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WINDSOR WEDS AN AMERICAN

MAYOR TELLS CIVIC GROUP ABOUT TRAFFIC

Exchange Club Is Interested in Problem.

TO MAKE SURVEY

A round table discussion of the traffic problem in Kankakee was conducted at the Exchange club Tuesday evening.

He told of the increased fire hazard, the loss of business and the acute congestion resulting from the closing of the court street viaduct over the Illinois Central railroad and of the progress made by the city and various civic groups in attempting to get the railroad and the state to construct a new four-lane structure.

The mayor touched on various phases of the traffic situation including double parking, shortening the time of parking, parking meters, disposition in police court of offenders, and erection of more traffic lights.

More Traffic Signals

Before the summer is over, he indicated, traffic signals would be installed on Court street at the intersections of Harrison, Dearborn and East avenues. This improvement has been temporarily approved by the state highway department and will be paid for out of the city's share of state motor fuel tax receipts.

The project will provide traffic lights at each block on the main part of the Court street business district. The lights will be so timed that a motorist traveling at a speed of 18 to 19 miles an hour will be able to "make" them all, the mayor explained.

After these lights are in operation, pedestrians as well as motorists will be expected to observe them.

To Make Survey

The municipal executive said that before any new system of parking is put into operation a traffic engineer from the Chicago Motor club and one from the Evanston police would make a survey of traffic conditions here.

Upon the results of this survey and the suggestions of businessmen the city will then base forthcoming legislation calculated to (Continued on page eight)

FR. LE VESSEUR 50TH JUBILEE HERE SUNDAY

Well Known Priest 48 Years in Two Counties.

HOLD RECEPTION

The golden anniversary of the ordination of the Rev. Joseph E. LeVesseur, retired priest who has held several charges in Kankakee and Iroquois counties during his 50 years of service in the church, will be celebrated Sunday at St. Rose church.

The jubilarian will sing a solemn high mass at noon with the Rev. C. A. Pousant of Chicago as deacon and the Rev. C. J. Kearns of Ashkum as subdeacon.

The Rev. T. J. Timmons of Dwight, formerly of Watseka, will preach in English, and the Rev. P. B. Dufault, pastor of St. Rose church, will preach in French.

Public Reception

At 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon there will be a reception in honor of Father LeVesseur which may be attended by the public.

During 48 years of his half century as a priest Father LeVesseur has served in Kankakee and Iroquois counties. He was ordained June 4, 1887 in the Basilica of Quebec by Cardinal Tacheau and shortly afterward came to Illinois in missionary work.

On July 17, 1890 he assumed charge of St. James church, then located two and a half miles north of Irving. He spent four years in this parish, and on May 30, 1894 became pastor of St. John the Baptist church at LeVesseur.

Father LeVesseur spent 15 years in the LeVesseur parish, during which time he built a parochial school, remodeled the church and improved the cemetery which is regarded as one of the most beautiful in this vicinity.

He was pastor of St. Joseph & St. Mary church at Chebanse from 1920 until 1929 when he retired.

Not only for his executive and ecclesiastical ability, but also for many qualities of heart and mind that have endeared him to former parishioners, Father LeVesseur is highly regarded by many in Kankakee and Iroquois counties.

KANKAKEE HAS OIL WELL BOOM FOR FEW HOURS

Crude Oil Gushes from Two Wells Downtown.

ONLY SEEPAGE

Excitement ran high on Court street early this morning as the Walgreen company started the pumps on its new well and got oil instead of water.

Louis Daigle of Chicago, the man who completed installation yesterday of the rotary pumping equipment intended for the air-conditioning unit in the drug store, started the pump to see what sort of flow of water would be delivered and when it began pumping 300 to 400 gallons a minute, oil appeared in the water.

A few minutes later a stream of oil was delivered instead of water. Daigle thought he could pump it off in a little while and ran his pipe up through the sidewalk and into the street. After an hour's steady pumping during which nothing but oil flowed, he halted the pumps and sought Construction Engineer Greenwood of the Walgreen company in Chicago.

Find Second "Gusher"

News of the firm's striking a vein of oil in this 100-foot well spread rapidly and visions of a possible boom in the city's downtown business district were quickly entertained. The story was heightened when it was learned a few minutes later that the drillers who are sinking a shaft in the alley behind the Luna theater for an air conditioning unit also had struck oil at a depth of 58 feet.

Miami, Fla. June 3—(AP)—Amelia Earhart took off from Caripito, Venezuela at 11:48 a. m. Greenwich time (8:48 a. m. c.s.t.) today, bound for Paramaribo, Netherlands Guiana, on the third leg of her round-the-world flight.

Pan American Airways, over whose route Miss Earhart is flying, reported the takeoff of the blonde aviatrix and Captain Fred Noonan, her navigator, was without incident. Paramaribo is 750 miles south and east of Caripito and it was thought Miss Earhart would require only four or five hours to reach this goal.

