reach \$500,000.

National Guard Training Bill Nears A Vote

Washington, Aug. 8—(AP)—Secretary Knox asked congress today for authority to hold future naval and marine corps enlisted men in service indefinitely during war or "declared emergencies."

He stated the request in a letter to Speaker Bankhead of the house.

It was the latest move of a series designed to strengthen the manpower resources of the armed forces for any emergency.

These included legislation to authorize calling up the national guard and reserve groups and other legislation to authorize compulsory training of large groups of citizens.

The new legislation, proposed by Knox would apply only to those men who enlisted in the naval service, including the marine corps, after the enactment of the measure.

In another communication to congress, Herbert E. Gaston, acting treasury secretary, asked legislation authorizing the secretary of the treasury to call retired commissioned and warrant officers of the coast guard to active duty in times of national emergency when the coast guard is not operating as a part of the navy.

The senate agreed to vote by 3 p. m. central standard time, on legislation for calling out the national guard and enlisted reserves for training. Both advocates and opponents predicted passage.

Disposal of the guard bill will clear the way for debate on the house.

Attorney Richard S. Kaplan, who said he was counsel for the girl's parents, said that he had convinced the family that the "interests of science might well be served" by bringing the mother and child here for examination by "the most highly regarded medical men in Chicago."

Peruvian physicians reported that the girl was only five when she gave birth to the child—a boy weighing a little more than five pounds—during a caesarean operation at a Lima hospital May 14, 1939.

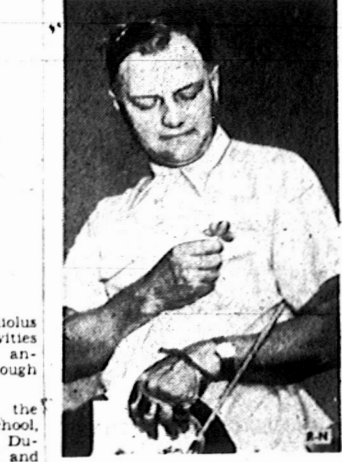

Farm Youth Drowns Near Watska Today

Help was summoned immediately and Robert Rush of Watska, diving for the body, found it within 15 minutes in 18 feet of water, near the spot where it submerged.

Fire Chief LaVerne Rhoades and Sheriff Guy E. Redman attempted resuscitation for several minutes without avail. Coroner Verne K. Buser of Sheldon set the inquest for Friday morning at the Segur funeral home.

Dominion Status To Be Offered After The War

Indians Themselves To Devise Framework Of New Constitution

London Aug. 8—(AP)—The British government declared today it is willing to let Indians themselves "devise the framework of a new constitution" after conclusion of the war in the hope India will attain "free and equal partnership in the British commonwealth" of nations.

Simultaneous statements outlining the British government's position on the controversial Indian question were made by Lord Linlithgow, viceroy in India, and by the secretary of state for India, L. S. Amery, in the House of Commons.

While repeating the government's offer of dominion status for India's 350,000,000 people, the statement reiterated unwillingness to undertake "fundamental constitutional issues" in the midst of war and held off devising of a new framework of government until after the war—a delay which has been criticized by ardent nationalists in India.

Italians Advancing
On another point, however, the government gave assent to the setting up after the war, "with the least possible delay" of a body "representative of the principal elements in Indian national life in order to devise the framework of the new constitution."

Britain's position was announced as Italian advances were being made in Africa toward an outlet on the Indian ocean.

The statement frankly said it was hoped Britain, by appealing Indian nationalist spirit, could tap the manpower and wealth of her richest possessions.

By satisfying India's claims Britain would be in a position to marshal overwhelming forces to crush Italian expansion in the Mediterranean area, according to the British view. With Japan threatening to expand southward and Italy seeking to expand westward, the British view is that India is a vital part of the defense system vital to the Singapore naval base and India also is an important source of supply for the British armies.

Prefer British to Others
Mohandas K. Gandhi, leader of the independence-seeking nationalists, declared in a recent plea urging Britain to abandon war for "non-violence" that he did "not want Britain to be defeated, nor do I want her to be victorious in a trial of brute strength."

Realists in India, however, are prepared to go all out to help Britain thwart any German, Italian

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Willkie Demands Amendments To The Hatch Bill

Seeks Aid Of Hoover And Landon: Will See Both Men Next Week

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 8.—(U.P.)—Alfred W. Willkie said today that he would ask former President Hoover and Sen. Charles McNary, R., Ind., to support his demand for amendments to the Hatch anti-politics law.

