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# TVA HEAD OUSTED: FDR'S REASONS

## INVESTIGATION IS TEMPORARILY HALTED; SENATE FEARS CHARGES MAY BE WHITEWASHED IF DELAYED

### "DICTATORIAL"

Washington, March 23.—(AP)—Senator Barkley, the administration's floor leader, temporarily blocked today a senate effort to authorize an investigation of the Tennessee valley authority.

Even before the senate heard a scheduled message from President Roosevelt on his reasons for ousting TVA Chairman Arthur E. Morgan, Senator Bridges (R-NH) asked unanimous consent to call up a resolution calling for a joint senate-house investigation of the power agency.

In registering his objection, Barkley said there was "no question regarding the desirability of an investigation of the TVA."

He added, however, that the investigation should not be made by "partial" legislators.

Removal "Dictatorial"

Bridges, in seeking immediate consideration of his resolution, described Mr. Roosevelt's removal of Morgan from the TVA chairmanship as "dictatorial" and "arbitrary."

"It is very apparent," he said, "that an immediate congressional investigation should be started."

"It must be remembered that," he said, "Mr. Morgan is in unquestioned possession of all records of the TVA. Unless there is an immediate investigation of the things to which Dr. Morgan has referred these may be covered up, or whitewashed."

The Bridges investigation resolution, of which Senator King (D-Utah) is a joint author, would set up a joint committee of five members from each house.

The President's expected message however cleared the way for investigation soon of the power agency.

Reorganization Measure

Senator Byrd (D-Va) declared today that the comptroller general had earned the displeasure of the administration by stopping what the Virginian called "illegal expenditures."

He urged the senate not to destroy the office "and give all the powers to prevent illegal government expenditures to the director of the budget, an appointee of the President."

## Foster Son of the Chinese President is Reported Killed

Shanghai, March 23.—(AP)—K. M. James Lin, foster son of President Lin Sen of China, who once married a Columbus, O., shopgirl, was reported from Hankow today to have been killed in action in the conflict with Japan.

James Lin married Viola Brown, a Columbus, O., clerk in a "5 and 10" store, July 14, 1935 while he was a student at Ohio State university. The romance was said to have resulted from the girl's returning Lin's pocketbook which he lost while making a purchase.

His foster father objected to the marriage. At the time James Lin was said to have two wives and three children in China, since under Chinese law he was regarded as having two fathers and therefore entitled to two wives.

His young American wife obtained a divorce two years ago.

## TWO MORE HELD IN CONNECTION WITH KIDNAPING

New Rochelle, N. Y., March 23.—(UP)—Two young men were arrested here today and accused of extortion in connection with the kidnapping of 12-year-old Peter Levine.

The youths, handcuffed to each other, were taken to police headquarters in the custody of E. E. Conroy, federal bureau of investigation agent in charge of the kidnapping investigation.

They were identified by police as Edward John Penn, 19, of North Pelham, N. Y., senior in the Pelham high school, and Werner Fred Luck, 23, unemployed, a native of Germany, married and the father of one child. North Pelham borders on New Rochelle.

Both will be booked on charges of extortion at New Rochelle police headquarters.

The arrests brought to three the persons apprehended since the kidnapping.

## Mexican Workers Suggest Taxes to Pay for Oil Leases

Mexico City, March 23.—(AP)—The Confederation of Mexican Workers suggested today a special series of taxes to pay foreign oil operators for loss of their \$400,000,000 industry, expropriated by the government.

As labor throughout the nation held a jubilee to celebrate the expropriation, the confederation suggested the taxes be placed on real estate, industry, securities and above 100 pesos monthly (about \$20).

Representatives of the 17 British and American oil companies affected have not yet acted upon an invitation to discuss indemnity with the treasury department.

They have, however, won one concession—tax accounts against the companies were closed as of last Saturday, the day on which the decree expropriating the properties was published.

## YOUTH DENIES THAT HE SHOT YOUNG SISTER

Avers Confessions Obtained Through Threats

### APPEARS CALM

Prairie du Chien, Wis., March 23.—(UP)—Harold Best, 15, testifying in his own defense today, denied that he shot his sister, Mildred, 11, and said the numerous "confessions" which he later repudiated were obtained through threats and promises.

Wearing the first "store clothes" he has known throughout boyhood, excepting overalls, he sat erect in the witness chair and insisted that he did not have "anything to do" with the death of his sister.

