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# HITLER TRAVELS TO AUSTRIA

## ANGLO-GERMAN RELATIONS TO BE DISTURBED

British To Consider  
Armed Aid to the  
French

### IF NECESSARY

**BULLETIN**  
Prague, March 12—(UP)—German told Czechoslovakia through diplomatic channels today that she entertains no hostile intentions toward the little republic.

In connection with the Austrian crisis, observers emphasized the difference between the positions of Czechoslovakia and Austria. Unlike Austria, Czechoslovakia has military alliances with two great powers, France and the Soviet Union.

Responsible quarters here preserved their poise. Czechoslovakia was said to be prepared to continue to adapt her policy to that of western powers, especially France.

The cabinet, in extraordinary session, conferred until near dawn. Before the session ended, the government reiterated that any attempt by Germany to encroach upon Czechoslovakia's borders would be met with armed resistance.

London, March 12—(AP)—The British cabinet today considered the possibility of armed British aid to France in protection of Czechoslovakia from the fate which has befallen Austria.

The cabinet's views on this grave issue were communicated at the close of a long session to Charles Corbin, the French ambassador, but the decision was announced.

Whether a decision was reached was undisclosed, but Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain was known to have been bitterly angered by the latest display of Reichsfuehrer Hitler's "naked fist"—the imposition of a Nazi yoke on Austria.

The stiff tone of his communique at close of the cabinet meeting was warmly welcomed in Paris and Praha.

**Protests Too Late**  
The vigorous protests Britain and France made yesterday to Berlin, it was apparent, came far too late to save Austria.

In Berlin the reich government rejected the protests, asserting Britain and France had acted "on false information."

The post-cabinet communique made it clear any Anglo-German agreement was out of the question. Rome's refusal to return to her old role of protector of Austria's freedom vastly reduced prospects of renewed Anglo-Italian friendship.

It was all too clear that Great Britain's words of protest came far too late to save Austria from Nazi domination and that the ministers must make up their minds now whether to forge a solid front with

## Slain Bride's Husband Held By Sheriff

Delavan, Ill., March 12—(UP)—James Crabb, 24, was arrested today as he completed testimony at an inquest into the mysterious death of his bride of five weeks, Mrs. Betty Collier Crabb, 19.

As young Crabb stepped from the witness stand, Sheriff Ralph Gear commanded:

"Get your hat and coat, Jimmy. You're under arrest."

Clear ran with the youth to an automobile and they drove away. Their immediate destination was not known.

Counsel for the Crabb family were taken by surprise. Attorney J. M. Powers said he would seek a habeas corpus writ immediately.

Another attorney for the Crabb family, W. J. Reardon, termed James' arrest a "kidnaping." He said the family was ready to prevail.

Later, it was believed the youth had been taken to Pekin. James was one of nine witnesses who testified at the inquest that was concluded with testimony by L. Glenn Collison, Champaign radio station executive and father of the victim.

## POSTOFFICE AT BRADLEY READY AHEAD OF TIME

Plan Dedication To  
Be Held Early  
in August

### SPECIAL STAMP

The new Bradley postoffice will be completed more than two months ahead of schedule if the present rate of operation continues, according to George Porter, superintendent of the Langlois Construction company, contractors for the \$45,000 structure.

With a crew of 20 men, the construction firm has virtually completed the outside masonry; the building is up to required height and, by next Wednesday, will be ready for the tar and gravel roof which will be applied by Henry Reuter and Sons. Of St. Anne tan-colored brick and Indiana limestone, the building will rank among the town's finest when completed.

All modern fixtures and equipment will be installed. This, together with the building and property investment make, a total expenditure of \$65,000. Ground was broken Dec. 2 and the contractor and federal resident engineer, J. D. Levin, anticipate that the edifice will be ready for occupancy in August if not sooner.

**Dedication Program**  
Postmaster Frank Hodapp today outlined plans for a dedication ceremony. He hopes to obtain approval from the postoffice department to issue a special envelope imprinted with small line drawing of the new building and possibly the oldest factories of the community.

He also is attempting to secure permission for a special stamp or cachet to commemorate the occasion. A special speaker probably from the postoffice department, will be invited.

