Earthquake Death Toll May Exceed 12,000

STATE FORCES KANKAKEE TO PAY MORE TAXES

City Taxpayers to Have Rate Boost- ed 21 Cents

Due to the recent slash by the state tax commission of railway property valuations for taxing purposes other taxpayers in this county will have to pay higher taxes this year.

The state tax commission recently lowered railway property valuations in Kankakee county from \$3,659,226 last year to \$2,641,199 this year, a difference of \$1,018,025.

As a result the taxing bodies of the county have been forced to levy higher tax rates to make up for that difference and obtain enough funds for operation.

\$182 in Kankakee

In some taxing districts the difference in tax rates will be appreciable. Persons living in Kankakee city and in Kankakee school district No. 111 will pay a rate of \$182 or 21 cents more than last year.

This total is divided into items of taxation as follows—county rate 4 cents, township rate 44 cents, road and bridge rate 33 cents, Kankakee city rate \$125, park district rate 27 cents, county highway rate 15 cents, school district rate \$2 and township funding bonds 4 cents.

The county rate is five cents higher than last year due to the necessity for a special rate of that amount caused by the fast increasing number of blind pensioners. The road and bridge county highway and school district rates are the same as last year.

Last Year's Rates

The township rate last year was 15 cents, the city rate was \$123 and the park rate was 26 cents. The tax for township funding bonds was approved by the people last year in a special caucus of the town board.

County Clerk Hector J. LeBeau, who announced the rate figures to-day, said that the books will be turned over to Fred Preisel, county collector, about March 15.

Zaragoza, Spain, Jan. 26—(AP)—Hundreds of Generalissimo Francisco Franco's women "shock troops," many of them daughters of Spanish refugees, awaited orders today to enter Barcelona and set up soup kitchens and bread lines.

Members of "Beneficencia de Guerra," these women were picked and trained with extreme care. They knew the exact addresses where they were to set up food stations after the expected fall of Barcelona and precisely how much food they were to take with them.

Huge food stores have been collected for months and earmarked for Barcelona. Even last fall shop owners were complaining they could not can goods because they were being saved "for Barcelona."

The women were instructed that when they entered the Catalonian

FIRST OFFICIAL TABULATION IS NOT COMPLETED

Military to Take Over All Radio Stations

Santiago, Chile, Jan. 26—(AP)—First government reports today gave more than 4,000 dead and the total may go above 12,000 in the earthquake that spread ruin and terror through central Chile Tuesday night.

The government communique was the first official tabulation of the death and damage and it was far from complete. Estimates of 12,000 dead came from aviators who flew over the regions hardest hit, 250 miles south of Santiago in the heart of the agricultural belt, from refugees who came out by air and from amateur radio operators.

The communique confirmed that the ancient city of Chillan, associated with early Chilean history, was destroyed. More than 300 were killed in a theater collapse and the total dead there was put at between 3,000 and 4,000. The population is 40,000.

"Sixty per cent" of Concepcion—known to tourists as the city of the perfumed plaza because of its beautiful garden—was destroyed.

The communique gave no estimate of death among the population of 77,000 but aviators and a manufacturer who flew out agreed that 2,000 was a likely figure.

Talca, with a population of 50,000 and known as one of the proudest cities in South America, suffered heavy damage but only five dead were listed there.

From more than a score of towns came reports of death, of homes and shops that collapsed, of fire, of lack of water and light, and of food shortage.

Most Seriously Affected

The quake was felt through a 450-mile strip from Valparaiso, north of Santiago, south along the coast. The Concepcion-Talca-Chillan region, 250 miles south, was the most seriously affected.

Many of the houses in the region are of ancient brick, some walls six feet thick, with heavy tile roofing. Only in recent years have the larger cities required quake-withstanding construction of steel.

The government announcement related that a hospital collapsed at Cauquenes, town of 6,500 noted for its mineral springs, killing 20. Seventy died when the jail fell.

San Carlos suffered heavy damage and Longavi was nearly demolished, but from these and other towns death tabulations were lacking.

To speed rescue operations, the government ordered the military to take over radio stations. Special trains, destroyers, planes, trucks and merchant vessels sped to the stricken region with doctors, nurses, food and (Continued on page ten)

INVITE PUBLIC TO DISCUSSION AT HOSPITAL

Manteno Institution Staff Sponsors Meetings

The first of a series of meetings open to the public will take place the afternoon of Sunday, Feb. 5, at 2:30 o'clock in the assembly hall of the Manteno state hospital to discuss the new attitude toward insanity of such institutions and their condition.

Dr. A. H. Gollmar of the hospital staff, who today announced the series, said that the new attitude in state hospital work is to regard insanity as a mental illness comparable to a physical malady.

As the result of that attitude and scientific treatment, he said, there are many cases of actual cures in which the patient is enabled to return to normal life.

