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# BRITAIN MOVES TO CHECK BLOCKADE

## NORTH ENGLAND PARSON TO AID WINDSOR, WALLY

Will Give Religious Blessing at Their Wedding.

A SURPRISE ACT

Monts, France, June 2—(AP)—The Duke of Windsor and Wallis Warfield's wedding tomorrow will be a civil service by this small town's mayor, the short, stout, bespectacled Charles Mercier. He will lecture the couple, in the French custom, on marriage.

A religious service by the Anglican "labor preacher," the Rev. R. Anderson Jardine, 50, greyish, who defied his church's opposition to remarriage of divorced persons. (Mrs. Warfield is twice divorced.)

He proclaimed today: "I would prefer to die rather than see my king (the abdicated Edward) married outside the church."

The altar cloth will be from the Monts Catholic church. A cross is from a Tours Protestant church. Charles Bedeaux, owner of the chateau in which the wedding will be held, borrowed them today.

Monts, France, June 2—(AP)—A fighting North England parson, braving the opposition of the Church of England, will give the Duke of Windsor and Wallis Warfield his religious blessing at their wedding tomorrow.

The middle-aged "labor" preacher, the Rev. R. Anderson Jardine, 50, greyish, will perform the religious ceremony at the civil service in the chateau.

Arrives at Scene

Today, without being met at the Tours railroad station, he taxied to Cande and bowed to the duke.

"I prefer to die rather than see my king married outside the church," proclaimed the Rev. Jardine.

Windsor and Mrs. Warfield were said to have been overjoyed. Both were represented as having been extremely disappointed over the impossibility of finding a clergyman to officiate because the duke's Anglican church frowned upon remarriage.

## Van Devanter Ends 26-Year Career With Supreme Court

Washington, June 2—(AP)—Justice Willis Van Devanter exchanged today his busy 26-year career as a member of the supreme court for that of a gentleman-farmer.

His colleagues in a letter expressed "high esteem and warm affection," and a poignant sense of regret at his voluntary retirement.

In reply, Van Devanter said he would carry memories of the association "together with profound respect and true affection" for each of those remaining.

The 78-year old justice attended his final session of the court yesterday when the tribunal adjourned until next October. His retirement marks the first change in its membership since Benjamin N. Cardozo was appointed a justice in 1932 to succeed 91-year-old Oliver Wendell Holmes.

Van Devanter intends to spend much of his time at his 788-acre Maryland farm, acquired more than a year ago. Later on in the summer, he expects to visit the Selznory club, a gathering place for sportsmen in Canada. Despite his age, he is fond of golf, hunting and fishing.

President Roosevelt has given no indication of his intentions in selecting a successor.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, is being boomed by many of his colleagues for the post. A number of other government officials and widely known attorneys also are being discussed in the capital as possibilities.

American airways reported that Amelia Earhart landed at Caripito, Venezuela, at 9:18 a. m. central standard time today after a flight from San Juan, Puerto Rico.

It was expected that she and her navigator, Capt. Fred J. Noonan, would remain overnight in the Standard Oil company's guest house there and take off tomorrow for Paramaribo, Dutch Guiana. From there she probably would proceed to Natal by way of Para, Brazil.

The aviator is flying around the world as near the equator as practicable, making the 28,000-mile journey for pleasure.

## Hospital Patient Wins His Freedom

Frank Johnson, 52, former Chicago carpenter, obtained his release yesterday afternoon from Kankakee state hospital, to which he was committed March as an alcoholic.

Proceedings before Circuit Judge W. R. Hunter.

The court made it clear, however, that his liberty is entirely dependent upon his abstinence from alcoholics and that one lapse will result in his return to the institution.

Dr. G. W. Morrow, acting managing officer of the hospital, testified that Johnson is mentally and physically well but that continuation of this condition depends upon future good behavior. He said that Johnson's nervous system has been permanently damaged by alcohol and expressed the doubt that he would be able to abstain.

## Insurance Code Passed by Both House and Senate

Springfield, Ill., June 2—(AP)—Approved by both houses, Director Palmer's insurance code today was sent to Governor Horner today for his signature.

The house passed the measure on a 145 to 0 vote today and sent it to the senate which quickly concurred in nine minor amendments.

No house debate preceded the avalanche of "aye" votes, asked as a demonstration of confidence in Palmer, who is recovering from an appendicitis operation. Palmer has backed the voluminous recodification of insurance laws in three legislative sessions.

Representative Benjamin S. Adamowski in the only speech said the code would improve insurance laws and reminded the house of Palmer's illness.

The overwhelming house vote indicated that the senate would agree to the minor amendments and send the bill to Governor Horner for approval.

The bill is in virtually the same form as when it was introduced, attempts to amend it also having been beaten down in the senate.

The code still contains the Lloyd's section, requiring that the London concern meet the same requirements as the domestic companies.

## Prefers Charges Against Ford Co.

Washington, June 2—(AP)—Homer Martin, president of the United Automobile Workers, announced today charges of unfair labor practices had been filed with the national labor relations board against the Ford Motor company.

Martin said over 150 specific cases were cited in the charges at the Detroit and Somerville, Mass., regional offices of the board. He said the charges alleged men were discharged for union activities.

At the same time Martin announced the U. A. W. would go into organization.

Martin made the announcements at a joint press conference with John L. Lewis, C.I.O. chieftain. Prior to the press conference they had been closeted together in Lewis' office for more than an hour.

Detroit, June 2—(AP)—A subpoena was issued today for Edsel Ford, president of the Ford Motor company, as a one-man grand jury began an investigation of last week's fight between company employees and members of the United Automobile Workers of America.