## Soviet Conspirators in a Plea for Mercy

Moscow, March 12—(AP)—Abject pleas for mercy were made today by the 21 political prisoners arrayed in the Soviet union's latest "blood purge" of its confessed enemies.

One by one they stood up in the dock and reiterated admissions of guilt, blaming others in part for their dire predicament.

Prosecutor Andrei Y. Vishinsky in a blistering summation of treason and murder charges has demanded death for 19 of the 21.

Avowing piteous repentance for their acts, they asked that their lives be spared.

N. N. Krotovskiy, once the first assistant foreign commissar, in his plea for leniency pointed to his 30 years as an "honest revolutionary."

He recounted how in 1901, at the age of 18, he had given his "honest" efforts in behalf of the Communist cause. He said his record was clear until 1921 when he intrigued with Leon Trotsky. He blamed Trotsky for everything.

Vladimir I. Ivanoff, former chief of the Soviet timber industry, turned on another prisoner, Nikolai Bucharin, trying to blame his confessed treason on the ex-editor of the government newspaper Izvestia.

## St. Mary Hospital Operating Room Supervisor Dies

Sister Agnes Marie Mailloux, 43, anesthetist and surgical supervisor at St. Mary hospital, died Friday evening at St. Mary hospital in Rochester, Minn.

She had devoted 28 years as a religious of the Servants of the Holy Heart of Mary, ministering to the sick at the local hospital.

## Territorial Rights in China Discussed by Jap Authorities

Shanghai, March 12—(AP)—Japanese military authorities again today raised the controversial question of foreign territorial rights in China.

Claiming jurisdiction over all persons in Chinese territory under Japanese occupation, the army issued warning against the transfer of Chinese-owned property to foreigners.

Army authorities said such transfers interfered with operations of Japanese armed forces and would be punished to the "full severity of military codes," including death, imprisonment and deportation.

Chinese guerrilla troops armed with rifles battled a Japanese gunboat today at Hohsein, in the Yangtze river area where the United States gunboat Panay was bombed and sunk.

The Japanese said they were victorious over 700 guerrillas and captured 20 junks loaded with 40,000 bags of salt.

In central China, the Japanese were reported spreading westward into Shensi province, a Communist stronghold, after having crossed the Yellow river at Hoku. Chinese dispatches denied such a crossing had been effected.

## Hungary Watching Neighbor

Budapest, Hungary, March 12—(AP)—A Nazi movement started in Hungary today, police and the army were alert for duty, and the guard at the Austrian border was strengthened.

The Hungarian Nazis, excited by the Austrian Nazification, started to recognize their illegal formations and demanded a release of arrested colleagues.

The ministry of interior announced the guard at the Austrian border had been strengthened. Interior Minister Szell has been conducting a vigorous anti-Nazi campaign.

The Hungarian high court yesterday lengthened the sentences of more than 70 imprisoned Nazis by several months each.

Hungary, Austria's Danubian neighbor, was part of the Austro-Hungarian empire and an ally of Germany in the world war.

The empire dissolved with the abdication of King Charles, Nov. 7, 1918—Austria to become a republic and Hungary a kingdom.

Over which Admiral Nicholas Horthy has ruled as regent. The Hapsburg Archduke Otto is pretender to the vacant thrones of both Austria and Hungary.

Nazism, suppressed in Hungary, exists in the "invisible front"—a union of about a dozen extreme right political elements, among them the Nazi arrow and cross organizations.

## Danville Minister Denied New Hearing

Danville, Ill., March 12—(AP)—The Rev. William McCullum, 48-year-old pastor, was denied a new trial in circuit court and was sentenced today to a year in the county jail for contributing to the delinquency of Mildred Miller, 17.

Defense counsel announced they would appeal.

McCullum was convicted by a jury March 1 after Mildred testified she had illicit relations with him on six occasions and that he threatened to kill her if she exposed her.

The minister denied the allegations. Last autumn McCullum was acquitted of a charge he raped Mildred's sister, Retha, 14. The girls are daughters of a Hungry Hollow WPA worker.