Harold was defending himself against a charge of delinquency rather than first degree murder. The latter is not recognized against juveniles under Wisconsin law.

Describes Night of Tragedy

Harold described what he remembered of the night of June 4 last, when Mildred was slain in her bed by a rifle shot. He was questioned by his attorney, Carl N. Hill, Madison.

Harold said he went to bed about 7:30 p. m. after a long, hard day at work on the farm, and went soundly to sleep. He said the first information he had of his sister's death was when Ora Shaw, uncle at whose home he and Mildred lived since their parents were divorced, "woke me up and said: 'Something has happened to your sister.'"

"Did you shoot your sister?" Hill asked.

"No," replied Harold.

"Do you know anything about how she met her death?"

"No," the youth answered.

Questioned by Hill why he made confessions which he subsequently retracted, the boy said "Because of threats and promises."

Treated With "Hot Light"

He testified that the sheriff and others threatened him with a "hot light" and he did not tell about the crime. The sheriff and others, Harold said, told him "fellows were knocked around" in order to get them to talk and how "they knew how to make me talk."

Although composed during most of his testimony, Harold broke down and cried when describing methods used to get him to confess. He said the sheriff told him several times how comfortable it would be at the boys' industrial school and how he could learn a trade and get a job after his release when he became 21 years old.

"How did the sheriff treat you?" asked Dist. Atty. James P. Cullen.

## NOT MANY FIRES THESE DAYS BUT FIREMEN BUSY

### Smoke-Eaters Say Boy Wedged in Tree Fork

City firemen are wearing what part. Of late they have been doing everything but putting out regulation fires. Early yesterday the big gong sounded, they jumped into their boots and helmets, clambered on the truck and had no more than pulled out of the station when they were called back; the fire in an apartment house had been put out.

The fire fighters frequently are asked to help get a stranded cat out of a tree, but yesterday was their first experience at prying loose a boy. Eight-year-old Jimmie Clifford climbed up into a fruit tree at 308 South Rosewood avenue and as he descended with his knee doubled under him he caught it in a fork of the tree. Try as they would with bars and tugging, neighbors were unable to pry the limbs apart.

Finally someone thought of the fire department. Company No. 1 was dispatched with Firemen Harry Holz, Oscar Niemeyer and Louis Osewowski. They attempted to put a jack between the fork but it was too large.

Fireman Climbs Tree

Then Osewowski got up into the tree above Jimmie and spread the limbs apart himself while the others pulled the lad free. His leg was numb for a few minutes; he had been trapped for nearly half an hour, it was said. A crowd of some two dozen persons cheered his release.

Grass fires ordinarily aren't anything to worry about. Usually they're extinguished with a couple of burlap sacks and a few squirts of water from the booster hose. But

## BILLION DOLLAR FUND REQUIRED TO BUILD ARMY

### Chief of Staff Informs Appropriation Committee

Washington, March 23.—(AP)—The house appropriations committee today set aside today to provide money for the army that has in 18 years.

The sum, \$447,808,555, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, was \$32,545,000 more than the current year and only \$30,754,000 short of the figure for 1939-40, when the army of occupation still was in Germany.

The committee's recommendation was below the budget bureau's estimates but included almost all of the money President Roosevelt asked in January for anti-aircraft guns, manufacture of machines to produce armaments and for replenishment of ammunition supplies.

Approximately one-fourth of the total appropriation, \$124,000,000 would go to the air corps. The committee said that among things this fund would provide 478 new planes, bringing the army's total to 3,302.

Increase for National Guard

The committee overruled the budget bureau's recommendations in two major instances. It increased the national guard appropriation \$1,355,737 to provide an expansion in enrollment from 200,000 to 205,000 on April 1, 1939.

The committee also recommended that citizens' military training camp appropriation remain at \$2,775,000, although the budget bureau had opposed cutting it to \$1,000,000. The army will train 35,000 youths with the money.

The bill also contains an \$8,166,880 appropriation for military post construction, of which \$1,500,000 would be spent at Chanute field, Ill., and \$1,355,000 at the air corps technical school at Denver, Colo.

Other items in this total: Savanna ordinance depot, Ill., \$341,137.

## CONGRESS GETS MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

### Says Morgan Charges Libelous and Not Substantiated

### WOULDN'T TALK

BULLETIN

Knoxville, Tenn., March 23.—(AP)—Harcourt A. Morgan took over the chairmanship of the Tennessee Valley Authority today with the homely phrase "business as usual."

