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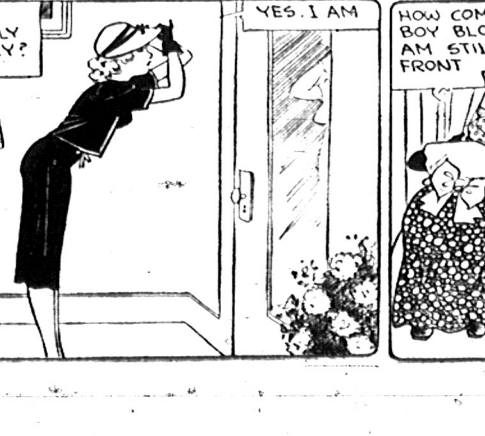
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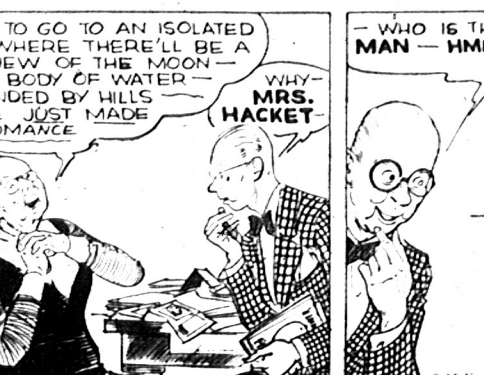
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CONFESSES HE MURDERED MAN FOR INSURANCE

Belleville Youth's Story Verified by Brother EXPECTED PAY

Belleville, Ill., July 12—(UP)—Angelo Ralph Giancola, 21, today confessed to St. Clair county, Ill., authorities that he killed William Kappen, 36, on the eve of Kappen's marriage, as part of a plot to obtain his insurance.

After a series of conflicting "confessions" and repudiations police announced that Giancola's story was substantiated by that of his 20-year old brother, John.

Both youths signed a statement which said they were to be paid \$800 by Mrs. Marie Porter, sister of Kappen, for the slaying. She was the beneficiary on several of Kappen's insurance policies, police said. The brothers said they had intended to buy an automobile with the money.

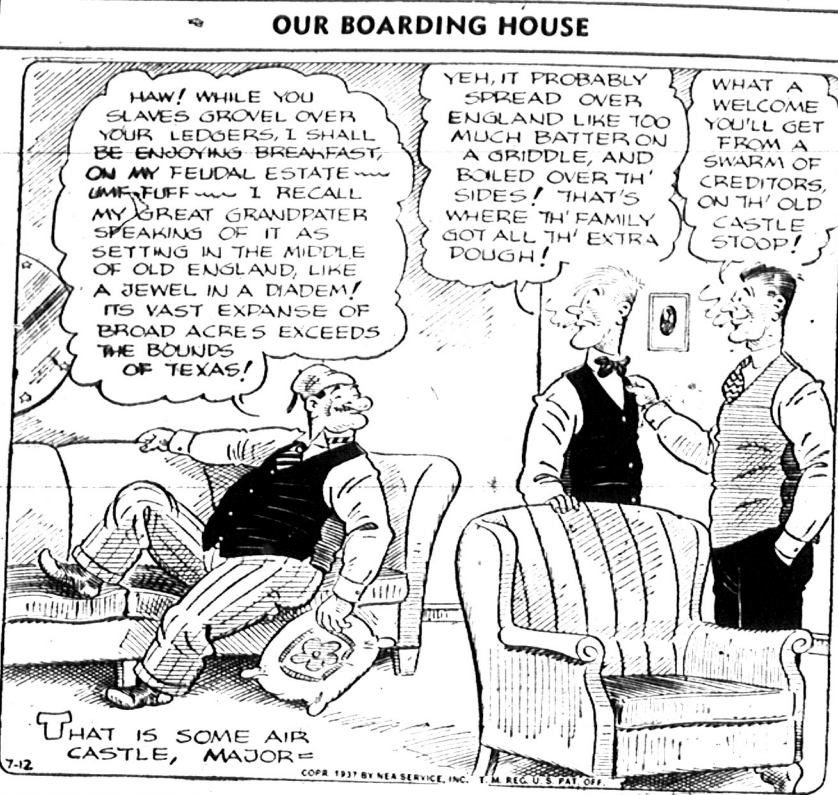
Slain on Wedding Day
Previously Angelo Giancola said Mrs. Porter had fired the shot which killed Kappen while the three drove through a desolate section of St. Clair county. Kappen's body was found near a main highway six miles west of Belleville a few hours before he was to be married to Miss Irene Traub, of St. Louis.

When asked why he had named Mrs. Porter as Kappen's slayer, he replied: "That was the only way I thought she could be involved in the case. She was in it more than I. Also I thought I could protect my brother."

John Giancola admitted, according to police, that he was with Angelo at the time Kappen was killed.

Angelo said he and his brother forced Kappen to accompany them into Illinois. Near East St. Louis, he said, Kappen was gagged and blindfolded. Then they continued for several miles until they reached an isolated area.
