Fear Plane With Eight on Board Crashed

BIG AIRLINER UNHEARD FROM SINCE HOP-OFF

Took Off From Burbank, California Saturday.

ENROUTE TO N. Y.

BULLETIN
Gallup, N. M., April 5.—The sheriff's office at St. John, Ariz., reported today the wreckage of an airplane had been located a mile and a half from Alpine, 60 miles from there. Searchers for a Douglas airliner lost since Saturday with eight persons aboard for quick details.

The wreckage was sighted in the general area where John T. Buckler, operator of a resort lodge at Greer, Ariz., said he saw a big transport plane circling Saturday afternoon in a snow storm.

Alpine is about thirty miles southeast of Greer with inaccessible mountain country between. It is about 30 miles south of Springerville, Ariz., near the New Mexico state line.

The Alpine telephone operator said she was without information on the report.

Burbank, Calif., April 5.—A plane carrying eight or more persons was missing today along a route marked by bad weather.

The plane, a Douglas transport, hopped off here Saturday noon and was being flown across the country to be shipped from New York to Holland for delivery to the Royal Dutch Air line. It was equipped with a radio sending and receiving set. The pilot, Glen Moser, 30, had no scheduled stop, except Kansas City.

TWA records indicated eight persons besides Moser and Co-Pilot Joe Wolfolk, 32, were aboard but George W. Stratton, assistant to the Douglas Corp. president, could give only the following list, besides the two pilots:

E. R. Moser, 55, father of the pilot.

Merle Estey, 29, Douglas engineer.

Mrs. Lucille Estey, his wife.

Bernard Troy, Jr., 33, parking station operator.

George Kent.

Mrs. B. R. Uderlin, mother of a Douglas employee.

Kent and Troy were guests of the pilots.

The plane was expected to fly by way of Krumm and Winslow, Ariz., Albuquerque, N. M., and Amarillo, Tex. The TWA transport which preceded it by 45 minutes was forced to fly "blind" through Ashfork and Winslow, Ariz., between cloudy weather and rain. TWA reports showed a ceiling of 200 to 2,000 feet in Arizona and western New Mexico.

FALL INJURIES ARE FATAL TO IDA SCHNEIDER

Wife Of Bradley Druggist Dies on Sunday.

Mrs. Ida Schneider, 62, wife of George C. Schneider, well known druggist of Bradley, died at 9:55 o'clock Sunday morning from injuries received as the result of an unavoidable accident at St. Mary hospital.

Mrs. Schneider entered the hospital on March 21 for medical treatment and was in a greatly weakened condition. Yesterday morning, about 8 o'clock, she attempted to raise the window of her room for additional ventilation, suffered an attack of weakness and dizziness and fell.

The fall was from a third story window, a distance of 35 to 40 feet. She suffered injuries which caused death from internal hemorrhage.

Abolishes Nurses
Mrs. Schneider was conscious afterward and gave to members of her family a definite explanation of how the accident occurred. Statements and evidence recorded at the inquest conducted yesterday afternoon at the hospital and special nurses from all responsibility.

Private funeral services will be conducted at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Rehr funeral chapel, followed by public services at St. Paul Lutheran church a half hour later, conducted by the Rev. Carl F. Haller, the pastor. Burial will be in Mount Grove cemetery.

Friends may call at the Rehr.

Tuesday is Charter Night For New Exchange Club

EXPECT 10,000 WILL VOTE IN TOWN CONTEST

Polls Open At 6 A. M. and Close at 5 o'clock.

WHERE TO VOTE

Approximately 10,000 voters of Kankakee township will go to the polls tomorrow for the purpose of electing township officers to serve four year terms.

The officers to be elected are a supervisor and two assistant supervisors, these officers also to serve on the county board, a town clerk, an assessor, five justices of the peace and five constables.

At the same time, voters of the Kankakee park district, which comprises an area somewhat smaller than Kankakee township, will elect two members of the park board to serve six year terms.

Separate Ballots
Ballots for the park district election will be cast at the same polling places as for the township election, and the same judges and clerks will act for both elections, but there will be separate ballots for each district ballot being smaller than the township one.

