TELLS ROTARY HOW ANCIENTS MADE OWN ICE

Egyptians Froze Water in Jars on Desert

MODERN PLANTS

The romance of refrigeration was discussed by A. H. Rose, sales manager of the City Ice and Fuel company at the Rotary club meeting Thursday noon in the Hotel Kankakee.

Earliest attempts at refrigeration were those of the ancient Egyptians who placed water in large earthen crocks, covered them with straw and set them out on the desert sands to be frozen by cold night winds, according to the speaker. The Chinese used this system, also, and Nero brought snow down from the mountains to place it in troughs to cool his wine.

In 1890, a yellow fever epidemic in the southern part of the United States was traced to lack of proper refrigeration. On the heels of this discovery came the large scale production of ice-making machinery. The local plant in West Kankakee is considered one of the most modern ice plants in the United States, Rose said.

Pre-Cool 24 Hours

Without ice the health of the nation would be impaired, he said. He described the railroad refrigeration system telling how the cars are pre-cooled for 24 hours before receiving shipments and how they are re-cooled enroute from five to eight times, depending on the distance traveled.

As a result of surveys made of the ice manufacturers' markets in recent years, the four common obstructions made of the old service have been removed. These include broken down type of delivery equipment, appearance of the ice man, the drip-drip sound and the unsightly appearance of the old boxes. The unkempt, careless ice men are vestiges of the past, according to the speaker. Now, they are fit-

Powers Plan to Warn Nazis Against Threats to Czechs

Paris, May 6.—(AP)—France and Great Britain, fearful of a German-Italian "deal" to give Adolf Hitler a free hand in Czechoslovakia, have decided on an immediate, joint appeal to Prague and a warning to Berlin, French foreign office sources said today.

These sources asserted London and Paris had decided to urge Czechoslovakia to make utmost concessions to the Nazis in order to ward off German aggression against the central European republic.

The representations, it was said, will be made within the next 24 hours—while Hitler and Benito Mussolini are conferring in Rome during the Fuehrer's state visit to Italy.

Foreign office circles said the decision came after receipt of diplomatic dispatches from Rome reporting that Italian and German general staffs were studying a plan of action should France and Great Britain "react" after a German coup in Czechoslovakia.

The Paris bureau reflected uncertainty over the Hitler-Mussolini talks. Government bonds lost a

Evidences What May Be Expected in Next Conflict

KINGS PRESENT

Rome, May 6.—(AP)—Reliable Nazi sources revealed tonight that Italy and Germany had decided against concluding a military alliance during Fuehrer Adolf Hitler's current visit to Rome.

Rome, May 6.—(AP)—The next European war—if it comes—will be largely a struggle with chemicals, flames and artillery, if Premier Mussolini's lineup of armed forces today in honor of Reichsfuehrer Hitler were an indication.

Mussolini showed his guest a whole "chemical regiment" that sent a sudden through the mass of spectators. The soldiers looked like beings from another planet in their gas masks.

Among their equipment were tanks and tubes and compressed air containers. There was, however, reassurance for Italians in equipment for fighting fire and disease germs.

Former Kings Guests
Besides Hitler and his entourage of high Nazis, Mussolini's guests included two former kings, Alfonso XIII of Spain and Amadeus of Austria.

How seriously Mussolini is thinking of future war as "totalitarian" may be judged by the fact that his review included not only regular army units but also small boys, girls in black uniforms, teen-age youngsters on horseback, military units of university students and various Fascist formations, including the colonial Fascist police.

The reviewing stand where the Fuehrer stood with King Vittorio Emanuele, members of the royal family and marshals of Italy, was

The residences, of 4 or 5-room type, were completed at costs ranging from 3,000 to 3,500. All have unique wall finishes, ample electric outlets, oil heat with forced air system, and other built-in modern conveniences.

Sunday's exhibit has been arranged in cooperation with the local Sears, Roebuck retail store which furnished and outfitted the dwelling.

Deaf Peddler Hears Judge Say '\$13.25'

George Williamson, Cincinnati rug salesman, said to be a member of the famous Williamson family of peddlers from Ohio, was arrested Thursday afternoon in the 1100 block on South Third avenue by Officer Thomas Cantlin on a charge of soliciting without a permit.

