Registration For
High School To
Be Held Next Week

Only two more weeks of summer vacation remaining for students of Kankakee public schools. Registrations are being made to re-open classes on Tuesday, Sept. 3. Registration for the fall term at Kankakee high school will be held next week, according to announcements today of Principal R. Y. Allen.

Students who are entering Kankakee high school for the first time will be required to take the first two days, Aug. 22 and 23. Those completing their eighth grade work at the Department of Longfellow schools will register on Monday, while those completing eighth grade in any other school will register on Tuesday.

Bring Diplomas
These pupils must bring either their diplomas or promotion cards with them. If they have not previously enrolled in the Kankakee public school system they also must bring birth certificates.

Students transferring to Kankakee high from other prep schools will register on the days indicated for their classification. These pupils should have a list of their credentials from the school they attended to Principal Allison. All transfer students are to present birth certificates.

Great Britain Seeks Military Alliance With United States

London, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Unofficial but well-informed sources indicated today that the British government is seeking a military alliance with the United States.

Canadian-American discussions on mutual defense are considered in these quarters to be the opening wedge in a British effort to obtain a full military accord between the United States and Britain.

As envisaged now, such an alliance would embrace the defense of Canada and other British possessions in the western hemisphere and, perhaps, even more important, would form the basis for common diplomacy in the far east at the conclusion of the European conflict, as one informant put it.

"Surrey Situation?"
The plain truth of the matter, said a neutral diplomat, "is that neither Great Britain nor the United States has a powerful friend left anywhere else in the world. It behooves them to get together and make the best of the sorry situation."

Official sources were reticent to comment on the talks between President Roosevelt and Canadian Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King, which resulted in a decision to establish a joint defense board, but satisfaction was evident.

There were reports here that the conversations progressed to the hypothetical defense of Canada and the United States in the event the British fleet were lost and aerial defense not only on the seaboard but from United States bases on the Pacific such as Sitka and northern Alaska.

Reluctant To Comment
"It is a logical progression from these talks to a military alliance with Great Britain," said one reliable person. "I think we may regard the present Canadian-American talks as similar to those which, in the early nineteenth century, preceded creation of the intimate cordial relations between France and his majesty's government."

Official British reluctance to comment may be explained by the presence of public opinion in England that a non-belligerent United States is more valuable to Britain than America at war. In the latter event, these persons reason, the United States would have to use most of her planes and munitions for strengthening her own Panama and Atlantic defenses, instead of letting Britain use them.

Nab 2 Chicago Youthful Gun Thieves Here

Identities Revealed
After One Is Injured
When Hit By Auto

Two Chicago youths who stole two guns and two bicycles in Chicago yesterday ended up in custody of Kankakee police late last night after one of them was struck by an auto and sustained a broken leg.

Held for Chicago police are Charles Guenther, 21, of 513 South Bell avenue, Chicago, and Raymond Bly, 15, of Chicago. The latter is in St. Mary hospital with the fractured leg and possible other injuries while Guenther is a prisoner in the city jail.

The accident occurred about 10:15 o'clock Tuesday night on highway 49, about two miles north of Manteno. The youths were headed south on bicycles when a southbound auto driven by Ray Laxen of 731 South Poplar avenue approached.

Saw Only One
Laxen saw Guenther riding along the edge of the pavement, but failed in time to notice Bly, whom he said was traveling almost in the second lane of traffic. The front bumper of Laxen's machine struck Bly, knocking him to the pavement.

Guenther told deputy sheriffs investigating the accident that he didn't know the address of his friend. Later, while checking over the county police radio system with Chicago authorities, it was learned that the two were wanted for burglary.

Caught At Hotel
Guenther by this time had left the hospital but he was found at 1:55 o'clock this morning at the Alamo hotel. Officers Kenneth Huns and Lawrence Shocher took him into custody. The youth had shells in both guns they had taken. One was a .25 caliber automatic and the other a .32 caliber revolver.

Gibbstown, N. J. Aug. 21.—(UP)—A dynamite explosion which took four lives at the E. I. DuPont de Nemours company Repaun plant was investigated by G-men today for traces of sabotage although company officials announced "no evidence of such activity has been found."

Company representatives refuted the possibility of intentional destruction with the explanation that the blast occurred in a structure where commercial explosives were being made.

Four men were killed yesterday when 1,200 pounds of finished dynamite exploded in a carting house. The victims were Lowell Woodall, 34, Gibbstown, single; Paul A. Young, 43, Gibbstown, father of three; Frank J. Smith, 22, Gibbstown, single and George Hanners, 36, Pitman, married.

Fire Chief Condemns Lang Place

The building housing the Sam Lang junk shop at 842 South Main street was condemned today by Fire Chief Roy Marquart as a fire hazard.