The polls will open at 6 o'clock in the morning and close at 5 o'clock. The voting places are as follows:

Virginia Dentist Will Plead Guilty

Charlottesville, Va., April 5.—Commonwealth's Attorney W. O. Fife announced today Dr. R. G. Miller, Charlottesville dentist, would enter a plea of guilty Wednesday to second degree murder in the death of 18-year-old Cleo Sprouse.

He declined to say whether the defense counsel on the length of the dentist's sentence, which, under Virginia law, might be from 5 to 20 years for second degree murder.

The body of the girl was found near the University of Virginia campus on March 2. Sheriff J. Mason Smith said Miller, a dentist, signed a statement saying the girl died in a borrowed automobile when he administered chloroform preparatory to an abortion.

Asks Observance of Army Day Here

Velsh McIntyre, Americanism officer of the local post of the American Legion, today asked that people of Kankakee join tomorrow in observance of Army day.

He asked that flags be displayed and if on a staff, be displayed at half mast in honor of deceased American soldiers.

The occasion commemorates the 20th anniversary of the entrance of the United States into the world war.

Miss Rogers Quits Job As Relief Head

Miss D. Katharine Rogers, representative of the Illinois Emergency Relief administration in Kankakee county for the past several years, today announced that she has resigned her position to accept a new one.

Her resignation takes effect April 15, after which she will go to New York City to take a new position with a large private welfare agency. She will be associated with the financial department of that agency.

Miss Rogers came to Kankakee in August of 1933 to organize the Kankakee County Emergency Relief administration. She remained in the position of county relief administrator until last July when that office closed as the responsibility of relief was shifted from the state to townships.

She then accepted the position of certification officer for the state relief commission for Kankakee and Iroquois counties.

In going to New York, Miss Rogers returns to the scene of her original participation in welfare work.

BEST PLAN IS VOTE STRAIGHT AT ELECTION

"Scratchers" Must Vote Each Square on Ballot.

It is the belief of hundreds of members of the "Maitland for Supervisor" clubs throughout Kankakee township that voters should vote the Republican ticket straight at the township election next Tuesday.

They believe that the welfare and progress of Kankakee township will be best served by the election of the Republican ticket as a harmonious, carefully selected unit.

But should any voter wish to "scratch" the ticket for some reason such as personal friendship, it has been pointed out that the only safe way to make a cross in the name of every person to be voted for, regardless of the cross in the circle at the top.

How It's Done
For instance, if a voter marked the Republican straight, then crossed over to vote for John Doe, a candidate for justice of the peace on the Democratic ticket, John Doe would be the only candidate for justice of the peace out of the ten on the ballot to get a vote.

This is because the election clerks when they count the votes would not know which of the five Republican candidates to leave out, and only one vote already has been given to a Democratic candidate.

Others Lose Out
Similarly, if a voter marked the Republican ticket straight, then crossed over to vote for Richard Roe for assistant supervisor on the Democratic ticket, then Richard Roe would be the only man out of four candidates on the ballot to get a vote.

The safe way is not to "scratch." But if the voter wishes otherwise, he or she should make a cross in front of every name of a candidate.

Auto Strike Hurts Local Paint Plant

The prolongation of strikes in the automobile industry has begun to effect local business. The J. W. Mortell company, 550 North Hobble avenue, has been forced to lay off 60 per cent of its force for an indefinite period because the auto manufacturers have curtailed orders from the local firm.

J. Leonard Mortell, vice-president, said this morning that the plant would continue to operate with about 40 men, but the remainder could not be kept employed because the labor troubles in the industry are settled and production is again stepped up.

The Mortell company supplies a number of paint and asphalt products to automobile manufacturers, who are their largest customers.

Death Of A Student Is Accidental

Champaign, Ill., April 5.—The death of a University of Illinois freshman student by premature explosion of a home-made bomb was called "accidental" by a coroner's jury after hearing testimony of the youth's companions, one of whom was seriously injured by the blast Saturday night.