Posing as a sailor, he was attempting to sell "oriental" rugs which he said he and shipmates smuggled in from Egypt. In police court, evidence gathered by N. J. Zinner of the chamber of commerce better business bureau showed that Williamson became impudent with some of his prospective customers, trying to enter their houses although they told him they weren't interested.

When he appeared before Magistrate Edward Hoenicke, Williamson feigned deafness, pled guilty, was assessed a fine of \$13.25, then threw himself on the mercy of the court, stating that he had no money. His supply of rugs was ordered impounded until he could produce the amount of his fine. It took him 10 minutes to get the money.

Third District GOP Seek a Nominee for High Court Justice

Decatur, Ill., May 6.—(AP)—A charge that the Democratic nominee's choice was "dictated by Governor Horner" was made today as Republican delegates from 16 east central counties convened to select their choice for the Illinois supreme court vacancy.

Attorney J. J. Griffin of Springfield, who was named permanent chairman of the Republican third district judicial convention, urged support of the Republican nominee at the June 27 special election, charging that the Democrat's choice of Circuit Judge Joseph L. McLaughlin of Sullivan was dictated by the governor.

Although some of his adherents were reported active in McLaughlin's behalf at the Democratic convention Tuesday in Springfield, the governor professed indifference to the outcome.

Meanwhile, in advance of the voting, Walter T. Gunn of Danville emerged as the favored candidate, with his supporters predicting 135 or 140 of the required 168 votes on the first ballot.

Supporters of Thomas W. Samuels, another favorite, worked feverishly to round up more votes in his behalf, however. The other candidates, former U. S. Attorney Frank K. McCaskill of Urbana, were not generally regarded as serious threats.

Harold E. Walsh of Bloomington, president of the young Republicans of Illinois, acted as temporary chairman today.

In an effort to speed up the convention, the delegates dispensed with meetings of the rules and credential committees. No early decision was reached on limiting convention speeches.

McCaskill and Samuels, along with their supporters, solicited votes last night while chairmen of the district's 16 counties held a long session to lay the groundwork for the selection of convention officers and wind up last-minute convention arrangements.

Robert R. Bookwalter, chairman of the Gunn forces, said the Danville attorney had the pledged support of Vermilion, Edgar and Ford counties.

McCaskill, endorsed by the Campaign county group, claimed probable support from Ford and Platt counties. Lemon carried the DeWitt county delegation while Samuels had the pledged support of Macon delegates, with indications he was favored by the Tazewell and Moultrie county groups.

Charles F. Fleming of Danville had the role of calling to order the session naming the opponent of Circuit Judge Joseph L. McLaughlin of Sullivan, nominated by the Democrats here Tuesday.

On that occasion there were tributes to him by President of the Chamber of Commerce; Roy D. Taylor, then Kankakee mayor; Will C. Schneider, an intimate friend; and Frank I. Mulholland of Toledo, O., former president of Rotary International.

Mr. Waterman on that occasion said of Kankakee, "Living here during my youth, educated in your schools, I feel very thankful for the financial help of your earlier citizens and the training in how to work, which has been a wonderful help in bringing me through life to my present age and position."

Education Limited
"While my education was limited to the lower classes of your school, your encouragement gave me strength and courage to push out and lead, permitting me to gain further education by experience, hard knocks and travel."

WAR ENDS ITS TENTH MONTH IN FAR EAST

Continue Reoccupation of the Towns Taken by Japs

PLANES ACTIVE

Shanghai, May 6.—(AP)—Chinese claimed the recapture of approximately half the territory in south Shantung province won by Japanese in a three-week offensive from Linzi in the undeclared war ended its tenth month today.

And while the two armies battled doggedly about Tancheng and Talerchwang, there were significant developments on several other fronts.

Peiping's gates were closed and barred and that ancient city of Chinese culture, occupied by Japanese troops soon after the war broke out, spent one of its most anxious days.

Aerial Bombing Continues
Japanese planes yesterday busily bombed objectives but a few miles west of the city's walls, and there were persistent reports Chinese guerrillas and Communists were approaching the city.