The new chairman indicated there would be no change of policies or shifting of directors in the course of the authority.

"The program is going on as it has been set up for the past four years of service, and it is business as usual," he said.

There were many telegrams and calls from friends congratulating him on his appointment by President Roosevelt to succeed the deceased chairman, Arthur E. Morgan.

Washington, March 23.—(AP)—President Roosevelt advising congress today that he had ousted Arthur E. Morgan from TVA, said it was "clearly the right" of the legislature to make "any fair inquiry" into TVA's administration or policies.

"But I cannot in the meantime," he said, "abdicate my constitutional duty to take care that the laws be faithfully executed."

Mr. Roosevelt ordered Morgan's removal from the Tennessee Valley Authority chairmanship, yesterday, to become effective today, Sunday, and the president announced the elevation of Harcourt A. Morgan, now vice chairman, to the chairmanship.

Vacancy Filled

His message on TVA made no recommendation for filling the vacancy on the board, but some informed persons believed he would nominate James A. Fly, TVA general counsel.

With his message, Mr. Roosevelt sent to the capital a letter from Robert H. Jackson, the acting attorney general, upholding the president's right to remove TVA board members from office.

Jackson, outlining the case in a letter dated March 18, said charges of "dishonesty and want of integrity" had been made against Directors Harcourt A. Morgan and David E. Lilienthal by the chairman, who then openly defied the president's "constitutional authority."

## Thunder Showers Break The Unseasonable Warm Weather

Chicago, March 23.—(AP)—State-wide thunder showers late yesterday broke the unseasonable warmth which gripped Illinois for two days, breaking spring temperature records in many places.

More normal readings were reported in all sections today and the heavier rains laid aside Monday were re-done. The government forecaster predicted temperatures of 32 to 34 degrees for Chicago tonight and frost in some sections of the state.

Warmer weather was forecast for the north and west-central portions tomorrow.

Precipitation in Peoria for the 24 hours ended early today totaled 1.14 inches. About an inch of rain fell in Chicago and .53 of an inch in Springfield.

Chicago witnessed a new temperature record for March 23 of 79.3 degrees yesterday, said the reading 18-hours later was 79. Other Illinois records for the date included 82 at Ottawa and 80 at Elgin.

Fingers Crossed

Washington, March 23.—(AP)—Weather bureau officials crossed their fingers today over the abnormally high temperatures prevailing throughout much of the country.

They feared the warm weather might bring trouble, possibly heavy frost damage to fruits and other vegetation.

In some sections of the Mississippi valley, they said, vegetation is three and four weeks ahead of normal. In Minnesota spring wheat seeding has been done at the earliest date for many years.

Fruit trees were said to be in bloom as far north as the lower Great Lakes region.

J. B. Kinser, chief of the bureau's crop division, said the unusually early spring possibly heavy frosts of frost damage. Killiey frosts, he said, have been reported as late as April 10 as far south as southern Georgia, south central Mississippi and central Texas, and as late as June 1 in the lower lakes region.

Washington, March 23.—(AP)—President Roosevelt cleared the way today for a congressional investigation of the Tennessee Valley authority by arranging to send Congress a full report on his ouster of Chairman Arthur E. Morgan.

His ouster of Morgan, however, brought varying congressional reaction, and a heated debate over TVA policies in both senate and house.

Senator Norris (Re-Nebr.), author of the TVA legislation, said the president could not "ouster" Morgan. "The TVA is a federal corporation," he said, "and the president has no right to remove its head."

That "fellow" caused all sorts of trouble," said Norris.

Senator Bridges, however, termed Mr. Roosevelt's procedure that "of the typical dictator."

## French Bill to Speed Gas Masks

By KENNETH T. DOWNS International News Service Staff Correspondent

Paris, March 23—(INS)—Manufacture and distribution to the civilian population of ten million gas masks are provided for in a new bill to be introduced shortly in the French parliament.

The bill is being framed by the air ministry and the ministry of the interior. Its adoption is considered certain.

It is the purpose of the ten ministries to effect the fastest possible distribution of masks to the civilian and urban areas. The masks will not be kept in store-rooms, as in England, but given out at once, sealed in a case, which must be opened except in a case of alarm.