Dave O'Donnell, 19, of Urbana was killed and Roger Shields, 18, of Highland suffered severe burns and possible loss of his eyesight as they attempted to experiment with the bomb on the edge of Urbana.

Young Shields' account of the explosion taken in writing at his hospital bedside, was presented to the coroner's jury last night. It read: "It was foolish. . . . We had been messing around with chemicals for three or four days, and we had read up on the explosion and decided to try it. . . . I did not notice he jarred the bottle (apparently referring to O'Donnell)."

Testimony of other witnesses indicated the boys apparently had taken small quantities of chemicals from the chemistry laboratory at the university, where young Shields also was a student.

The blast occurred after the bomb had been placed in the crotch of a tree, and was heard four miles away. George and Ralph Clark and John Deturk, all of Urbana, told the jury they had accompanied the other boys to watch the experiment, but remained some distance away.

Hospital authorities reported an improvement in the condition of Shields yesterday.

Filipino Tribesmen Fight Constabulary

Manila, P. I., April 5.—Pierce Mohammedan tribesmen of the island of Mindanao fought off massed attacks of Philippine constabulary from behind log forts today.

Dispatches from Dansalan, on mountainous and heavily wooded Mindanao, said well-armed Moro tribesmen were putting up stiff resistance to 150 constabulary men led by 15 officers storming the Moro strongholds in the Bindayan district.

The Moros are disarmed periodically by the Christian Filipinos of the northern islands but the fighting tribesmen, armed with gas pipe firearms and heavy bolos are able, at will, to put effective forces into the field to defend their territory.

Sportsmen Get 100 Black Pheasants

One hundred black mutant pheasants have been received by the Kankakee county Sportsmen's club from the state conservation department.

Twenty-five are specially selected for breeding purposes at the club's state hospital pens, while the remainder have been liberated in different parts of the county with the assistance of deputy game wardens.

Six pairs of quails were also liberated at the same time.

During the first week in June, the club expects to receive 450 pheasant chicks, two weeks old. These will be liberated when they reach the age of nine weeks and another flock will be started. Shipments of birds are made to similar clubs throughout the state.

The department of conservation game farms are operated entirely with such revenue as is derived from license fees. The sportsmen ask farmers to cooperate in the conservation program, by leaving plenty of cover for the birds, seeing that they have plenty of food during the winter and killing all stray cats and crows, two of the bird's worst enemies.

Dr. G. W. Morrow, chief of staff of the Kankakee state hospital, will be the speaker at the meeting of the Kankakee Business and Professional Women's club on Wednesday evening at McBroome's cafe. He is to speak on some phase of mental hygiene.

The meeting is in charge of the health committee of which Miss Sadie Barnes is chairman.

The principal business will be the appointment of a nominating committee to report at the May meeting.

VOTERS INDIGNANT AT SWITCHING OF NAMES

Clerk of Park Board Arranges Names of Candidates to Confuse Voters in Favor of His Own Ticket

What started out to be a quiet political campaign suddenly flared into a heated conflagration today when discovery was made that an appointed official of the Kankakee park board had done something apparently with the intention of confusing the voters of the park district at the polls tomorrow.

Specimen ballots, containing the names of six candidates for members of the park board, were issued by Clerk Thomas Sawyer of the board a day or two ago. To say that both Democrats and Republicans were amazed at the manner in which the names were juggled would be putting it mildly.

TWO INJURED IN SIX WEEK-END CRASHES HERE

George Dion, Boxer, Hits Fast I. C. Passenger.

In six week-end automobile crashes reported to police, two persons were injured and one driver arrested on a charge of reckless driving.

George Dion, 22, boxer of 331 North Rosewood avenue, sustained a cut over the left eye when his automobile rammed into the side of an Illinois Central passenger train as it pulled out of the depot at 1:10 a. m. Sunday morning.

Dion was headed east and the train was southbound No. 17, St. Louis special. The vehicle struck the side of the locomotive and bounced back. Dion was arrested by John Powell, night sergeant of police, and James Downs, I. C. railroad policeman, and later released on bail pending a hearing in police court.