A Chinese counter-attack on the Yangtze river was claimed to have occupied Tangtu, severing Japanese railroad communications between Wuhu and Nanking.

In the same area, a Japanese column advancing westward into Anhui province against Hefei, captured Shihkiao after a 15-mile march along the shore of Lake Chao.

Yet another Japanese column reported a victory over 7,000 Chinese in north Szechwan province.

Chinese aviation became active and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's fighters reported bombing Peiping, important center on the Tientsin-Pukow railway south of Suichow.

Reclaim Ten Towns
In south Hopeh and north Honan provinces, Chinese continued reoccupation of territory previously taken by Japanese in their advance to the Yellow river. They said they had reclaimed 10 towns.

A Japanese military report from Peiping said today Father Frederick Fourre, French Franciscan missionary, was shot and killed by a Japanese-controlled peace conservation corps member at Changlo, Shantung province.

The Japanese report said the priest interfered with the soldier in performance of his duty and fired a revolver at him. The soldier returned the fire.

Bird's Home Burns as Firemen Arrive

A little bird caused moments of excitement and apprehension at the household of City Clerk Ralph Farmer, 735 South Greenwood avenue, this morning.

The bird chose to build a nest in the valley of a slate roof on the Farmer home and when Mrs. Farmer, burned papers at 10:50 a. m., the chimney sparks dropped on the nest, which was crumpled leaves, sent shafts of smoke into the air so that the house appeared to be on fire.

Two fire trucks and Noah Be-tourne in the chief's car dashed to the scene and tossed out the nest, leaving the bird to start life over again.

Late yesterday firemen were called to the dump in rear of 147 North Fifth avenue, where rubbish was blazing. Nothing of value was damaged.

Supporters of the Wage-Hour Bill Claim a Victory

BULLETIN
Washington, May 6.—House members completed a petition to force the house to consider the revised wage-hour bill. The 21st signature was affixed by Representative Moulton (D-La.) on the 21st day.

Completion of the wage-hour petition relieves the rules committee from further action on the measure and has the effect of bringing the revised wage-hour bill to the house floor for consideration within this month.

Washington, May 6.—Loyal supporters of the revised wage-hour bill declared today they had won their fight for 218 signatures to a petition forcing the measure to the house floor.

Chairman Norton (D-N.J.) of the house labor committee arranged to place the petition in circulation immediately after the house convened.

Some sponsors predicted a majority of the 435 house members would sign by tonight, but Mrs. Norton expressed doubt that the required number could be obtained before Monday.

"If we get 170 names the first day," she said, "I will be tickled to death."

The rarely-used petition method, endorsed in this instance by President Roosevelt, was designed to overcome opposition of the house rules committee. That group refused last week to give the legislative right-of-way.

Sponsors said between 25 and 30 Republicans had agreed to sign.

On the eve of the showdown, three farm organizations united in a campaign against the measure.

The national grange, the national cooperative council and the national cooperative milk producers' federation, claiming to represent almost 2,000,000 farm families, sent a joint letter to all house members denouncing the legislation as "harmful and demoralizing."

Soviets Name New Ambassador; Berlin Do Not Fear Any Trouble in N. J.

Moscow, May 6.—(AP)—The government announced appointment of a new ambassador to Germany, replacing Dr. Constantin Yourenoff, who was implicated in charges of treason by witnesses in the Moscow trial of two months ago.

The new ambassador is A. T. Merkuloff, who has been vice-consul of foreign trade since the breakup of that department which followed the removal of A. P. Rozengoltz as commissar.

Rozengoltz was 60, 18 men excited as traitors after the March trial, in which chief defendants were ex-prime minister I. I. Rykov and Nikolai Bukharin.

Christian Rakovsky, one of three defendants in the March trial who received prison sentences instead of death, implicated Yourenoff in his confession to treasonable dealings with Japanese officials.

Yourenoff was ambassador to Japan at the time Rakovsky visited Tokyo in 1934 to attend a Red Cross conference. Named ambassador to Berlin last July, but disappeared after returning to Moscow in November and is now believed to be in prison.