Two years ago a deputy state fire marshal issued a similar order against this property but the defendant won his case in circuit court when attorneys found a flaw in the state legislation many years ago which created the office of state fire marshal but neglected to give him certain powers.

Fire chiefs, however, do have the power to condemn buildings as fire hazards.

Today's order requires that all rubbish and trash be removed from the building, that a three-foot passageway be made through the assorted merchandise piled up in the interior, that broken windows be replaced or boarded up, that the east end of the building be re-roofed with fire resistant material, the cornice on the north side repaired, new joists and sills installed and plastering repaired, or else remove the building.

Improvements must be started within 30 days.

Army Airman Faked Holdup In Kankakee

Rips Shirt, Rolls In
Mud To Impress A
Gal Named "Diana"

City police solved a "holdup" last night by proving that the "victim" faked the whole thing.

John R. Hansen, 26, of American Falls, Idaho, who has been in the city the past year and is now stationed at the air corps technical school in Rantoul, appeared at the scene about 9 o'clock last night and reported he had been beaten and robbed by three men.

His torn clothes showed evidence of a struggle, with shirt ripped to ribbons and trousers caked with mud. He told authorities he was accosted by three men who drove up in the 1400 block on East River street, cut him about the neck with a knife and suitcase containing clothes.

Changes Story
When police went with Hansen to the spot where the alleged robbery occurred, they found only dry cinders where he was supposed to have rolled in the mud. Questioning him closer, they found his story didn't jibe in every detail. He reduced the amount of money lost and other details were in variance.

Finally he admitted that the whole thing was a phoney. He apparently wanted to impress certain persons with his prowess. A sacrifice he used to rip the shirt had the name "Diana" carved on it.

Hansen insisted that he was on his way to March field, Calif., where he had been transferred upon completion of his mechanics course at Rantoul. He had no traveling pass, however, requesting authorities to believe he was absent without leave.

Back to Rantoul
He was detained at the police station overnight, someone found a shirt for him this morning and he was turned over to Sgt. William C. O'Connell, recruiting officer at the armory who arranged to transport him back to Rantoul.

Believe Refugee Ship Has Passed Dangerous Waters

Washington, Aug. 21.—(UP)—Officials believed today that the army transport, American Legion, with 897 war refugees, had passed safely through the mine infested waters off the north coast of Scotland.

The state department said it had had no word. The war and navy departments declined to give information, but it was believed that one or the other was in communication with the boat.

Unofficial calculations indicated that the American Legion, bound for New York from Petsamo, Finland, had passed Cape Wrath, Scotland, yesterday.

Her plight resulted from the mine fields of the belligerents which now blanket the north Atlantic from Iceland to Scotland.

On her special voyage to Petsamo to pick up Americans stranded in the Scandinavian countries, she had skirted the British mine fields. Both Great Britain and Germany had given her a safe conduct.

After she had passed the British extended their mine field several hundred miles farther south and notified all countries. This left a small strip of water off Cape Wrath, Scotland, the only "hole" through the mine field and the American Legion's homeward course was changed accordingly.

Germany gave the United States assurances of safe conduct for the homeward voyage before she left Petsamo. After she left Petsamo, the German government suddenly informed the United States that she couldn't be responsible for the ship on her chartered course. It developed that German planes had dropped mines in the waters off Cape Wrath, and, as it was pointed out in Berlin, the German government could control naval vessels, but couldn't control mines.

Registration Of Aliens In County Starts

Registration of aliens residing in Kankakee county will begin next Tuesday at the Kankakee post office. It was announced today by Postmaster George P. Ravens.

All aliens 14 years of age or older are required to register in person and be fingerprinted. Alien children under 14 years must be registered by parents or guardians.

Persons with first citizenship papers also must register. Registration is compulsory and must be done between Aug. 27 and Dec. 26 of this year. A fine of \$1,000 imprisonment for six months is prescribed by act of congress as penalties for failure to do so.

Estimate 3,000 Here
Unofficial estimates placed the foreign born population who have not become citizens at 5 per cent of the county total, or approximately 3,000.

Registration is free. The alien registration act was passed so that the United States could determine exactly how many aliens there are, who they are and where they are.

Registration, including fingerprinting, will not be harmful to law-abiding citizens. It was stated in a bulletin issued today by the U. S. department of justice.

All records will be kept secret and confidential and will be made available only to such persons as may be designated with the approval of the attorney general of the U. S.

A receipt card will be sent to every alien who registers. This card will serve as evidence of registration. Afterwards, the law requires all aliens and parents or guardians of aliens to report changes of address within five days of the change to the immigration and naturalization service, department of justice, Washington, D. C.

Wunderlich Warns Workers Against Leaving Kankakee

Workers who leave Kankakee in the hope of getting jobs in defense industries in other cities or states are doomed to almost certain failure and disappointment, Manager A. J. Wunderlich of the Illinois State Employment service said today.