One of the greatest problems to be overcome, he continued, is the present manner of committing patients through the courts.

"You don't arrest a man if he has a ruptured appendix and take him into court like a criminal," Dr. Gollmar said. "Insanity is an illness and should be diagnosed by a physician, not a policeman or a judge."

There is now an organization, he continued, of cured patients, their relatives and friends who are concerned with the problem of removing the present stigma of insanity. This group, he said, intends to introduce a bill in the legislature providing for removal of the "archaic and inhuman" method of commitment of a patient until cured.

The purposes of the organization will be explained at the Feb. 5 meeting, and in meetings every two weeks thereafter, by members of the hospital staff.

RHUMMY GAME CALLED ILLEGAL IN BONFIELD

Bonfield, Ill., Jan. 26—(UP)—This so-called "rummy village," which has no dance halls, pool rooms or movies and where the sale of liquor or beer is unlawful, eliminated another pastime today.

Effective Feb. 1, it will be against the law to play rummy.

This measure was put through at the suggestion of Mayor Reuben Orwig who had received numerous complaints from "rummy widows." Wives complained that their husbands gathered in one of the stores and played for a dime a hand.

Players, claiming the most anyone could lose in one night was a dollar, believed at first that the ordinance was a joke. But Leslie Yates, village justice of the peace, gave assurance to the contrary.

Yates, in the face of threats by opponents to obtain an injunction against the ordinance, has refused to issue any writs and promised that anyone caught playing rummy will be fined \$10 and costs.

Independent Stores Here Show Gains

Independent retail store sales in Kankakee during December of 1938 showed an increase of 6.5 per cent over the figure for the same month a year ago. This was the third largest gain reported in the state, according to the federal bureau of foreign and domestic commerce who announced the compilation today.

Evanston led the state with a gain of 9.4 per cent and Springfield was second with 6.6 per cent; Kankakee ranked only 1-10 of a point behind Springfield.

Chicago's gain was 4.4 per cent, or a little better than the state average which showed an increase of 4 per cent. December sales in Illinois showed an increase of 30.1-2 per cent over the previous month, according to the bureau's report.

Motor vehicles showed the greatest increase—32 per cent. Lumber and building materials dealers reported gains of 17 per cent and department stores, about 2 per cent.

This data was based on the confidential reports from 1,057 independent retailers who reported total sales of \$12,919,600 in this state last month.

BIGGEST PRIZE FOR THE REBEL FORCES IN WAR

Climax of Offensive Launched on De- cember 23

BULLETIN
Rome, Jan. 26—(AP)—A "wildly cheering" Fascist crowd tonight raised shouts of "Tunisia!" in response to a speech in which Premier Mussolini acclaimed the Spanish insurgent conquest of Barcelona with the aid of Italian troops.

Referring to the Spanish government slogan, "No Pasaran!"—"they shall not pass!"—Mussolini said:

"We have passed and I say to you that we will pass!"

A crowd estimated at 50,000 clamored for 11 Duce until he appeared on the balcony of his palace, Venezia.

He described the capture of Spain's largest city as a "splendid victory" and called it "another chapter in the new Europe we are creating."

The shouts for Tunisia, France's protectorate in North Africa, were interspersed with cries also for Corsica, the island department of France in the Mediterranean.

They roared after Mussolini's speech and lasted several minutes, bringing the premier back to the balcony where he smiled broadly and gave the Fascist salute.

Fascists had organized the demonstration to celebrate Barcelona's fall to the insurgent armies with blackshirt Italian legionnaires in the van.

Hendaye, France (At the Spanish Frontiers), Jan. 26—(AP)—Insurgent Generalissimo Franco's Spanish, Moorish, and Italian troops marched into Barcelona at noon today with flags flying and bands playing, formally taking over Spain's largest city after two and a half years of civil war.

The government defense had collapsed. Insurgent dispatches said there was little or no resistance at the city. Last night the government army was forming a new defense line somewhere to the north.

Insurgent accounts of the entry said the people of Barcelona flocked from their houses to greet the victorious army whose planes for months have been raining death in their midst.

Barcelonians cheer.

Today it was another thing. Dispatches reaching the border said the Barcelonians cheered wildly as the troops paraded through the palm-lined streets.

To them Franco's victory meant something other than triumph for the insurgent cause. It meant food and an end to the bombings.

Franco's armies had gained the greatest prize of the war at the climax of a knockout offensive launched Dec. 23 from lines some 80 miles to the west.

Near the French border Premier Juan Negrin and his Spanish government sought to reestablish their offices temporarily after a hasty flight from Barcelona.

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 26.—(AP)—Two bandits, who claimed to be the Cashier and the teller of the bank, today held up the bank and stole \$11,000 in cash and negotiable securities, about \$100,000 worth, they said. The aid of two confederates who used a pair of automobiles.
