STATE ORDERS DEMOLITION OF SLOT MACHINES

Sheriff Bergan To Continue Drive on Gambling

A notice served by the state today on the sheriffs of the 102 counties in Illinois, including Sheriff Daniel E. Bergan, that they must move to confiscate slot machines is belated so far as this county is concerned.

Immediately after his election early in December Sheriff Bergan began a campaign to eliminate "one-armed bandits" from this county. Two persons have been arrested, fined and their machine confiscated.

The notice to the sheriffs was served by Attorney General John Cassidy who offered county enforcement officials the assistance of state police if necessary.

Legislature Aroused

According to the United Press the action was coincident with developments in the state legislature yesterday when two proposals to investigate the manufacture and sale of the machines and truth of the charges that slot machines cause murder and corruption in the state, were introduced.

Today state police in each of eight districts contacted city and county law enforcers and proffered their assistance. In Springfield, Sangamon County Sheriff Harry Eleison received a personal visit from Police Lieutenant Raymond May.

A few hours later six machines were seized and Eleison planned to take custody if the drive was to include private clubs and fraternal organizations. At Moline, police raided two taverns and seized two slot machines.

The drive was touched off following a conference between Acting Governor Stelle and Cassidy, at which the acting governor offered Cassidy the assistance of his state police force.

"Not Spectacular"

The acting governor said the raids would not be spectacular.

"There will be no chopping," he said. "Everything will be done legally. The attorney general says the statutes of Illinois give the state full authority to act as conservator of the peace."

"State police have all the powers of police in cities and counties and they will see that the law is enforced."

"Do you mean that where local law enforcers do not act, that state police can move in?" he was asked.

"Yes, I do," Stelle replied.

The order to state police loosed 500 patrolmen and officers in an almost unprecedented move. It is the first time it was said that state police have ever been detailed to active duty and apprehension of criminals.

In the past two or three weeks, six murders have been committed in the state-four in so-called down-town counties which have been characterized of gangland executions," Cassidy wrote sheriffs and.

Americans Run The Gauntlet Of Bombs

Aboard the U. S. Cruiser Omaha, near Barcelona, Jan. 25—(AP)—Fifteen Americans, fleeing the beleaguered Barcelona area, had to run a gauntlet of bombs today before they reached safety aboard the Omaha and the United States destroyer Bagley.

One bomb fell 100 feet from the refugees as they stood on a breakwater waiting for a small boat to take them out to the warships, anchored about two miles off Caidetas, approximately 20 miles north of Barcelona.

More bombs were dropped by insurgent planes while the small boat was enroute to the United States vessels, but none fell near the refugees.

Seven insurgent planes started bombing Caidetas at 8:30 a. m. (2:30 p. m., est.), after the Omaha had sent out a tender to take off the

City Fireman Resigns Job After Arrest

John DiPietra, city fireman, handed in his resignation yesterday from the force following a hearing in police court over marital difficulties.

NAZIS LIABLE FOR AUSTRIAN DEBTS TO U. S.

State Department Rejects German Contentions

Washington, Jan. 25—(AP)—The state department rejected today Germany's contention that any payment she makes on Austrian debts to the United States government and citizens must depend on the German-American balance of trade.

The department also refused to accept Germany's position that she is not legally responsible for Austria's debts.

Relief Obligations

The debts include a relief obligation to the United States government of \$26,000,000, which Germany wanted to put aside on the ground it was a war debt. An American note dated January 20 and made public today, however, says this government "perceives no reason why the intergovernmental relief debt should be left out of present consideration."

The remainder of the debt is made up of \$20,575,000 in Austrian government bonds and dollar bonds of Austrian political subdivisions and corporations amounting to \$18,000,000.

The American note dealt the second blow within the past few days at German efforts to expand her trade by tying other enterprises to it. Germany had sought to get the United States and other countries to agree to buy increased German exports in return for allowing Jewish refugees to leave the reich with a portion of their wealth.

Discriminations

The note, delivered by Charge d'Affaires Prentiss Gilbert, called into question Germany's statement that "it does not have the intention to discriminate against American creditors as compared with other creditors."

"This statement," it commented.

TIGHTENS RING ABOUT CAPITAL AT EARLY DAWN

Predicts Complete Occupation Before Night

Hendaye, France (At The Spanish Frontier)—Jan. 25—(AP)—An insurgent military dispatch said Generalissimo Francisco Franco's insurgent troops entered Barcelona this morning.

The advance guard of the insurgent army marched into the Spanish government capital after tightening a ring around the city on three sides, reports from field headquarters said.

Barcelona still was in government hands, however.

Fires Raging

Late today large fires were reported in the old quarters of Barcelona, where thousands of refugees were cut off from escape to the north by the insurgent ring around most of the city.

Only the road which hugs the Mediterranean coast still was open to hordes attempting to flee toward the French border and by mid-afternoon even that road was being shelled by insurgent big guns.

Insurgent airplanes, which for days had been bombing Barcelona almost incessantly, dropped leaflets calling on the city to surrender "to avoid useless bloodshed."

Northwest of Barcelona, insurgents reported that the northern wing of their armies had occupied Solsona, 50 miles from the capital and commanding important high-ways to the French frontier.

The Moorish army corps commanded by General Juan Yague which had driven northeastward along the coast from Tarragona was reported the first insurgent unit to enter the government capital.

The government fort of Montjuich, a Gibraltar-like rock towering over Barcelona at its southern edge, rose above its column.

France's inland columns, converging on Barcelona from the west and northwest, were reported to have captured the important town of Tarrasa, 15 miles northwest of Barcelona.

Hope To Trap Defenders

On this flank the insurgents pressed on toward the sea in a drive to cut off Barcelona from the north and leave the city's defenders trapped and without hope of outside help.