"News of employment booms in industries stimulated by the national defense program has tempted many workers to make futile migrations in search of these jobs," the employment officer manager said.

Many persons, for example, have rushed to the motor centers of Michigan, the shipyards of Texas, or the steel mill towns of California, in search of jobs. When they arrived there, they found that the industries had all the manpower they needed but found no jobs.

"Disappointed and broke, many of these workers have had to write to friends and relatives for money to return home or depend upon public relief," the local employment officer manager pointed out. "And in many states transients are not protected with public relief."

Nazis Shift To "Hit And Run" Aerial Tactics

Greece Cancels Army
Leaves As Tension
Is Increasing

BULLETIN
Gibraltar, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Britain's great fortress of Gibraltar was raided by enemy planes twice today. Bombs started a small fire which was brought under control quickly, a communique said.

"During the night enemy aircraft bombed Gibraltar twice," the communique declared. "In the first raid, bombs dropped in the sea, but an aircraft was brought down on the sea off Europa point. In the second raid bombs dropped on the rock, causing a small fire which was quickly brought under control. There was slight damage and no casualties."

BULLETIN
La Linea, Spain, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Britain's rock of Gibraltar flamed like a volcano early today after raiding warplanes dropped bombs on the fortress guarding the western gate of the Mediterranean.

In the pre-dawn darkness flames could be seen spreading down from the top of the rock—where long-range batteries apparently had been hit—toward the town where alarms sounded to summon residents to shelter.

The bombs apparently had set fire to ammunition dumps near the batteries.

From here and from Algeiras, Spain across the bay from Gibraltar, the sea was clearly seen racing down the rock.

The top of the rock looked like a volcano belching flame.

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
Ammunition dumps fired at Britain's great rock of Gibraltar reportedly turned the historic bastion into a flaming volcano today as raiding warplanes, apparently Italian, stormed the huge fortress.

(A British-censored dispatch from Gibraltar itself said only a small fire was started and quickly controlled.)

Stefani, the official Italian news agency, reported a fierce naval and air battle was fought in the Mediterranean between British and Italian forces, with seven R. A. F. planes shot down.

Simultaneously, Italy proclaimed a "total blockade" of British coasts in the Mediterranean area.

New Mode of Attack
In the west, Britons asserted that Hitler's warplanes have shifted from mass aerial assaults to a new style of "hit-and-run" attack.

British experts said the new mode of attack, by lone raiders or small groups, probably was designed to avoid the heavy losses suffered by the Germans recently in hurling great aerial armadas at the island kingdom.

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U. S. Leases Two Islands In The South Pacific

British Foreign Office Confirms Reports; To Use As Air Bases

London, Aug. 21.—P.—British foreign office sources cited the British-American agreement of 1936 that the United States might lease certain islands in the Pacific to the United States as an illustration of the "common purpose" between the two countries had developed before the war.

The officials offered the statement as a result of reported Japanese concern over rumors that Britain is offering to lease defense bases in the Pacific.

Joint Control

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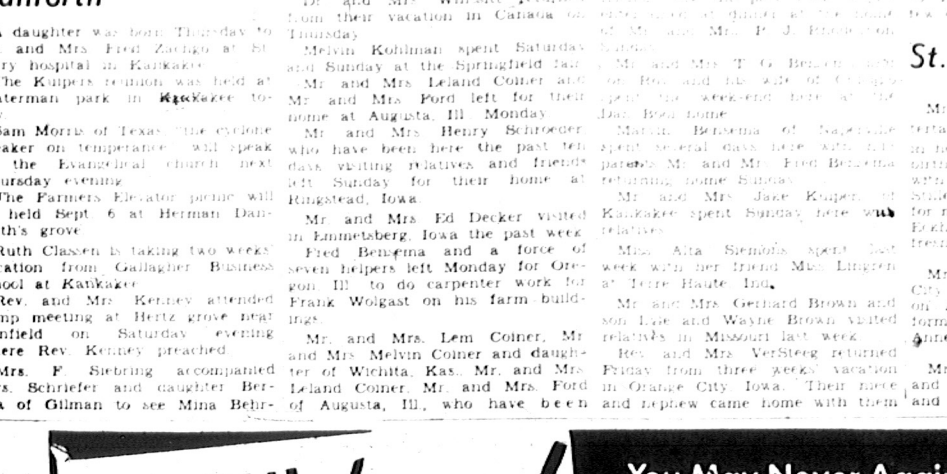