# Issues Proclamation Explaining Activity

## SEYSZ-INQUART IS CHANCELLOR FOR AUSTRIANS

Moves To Consolidate Powers of the Nation

### CELEBRATIONS

**BULLETIN**

Vienna, March 12—(AP)—Reichsfuehrer Hitler tonight proclaimed union of Austria and Germany, and, turning to the rest of Europe and the world, defied attempts to put them asunder.

"We must now prove to the world that any further attempt to part this united people will be useless," were the words with which he capped a triumphal but bloodless invasion.

Vienna, March 12—(AP)—About 1,000 German infantrymen landed from planes began marching into Vienna at 5:06 p. m. (10:06 a. m., cst) today as Adolf Hitler returned in triumph to his native Austria.

The German soldiers landed at the suburban Aspern airport, the commander of which said they arrived in huge numbers.

The German Fuehrer was hailed as a savior when he entered Linz, capital of Upper Austria.

"Long live the liberator of Austria, Adolf Hitler!" yelled crowds in the main square.

To Vienna Sunday  
But it was announced he would not attempt to reach Vienna for his real triumph until tomorrow.

The governor of upper Austria said Hitler would remain overnight at Amstetten, 80 miles by motor road from the capital.

In Berlin it was reported he would address the people of Germany and Austria by radio from Linz at 8 p. m. tonight (1 p. m., cst).

Edmund Glaise-Horstenaus, vice chancellor of the new Nazi government of Austria, addressed the frenzied crowd:

"Today after a long time Hitler again is stepping on Austrian soil." So far as known it has been 25 years since Hitler visited the land of his birth.

Arthur Seysz-Inquart, the chancellor, left Vienna by air for Linz to greet Hitler, who made him Austria's new chief.

Schuschnigg in Exile  
Kurt Schuschnigg, the deposed chancellor, remained the prisoner of armed S. A. and S. S. units (Nazi guard corps) in Bevedere castle in Vienna.

Automobiles of diplomats hurriedly arrived and departed as friends attempted to arrange for Schuschnigg to go abroad, perhaps to live in exile in Hungary.

High generals of the Austrian labor service, Austrian youths and housewives stood shoulder to shoulder in Linz singing "today Germany is ours, tomorrow the entire world" and other German songs greeting Hitler.

All the villages of upper Austria through which he passed turned out to a man as the Austrian-born

## AIMS OF NAZIS IN AUSTRIA

Berlin, March 12—(AP)—National socialism aims at formation of a self-conscious national state based on racial purity.

The Nazis contend the peak of a nation is dependent upon race.

Their concept is to adhere to a leadership principle, with the ablest men at the head of the government.

Nazism's "Weltanschauung," world outlook, and Marxian world policies conflict. Nazism rejects the Marxists' goal of worldwide solidarity of the proletariat. It seeks national—not international—solidarity in which all classes form a unified community.

It rejects international solidarity of the proletariat in favor of national solidarity with the aim of a real national community of the people.

It fights liberalistic class distinction and class hatreds.

## European Situation At Glance

By the Associated Press  
Vienna—Adolf Hitler followed German troops into newly-Nazified Austria; all government passed into Nazi hands; numerous citizens arrested; frontiers closed to fleeing Austrians.

Berlin—Hitler temporarily turned over German rule to Field Marshal Goering before starting for Austria, land of his birth, and proclaimed a plebiscite soon would show Austria's desire for Nazi rule; German troops reach Brenner pass, Austrian gateway to Italy.

London—Britain's cabinet met, facing cold fact British protests against absorption of Austria had failed; Anglo-German negotiations halted by Nazi coup; fears expressed Czechoslovakia may be next.

Rome—Mussolini peacefully permitted troops to reach his Austrian frontier; Hitler had informed him in advance, apparently leaving the Rome-Berlin axis intact.

Paris—Leon Blum, rushing attempts to form a government, appealed for all party support in the face of European crisis; France closely cooperated with Britain's policy to protest but no action.

Praha—Fearsful Czechoslovakia closed her frontiers; watched Nazi troops move into Austria leaving her two-thirds surrounded.

Budapest—Hungarian Nazi movement sprang to new life, encouraged by the Austrian coup.

Tokyo—Japan eagerly watched success of her German anti-Communist ally in Austria; pushed her military campaign in central China.