Willkie told his press conference yesterday the existing act should be amended to require the president, cabinet officers and all other non-exempt officials to file sworn statements of their assets upon taking office and upon leaving office.

He added that another desirable amendment would be to prohibit any member of a family of an official from receiving compensation for representing clients before federal agencies.

The Republican nominee will have a luncheon conference with Landon at his resort hotel here next Tuesday. He will see Hoover in Denver sometime next week.

Personal Assets
If he is elected, Willkie said, he and members of his family will file statements of personal assets with the Federal Bureau of Investigation whether the Hatch law is amended or not.

It is in favor of all amendments to the Hatch act necessary to make it air-tight in carrying out both its provisions and spirit, Willkie declared.

The Hatch law prohibits political activity by federal workers and state workers paid partly from federal funds.

Asked at his press conference whether he had any specific examples in mind when he suggested that members of official families be barred from practicing before federal boards and commissions, Willkie replied negatively.

One reporter, apparently recalling that James Roosevelt once asked whether compensation received in such a position should be listed in an accounting of assets, Willkie replied that he did not think so.

Battle Rages Along England's Southeastern Coast Early Today

London, Aug. 8.—At least nine German bombers and dive bombers and three fighters were shot down in a battle which raged along England's southeastern coast this morning, an official announcement said.

Two British fighter pilots were missing after the battle, which followed a German bombing attack on shipping in the narrow waterway of the English channel.

Three Nazi planes were shot down and several others reported destroyed.

The German planes—after two days of comparative calm—resumed attacks on shipping and raids on land objectives.

Air forces fighters engaged the Nazis in several air clashes in the channel area, while ship chasers appeared to be the objectives.

The channel along the southeast coast reported that the number of German planes also had crossed the high over the coast line and engaged in defense fighting craft.

The fact that the German planes were flying very high suggests that they might be headed for important daylight raids on land objectives.

In the bombing close to the sanctuary, all of the windows were broken.

The children, gathered from poor homes in industrial districts, were quickly in their beds even after the first bomb had exploded.

One of the bombs fell just behind the main building, where 150 adults were sleeping.

Homes nearby were damaged by the bomb blasts but there were no casualties.

Mysterious White Powder
An investigation was conducted after a German plane passed over a northwestern English town during the night, a mysterious white powder was found in the streets.

Preliminary examination indicated that the powder was harmless but it was handed over to experts for careful chemical analysis.

Anti-aircraft gun fire was heard last night from the coast of northern France, and it was assumed that Royal Air Force planes were raiding as they had been throughout yesterday.

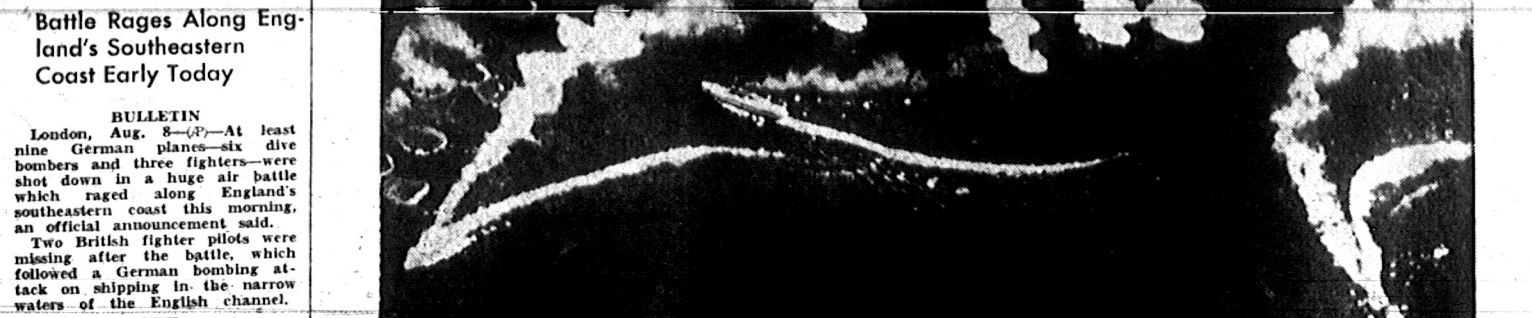

Seriously, I commend a similar scheme to you."

"Of course you won't expect to get relief all at once. If you accomplish some noticeable progress after several months be very happy. I still have my own trouble, and I have been working at it for a number of years. But I am as sure as I know my hair is light; that the method I described has helped me. And make yourself go places."

"You might get help from my booklet, 'Learning to Be Likable.' I hope you can find it in your public library. I am enclosing a selected reading list on personality and mental health."