Pan American weather reports from Georgetown, British Guiana, indicated the big twin-engine monoplane would have clear weather all the way.

Over the first 1,750 miles of her 28,000-mile route, Miss Earhart had not pushed her silvery monoplane. She eased along at about 150 miles an hour Tuesday on the 1,000-mile first leg from Miami to San Juan, Puerto Rico. Yesterday she stepped it up to an average of 190 on the 750-mile jump from San Juan to Caripito.

GOVERNMENT SILENT
London, June 3—(AP)—Britain's government, which would not have Wallis Warfield as the empress's queen, maintained official silence today on the American-born woman's marriage to former King Edward VIII at Monts, France.

"Has the government already decided to send or are they considering sending a message of congratulations to Windsor on his wedding," J. McGovern, in comments.

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain made no answer.

Chamberlain last week succeeded Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin, the man who is credited with having put George VI on the throne as successor to the abdicated Edward.

Chateau de Candé, Monts, France, June 3—(AP)—The Duke and Duchess of Windsor, married today in two ceremonies, left their Touraine retreat tonight at 8:30 p. m. (11:30 a. m. c.s.t.) for the "haunted castle of Wasserlooburg" to spend their honeymoon in Austria.

The radiantly happy couple left after having been united in a French civil ceremony and the religious service of the Church of England.

Only a small group of guests attended the wedding and breakfast just 25 weeks after Edward forfeited his crown of England and empire because Wallis Warfield could not be his queen.

No member of his royal family was there.

The bridal couple left the chateau by automobile. They were said to be planning to board a special train at the town of Laroche-Migennes. They had sent their baggage ahead.

"I will," the Duke, supremely happy, answered in a firm, loud voice to the Anglican poor man's parson who gave him the unsolicited blessing of the church of England.

As far as I could see neither the Duke nor anyone else kissed the bride.

The Duke raised his voice so high in his eagerness to take the "woman I love" as his wife that he startled the 34 guests in the flower-banked music room of this old chateau.

After him, his blue-eyed lady answered, "I will." Her voice was just as firm as Edward's, but more hushed.

Garden Is Best Vegetable Refrigerator

LITTLE TVA'S ARE OUTLINED BY PRESIDENT

Seven Regional Authorities Will Administer. SENDS MESSAGE

Washington, June 3.—President Roosevelt today set out seven regional authorities to administer federal power projects and to plan safeguards against floods, droughts and dust storms.

A comprehensive program for the seven "little TVA's" was outlined in a special message.

It said the hydro-electric projects which have been or may be undertaken were part of a "multiple purpose watershed development" designed not only to develop the nation's water power but to prevent nature's calamities but to prevent their occurrence.

The watershed resources of the nation must be protected from private monopoly and used for the benefit of the people. The president said in what was expected to be his last major legislative recommendation for this session.

Bills Prepared. Bills were ready for introduction in both houses to carry out his suggestions.

The seven regional authorities would plan and in some cases administer projects in the areas:

- 1.—Atlantic seaboard.
- 2.—Great Lakes and Ohio valley.
- 3.—Tennessee and Cumberland rivers drainage basin.
- 4.—Missouri and Red river of the north drainage basin.
- 5.—Arkansas, Red and Rio Grande drainage basins.
- 6.—Colorado and rivers flowing into the Pacific south of the California-Oregon line.
- 7.—Columbia river basin.

The president said he would leave undisturbed the existing Missouri river commission because it was "well equipped to handle the problems immediately attending the channel of that great river."



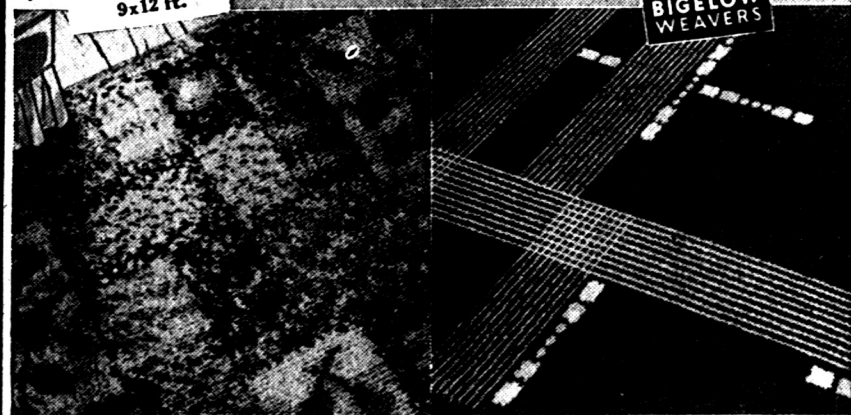