The price of the mask will be about fifteen francs each, which amounts to about fifty cents. Poor people and children under sixteen will receive masks free. After distribution the masks will become the personal property of the individual receiving them, and an annual fee of fifteen francs will be charged to those able to pay. It is estimated five years will be required for the manufacture of the ten million masks.

About half of them, however, can be available within two years, and the rest within three.

The bill also deals with the protection of buildings and houses from bomb attacks. It points out that property owners will have to take steps to insure that cellars are sufficiently solid to withstand the collapse of the entire building, and that walls are strong enough to prevent the passage of splinters.

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# Hitler Does Not Intend to Be on Losing Side; Next War

Editorial note: Adolf Hitler is building Germany's armed strength and will be ready for the next war. Twice he has used the threat of his army to the west of Europe how to his advantage. When he occupied the Rhineland and when he took Austria, it was the threat of his army that won him the day. In the following dispatch, Frederick G. Oechsle, manager of the Berlin bureau of the United Press, writes that Germany today is preparing for a "totalitarian war".

By Frederick G. Oechsle, United Press, Berlin, March 23.—(UP)—Once more Germany is arming for "totalitarian war" and this time she does not intend to be on the losing side.

Hitler has drawn blueprints for what may turn out to be the most powerful war machine in Europe, and as far as factory wheels can turn, those paper plans are being transformed into ships, tanks, airplanes and guns.

In the next German battle front, it is the nation's army, not the navy, that will be the main factor in the defense act. Every soldier in the German army, from the private to the general, is being trained in the use of modern weapons. The German general staff, but one idea he has in mind is to use the "totalitarian" war in which every citizen of the nation is mobilized for the military function.

For example, Germany must not think of a horse as an animal that pulls a plow or can be ridden to a farm.

German chemists are working night and day to make the nation self-sufficient in time of war and to perfect new weapons for the army.

Experts are confident that by 1940 Germany will be independent of foreign supplies. She now produces enough food-stuffs to be 80 per cent self-sufficient in the event of peace-time shortages. Some observers believe she could not conduct a war for more than six months on the basis of present food stocks.

The German navy, handicapped by post-war treaty limitations, is beginning to come back. In the next four or five years, Germany will have 400,000 tons of ships.

The German air force is not strong numerically compared to others in Europe—2,500 planes probably would be the maximum—but it is composed of first-class fighting ships.

Production of planes probably will be declared, for every factory geared to the central "war power line."

# STORIES IN STAMPS



UP from the shoals and rocky shores of Britain's crown colony, Ceylon, rise precipitous mountains, rising to 8000 feet at many points. And for a distance of 500 feet up these heights the land is under cultivation, tea producers of the world.

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## HOLD STUDENT IN CONNECTION WITH SLAYING

### Former Buddy Slain While Enroute to Pay Money IN EXTORTION

Spooner, Wis. March 23—(UP)—Charles Lockhard, 17, was held for questioning today in the slaying of his former buddy, Raymond Washkuhn, victim of a \$10 extortion plot which police believe was inspired by the recent kidnap-slaying of Charles S. Ross.

Washkuhn, also 17, a high school senior and son of a well-to-do farming family, was shot Monday night while enroute downtown to fulfill the extortion demand. With a bullet from a .22 caliber pistol in his lung, he crawled nearly a block to the home where he boarded during the school term, then collapsed.

Names Lockhard  
Early Tuesday, just before he died, he gasped out part of his story from his hospital bed. Sheriff Robert H. Willis said he named Lockhard as his assailant.

In his pocket was found a type-written note, it read:  
"You are a pretty well-dressed young fellow. Your folks must have money. Put \$10 in an envelope and leave it at the public library Saturday night or Sunday—or else."

Willis said Washkuhn kept the note a secret until Monday night when he confided in the son of his landlady and revealed that he was going downtown to telephone his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred K. Washkuhn, at nearby Spring Brook, to ask them for the money.

He had just left the house when he was accosted. In his death-bed statement, he told Sheriff Willis he heard Lockhard's voice just as two shots rang out. One bullet went wild and struck the boarding house.

Lockhard, Willis said, denied knowledge of the note and slaying. He formerly went to school with Washkuhn, Willis said.

Spooner was the scene two months ago of intense activity by G-men who, guided by John Henry Seadlund, condemned kidnaper, located the bodies of Ross and J. Atwood Gray, Seadlund's slain accomplice.

"It appears that constant talk of the Ross case and a desire to imitate it, inspired this case," Willis said.