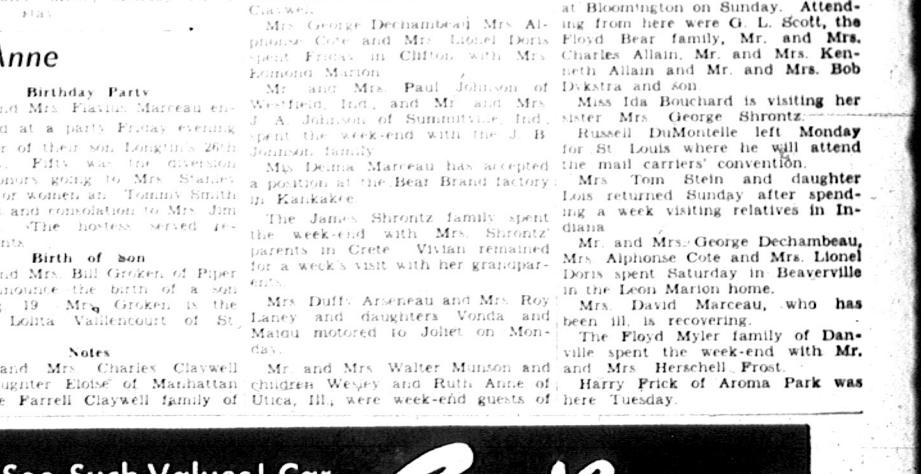

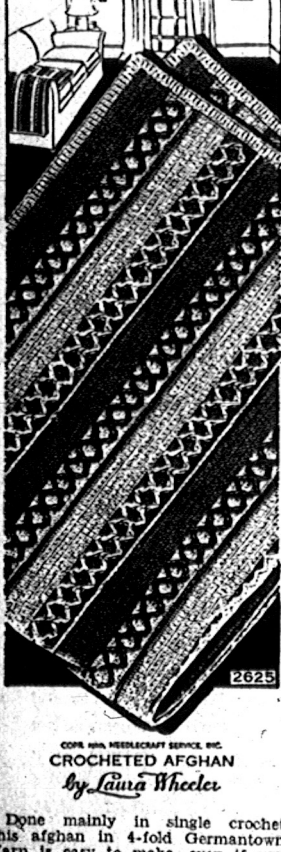

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Conscription Of Industry And Wealth Sought

Difficulties In Placing Of Government Orders; Equipment

Washington, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Demands that wealth and industry, like manpower, be conscripted for national defense shifted today debate into new channels on the subject of compulsory military service.

The agitation for a "total" draft of the country's financial, economic and human resources developed after disclosures that the armed services were finding it difficult to obtain defense necessities because of existing tax-profits laws, and the higher bids of Great Britain for war material.

There was a prospect of even further complications on the contentious conscription issue, for house military committee members indicated they were ready to give formal final approval to compulsory service legislation covering a much broader manpower bracket than present senate proposals contemplate.

The Burke-Wadsworth compulsory service bill, as amended by the senate, would limit registration and possible service to men from 21 years of age through 30. The house version, tentatively approved yesterday by the military committee, follows the original Burke-Wadsworth plan—registration of all men between 18 and 65, with active service limited to those between 21 and 45.

Encounter Difficulties
The move to link conscription of wealth and industry with a draft started yesterday after publication of the testimony by high army and navy officials before the senate appropriations committee on difficulties besetting the placing of government orders for planes, guns and warship materials.

Senator Lee (D-Okla.) asked for a record vote on a proposal calling for the imposition of "forced loans" to finance the defense program if conscription of manpower was ordered. He offered the measure as an amendment to the Burke-Wadsworth bill.

Senator Pepper (D-Fla.), who said he was "definitely in favor of the principle" of Lee's amendment, an-

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 21.—(AP)—State Republican leaders are seeking to book Wendell L. Willkie for three Illinois addresses during his presidential campaign. Chairman Ben L. Berve of the GOP state committee announced today.

Berve said the party organization wants Willkie for two appearances in Chicago and another in a downstate city. The downstate cities mentioned as possible sites for a large Willkie rally include Rock Island and Springfield, the party chairman said.

The Republican nominee had "indicated" he will make at least one and probably two speaking campaign appearances in this state. Berve added. Detailed arrangements are yet to be made, but the meetings would be scheduled some time after mid-September, the period already fixed by Willkie for the formal opening of his speech-making campaign at Coffeyville, Kan.

Immediately following the Coffeyville address, Willkie has tentatively planned a tour of the west coast. After that the candidate said recently he expects to make a swing through the middle west and the east.

Chairman Berve said negotiations for Willkie appearances in this state now are under way with the candidate's campaign leaders. Party leaders in Illinois plan to take up the subject with Joe Martin, GOP national chairman, when Martin comes to Peoria for an address the night of Saturday, Aug. 24.

"Illinois is a state that Willkie must win," Berve said. "He wants to come to this state because he knows it is important that he carry it."

Efforts originally were made to book the nominee for today's Republican day program at the Illinois state fair, but the Willkie managers held the rally here followed too closely the notification ceremony last week-end at Elwood, Ind.
