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# MEXICAN FLIERS AMB AIR BASE INSURGENTS

## Retaliation For An Attack on Field Headquarters

### TO DOMINGO

**BULLETIN**  
San Luis Potosi, May 23—(AP)—The ministry announced today that the rebel leader, General Salgado Cedillo, had been killed in a clash with government troops yesterday near San Luis Potosi.

The ministry said Hipolito Cevallos was heading a rebel band of 500 men. A group clashed with a column of the government's 35th regiment.

The ministry denied reports that a rebel plane yesterday over San Luis Potosi. It was said the reports arose from government pursuit planes mistaking their own observation planes for enemy machines.

San Luis Potosi, Mexico, May 23—Army fliers said today they had destroyed a rebel air base, downed two camouflaged planes, and made yesterday for an attack on the field headquarters of General Salgado Cedillo, three miles from San Luis Potosi.

Bombs dropped by the white exploded in an air field near the headquarters from which President Salgado was directing military operations to crush the Cedillo rebellion.

Army fliers said they found a hidden air base near a point on a map but which is to be in the rugged region. A rebel plane was reported to have bombed the village of Ciudad Maita, near Ciudad Maita, causing terror among the inhabitants and causing them to flee. It is not known immediately whether there were any casualties from the two bombs which fell in the region.

Cedillo is the town in which the rebellion broke out. His first rebel force to fight President Porfirio Diaz. The uprising was confined to the state of San Luis Potosi, but hints were given that it might spread.

Army officers estimate 60 Sedillistas have been killed in scattered San Luis Potosi engagements. One government soldier was killed and three wounded.

## Missouri Convicts Recaptured Today

Springfield, Ill., May 23—(UP)—One day of freedom for two convicted murderers who escaped from the Jefferson City, Mo., penitentiary Saturday, was ended today following their capture in the yards of the Wabash railroad here yesterday.

The two, Ben Edwards, 50, formerly of Springfield, and Jasper O. Hinton, 44, were taken in the yards when they alighted from a freight train which they had boarded at Moberly, Mo., after making their escape.

Guards from the Missouri prison returned the two, trustees at the penitentiary, last night. They were captured by J. W. Jesberg, a railroad policeman.

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## Central Japan is Shaken by a Quake

Tokyo, May 23—(UP)—Telephone service to 30 central and northern cities was disrupted today by an earthquake which shook central Japan and jarred plaster from some Tokyo buildings.

The earthquake was recorded as starting at 4:19 p. m. (1:19 a. m. cdt) with its center near Asama where there have been frequent volcanic eruptions recently. Seismographic instruments vibrated for 28 minutes here.

(An earthquake of medium intensity rocked Manila, in the Philippine Islands, for more than one minute starting at 4:25 p. m.)

The quake smashed windows and disrupted power lines at Caruzawa and other towns near Asama. Utsumiya was vigorously shaken and there was some property damage there.

## Fatally Injured Enroute Hospital

Chicago, May 23—(AP)—A 19-year-old youth was killed in an automobile accident yesterday while speeding to a hospital with a 16-year-old girl who had swallowed poison in a tavern.

Sgt. Daniel Nash said Jane Tilling drank the poison in the tavern of Louis Uecker. He was held on open charges.

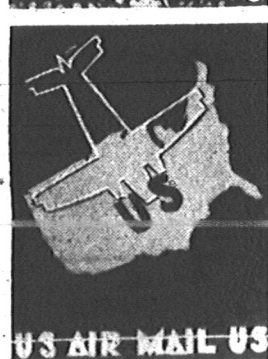
Stephen Funsten, Jr. was injured fatally when his automobile collided with another as he and several other youths were taking the girl to a hospital.

Sgt. Nash said that four companions of Funsten and Miss Tilling, all of whom were injured in the accident, said they had been in the tavern with the pair.

Miss Tilling's companions, Sgt. Nash said, reported that she had been plucked because her escort was attentive to another girl. Doctors said she would recover.

## Rockford Pickets Are Sent to Jail; Contempt Charges

Rockford, Ill., May 23—(AP)—A battle between police and pickets surrounding the J. I. Case plant here early this morning resulted in a partial defeat for the pickets. Several carloads of workers were rushed into the plant.

Several hundred pickets, members of the United Automobile Workers of America, were massed on a narrow bridge in the street leading to the plant's main entrance, with an automobile parked crosswise at the structure.

The mayor and sheriff spoke to the crowd and asked the pickets to disperse. The speakers were booed. Police ordered the car which blocked the street removed. The pickets refused to move.

Police then charged the picket lines and removed the car. In hand-to-hand fighting which ensued, police used their clubs freely and were in turn assailed with bricks, rocks and clubs.

In the melee, Chief Deputy Sheriff Carl Palmgren was struck in the head with a thrown brick and was taken to a hospital unconscious. Physicians, after a preliminary examination, said his condition was serious.

Pickets were hurled over the bridge railings into the narrow dry creek it spanned.

A force of plant employees, estimated by eye witnesses to number probably 150 men, stormed into the plant in automobiles. These were mostly supervisory and office employees.

Cuts and bruises were noted among many of the pickets and police.

No shots were fired during the battle nor was tear gas used.

Shortly after the battle, all workers who wished were able to pass through the picket lines without trouble. The pickets stood in their places and booed the entering workers, but did not molest them.

It was not known immediately whether enough men to man the plant were within the walls.

The pickets had defied a circuit court injunction restraining them for a week.

Council for five officials of the United Automobile Workers of America, who were fined and sentenced to jail for contempt of court, prepared an appeal today.

The five were convicted late Saturday in connection with the violation of a circuit court injunction restraining pickets from interfering with employees at the J. I. Case company plant here.

Charles Fain, president of the U. A. W. A. local, a C. I. O. affiliate, and Leonard Key, recording secretary, each was fined \$300 and sentenced to 30 days in the Winnebago county jail.

John Brunau, a vice president; Byron Heaton, treasurer, and Frank O'Donnell, financial secretary, each was fined \$100 and sentenced to 10 days in jail.

Circuit Judge Arthur E. Fisher ordered them incarcerated immediately after sentence was passed, with instructions that they were to remain in jail until the fines were paid. One-fifth of the court costs also was assessed against each of the defendants.

The farm implement factory was closed April 25 in a dispute involving the U. A. W. A. and an A. F. of L. union. The injunction was obtained by 97 employees of the plant.

## GOOD WILL AUTO HERE TOMORROW

U. S. Rubber has been chosen to play an important part in the nationwide promotion of the New York World's Fair 1939, according to C. F. Close, proprietor of Close Motor Service, local U. S. Tire Dealer.

"To stimulate interest in the Fair, which will open a year from now, 49 Good-Will cars will be sent to the Fair, May 2, on a tour covering the national capital, all state capitals, and all key cities in the United States," Mr. Close stated. "These cars will be driven by U. S. Rubber's Field Engineering organization and will be equipped with new U. S. Royal Master safety tires."