Danzig—Nazi-dominated free city of Danzig jubilant over Hitler's triumph.

Brussels—Archduke Otto's headquarters frantically kept up with Austrian situation but refused information about the Austrian pretender.

Moscow—Soviet Russia, engrossed in its 21-man treason trial, took no official cognizance of Austrian developments.

Warsaw—Poland considered the new Austrian chancellor's appeal for German troops settled the question there had been no technical invasion of Austria.

## NAZI TROOPS MANEUVERING ON FRONTIERS

Tells Why Germany  
is Rescuing Suffering Austria

### TO EXTEND AID

Berlin, March 12—(AP)—Fuehrer Hitler left Munich by automobile today for a triumphant return to Austria, the land of his birth, after proclaiming that "soldiers of the German defense force were marching over all the frontiers of German Austria" to carry on its Nazification.

He had flown from Berlin to Munich early this morning, leaving Propaganda Minister Goebbels to read the broadcast proclamation.

Naming Field Marshal Goering as acting head of the German government during his absence, the Fuehrer delegated Goebbels to tell why Germany went to what was termed the rescue of a suffering Austria, held in the grip of a small minority lacking even the slightest legal status.

"I have now decided to extend the aid of the reich to the millions of Germans in Austria," Hitler proclaimed.

**Soldiers on All Frontiers**  
"Since morning soldiers of the German defense force have been marching over all the frontiers of German Austria."

As the proclamation was read, more than 100 three-motored German transport planes crossed the Austrian border south of Praxdorf. It was understood they carried troops to Vienna.

"I myself as Fuehrer and chancellor of the German people shall be happy again to be able to enter as a German and a free citizen this land which is my own land," Hitler's proclamation said.

"The world, however, shall convince itself that the German people in Austria experiences in these days, hours of deepest joy and emotion."

"The Austrian people see in the brethren who have hurried to their aid, saviors from dire distress. 'Long live the national Socialist German Reich.'"

"Long live national Socialist Austria."

### Creates Role of Jean Lafitte, Pirate Who Saved the Nation

One of the screen's outstanding portrayals of characters from history undertakes the biggest role of his career in the Cecil B. DeMille epic "The Buccaneer," which opens Sunday at the Paramount theater.

The actor is Fredric March and the person whom he plays in this dramatic story of America during its most crucial days, is the amazing Jean Lafitte, pirate king, merchant prince and dreamer of empire who, among other things, is perhaps as much responsible for the defeat of the British at New Orleans in 1814 as was General Andrew Jackson.

March won his widest acclaim for his portrayal of the famous

poet Robert Browning in the great screen romance built around the poet's love, "The Barretts of Wimpole Street." Appearing opposite him in that picture was Norma Shearer as Elizabeth Browning.

March also scored in "The Affairs of Cellini," in which he appeared opposite Fay Wray, as the famous sculptor and goldsmith of the sixteenth century, Benvenuto Cellini. He also enacted the roles of Hepburn, Earl of Bothwell, op-

posite Katherine Hepburn in "Mary Queen of Scots."

It is not only because of his talent for bringing back to the screen the lives of great men that March has been chosen for the important role of Lafitte in "The Buccaneer." Groesbeck spent several months in research and succeeded in digging up a number of old prints showing Lafitte, from these he drew "visuals," and presented them to DeMille who immediately saw the strong resemblance between the fa-

mous pirate and March. The actor permitted his moustache and hair to grow, he acquired a French accent, and Jean Lafitte he became! Another startling "recreation" was performed in a similar manner with Attila Tamiroff, famed Russian actor who scored in "The General Died at Dawn." Groesbeck's "visuals" of Dominique You, Lafitte's second-in-command, and a former cannoneer for the great Napoleon, fitted the portly Tamiroff to a T. Some skilled make-up made the resemblance perfect.

Appearing opposite March in "The Buccaneer" is charming Francisca Gaal, the little Hungarian stage and screen star whom DeMille brought over expressly to play the role of Gretchen in "The Buccaneer." The cast also includes Margot Grahame, Walter Brennan, Ian Keith, Anthony Quinn, Douglass Dumbrille, Beulah Bondi and over a thousand supporting and bit players.