The removal of Merkuloff as commissar for agricultural collections was announced within four months of his appointment, January 19.

The announcement said Popoff had shown inability to handle his job.

S. R. Skinnikoff, hitherto vice-commissar of food industry, was named to the post.

Blindness or Death to be Baby's Fate

Chicago, May 6.—(UP)—The parents of five weeks old Helaine Judith Colan today faced the dilemma of choosing between blindness or death for their baby.

Diagnosis revealed that Helaine, daughter of Dr. Herman Colan, 30, a dentist, and his 22-year-old wife, Shariene, is 3.

Two Congressmen Do Not Fear Any Trouble in N. J.

Jersey City, N. J., May 6.—(AP)—Public Safety Director Daniel J. Casey asserted today police would not permit two congressmen who might speak here tomorrow night "to infringe upon the rights of our citizens" but said he was assured there would be no disorder by war veterans.

Casey said he had investigated a reported statement that war veterans would be at Journal square, equipped with rubber hose, prepared for resistance.

"There is nothing to it," Casey said. "The statement was merely made by an over-enthusiastic veteran who was imbued with an ardent desire to prevent the congressmen from speaking."

Addressing various veterans' groups and Odd Fellows last night, Charles Brophy, senior vice commander of Catholic war veterans, said that if necessary, he will lead 600 uniformed men there, each with two feet of rubber hose.

Dalhoffer May Gain Stay of Execution

Chicago, May 6.—(UP)—James Dalhoffer, Al Brady gangster, under sentence to die June 10 in the Indiana state penitentiary, may gain a temporary stay of execution, his attorney said today.

Dalhoffer petitioned the United States circuit court of appeals late yesterday for a rehearing of his appeal from a Hammond, Ind., district court trial in which he was sentenced to death for killing Paul Minneman, Indiana state policeman.

Plans Mobilizing an Army of Women for the Next War

London, May 6.—(UPI)—Mushy-garbed women tripped into the colonnade war office today to counter the army chiefs on plans for mobilizing an army of women for non-combatant military duties in Britain's next war.

In preliminary talks over which Major-General Sir John Brown presided, the formation of a women's military organization was "discussed" in accordance with ideas of the dynamic secretary for war, Leslie Hore-Belisha. General Brown is deputy director-general of the territorial army, Britain's national guard.

The women who represented several organizations, included the Marchioness of Londonderry, wife of a former air minister, and Viscountess Hailsham, wife of the president of the council and former secretary for war.

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain could not have approved any preliminary common approval of another friendship pact tending to make secure Britain's back door—the epochal treaty with Ireland settling heavy economic and defense questions.

Without a record vote common yesterday approved the settlement, yet to receive the mere formality of a third reading before it goes to the house of lords for action.

But it was not approved until Winston Churchill, recalling the Irish insurrection during the world war, voiced criticism of the pact. Churchill, who was first lord of the admiralty when the world war broke out, declared Britain surrendered three "indispensable" naval bases in Ireland.

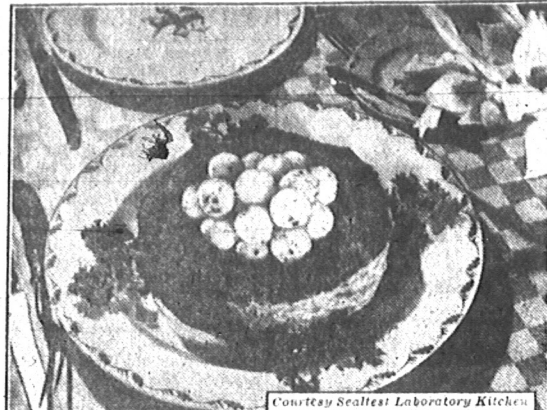

Master of One of England's Feudal Families Dies Today

London, May 6.—P.—The ninth duke of Devonshire, a member of one of England's greatest feudal families, died today at the age of 69 within the historic walls of his principal seat, Chatsworth House, where Mary, queen of Scots, once was imprisoned.

viewing on successive days since the duke of Devonshire's death were on a good-will tour of America and United States, including a visit to the White House.