The evacuation of government departments from Barcelona was completed during the night. The new seat of government remained officially a secret, lest it become a target for insurgent bombing planes.

At the border, however, it was learned that most of the Barcelona

CHILLAN, CHILE, IS DESTROYED; 40,000 PEOPLE

Concepcion Suffers Greatest Number of Casualties

Santiago, Chile, Jan. 25—(AP)—An army plane surveying the scene of a disastrous Chilean earthquake today flew low over Chillan, 220 miles south of Santiago, and reported finding the city of 40,000 inhabitants "completely destroyed."

The report of heavy damage to Chillan came as three army planes flew south to check unconfirmed reports 2,000 persons had been killed in Concepcion, important coastal city 50 miles southwest of Chillan.

The mayor of Concepcion sent a terse message to the government saying: "Situation most serious as result of the earthquake. Unable to state number of casualties but many hundreds, probably thousands. Require food, medical aid. Desperately urgent."

Mobilize for Relief

All available planes in Santiago were commandeered for relief and survey work as the government rushed medical and food supplies to the stricken area by train, plane and boat. Hundreds of doctors and nurses were mobilized for earthquake relief duty.

Concepcion and the nearby coastal city of Talcahuano were placed under a form of martial law.

Official reports said that 100 dead had been counted thus far, exclusive of Chillan, and more than 500 injured.

Shattered communication lines hampered officials striving to obtain a clear picture of the extent of the disaster. Trains proceeded slowly, fearful of quake-weakened roadbeds. All passenger trains were held up near Talca, 90 miles north of Chillan.

President Pedro Aguirre Cerda and several cabinet members departed for the quake area on a special train with 40 physicians, 70 nurses, and medical supplies.

First reports said the majority of houses were destroyed in Renaco, small town 50 miles south of Concepcion, and the railway disrupted in numerous places. Forty per cent of Concepcion's houses were reported demolished.

Early reports had accounted for 14 dead in the quake area which included Talca, a city of 45,000 inhabitants.

Fires Raging

A radio message from the Chile telephone company's manager, sent from San Rosendo, 25 miles south of Concepcion, said that probably 2,000 persons had been killed in Concepcion.

Other sources, however, considered this estimate too high despite radio reports that three big fires were raging in the center of the

Naval Officer is Drowned as Plane Capsizes; Newport

Newport, R. I., Jan. 25.—(AP)—Commander Francis Martin, 42, of the U. S. Navy, was killed today when his plane capsized as he was making a landing at the Newport Naval Station.

Physicians and an emergency crew from the Newport fire department worked over the 47-year-old naval officer for more than an hour before he was pronounced dead.

A native of Vincennes, Ind., Martin took the plane to the station this morning to "get in some flying time." He landed safely, but a gust of wind caused his ship, trapping him in the cockpit.

Favors Naval Base on Island of Guam

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Admiral William D. Leahy, chief of naval operations, told congress today a fully equipped naval base on the Pacific island of Guam would provide "valuable and needed assistance" to the fleet in protecting Hawaii, the continental United States and the Panama canal.

Leahy testified before the house naval committee, however, that such a base was not proposed in the navy's current \$50,000,000 program for establishment or expansion of a dozen naval air bases in Alaska, the Pacific, Caribbean and continental United States.

Leahy said the proposed expenditure of \$50,000,000 at Guam to dredge the harbor and provide auxiliary facilities was extremely important to commercial aviation even if future military development of the island never were undertaken.

Disclosure of the project has brought strong criticism from Japanese officials because the tiny island is less than 1,500 miles from Tokyo.

Franklin Roosevelt already has taken note of the Guam controversy and has said the proposed air base, while having no military value, necessarily means fortification of the island.

Although he said the question of establishing a fully-equipped naval base on Guam was a matter of national policy which the navy could not decide, Leahy told the committee:

"In my opinion, establishment of a base at Guam would provide valuable and needed assistance in repelling attack on the Hawaiian Islands, the Panama Canal, the continental coast of the United States."

"Guam is extremely valuable in augmenting the navy's defense power in the Pacific."

"No foreign power could advance on American territory without reducing such a base to the United States."

"The United States is to withdraw its Asiatic squadron from Guam to serve as a deterrent against attack on Hawaii."

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German Rebel Plane Crashes in France; Five Dead

Louder, France, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The entire five-man crew of a German-made tri-motor bomber plane was killed today when the machine, believed to be from the Spanish insurgent air force, crashed at Louder, France, 15 miles west of Paris.

Investigation by French experts established that the plane was of German make. Other officials sought to learn why the plane crashed on French soil some 100 miles northwest of the Catalonian battle-front.

The plane, a Heinkel He 111, was carrying five persons and was flying over the Atlantic when it crashed.

"Enough facts have been uncovered to state these murders to be syndicated slot machine racket," said the investigation. "Investigation disclosed that although the machine was removed from some counties, they are still operating in violation of the law in others."

Snappy Weather But Temperature Climbs

Chicago, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The middle west enjoyed generally fair and snappy weather today, but rising temperatures were on the rise.

The mercury plunged to 24 degrees below zero at St. Louis, Mo., and 14 below at St. Paul, Minn. The cold wave spread over the Great Lakes region yesterday morning moved eastward with the Lake Superior storm, increasing force.

In the past 24 hours, precipitation occurred over practically all of the United States, from the Gulf of Mexico and over some northern districts from the Dakotas westward to the Pacific coast.

The weather bureau forecast tonight, or by tomorrow in Wisconsin, northern Illinois, northern Indiana, northeastern Iowa and northern Minnesota.

Heavy Snowstorm Blankets England

London, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Heavy snowstorms blanketed most of England today, disrupting rail and highway traffic and causing a suspension of air services to the continent.