Hits Aged Woman

Government Approves Title For Bradley Postoffice Site

Washington, April 5.—Procurement officials stated today that the Bradley, Ill., post office project the plans are complete and have been for the past two weeks and as soon as Department of Justice officials advise the treasury that the land is the property of the government the project will be placed on the market for construction bids.

A period of 30 days must elapse before bids are opened, in order that contractors will have time in which to prepare estimates and probably visit the site. Providing a reasonable offer is received for the land, the contract will be awarded about two weeks after the formal opening of bids.

Favors Friends

The Republican party had endorsed a ticket composed of Joseph Tolson, Sr., and Armand LeBeau. The Democrats had endorsed as their candidates, August C. Radeke and Harry Tanner. In addition to these two tickets, Clerk Sawyer, who has assumed an active part in the park board turmoil the past two years, got out his own ticket consisting of Louis C. Ray and Fred J. "Brick" Andrews.

Now, the clerk of the board has the authority under the law to print the ballot and to arrange the names in whatever order he sees fit. If the clerk wants to be fair, he usually arranges the names in such a way as to aid the voters in casting an intelligent vote.

Sawyer's Ballot

When Clerk Sawyer had the ballots printed a few days ago, here is his order of arrangement:

LOUIS C. RAY
FRED J. "BRICK" ANDREWS
AUGUST C. RADEKE
JOSEPH TOLSON
HARRY TANNER
ARMAND LEBAU

It will be noted that Sawyer placed his own candidates first, which was to be expected. But it will also be noted that he has "split" the Democratic and Republican candidates, with the apparent intention of confusing the voters of those two parties.

Confuses Voters
As soon as the discovery was made, complaints began coming in from all over the city to both Democratic and Republican headquarters. Leaders of both parties immediately saw a cleverly devised scheme to confuse the voters with the hope that such a confusion would work to the advantage of Ray and Andrews, the Sawyer candidates. They also recalled how, several years ago, a town clerk left a whole ticket off the ballot and how his own party suffered the repercussions from this act for many years.

WAGNER LABOR ACT DECISION POSTPONED

Supreme Court In Recess Until Next Monday. NO EXPLANATION

Washington, April 5.—The supreme court deferred today until at least next Monday a decision on the Wagner labor act, a decision which would have settled the issue of whether the act is constitutional.

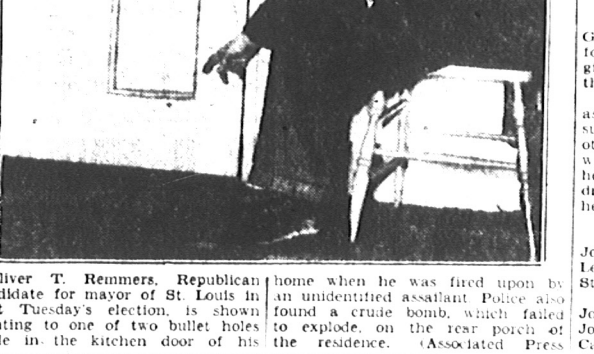

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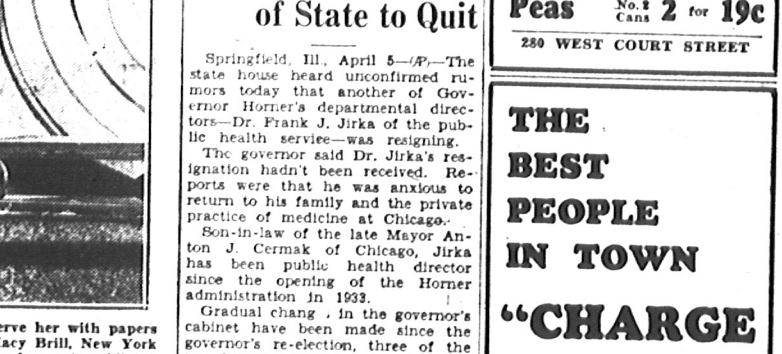