The duke visited Washington in 1918. There he told the National Press club that President Woodrow Wilson's famous fourteen-point plan was "the Magna Carta of Peace."

Back of his term in Canada was a long record of public service in the best Canadian tradition. He was treasurer of the royal houses in the last years of Queen Victoria's reign and for a time under King Edward. For the seven years preceding his accession to the house of lords, he sat in the house of commons as representative of his home constituency, the western division of Devonshire, being also financial secretary of the treasury 1903-5.

His strong interest in education led to his appointment as chancellor of the University of Leeds and as high steward of Cambridge university. He was lord lieutenant of Devonshire, high steward of Derbyshire, and high steward of Cheshire in 1911.

In the early stages of the world war he was civil lord of the admiralty.

The duke was governor general of Canada from November 11, 1916, to August, 1921. Within that term he had the unique experience of re-

ceiving the surrender of the German forces in the Rhine.

He was also governor of the Bank of England from 1921 to 1925.

He was a member of the House of Commons from 1903 to 1911.

He was a member of the House of Lords from 1911 to 1925.

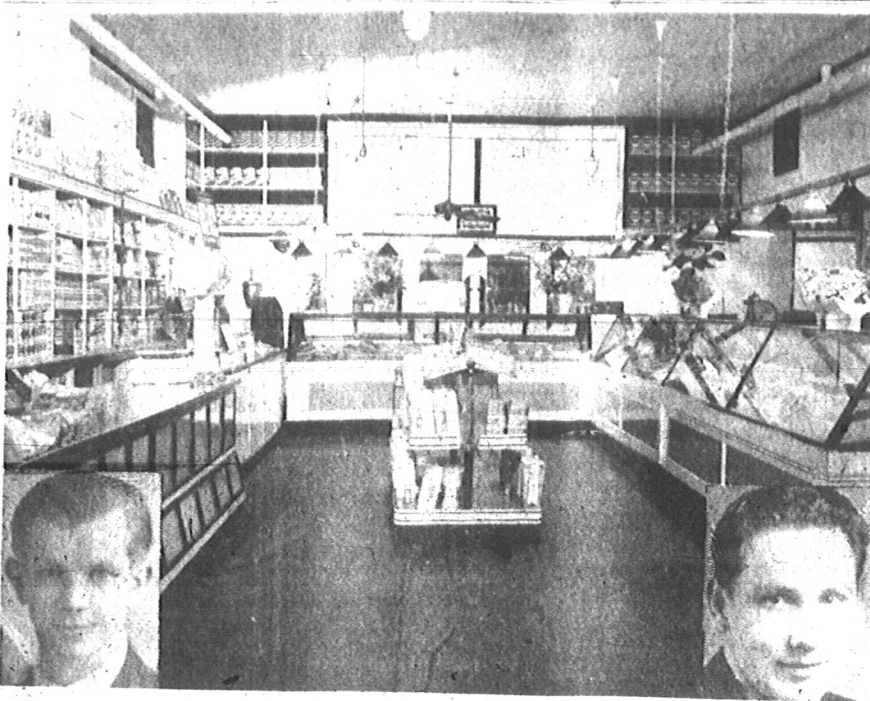

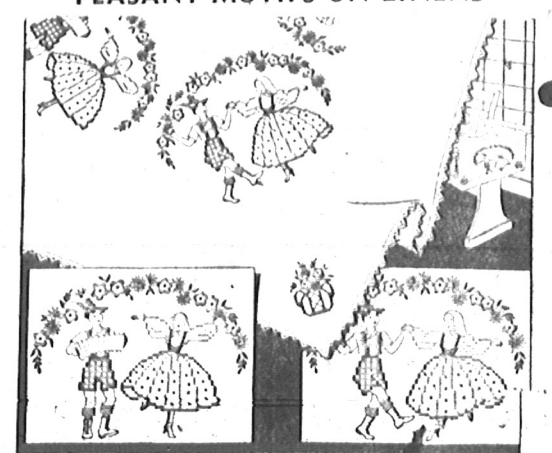
Dr. Millard Homan, a dentist, driver of the car, and his wife suffered skull fractures. Physicians said both were in a critical condition.
