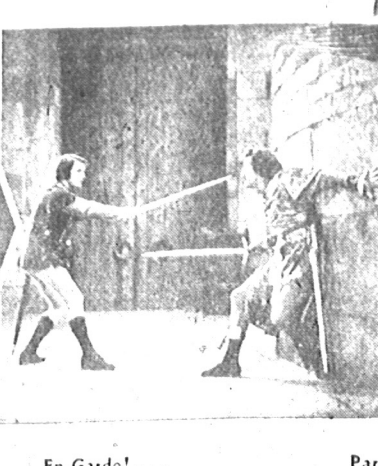

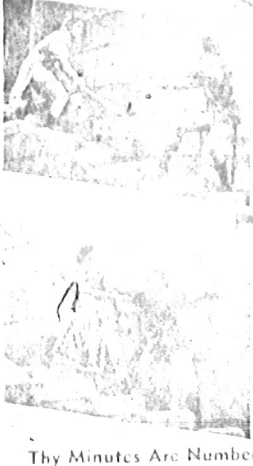

"Adventures of Robin Hood" Production in Technicolor Starts Sun. at Paramount

Robin Hood! How strange the fascination new initiative the sound of these two words, the legendary name of a knighted and beloved by thousands of Englishmen.

We'll meet it thrill in "The Adventures of Robin Hood," a Warner Bros. production, starring Errol Flynn, Basil Rathbone, and Olivia de Havilland, which comes to the Paramount theater starting Sunday.

Robin Hood is the story of how a Saxon noble, Sir Robin of Locksley, the eldest son of an English noble, captured a band of outlaws around him to rescue the cruel Norman conqueror.