Duncan C. McCrea, Wayne county prosecutor, said process servers who called at the Ford company offices were unable to find either Ford or Harry H. Bennett, personal director.

Six witnesses appeared today before common pleas Judge Ralph W. Liddy, conducting the grand jury inquiry on the petition of McCrea.

They included Mayor John L. Carey and Police Chief Carl A. Brooks of suburban Dearborn, where fighting broke out last Wednesday as union organizers prepared to distribute "unionism not Fordism" leaflets.

## Three-Judge Pardon Court Is Proposed

Springfield, Ill., June 2—(AP)—Establishment of a three-judge court of pardon and parole was proposed today in a bill by Rep. Benjamin S. Adamowski, Chicago Democrat, who did not claim administration backing for the parole board substitute.

Members of the parole board would serve 12-year terms at \$15,000 salaries, retire on pension, appoint bailiffs and other employees and grant paroles on the indeterminate sentence system.

The bill authorizes downstate municipalities to increase tax rates a companion to the minimum wage bills for policemen and firemen, was amended by the house. Changes made would earmark for increased taxes for the salary purposes and prohibit increases in the municipalities of less than 10,000 population where the minimum wage measure would not apply.

## POLICE ARREST 183 PERSONS IN ONE MONTH HERE

A new all-time high for arrests in a single month by the city police department was established during the officers' concerted drive on violators of traffic laws in May.

A total of 183 persons were booked at headquarters last month to exceed the previous high of 141 established in June of 1936.

Almost as many traffic offenders paraded through police court for the month just ended (139) as the total for all offenses in June of last year.

Young and Old

A study of traffic violators has led Chief of Police L. B. Rogers to observe that the authorities have most trouble with young men between the ages of 15 and 25 and with drivers 60 years or older.

The young fellows drive too fast to stop for red lights and observe other rules, according to the chief, while the older men either can't see the signs or can't control their reflexes quickly enough to avoid crashes when they get into tight spots.

Speeding was by far the most frequent charge placed against motorists last month with a total of 64 apprehended.

47 Didn't Stop

Next most prevalent was the failure of drivers to stop at red lights, with 47 booked under this classification.

Seven were brought in for alley parking, five for reckless driving, four each for improper parking and double parking, three for exceeding the time limit, two for using fictitious license plates, one for leaving the scene of an accident and one for driving on the sidewalk.

Other than traffic offenses, a total of 44 arrests of the usual variety were recorded with drunks and disorderly persons comprising 20 of these.

## Wheat Prices Drop on Board of Trade

Chicago, June 2—(AP)—Wheat prices dropped more than 4 cents a bushel today after release of crop estimates of Chicago experts forecasting the largest winter wheat spring wheat production this year in the United States since 1931.

The market gained almost a cent at the start but after release of the private estimates at 10 a. m. plummeted on an early high of \$1.14 3-4 for July wheat to \$1.10 1-4 shortly before the close. Last prices were 2 3-4-3 1-2 below Tuesday's finish.

## NAVAL ACTION AGAINST SPAIN IS CONSIDERED

Additional Vessels May Be Sent to Troubled Area.

ITALY-GERMANY

BULLETIN

Perpignan, France, June 2—(UP)—The Spanish sailboat Granda, 214 tons, out of Barcelona with a load of cement, was torpedoed today by a submarine off the northeastern coast of Spain. The ship filled and sank rapidly. The crew of eight escaped in a rowboat which the submarine shelled, killing one, Salvador Barberon, and wounding two.

BULLETIN

Washington, June 2—(AP)—The Spanish embassy said today that Ambassador Fernando de Rios had been called to Valencia to consult with the Loyalist government on the present situation in Europe. Enrique Carlos de la Casa, who will become charge d'affaires, during the ambassador's absence, said the ambassador would sail on the steamship Queen Mary from New York.

Embassy attaches said they had no definite knowledge of the discussions the Loyalist government wished to have with the ambassador and did not know how long he would remain in Spain.

London, June 2—(AP)—Great Britain was reported today to be considering a plan for joint naval action against Spain to offset the establishment of a virtual Italian blockade of ports held by the Spanish government.

Convinced of the necessity of preventing any new critical incidents in the civil war, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden was understood to have taken under advisement the plan which would grant Italy's and Germany's demands for guaranteed protection of their fleets in Spanish waters.

The British admiralty was reported to be considering dispatch of additional ships to the troubled area. The battle squadrons of both Italy and Germany already off Spain were being Joint Action.

Under the proposal Eden was said to have before him for immediate action, the warships of Britain.

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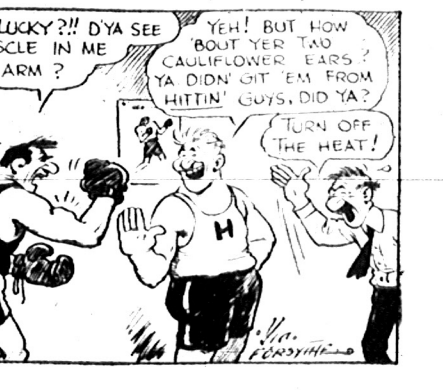

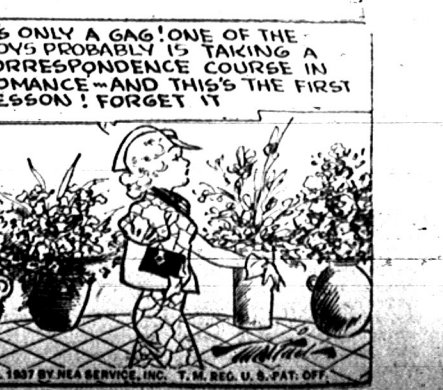
